Board Member Olson introduced a letter, which he wrote and transmitted to Mr. Steven Green of MartinAir, Incorporated. You'll recall that MartinAir, on September 15th, 2023, submitted a proposal to construct and operate an FBO on the airport property. The issue I want to make sure we clarify pertains to whether MartinAir could be accommodated soon or -- on a specific 21-acre parcel of property on the airport or, in the future, in an area near Gun Club Road in the -- when it's available for development.

Mr. Olson did not submit the letter prior to the meeting to either the chair or the executive director or counsel so it could be vetted before it was publicized and transmitted to the members along with the other agenda items. So the -- the letter was appended to the minutes and made part of the permanent record of the Authority; however, after the meeting, staff noted there were some discrepancies and some -- several errors within the letter.

So I've asked staff to review the letter and to report their findings on MartinAir's proposal

               MR. ROBERTS: Thanks very much.

               The issue was and is the process by which
21
          staff came to the recommendation to move forward
22
          with the Volato proposal.
23
               Mr. Topp, could we go to just the first
24
          slide --

MR. TOPP: Sure.

1	MR. ROBERTS: of the slide deck?
2	I'll do this as rapidly as I can.
3	We the record is clear of what parcel we're
4	talking about. By the way, for the record, my name
5	is Chad Roberts. I'm aviation counsel for the
6	St. Johns County Airport Authority. And I have
7	personal knowledge about what I'm discussing and
8	have done a reasonable investigation to determine
9	the veracity of what I'm discussing.
10	This is what we call the south parcel if
11	you could go to the second slide more
12	particularly described in other places as this blue
13	area in between Grumman's North 40 and the yellow
14	area, which is the Hush House. Don't need to
15	recite the procedural history of where we are.
16	If you could go to Slide 3.
17	In the course of developing this proposal,
18	staff elected to publish a notice, and and the
19	notice is exactly the purpose of the notice is
20	self-disclosed in it. It recites that the airport
21	had received an unsolicited proposal from the
22	private sector to develop and build a full-service
23	FBO upon this 21-acre parcel that I just described,

proposal was currently being evaluated, and that

the purpose of the notice was to establish a time

24

and date after which other proposals from the
private sector to develop and build any kind of
commercial aeronautical service facility on that
parcel would no longer be considered during the
evaluation site.

What that means is something like a period of exclusivity was going to begin on September 15th so that whatever was on deck on September 15th, whatever had been submitted by September 15th, that was going to freeze and provide some stability to what the airport was going to have to work through.

That notice was published on July 17th. The due date was 2:00 p.m. on September 15th, almost two months.

There were three purposes that the staff had for making that notice. One was to bring some order to the process so that there would no longer be a moving target of what was on deck, changing from day to day.

The second was notice and fairness. If someone had just been on the cusp submitting a proposal for that parcel and -- and walked up and said, "Well, if I'd only known you were about to -- to do a lease with someone else, I would have done it earlier," provide notice and opportunity and

L	fairness to anyone else that might have been
2	considering submitting any type of aeronautical
3	service proposal.

The third purpose the staff relied on was public confidence, and that was for the circumstance that one-fifth of our governance also is an officer of Volato. It provided some transparency, not just the appearance of transparency, but transparency in fact. Right? Transparency in fact. And that was to protect both the non-conflicted board members and the conflicted board member and to put to rest any concern that the public may have that somehow Volato's proposal was -- was being insulated from competitive review or that it was being given the inside track to some lucrative opportunity here. So those were the purposes of it.

This notice was published by a marketing company in the aviation/space to 14,000 users of aviation property on airports. In addition, there is some evidence that the prior interim director, Mr. Harvey, contacted a number of the leading market participant FBOs -- I don't know who they were, probably more than two -- and made them specifically aware of this notice.

I'm aware that this notice had its intended
purpose. I'm aware of at least one circumstance
where a chain major chain operator FBO contacted
the Authority and asked for our fuel sales, and
they were actively computing and putting a number
on that. So we know that the notice went out, it
had its intended effect, and it was being
considered by the major market participants.

Specifically, this was not a request for proposals. That had been considered and -- and rejected as an approach. It did not involve the solicitation of bids because we weren't asking for anything. These were simply a way of accommodating other aeronautical users that might have wanted to use the property. All it did was direct anyone interested to our policies and procedures manual so that their submission would be the very same procedure for which Volato was also subject.

September 15th came. No other proposals had been received. Nothing from the major FBO competitors, nothing from Signature, nothing from Million Air, nothing from Sheltair, nothing from any other major FBO chains had -- had arrived on September 15th.

