3	St. Johns County-St. Augustine Airport Authority
4	board meeting. Stand for the Pledge, please.
5	(Pledge of Allegiance.)
6	3 APPROVAL OF MINUTES
7	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Okay. First order of
8	business is approval of the minutes. They were
9	sent to us electronically and there's paper
10	copies. Any objections, exceptions to the
11	minutes?
12	MR. BRUNSON: I move we approve them as
13	printed.
14	CHAIRMAN GREEN: No no objections or
15	exceptions?
16	MS. BARRERA: Second.
17	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Okay. Then they will be
18	approved as presented. Financial report?
19	4 FINANCIAL REPORT

20	MR. BRUNSON: Now, that's a different story.
21	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Well, Kelly?
22	MS. BARRERA: I have reviewed the financial
23	report and sat down and gone over it, and I'm very

1	MR. BRUNSON: I second.
2	CHAIRMAN GREEN: No other comment, exceptions
3	or objections to the financial report? Questions?
4	(No exceptions or objections.)
5	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Okay. And we will accept
6	the financial report as given.
7	5 AGENDA APPROVAL
8	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Agenda approval. We see the
9	meeting agenda in front of us. Buzz?
10	MR. GEORGE: I've got a couple of three items
11	I'd like to see added on to today's agenda. As
12	far as project updates, I'd like to get a status
13	of the painting of the floor of hangar 10. Also,
14	what's doing what's happening with the passes,
15	gate passes for Civil Air Patrol or Coast Guard
16	Auxiliary?
17	MR. WUELLNER: Okay.
18	MR. GEORGE: All right. When we get to
19	project updates. I would also like to add on to

20	the action items, we have a facility here I think
21	we're all proud of. And Ed and I have kicked it
22	around, you know, before, that like the county and
23	the city governments and everything, we don't have
24	the proper recognition of the Airport Authority
25	members from 1980, 1985 that have all contributed

1	to this. And I had suggested a plaque, you know,
2	to be established, you know, on the grounds.
3	Anyway, I'd like a discussion of that in the
4	action items.
5	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Any other comments? I
6	don't I don't know if we need to I don't
7	think that's going to take much time. It won't
8	push our agenda to much.
9	MR. GEORGE: No. No.
10	MR. BRUNSON: I have no objection.
11	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Is that all right, guys?
12	We'll amend the agenda to add those three small
13	items for discussion? The plaque, badges, and the
14	painting.
15	Okay? Not hearing any objections, so we'll
16	just add those three items to the agenda today.
17	And the agenda will stand.
18	Committee reports. MPO.
19	6 COMMITTEE REPORTS

20	MR. BRUNSON: MPO, very basic meeting, but
21	very detailed that and I'm not going to bore
22	you with it. But this is a list of the priorities
23	for the surrounding counties in St. Johns County
24	where we the projects that we believe are the
25	most important, including 312 and and the

1	different roads around here.
2	So, this is available and will be here if you
3	want to review it, if anybody wants to review it,
4	with a list of priorities that we go over with the
5	Department of Transportation and with the other
6	county commissioners from the other counties and
7	other board members for the MPO. Very simple, and
8	it's it's available if we want to look at it.
9	And that's all I have for the MPO.
10	CHAIRMAN GREEN: So that's available. Where
11	is it available? Like they could come here and
12	look at it or
13	MR. BRUNSON: Cindy, would you mind making it
14	available?
15	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Sure.
16	MR. BRUNSON: Okay.
17	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Okay. EDC? Did they have a
18	meeting?
19	MR. GEORGE: One of us is on that.

- MR. GORMAN: Not me. No.
- 21 MR. BRUNSON: I -- I missed the last meeting,
- so I have nothing to report.
- 23 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Intergovernmental.
- MR. GEORGE: Intergovernmental meets every
- other month, and they're supposed to meet again --

1	MR. WUELLNER: September.
2	MR. GEORGE: A couple of weeks.
3	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Okay. St. Johns County
4	Aerospace. We were scheduled to have a meeting on
5	the 15th, and it was decided that that was not a
6	good night, so they've postponed it until the 29th
7	of August.
8	We have a special person coming. I'm trying
9	to remember our agenda. Some interesting things
10	that were coming up in that meeting. That will be
11	6 o'clock. They were unsure if it was here or in
12	St. Augustine High.
13	MR. WUELLNER: I think it's at the high
14	school.
15	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Is it the high school?
16	Okay. Okay. Reports?
17	7 REPORTS
18	MR. WUELLNER: First up is Commissioner
19	Sanchez.

