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1	PROCEEDINGS
2	MR. KIRA: I guess we're going to start the
3	short short meeting of the Airport Authority
4	because I look like I'm the only director at the
5	moment. So, would you please stand for the Pledge?
6	(Pledge of Allegiance.)
7	MR. KIRA: Thank you. Please be seated.
8	I'd like to ask our attorney to give us a
9	ruling on how we should continue this meeting with
10	one board member.
11	MR. BURNETT: Okay. Mr. Kira, unfortunately
12	we can't have an official meeting without a quorum.
13	So for that reason, we can discuss something,
14	if there's something in particular you want to
15	have you'd like to discuss. But otherwise, we
16	can't record an official meeting because we don't
17	have a quorum. Obviously no official action can
18	take place.
19	And so, unfortunately, that's the the long
20	and the short of it. I guess you could record
21	public comment if you wanted to do that. But
22	otherwise, we really need to wait for the next
23	meeting where we have a quorum in order to conduct
24	any business.

MR. KIRA: Okay. What we have is, we went

1	through Pledge of Allegiance. Meeting minutes and
2	financial reports can't be accepted by the board
3	since we don't have enough people to accept.
4	Agenda approval, that's where we're at at the
5	moment.
6	Executive Director's report, we can go to that
7	and get a summary from the director Executive
8	Director.
9	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT
10	MR. WUELLNER: If you wish. How efficient I
11	am, let me steal your mic.
12	New T-hangars B and C have we received CO a
13	few weeks back and I believe completed the move-in
14	of those who are have been assigned or asked to
15	move as well as those off the hangar waiting list.
16	We still have remaining punch list items to
17	work through with the contractor. As a result, the
18	action you took last month to approve release or
19	retainage pending receipt of all the paperwork is
20	still hanging out there until completion of those
21	punch list items.
22	We are actively in design for the improvements
23	along Estrella Avenue that are still in the
24	project. They'll be awarded independent of that.

Taxiway Delta, that project by way of update

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1	looks like it will not start in earnest until after
2	the first of the year, so about early January for
3	the for the major work elements.

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We are still working with the contractor and actually one of his subs to get the underground pipe work and the like that can be done without the actual physical closure of the existing taxiway or any of the access points, get that work accomplished perhaps ahead of the -- of the January start date in earnest and get that out of the way. So, we're hoping to get started in a -- in a meaningful way after the first of the year, but there may be some work that begins perhaps in November, but again, maybe not till January.

Terminal apron project is complete, just so you know. That is working through the process with FAA and FDOT to close that grant out or those grants out.

And FDOT has advised us that the State is -has something in the order of a \$700 billion
revenue shortfall in general for the upcoming
couple of years. They don't know what that means
relative to their work programs.

They have indicated that, without question, they intend to fund any match grants with FAA

projects as it relates to aviation, and then they
will be evaluating as they get direction from the
top of FDOT.

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My guess is you're not going to get meaningful direction on what DOT's going to do until following the legislative section in March and April because I just don't see them -- it's going to be budget-dependent on the State side and there could be revenue changes that affect upcoming work programs. So just kind of hold on like everybody else and we'll see what happens as we get into spring, late spring on this.

They indicated that anything that's already under grant is fine because it's actually allocated money already; it's just grants that are programmed. Could be deferred, could be partially funded. They could — they could have a myriad of options in front of them, but we don't know what that's going to look like.

I did want to advise you the annual audit has begun. Most of that is being done out of the office at this point but with the new auditors.

That'll continue. We will not -- as has been the case for the last several years, we don't expect that a report will be produced until after the

first of the year. That is owing entirely to the

time it takes the State of Florida to release the

certified audited pension-related matters. That

doesn't occur till January each year.

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So until that data is released and then can be conformed under the GASB standards, it's just not going to happen until then. And that -- may as well get used to that timeline. It's probably not going to happen any sooner until and unless they ever repeal that section of GAS -- the Government Accounting Standard Board's requirements.

Lastly, we provided you -- Carol put together the legislative and operational updates. You can see the general operating numbers are down as expected approximately 30 percent overall.

Still solid. Revenue numbers and the like are, you know, pretty much tracking as we would expect from a budget standpoint. The numbers are down operationally, but thankfully it's not translating into real reductions in revenues, and of course expenses we can track and monitor as we go. Everything's performing at least one month into this doing fine.

So I'm happy to answer any questions you might have, but otherwise, that's pretty much what I've

got for this month. 2 MR. KIRA: Thank you. Any questions from the 3 audience? 4 (None.) 5 BUSINESS PARTNERS UPDATE 6 MR. KIRA: Okay. Well, let's go down the list. Business partners. Mr. Dean, Commissioner? 7 COMMISSIONER DEAN: Good afternoon. Is this 9 on? 10 MR. HARVEY: Yes. 11 COMMISSIONER DEAN: No. It's lit up. Hello? 12 Hello? 1.3 MR. KIRA: Yes, hello. COMMISSIONER DEAN: I -- I'm loud anyway. I 14 can yell. 15 16 Quick update. I wanted to highlight a couple 17 of things. I get asked quite a bit about how's 18 COVID-19 affecting St. Johns County in general and 19 a few interesting statistics that I have come 20 across. 21 Am I okay recording? Can you hear this okay? 22 Maybe I should speak into the mic. It's backing up 2.3 now. 2.4 Since COVID-19 hit last March, it -- it's sort 25 of interesting. We -- we base next year's

budget -- well, actually we started October 1 this year's fiscal year budget, based on the previous year's property assessments, which as of January 1 really reflects the previous year '19, but that's when they're assessed, the valuation assessed.