On -- about two hours before the 2:00 p.m.

1	deadline or a few hours before the 2:00 p.m.
2	deadline, a FedEx package arrived and there was a
3	package inside of it. And the cover letter looked
4	like this does, Number 4. It looked like this. We
5	didn't know who this was from, who these folks

were. We weren't familiar with them. They hadn't,
to our knowledge, contacted us ahead of time. This
just showed up.

So we opened it, and we started to read it, and the first thing that immediately jumps out is there's something strange about it. It appears to be the wrong proposal. It appears to be addressed to some other airport. It appears to be that someone may have inadvertently printed the wrong draft of a proposal to us and sent it to us because surely sophisticated businesspeople contemplating a multimillion-dollar proposal would not have intentionally sent this to us in this condition.

So it -- the text of it all describes this prospective FBO, not in St. Augustine, but in Richmond, Virginia.

Go to Slide Number 5.

And it continues, it describes what they're going to do here and that they will be the FBO for access to the greater Richmond market. Strange.

- 1 Next slide, please.
- They describe their fuel supplier that they're
- 3 going to contemplate.
- And if you could go to the next slide.
- 5 Also describes, strangely, how they're going
- to be prepared for the Richmond NASCAR races that
- 7 are coming in that area. It continues --
- 8 Next slide. If you could go to the next slide
- 9 for the callout.
- MR. TOPP: Next one?
- MR. ROBERTS: Yes, sir.
- 12 Again, the text -- although the cover letter
- says St. Augustine, the text is all about RIC,
- 14 Richmond -- Richmond International Airport. So we
- 15 suspected that someone would call us someday and
- say, "We didn't intend to send you this. It was
- 17 the wrong one. Here's the correct one." Right?
- 18 But what did we do next? What did Mr. Topp do
- 19 next? Reached out to the person -- if you'd go to
- the next slide, Number 11.
- 21 I know the -- the print is fine, but this is a
- 22 website about Mr. Galdieri. This is the gentleman
- who was proposed to be the operator of our
- 24 St. Augustine FBO. Right?
- 25 So if you could go to the next slide.

1	This is his company. He's makes a great
2	impression on a background check: Naval Academy
3	grad, aircraft manager, Part 135 operator, and does
4	have, in Easton, Maryland, a single FBO operation
5	there.

Everything about Mr. Galdieri's involvement was enormously reassuring to us for this proposal, and everything about Mr. Galdieri remained reassuring to us until he answered the phone.

Mr. Topp called to introduce himself. The airport's general counsel was on the call to introduce the airport, to let him know "We got your proposal, wanted to introduce ourselves to you. We've got some work to go through and do all our due diligence with you about your proposal to operate an FBO in St. Augustine, Florida."

And you would not imagine his response. I'm paraphrasing, but it was something like "I'm not involved in an FBO proposal for St. Augustine, Florida. It's not me. I'm not doing that."

And to confirm the incredulity of what they were hearing, at some point, general counsel said, "I'm sorry, Mr. Galdieri. I need to ask you just very specifically and very directly, are you telling us that no one authorized you to be -- that

Τ	you did not authorize anyone to make you part of
2	some proposal to operate an FBO in St. Augustine?"
3	And the clear unambiguous answer was "No."
4	Mr. Topp, is that a fair characterization?
5	MR. TOPP: That is correct?
6	MR. ROBERTS: Mr. Blocker, fair summary of the
7	phone call?
8	MR. BLOCKER: That is accurate, yes, sir.
9	MR. ROBERTS: So at this point, we're
10	wondering: Who sent this to us? Where did it come
11	from? The person operating the FBO doesn't know
12	anything about it. The proposal looks like it's a
13	mistake. It's meant to go to Richmond. Who sent
14	this to us?
15	So we go back to the document itself, and it
16	describes who the players are. There is MartinAir
17	that is owned by Revolent Capital, an investor
18	organization, private equity investor. And it says
19	the investors behind Revolent are not passive.
20	They're they're they understand front line
21	operations and the importance of culture and all
22	that. So Revolent owns MartinAir. And there's a
23	point of contact on this page here, Mr. Green, and
24	a phone number.