20	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Ron? Commissioner Sanchez?
21	COMMISSIONER SANCHEZ: My gosh, my name in
22	lights. I haven't seen that. I might resort to
23	my old entertainment business and start dancing
24	and singing, you know.
25	MR. GEORGE: Please make it small letters

1	then.
2	COMMISSIONER SANCHEZ: I'll make it real
3	short. It was my group, but they let me sing the
4	last two songs to get everyone out of the lounge
5	on time so, you know, it worked out well for
6	everybody.
7	Well, our new administrator's on board, and
8	he was I'm going to brag a little bit. He was
9	my number one selection. And I'll tell you what;
10	I am very, very pleased. We have a very
11	intelligent person, very caring person. And he
12	actually has a real sense of humor, which you need
13	in that position. He's really a great person.
14	And I don't know, have any of you met him yet?
15	Has he been over here to the airport office yet?
16	MR. WUELLNER: Not yet.
17	COMMISSIONER SANCHEZ: I will see if I
18	he's really busy, but I'll see if I can bring him
19	to the next board meeting, at least as

- 20 introduction.
- 21 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Or at our budget, I mean,
- whatever.
- 23 COMMISSIONER SANCHEZ: But he really is.
- He's -- he's going to work out fine. For the
- 25 first time in I think eleven years -- of course,

1	Wally was there for a purpose of this transition
2	and to make some changes and so forth, but let's
3	say for ten years of actual someone that was an
4	administrator, we really received our very first
5	memorandum that contained all the facts on the
6	subject we had questions on and had a
7	recommendation from the administrator. You won't
8	find that anywhere in the last ten years. So, our
9	county is going to start healing in places it
10	needs to heal.
11	Okay. I brought over a DVD that was I was
12	asked by someone I can't remember who it was.
13	I think it's your oldest member. Oh, it was
14	Mr. Brunson, I'm sorry.
15	MR. BRUNSON: Best looking, oldest, most
16	intelligent.
17	MR. GEORGE: Oh, be quiet.
18	COMMISSIONER SANCHEZ: This is my time. I'm
19	only kidding you. But anyway, if we can are we

20	set to play that? The question was about
21	Mr. Mica's meeting with the Board of County
22	Commissioners. The expansion of the airport to
23	the west came up and it was partially discussed.
24	Instead of me being over here making up
25	things, you're going to get to hear it.

1	(Taped proceedings as follows:)
2	CONGRESSMAN MICA: I owe a lot of gratitude
3	for you in moving forward when others were asleep
4	at the switch in in getting that facility
5	here
6	COMMISSIONER SANCHEZ: He's talking about the
7	veteran's hospital here.
8	CONGRESSMAN MICA: for the St. Johns
9	County Veterans. So, that's just a little report.
10	That doesn't raise any controversy.
11	Now, the airport. The airport's come to me
12	with a plan, you know, to to extend the runway
13	and to move both the rail tracks and and the
14	highway. I don't have an official request, but
15	it's been discussed.
16	Last year, I had the opportunity to visit the
17	Skybus folks in Ohio, and I was pleased to see
18	that they found as a potential future site our
19	community and the airport there. But the

20	long-term the long-term viability of the
21	airport may rest in extension.
22	As you know, we can't go in the opposite
23	direction I guess it would be to the
24	southeast because of the environmental sense
25	environmentally sensitive areas that we have

1	there.
2	But at some point, somebody's going to have
3	to make a decision on what they want to do with
4	the airport. It's not only a matter of commercial
5	service and civil aviation, which also has
6	dramatically utilized that, brought a lot of
7	resources, jobs into there. But Northrop Grumman,
8	to bring in a large array of aircraft, I do
9	have we do have a problem. And I met with the
10	military on several occasions. So, in the long
11	term, we need to make a decision on where you want
12	to go with that project or with the airport.
13	I know there's this board, an Authority, but
14	I think you'll have a lot of influence in that
15	decision. I want to know what the the
16	community wants to do in the long term.
17	We don't have to you don't have to make a
18	decision now, but I do need to hear from you on
19	that accord.