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And because we had such a runup in commercial and business activity construction over the last year -- Durbin Park, for example, the new town center out near 9B, other -- some other major commercial development, our property value assessments, our assessments on taxable property that we're basing this year's budget on were actually up 10 percent.

And also, the CARES Act that Congress passed provided St. Johns County approximately \$46 million this year to be spent by December 31st. And today is the second phase, by the way, for those who may be interested or if you have friends who may be interested, in the second phase of the business and individual grant program.

You can contact our offices. Joy Andrews, the assistant county administrator, is basically overseeing that project, and you can certainly call Joy Andrews, the assistant county administrator, if anyone has questions about that program that is

	being kicked off today. There was a press
2	release I don't know. I think it ran in
3	The Record over the weekend about the program.

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We continue to be, I'm a bit surprised, very active in our growth, for better or worse. Some people are -- like no growth. Some people like healthy growth. Some people are in between.

But just to give you another stat to think about, in September of 2019, a little over a year ago, we had 250 single family homes permits issued, 250 single family dwelling unit permits issued by the building department. September of 2020, last month, we had 400.

And, I mean, I guess it's what Sheriff David
Shoar told me four years ago when I was running the
first time and the issue of growth management kept
coming up, and he said, "Henry, you just have to
accept the fact that there are two kinds of people
in America: Those who live in St. Johns County and
those who want to live in St. Johns County."

And we're doing the best we can, but we see a projection -- I have several friends in the business of pretty large significant developments that have been underway for some time and what they're hearing on the national scene and the sort

1	of the gossip among builders is that because of
2	COVID, you've got middle-aged couples or slightly
3	beyond middle age who are talking among themselves
4	saying, well, we can't go on our our dream
5	vacation to Europe this summer we've been planning
6	for 20 years and, you know, we're stuck. Let's
7	just go ahead and do what we need to do, get out of
8	this urban densely populated environment in Boston
9	or New York or Philadelphia and get down to
10	Florida, God's country.

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So we're seeing a continual increase in home sales in Nocatee. We're starting to have home sales in SilverLeaf and everywhere in between. You know, it's -- to me, it's kind of a -- an interesting factor. And as a county commissioner, when I talk about this issue on -- with several friends around the state, some on other commissions, I feel a little -- a little embarrassed or guilty that St. Johns County is doing so well.

I know we have people that are hurting. Our unemployment numbers continue to be too high. With COVID, they shot up initially to around 12 percent for St. Johns County. Well, they've come down to around 8 percent, but historically up until last

1	March, we were the number one county for a low
2	employment, unemployment number. We were like
3	2.7 percent, which led the state. And we also lead
4	the state of course in having the best schools, the
5	healthiest county, the list goes on. So those of
6	us who live here I think can be fortunate that we
7	have so far kind of weathered the COVID-19 storm
8	pretty well.

I would like to see more of our tourist industry folks that are unemployed come back, in other words, get tourism sort of revitalized, but it's tough. You know when you're dealing with, you know, certain reduced occupancies for restaurants, certain rules that have to be followed for hotels, et cetera, and attractions and just travel in general. People are not taking the kind of vacations they did. You've all seen what happened to Disney World and the numbers that, you know, have been laid off.

But in general, St. Johns County, I'm

pretty -- pretty pleased with how the county is

doing so far. It could be doing a lot worse. So

are there any questions? Since we have one member,

have you got --

MR. KIRA: Actually, I don't. You're very --

BARRESI: Yeah, I'm just going to pass on 7 any comments today other -- other than to say, you know, we do have the election coming up and looking at the people who are running, there's a lot of 9 fine people running for the board, really. I have 10 to, you know, take my hat off to the other 11 12 candidates that they have very impressive resumes. 13 MR. KIRA: I totally agree with you. 14 MR. BARRESI: Thank you. MR. KIRA: Dan Nehring? 15 16 MR. WUELLNER: Not here. 17 MR. KIRA: Okay. Tammy? 18 MS. ALBIN: Tammy Albin, St. Augustine Air 19 Traffic Control.
- Every month we've gone down. Last month was our lowest month and -- that I can remember in a long time. We only had about 6,600 operations.

For our numbers, Ed pretty much hit. We're

anywhere between 20 and 30 percent down on our

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operations.

- I've been here since October of '06 and I think
 that's probably the lowest month that we've had in
 that amount of time. Our current totals are at
 88-, just over 88,000 for the year as opposed to
 the same time last year it was almost 113,000
 operations. So just kind of shows you where we're
- So far, knock on something, the controllers

 have stayed very healthy and we haven't had any

 issues whatsoever COVID-wise. Other towers in the

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MR. KIRA: Our operations went down, and now is the reasoning for that is weather-related or --

area have. So, so far, so good.

- MS. ALBIN: We've had -- some has been

 weather. There's been a lot of weather days. But

 a lot of it's been flight schools.
- 18 MR. KIRA: Okay. So issues there.
- MS. ALBIN: Now, we're getting more flight schools from Embry-Riddle and all those are now finally starting to come back through
- 22 St. Augustine.
- Up at Craig, they're having record numbers.
- They're having -- they're probably going to --
- they're having 700, 800 days in their operations

- right now. So they started out slow in COVID where
 they pretty much shut down the flight schools and
 now they're record numbers.
- We were the other way around. The flight

 schools here flew as hard as they could for as long

 as they could and now we're slow. So we did the

 opposite of everybody else and everybody else has

 already picked back up. So we're just waiting to

 see where we fall on that curve.