So a little background on MartinAir and who

Τ	these folks are. There's a Mr. Raver I know the
2	print is fine, but according to the Virginia
3	Department of Corporations, the president is a
4	Mr. Kuder, the vice president is a Mr. Raver. And,
5	sure enough next slide these are one more
6	above. One more above.
7	MR. TOPP: One more?
8	MR. ROBERTS: Just one slide up. One slide
9	up, one of the first two pictures. There you go.
10	So these are the two principals of Revolent
11	who are on record of being the president and vice
12	president of MartinAir.
13	If you could go to the next slide.
14	Their buyer fees are there. Mr. Kuder came up
15	professionally through the Venture Capital
16	professional experience through Venture Capital.
17	And Mr. Raver is a young entrepreneur who began
18	acquiring business service companies. They if
19	you'd go to the next slide.
20	Their website tells you what they do. They
21	invest in some target industries, which include
22	janitors, security guards, landscapers, painting
23	things, and caulking windows. They're also
24	interested in some other industries. I'll
25	summarize that none of them are aviation

1	industries.
2	Next slide, please.
3	They describe what they've actually invested
4	in, and consistently, it's janitorial services,
5	apartment management services, and trash haulers.
6	Next slide.
7	And they own some apartment buildings.
8	So at this point, Mr. Topp was ready to call
9	Mr. Green, not knowing really what to expect, and
10	to give him the benefit of the doubt of "Did you
11	send us the right application? Did you mean to
12	have a different FBO operator other than
13	Mr. Galdieri? But let me hear your side of the
14	story."
15	And they had a conversation. And Mr. Galdier
16	responded, "Yep, it was a cut-and-paste. It was a
17	cut-and-paste. The difference in our
18	cut-and-pastes that we send to people is just the
19	architectural rendering that we put in it.
20	Everything else is the same."
21	Not a reassuring response.
22	Next slide, please.
23	And as to the person that they held out to us
24	as being the operator of the FBO for St. Augustine,

the response was, well, they had mentioned it to

1	him	had	ment	cione	d it	to	him		and	maybe	they
2	forgot	to	drop	the p	oacka	ıge	off	to	him.		

Not a reassuring response for what this submission was.

I can tell you personally at this point -- if you could just stay on that slide for a minute -- at this point, personally, I started thinking of this as a marketing brochure and not a real submission.

So at this point -- at this point, everything that's in this proposal, all of the lists of the employees they're going to bring here, all of the ground handling equipment they're going to bring, none of it is about us. None of it is about us. And while it's glossy and it might impress a casual reader, if you push through the thin gloss of this submission down to the substance, as a critical reader, it deflates and just disappears. It's not a meaningful submission.

The question then became does this kind of submission justify us going back to the drawing board? And our conclusion unanimously was, no, it justifies them going back to the drawing board.

This is not what we were -- we were interested in protecting the rights of. This was some

1	investors who had rear or missing out and they
2	they slapped together a proposal at the last
3	minute, cut-and-paste, with material
4	misrepresentations in it and sent it to us.
5	It is actually a good thing that this was not
6	a formal RFP because submitting to the State of
7	Florida an RF response to an RFP that had those
8	material misrepresentations in it would have had
9	consequences, potentially, for anyone.
10	So we didn't think our process is going to be
11	derailed by continuing. Our conclusion was if we
12	would have permitted this to derail our process,
13	that would have been dysfunctional
14	dysfunctional, not the other way around.
15	Mr. Topp is who is tasked with being "the buck
16	stops here" guy for us. It was time. Someone had
17	to make a decision on the information available.
18	And he made a decision. It had unanimous
19	concurrence with with both counsel. And it was
20	because we had arrived at a point where, number
21	one, none of the smart money showed up. Okay?
22	None of the smart money showed up. The people who
23	do this for a living didn't show up. Only this
24	submission came in.

And at this point, after this scrutiny had

L	been visited upon Volato's proposal, un
2	unparalleled scrutiny of this proposal, could one
3	say that for this particular parcel at this airport
1	at this point in time, was Volato's proposal the
5	highest and best use for the airport? And the
5	answer's yes. Yes, it is. It is. That was our
7	conclusion.