20	We got a record Northrop Grumman had a
21	record appropriation this year. Some of the
22	some of the equipment that they produce is in high
23	demand, and they do an excellent job here. It's
24	one of the highest paying manufacturing activities
25	in the state, and we want to make certain that

1	we we don't keep them just for a short time,
2	but also that we have some business for the
3	future.
4	So, I met with their folks. I met with the
5	Airport Authority, and I raised the issue with you
6	for for the long term. Mr. Chairman?
7	COMMISSIONER RICH: Thank thank you very
8	much, John. The the on that issue right
9	now, as it appears to me on the surface and
10	I've I've looked into it pretty deep the
11	the expansion of the airport to the western to
12	the western side of A1A (sic), moving A1A, moving

- 15 COMMISSIONER RICH: I'm sorry?
- 16 COMMISSIONER SANCHEZ: Moving U.S. 1.
- 17 COMMISSIONER RICH: I'm sorry. U.S. 1.
- 18 That -- that --

19 COMMISSIONER SANCHEZ: I can see the phone

20	calls.
21	COMMISSIONER RICH: That's hugely that's
22	hugely that's just hugely expensive, and I'm
23	not sure that that you know, St. Augustine,
24	especially as close as we are to the to the
25	to the tourist center of St. Augustine, I'm not

1	sure that expansion of this area into a major
2	transportation commercial hub is is exactly
3	what the people of St. Augustine are expecting.
4	I know that the impacts of of expansion of
5	the airport I'm sorry?
6	COMMISSIONER SANCHEZ: Yes.
7	COMMISSIONER RICH: I know that the expansion
8	of the airport impacts on residential areas that
9	have that have basically snuggled up against
10	the airport, as well as moving the rail system and
11	A1A (sic) to the west is it has huge has
12	huge implications as far as impacts to residential
13	areas.
14	The the ability to land aircrafts like
15	C-130 aircraft, aircraft small the commuter jet
16	aircraft, all of those things presently, you know,
17	the the airport has all the facilities for
18	doing that.
19	As far as jumbo aircraft, C-141s or or

20 C-5As or something of that nature, I'm su	-5As or something of that na	ture, I'm su
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- 21 that -- that we can't do that. But I -- I am also
- pretty sure that, at least from the citizens that
- 23 I've talked to, we're not really interested in --
- in that, either.
- 25 CONGRESSMAN MICA: Well, again, I'll take the

1	guidance from both the Authority and from the
2	Commission. And there are several other solutions
3	we've looked at that can provide some safety
4	cushions without a the larger project that
5	might be options.
6	COMMISSIONER RICH: Right. Commissioner
7	Manuel?
8	COMMISSIONER MANUEL: Thank you,
9	Mr. Chairman. Congressman, I think it'd be very
10	ill-advised to expand the St. Augustine Airport.
11	I think it's severely limited, you know, to the
12	east and severely limited to the west.
13	I have begun serious of discussions on a
14	regional basis, because I'm very concerned about
15	Hastings and Putnam and the southern areas of
16	Clay. Airports bring economic vitalization. And
17	I would like to see a study done of relocating a
18	regional airport into the southern part of St.
19	Johns or into Putnam, which certainly is an area

20	that requires investment by this state and this
21	federal government, or in the southern portion of
22	Clay.
23	As you know, the northern portion of Clay has
24	significant traffic issues which I'm not sure
25	there's enough money in the world to fix. And

1	what you need to do is create job centers that are
2	south of Jacksonville.
3	And you mentioned the vital word to me, which
4	was long-range. And in the long range, in the
5	next 25 to 30 years, I think we need to begin that
6	discussion today. Thank you, sir.
7	CONGRESSMAN MICA: Might just say in that
8	regard and again, it's with I don't make the
9	decisions. You would have to make the decisions
10	on that. But there has been a reluctance to
11	expand the facility, and I recognize that.
12	Yesterday, we announced in Palatka just under
13	a million dollar grant, FAA grant, to expand that
14	airport. We're going to try to replicate what we
15	have in St. Augustine in Palatka. And they do
16	have the land.
17	We've already acquired assistance for access
18	for improvement for construction of terminal and
10	runways. So we are looking at other options

20	And and we announced yesterday, again, a major
21	effort toward expansion of the the Palatka
22	airport as a regional airport.
23	COMMISSIONER MANUEL: And as you know in
24	Clay, there's already an airport that's, you know,

associated with the Reynolds Aluminum, and so

1	there are some FAA licenses, which as you know are
2	quite difficult to get, that I think would permit
3	a and I'd like to see a study of that, to be
4	perfectly honest with you, to see the long-term
5	economic impacts on three areas that we are all
6	concerned about. But we need a program of
7	vitalization to make them long-term economically
8	viable.
9	Now, whether that means we get into the
10	biofuel business the agrarian industry in
11	southern St. Johns County and in Putnam County and
12	in southern Clay is a billion dollar industry
13	today. And it's one of the largest businesses
14	that we have in our region. And I think that we
15	should be looking at ways to support and vitalize
16	that community.
17	And one of the discussions that I'm hoping to
18	have with Secretary Brunson is the and I had it
19	with Secretary Pelham vesterday at the DCA, is