So, fortunately, I think for MartinAir, Mr. Topp is gracious. He's a gracious person. Не doesn't visit embarrassment on people unnecessarily. He called Mr. Green -- if you could go to the next slide -- and told him a couple things: One, that there was nothing unique about MartinAir's submission that they needed this parcel as opposed to another parcel. There was nothing uniquely tied to the 22-acre parcel that they needed, number one. The 22-acre parcel was subject to an FAA order that has great uncertainty about it and we don't know when that will be released. that if they did want to put together a proposal that was about us, that was about our needs, that was about our future, we would entertain that but they needed to go back and do that. And when they did that, they should contemplate applying that to the parcel on our airport layout plan that's

1 designate for -- designated for future FBOs. 2 So Mr. Topp sent an e-mail to confirm this 3 conversation. We had a -- we had a call "MartinAir 4 has agreed to amend its conceptual submission to 5 that parcel of land on the ALP, the airport layout 6 plan, for future development of an FBO." 7 If you could go to the next slide. 8 Mr. Topp included in the e-mail a picture of 9 what he was talking about so there's no 10 misunderstanding where he was sending these folks. 11 It accurately depicts the parcel. It depicts 12 Hawkeye View Lane. It depicts everything that's 13 involved in that parcel. 14 If you could go to the next slide. 15 Mr. Green responds and says, "We agree to the 16 new site. We agree. We'll withdraw our submission 17 from the 21-acre parcel and apply it to the other one." 18 19 Next slide. 20 Now, I don't know how to resolve what you're looking at. I really don't. On the left-hand side 21

looking at. I really don't. On the left-hand side is the e-mail thread from Mr. Green that says they agree to withdraw the submission from the 21-acre parcel and apply it to the other parcel, October 6th.

- 1 MR. OLSON: Could you point out exactly where 2 on this screen you're reading right now?
- 3 MR. ROBERTS: I'm sorry?
- 4 MR. OLSON: Could you -- what you just read --
- 5 MR. TOPP: Right here.
- 6 MR. OLSON: -- they withdraw. I don't see
- 7 "withdraw."
- 8 MR. ROBERTS: Okay.
- 9 MR. OLSON: Just -- I just wanted to see the
- 10 connection. That's okay. I see it now.
- MR. ROBERTS: Okay.
- MR. OLSON: I don't see "withdraw," but okay.
- 13 A small -- small -- small point.
- MR. ROBERTS: So I don't know how to resolve
- this. But I can tell you this: When Mr. Topp was
- asked at the board meeting if MartinAir had agreed
- to move their application over to the other parcel
- and he said yes, he was telling you the truth. He
- 19 was telling you the truth.
- 20 And I won't go through the other points of
- 21 Mr. Olson's memo other than to summarize this as to
- 22 whether there is some unfair prejudice being
- visited upon anyone applying to the other parcel
- instead of the 21-acre parcel.
- 25 If you could go to the next slide.

They are both impacted by significant wetland mitigation issues.

If you could go to the next slide, you can see where the 21-acre superimposes on top of the green over there. And just go to the next one, and it's more transparent. You can see that.

"Wetland mitigation" is going to be the environmental term that drives this economic feasibility. They're both equally impacted.

As for the road, Hawkeye View Lane -- if you could go to the next text -- what -- what all developers have is -- you know, they take this -- they take this as it is: As-is, where-is.

What is also in Volato's term sheet that we used and submitted to Northrop Grumman was if they don't want to wait for the State of Florida to help relocate this road, they want to do it themselves, they can do it themselves and we will give them a credit for it. Right? So if they -- if they invest as part of their infrastructure and they make improvements to road, sewage, water, retention ponds, and that provides a common benefit to other subsequent developers on the east side, one of which may be the airport, by the way, they'll get a credit for that, and the FAA permits that.

          equivalent that the developer would finance those

- 1 common benefit improvements.
- 2 MR. OLSON: I'm just wanting to make sure that
- 3 the liability isn't on the books of the Authority.
- 4 MR. ROBERTS: Right. It would not be.
- 5 MR. OLSON: Okay. Thank you.
- 6 MR. ROBERTS: So that's how the decision was
- 7 made. We've revisited this. We've looked at
- 8 everything we did. We -- we don't change it. We
- 9 don't -- don't think anything disturbs it. We
- 10 stand by it. It was an unanimous consensus by
- 11 staff for this conclusion.
- So -- well, I'll just stop there. I'll just
- stop there and say this: If anyone has any
- questions at all about this process and how it
- happens, this is a great time to ask. If anyone
- has any concerns about undisclosed conflicts of
- 17 interest or undisclosed motives or undisclosed
- 18 purposes, this is a great time to ask: Court
- 19 reporter, lawyer under oath, Bar license on the
- table. We would like to hear it now if there is.
- MR. OLSON: Yes. May I --
- 22 CHAIRMAN CLARKE: You --
- MR. OLSON: Yeah, I have -- I have a couple of
- 24 points and questions, but -- and I'll say right now
- I have had no reason to think about, necessarily,

1	conflicts	of	interest	and	

MR. TOPP: I can't hear	VO11 -
------------------------	--------

MR. OLSON: And my other summary point, and I've got a couple others, is we could have all saved a lot of time and effort if, on the 9th of October, a report such as this should have come back instead of the sort of ambiguous statement about they had withdrawn because they ended up becoming interested in another parcel.

That is the answer -- the minimal answer that caused me to wonder since I wasn't hearing detail.

And, in fact, the procedure was for staff to review this proposal that had just come in and report back to the board. In fact, the Sunshine Law is very specific on this. It gives very specific examples. Staff does not make decisions about -- boards make decisions. Decisions such as this are done through deliberation in a publicly announced meeting. The role of staff is to -- is to retrieve the detail and make a report and not to make decisions.

So, technically, to -- to come back and say that this company, MartinAir, is no longer interested means -- or gives the impression that -- and -- well, I just think what should have happened with what was going to happen on the 25th of

1	September is a report, such as the detail you
2	have Mr. Roberts, have just shared, should have
3	come back. If it wasn't ready to be reported to
4	the board, it should have just been held back.

It created a lot of concern, certainly on my part, and it created a lot of controversy that could have been avoided. And that's, I guess, my summary statement.

My other statement is I'm not sure if your description of the motivation behind the issuance of notice was fully complete and fully addressed and encapsulated all the reasons that this was -- that this was done.

There was a two-hour, as I recall, discussion in a -- what's called by locals here a shade meeting on July 7th that went back and forth, back and forth. Because I went into that meeting, as you can recall, advocating that a -- that an RFP process be used because of my personal feeling that we should not award land leases without RFP processes. And there was a huge amount of discussion.

The point you made about the reason doing it to allay any concerns about conflict of interest came into the discussion, but it came in late in

- 1 the discussion.
- 2 So I feel that the only way we can fully share
- 3 the reasons behind the notice was -- was -- would
- 4 be to have the minutes of that shade meeting become
- 5 available, and I -- I'm -- I know that others don't
- 6 think it should be available.
- 7 The -- the only time we -- or we did not hear
- 8 that the proposal was -- had been -- a study of the
- 9 proposal had found all the deficiencies and
- 10 questions that you raise now, Mr. Roberts, until
- our last board meeting. So, again, that report
- should have come out as was intended from the
- 13 September 25th meeting.
- But I have to say I appreciate all of the work
- and attention you've given to me. It answers a
- bunch of questions in my mind as to the puzzlement
- 17 I'm hearing that Martin had actually themselves
- 18 initiated a withdrawal of the 21 acres. So thank
- 19 you.
- 20 MR. ROBERTS: Yeah, and I appreciate that.
- 21 The -- and, Madam Court Reporter, further affiant
- sayeth naught, I -- we can end this record here.
- As a practical matter, everything we say is under
- oath, anyway, professionally.
- The only thing, Mr. Olson, and I appreciate

1	that feedback, and there is, respectfully, I think,
2	a different understanding about our governance and
3	the role of Mr. Topp. Under our governance, he
4	does, in fact, make decisions. He does, in fact,
5	make decisions. It is subject to board oversight.
6	So, for example, it's decision and report,
7	decision, report, decision, report. Or "I think
3	I'm getting about to make a decision, I'd like
9	some board guidance so we can talk it out."

But our current government structure does contemplate a very strong executive director position with policy oversight by the board. The board can make a motion to overturn anything Mr. Topp does at any time.

So -- so I think that's the more practical mechanism to avoid you all having to be in the weeds of everything. But that's our understanding. If the board collectively wants to recalibrate that, it's the board's power to do so.

And with respect to how the information came out, you know, Mr. -- Mr. Green was sitting in the back of the room -- well, not on the day that -- that Mr. Topp described his decision, but -- but if there's a fault, it's a fault of trying to be gracious and not visit unnecessary embarrassment to

I'm going to ask you all to bring these concerns to us, because I'm sure that Mr. Roberts and myself -- and I did -- you did reach out to me, Mr. Olson, but these are conversations we could have had. They

4	Mr. Topp not to put on this presentation to you all

MR. BLOCKER: That's right.

MS. CASH-CHAPMAN: It was posted on LinkedIn, it was posted on Indeed, which feeds to other job boards throughout the nation. We had 76, I think, applicants come through. Some came directly to the office that Mr. Topp put together and gave to me, the others came to -- through the job boards. And so I saved every single one of them on a flash drive. I brought them down to office where I printed them all.