20	there a broader discussion of biofuel and
21	investments by the federal government and the
22	state and the local authorities into real economic
23	vitality. So, I would urge you to you know, to
24	consider that.
25	CONGRESSMAN MICA: Well, thank you. And we

1	do have of course, we have major registation
2	pending in Congress right now on alternative
3	fuels. And Florida actually has the potential
4	to to be a leader in that regard.
5	Remember some conversations with, not Mayor
6	Peyton, but his dad, was actually looking at
7	getting into that business, but as the price goes
8	up unfortunately right now, we're subsidizing
9	every gallon of of production of ethanol at 51
10	cents. And we also get less tax and which is also
11	bankrupting the way we finance the highways.
12	So, right now, we're looking at a \$3.6
13	billion deficit in the trust fund in 2009. So,
14	it's it's it's difficult. And we're
15	requiring cars to go further on one gallon of gas,
16	is the basis on which we right now have our
17	revenue. So, they go twice as far, tear up the
18	roads. Charlie will tell you how much it costs to
19	maintain them. It's four times the or to five

20	times the amount to construct them over the life
21	cycle. So, it is
22	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: They need to take the
23	bus.
24	CONGRESSMAN MICA: It's sort of a exactly.
25	(End of tape.)

1	COMMISSIONER SANCHEZ: That was all about the
2	airport. Anyway, I did want you to hear the part
3	about the biofuel, because the studies I have read
4	said it's going to take an acre of corn to produce
5	50 gallons of biofuel. And in order to produce
6	enough to even make a dent, we'd have to do away
7	with all the trees in the United States and plant
8	corn. So, think about that.
9	But anyway, I Mr. Brunson asked me and I
10	wanted y'all to to see the tape. And at least
11	you got some thoughts and so forth about what
12	happened.
13	If there's anything else you want to know
14	about the County, our amphitheater is finished.
15	We have the CO. And as a contractor, I can tell
16	you those are hard to get sometimes. Isn't that
17	right, Randy? I know someone else knows that.
18	Anyway, we're up and running over there and
19	have a big show coming up September 2nd. So,

20	anything else from the County you want to know?
21	The health issue is up and running, but I
22	guess everyone understands that sometimes you have
23	to make a political decision to get people to the
24	table. And we did; we cut their money long
25	enough. They all came to the table, and we're

1	going to have something worked out. So, anyway,
2	any questions?
3	CHAIRMAN GREEN: John? Do you have
4	something?
5	COMMISSIONER SANCHEZ: Yes.
6	MR. GORMAN: I just have one. And it it's
7	just a it's a cage-rattling question about
8	overall insurance costs for the county are
9	catastrophic. Have we have me made any headway
10	along those lines
11	MR. WUELLNER: Well
12	MR. GORMAN: as far as what the County
13	pays and what this airport's paying?
14	COMMISSIONER SANCHEZ: She's trying to
15	CHAIRMAN GREEN: They can't pick you up.
16	COMMISSIONER SANCHEZ: Want you to talk in
17	your microphone. They can't pick you up.
18	MR. GORMAN: I'd like to see if they're if
19	the County has made any headway as to the

20	catastrophic the catastrophic costs for
21	insurance. In other words, the insurance, of
22	course, on this airport's very high. The County,
23	of course, their costs are very high. And if
24	there's been any headway made towards
25	self-insurance or towards cutting those costs.

1	That's all.
2	COMMISSIONER SANCHEZ: I don't have the
3	answer to that right now. A lot of things like
4	that, we sort of purposely placed on the back
5	burner until our new administrator got here. And
6	I think things will start happening pretty quick
7	on all of those pending subjects. But I don't
8	have the answer for that today.
9	MR. GORMAN: Thank you.
10	MR. GEORGE: Ron, just a quickie. Seven or
11	eight months ago, we were talking about the County
12	allowing the Airport Authority to join the health
13	insurance plan that they have. And do you happen
14	to know
15	COMMISSIONER SANCHEZ: I don't have an answer
16	on that yet, either. I think when that came up,
17	we you said you went through all the process,
18	and then it ended up in the attorney's office and
19	stayed there forever and the answer was no. Well,

- I told you I would start out at the attorney's
- office. Well, that's where I started, so --
- MR. GEORGE: Yeah. All right. Okay. Good.
- 23 COMMISSIONER SANCHEZ: Anyway, we're -- but
- 24 he -- believe me, Pat McCormack has been more than
- busy. So, that will come out, too, very soon.