You're right, I did remove the contact information, which everyone else on the board seemed to be okay with, because that was to protect us, as well as the applicants, so that we could discuss them openly without -- I mean, these are people that we're talking about. So we wanted to be aware of that and kind when we were reading

1 through these inter- -- or these applications in a 2 public forum. 3 I did assign numbers to each person so that we 4 could take away any biases that we knew about or 5 didn't know about. We all went through all of the 6 applicants the first time. You requested to take 7 all 76 home, which you absolutely had the right to 8 do and you did. MS. LUDLOW: With numbers. 9 10 MS. CASH-CHAPMAN: You didn't come to the 11 next -- but it shouldn't matter what their name is. 12 I didn't know their names either. 13 MS. LUDLOW: But you altered their resumé. 14 MS. CASH-CHAPMAN: I took off their contact 15 information, yes. 16 MS. LUDLOW: And -- and -- yes. And you took 17 off like their pictures or whatever was on the 18 document. 19 MS. CASH-CHAPMAN: Right, specifically to --20 MS. LUDLOW: You're not supposed to do that. 21 MS. CASH-CHAPMAN: Says who? 22 MS. LUDLOW: Well, says -- I mean, we're not 23 three years old. Now, I didn't remember at the last meeting exactly how everything had been posted. I knew it had been posted. So I don't see any fatal flaws in this process and I don't have -- and I would like to see these two candidates for in-person interviews.

MR. OLSON: And let me --

MS. CASH-CHAPMAN: A few weeks before, though, just in one of the meetings before when I gave you the initial update on how applicants were coming in, I told you specifically we had X amount from Indeed and X amount from LinkedIn, just so we're -- we can go back and look at minutes if we need to.

CHAIRMAN CLARKE: -- for the benefit of the

1	other board members, pretty much what you found,
2	how we got where we are
3	MR. HARLEY: Yes.
4	CHAIRMAN CLARKE: and how we can alleviate,
5	you know, the you know, the various conditions
6	with our technology?
7	MR. HARLEY: Absolutely. And I should
8	probably provide some background because I'm in an
9	unique position to where I was with the prior IT
10	company of the airport. Obviously, Gwanda, my

former employer, was acquired by i-Venture, which
is who I work for now, and now we've taken over the
support for the airport. So I've been working with

14 the airport for seven-plus years on the network, so

today.

I have a really good understanding where we're at

But, honestly, there was a different business goal and objective and things were to run out their intended life or longer on the current network, and now they're providing security concerns and points of failure for the network now. So my job with Mr. Topp -- we've been reviewing this -- is: How do we simplify the network to be reliable and efficient for the airport and replace it with new, modern equipment?

Τ	So there are many switches, there's servers,
2	there's many virtual networks that are, you know,
3	in the network that can be dissolved or shut down
4	and we can replace that with new and obviously
5	spend less dollars. So that's part of our goal.
6	MR. TOPP: Yeah. And to expand on that just a
7	little bit, there's a perfect example. We've beat
8	the lightning thing to death already. We're not
9	going to talk some more about that, but today I
10	got a call on Sunday morning, and this is going
11	through today, our Internet provider that comes
12	into the network what's that
13	MR. HARLEY: For our high-speed Internet, yes,
14	sir. It's Last Mile Wireless from the PD.
15	MR. TOPP: Yeah, Last Mile Wireless
16	MR. HARLEY: Uh-huh.
17	MR. TOPP: they have a juniper switch? Is
18	that what it's called?
19	MR. HARLEY: They do. Yes.
20	MR. TOPP: And I'll never forget that name
21	now. The juniper switch went down. It didn't just
22	go down; it just flat died. Okay? It supplied the
23	tower. It supplied our friends at Nimbus. It
24	supplied
25	MR. HARLEY: The tenant network, basically,

- 1 yes, sir.
- MR. TOPP: Yeah, the tenant network. Okay?
- 3 And the only reason I found out later today that
- 4 we're still functioning at the office of the
- 5 administration building is for the bill that we
- 6 pay -- and I always wondered what this was; I
- 7 investigated it -- was from Comcast. So we have a
- fiber line, I guess it is, from Comcast coming into
- 9 our building, and it somehow knew it died, so it
- 10 flipped over --
- 11 MR. HARLEY: Yeah. Yeah.
- 12 MR. TOPP: -- and ran our network. Because I
- was wondering, "Why is everything so slow today?"
- 14 you know? And -- because our network is usually
- 15 pretty darn fast.
- And so one of the other things that Chloe did
- today, she talked to Roxanne, and we're going to
- 18 set up a meeting with a rep from Comcast because it
- 19 wouldn't hurt -- since we have fiber everywhere,
- right, that the Last Mile, like he's talking about,
- if we could get a backup for Comcast to all these
- switches, including the new ones we're going to be
- 23 putting in, right --
- MR. HARLEY: Yes, sir.
- 25 MR. TOPP: -- instead of the 37 that we have

1	now
2	MR. HARLEY: Uh-huh.
3	MR. TOPP: then it would automatically roll
4	over for our tenants.
5	The other thing we're going to talk about is
6	some of our tenants Andrew just left, but, you
7	know, they really need to have their own network,
8	because when they get on, they get on and they
9	start sending these big CAD drawings, everybody in
10	the building just, you know, dies off, right? So
11	we're going to talk to him about that.
12	So that that's it. But there's also
13	something really important that kind of we need
14	to do a gap analysis. And maybe you can just talk
15	about that, the security risks that we have here
16	and
17	MR. HARLEY: Yes.
18	MR. TOPP: if we could, it falls into the
19	FAA and and you name it.
20	MR. HARLEY: So let me hit on another point.
21	The infrastructure updates and the refresh that I'm
22	talking about, also there's a plan to replace
23	Florida High Speed with a fiber provider, either
24	Comcast or Unity, to straighten the backbone so
25	it's a stronger bandwidth for the airport to

1 utilize. 2 Now, Last Mile Wireless was great for a period 3 of time, but it's gone down many times this year, and it's still down as of this week. So it's been 4 5 down for, you know, 18 hours plus --6 MR. TOPP: They told us --7 MR. HARLEY: -- and I don't have a repair 8 time. MR. TOPP: Four hours ago, they said, "We're 9 10 going to steal the backup power source from the 11 sheriff's department." 12 MR. HARLEY: I'm waiting for them to tell me 13 that it's back online right now. 14 MR. TOPP: Yeah, yeah. 15 MR. HARLEY: So I do have that in the 16 replacement plan. 17 So jumping to that, just one of the things 18 that I would like to conduct is that there are a number of compliance standards out on the -- you 19

that I would like to conduct is that there are a

number of compliance standards out on the -- you

know, IT standards today, right, and compliance

regulations. So with homeland security being here

and customs, we should start with a gap analysis

and having a third party come in -- we've partnered

with Alluvionic because we can't do the eval and

then remediate our eval. It's a conflict of

- 1 interest for us.
- 2 So Alluvionic is a company that we use.
- 3 They're out of Melbourne, Florida. They come in
- and say, "Here's where our concerns are," and then
- 5 hand the plan over to you, obviously the
- 6 administration, and then to us to say, "Here's --
- 7 here's what we recommend to do to remediate your
- 8 plan and how we fix that."
- 9 So it really is a kind of set zero point and
- 10 lets us move forward from there. So it's a really
- good option for us to do that.
- MR. TOPP: Right. And then -- and then the
- phone system refresh is because we have absolutely
- zero support for the Cisco phone system we have
- right now because they don't support it.
- MR. HARLEY: They do not support it. It is --
- it is 18 years old plus. It is a Cisco on-prem
- 18 device that's no longer supported. There's one
- 19 company in Louisiana that does this, and they're a
- 20 Cisco partner, and they're dramatically expensive,
- 21 up to the tune of \$500 an hour to repair the phone
- 22 system.
- MR. TOPP: Right.
- MR. HARLEY: There's no point in doing that.
- 25 It's time to replace it.

          hardware, the infrastructure refresh after all this
 3
          analysis is done, it's -- it's interesting. You

          know, we really have switches and switches and

          switches, and there's no need for that. You know,

          always coming to you and saying they need a bigger

21	MR. OLSON: Thank you.
22	MR. TOPP: Right. And Mr. Roberts
23	MR. OLSON: Yeah. It seems like if things are
24	becoming more expensive for the Authority, that
25	pain needs to be shared.

Ţ	MR. TOPP: Pass it on. Absolutely. The
2	opportunity needs to be shared.
3	MR. OLSON: Because it sounds like we're a
4	service provider more than facilities. We're an
5	IT service provider.
6	MR. TOPP: Right.
7	MR. HARLEY: There is both when you consider
8	that the hangars as the T-hangars, we're
9	providing wireless equipment for the tenants to use
10	in the hangars. That also uses your bandwidth. So
11	there is some sort of cost that should be passed on
12	appropriately.
13	MR. OLSON: Right. Did you hear that,
14	Ms. Ludlow?
15	CHAIRMAN CLARKE: Will that can that be
16	obviated going forward, or will the tenants have
17	their own network, or will they do you believe
18	they
19	MR. HARLEY: The tenants are on a separate
20	private network, so they can't access any sort of
21	airport resources
22	CHAIRMAN CLARKE: Okay.
23	MR. HARLEY: only Internet, and obviously
24	that's controlled as well by the firewall for
25	content filtering. So we only allow bandwidth for

- 1 what they need.
- 2 CHAIRMAN CLARKE: Oh, okay. All right. So
- 3 we're okay with that arrangement whereby we're --
- 4 we're selling them --
- 5 MR. HARLEY: Yes. It is virtually
- 6 separated --

L7	making sure our policies are consistent with
18	Florida and state law. So I'm going to get with
19	Mr. Topp, and we'll just go through our policies.
20	I don't think there's been a policy review
21	MR. TOPP: No.

23	probably some time. So we'll go through that and
24	report back to the board if we find any anything
25	that needs board action. Most of this could just

They can't 13 release it until they do the EO on it that, you 14 know -- so, hopefully, I'll have that by the 11th, 15 and if not, we'll do it later. 16 We've been meeting with a lot of people from 17 the county economic development folks and also the 18 chamber of commerce economic development and had 19 lunch with some folks on Friday. Was it Friday, 20 Dennis? 21 CHAIRMAN CLARKE: Yes. 22 MR. TOPP: Friday? 23 CHAIRMAN CLARKE: Uh-huh. 24 MR. TOPP: And then prior to that, we had a

meeting in our office, and they brought a whole

1	crew from the county economic development. And
2	it's moving along. And I think that there's a
3	tremendous amount of interest. And we'll recap
4	that in the future once I get my arms around it.
5	But I just wanted to let you know that the meeting
6	with Mr. Dean has precipitated a lot of interest
7	and also some Volato has also brought together a
8	lot of people. So we're going to have an
9	opportunity there.

And then the last thing, TSA, they had a meeting -- they had a meeting with us about three weeks ago originally? We have a new gentleman, David. Very nice gentleman. He went through and he said that, basically, nobody had really inspected us in detail in years and years and years since we redid it. So he picked up all the rocks and he found the frogs and he found a bunch of things and we got a letter from them.

Chloe and James have been working very hard.

Actually, by the time we got the letter,

three-quarters of it was resolved. There's some

locks and some different things that we have to do.

It's just small details. I just wanted to let you

know that we did get that letter from TSA. We

asked for an extension to respond to it because

25	know, sometime after the regular meeting, we'll

1	have a workshop, and we'll drill into some of those
2	concerns because they they I share those
3	concerns about going forward and setting up, you
4	know, long-term financial planning.
5	We did meet with Mr. Topp and I met with
6	the representatives of the South State Bank to
7	talk discuss a a line of credit, you know,
8	that they we may, you know, recommend. We need
9	to set up bonding facilities. I looked back in
LO	some of the minutes of the earlier in the
L1	Authority minutes, and it happened in 1964; they
12	had an issue a bonding issue. So it's not
13	unprecedented here, you know, that we have that
L 4	the Authority issue long-term bonds.
15	MR. OLSON: Yeah, I think that those were
16	for a lot of them were for the Fairchild
L7	accommodating Fairchild, as I I think I
18	researched.
19	CHAIRMAN CLARKE: So all that will be, you
20	know, incorporated into, you know, a workshop
21	meeting and an analysis going forward. So that
22	it's under way, we can tell you.
23	MR. OLSON: We need to look more than at
24	incurring debt. We need to look at revenues. And
25	T think we need to look hard at all the places that

Τ	revenue might be able to be enhanced and both in
2	the short term and in the long term.
3	CHAIRMAN CLARKE: I agree. That's all that
4	will be all part of the study or the analysis.
5	MR. OLSON: So what's the timing on this?
6	CHAIRMAN CLARKE: Well, we have to wait until
7	our preliminary financials are ready because

5	MR. TOPP: Right.
6	MR. OLSON: and very few jobs and not a lot
7	of capital return.
8	MR. TOPP: Right. I think that one of the
9	things that are going to help us is the
10	312 extension to the west.
11	MR. OLSON: Yes.

13	expressway and get
14	MR. OLSON: Yes, that will open it up and
15	MR. TOPP: And I talked to Randy at Grumman.
16	As I mentioned before, I read Aviation Week & Space

22	work. And when I mentioned it to Mr. Randy from
23	Grumman, he just like, "Yeah." He said, "We're
24	sending engines back all the time."