1	But again, I also wanted the new
2	administrator's input, because he has a lot of
3	experience in in government and insurances and
4	even in health situations.
5	MR. GEORGE: Good.
6	COMMISSIONER SANCHEZ: So, I kind of want him
7	to rely on some of his experience.
8	MR. GEORGE: Sounds good. Thanks.
9	COMMISSIONER SANCHEZ: Thanks.
10	MR. BRUNSON: Madam Chairman?
11	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Yes.
12	MR. BRUNSON: Just a real quick comment. I
13	asked Ron, in case some of the board members or
14	some of the public did not attend this meeting at
15	the County Auditorium, I thought it was just a
16	good idea for us to see how many personal opinions
17	that different people have on the airport and what
18	each commissioner's thinking may be and and
19	iust to be aware of some of the personal things

- 20 that they're thinking about. And that's the only
- reason I wanted this presented.
- 22 CHAIRMAN GREEN: All right. Galaxy, Michael?
- MR. SLINGLUFF: Nothing to report.
- 24 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Too busy?
- MR. SLINGLUFF: Yeah.

1	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Northrop?

1	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Painting the hangar 10?
2	MR. GEORGE: Paint floor, hangar 10?
3	MR. WUELLNER: Okay.
4	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Passes for Civil Air Patrol.
5	MR. WUELLNER: Gate card policy. Yeah.
6	Okay. If you'll remind me of those two at the

18	That should be coming very shortly.
19	They're doing the edge dressing and sod work

20	and	and the	like,	basically	coming	up on

- 21 completion of the FAA project back in that area.
- So, we'll be rapidly moving into the next phase of
- that work back there. So, everything looks good.
- Real pleased with the work. And it's going to be
- a great asset or great addition to the assets

1	here.
2	MR. GEORGE: What are we going to use it for
3	until we get the hangars?
4	MR. WUELLNER: Initially, the area will be
5	available for special use, any type of aircraft
6	activity that needs overflow parking or the like
7	back there. But it can be used by anything;
8	otherwise, we'll we'll barricade it off until
9	we're ready to use it, just to keep
10	MR. GEORGE: Excuse me.
11	MR. WUELLNER: people from driving back
12	there.
13	MR. GEORGE: Do we need to consider a program
14	of tie-downs, renting tie-downs to people? I
15	don't know what the market's like for that.

17	Based on what I, you know, see at the FBO ramp, I
18	don't see any real shortage of tie-downs at this
19	point that might but it certainly you could

20	do that. I mean, just based on what I what I
21	see on the apron, there's still plenty of places
22	to park on the apron.
23	And I'm not trying to steer the business over
24	there. I'm just simply saying maybe there's not
25	enough demand. But but we certainly could do

1	it.
2	MR. GEORGE: I've just seen at every other
3	airport I go in, there's a tie-down area. And I
4	would imagine that tie-down area generates 95, a
5	hundred bucks a month?
6	MR. WUELLNER: I don't know that it generates
7	quite that here. But
8	MR. GEORGE: Okay.
9	MR. WUELLNER: But but certainly, it it
10	could be a revenue producer if we get down to
11	that.
12	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Especially if there's a
13	period of time we're waiting for the hangars to
14	significant period of time.
15	MR. GEORGE: Yeah.
16	MR. WUELLNER: And and typically we have
17	more aircraft going into the winter months down
18	here than we, you know, do have sitting around
19	baking in the sun this time of year, so

20	MR. GEORGE: Right.
21	MR. WUELLNER: You know, it may pick up to
22	where it it makes some sense towards spring.
23	T-hangars, contract's awarded. FDOT has
24	concurred in that award. And we have executed the
25	contract documents for that. It will be up and

- 1 running in terms of getting the final permitting.
- 2 They have to go get their -- pull their actual
- 3 building permit. And I suspect it won't be too
- 4 long that the shop drawings are here and things
- 5 will be moving along very quickly from this point
- 6 on. So, looks pretty good.
- 7 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Buzz?
- 8 MR. GEORGE: I have a concern.
- 9 MR. WUELLNER: Uh-huh.
- MR. GEORGE: And I'll voice it again later on
- in the meeting. We originally started this --
- these project updates out by saying the hangars
- would be available by the end of the year.
- MR. WUELLNER: Uh-huh.
- MR. GEORGE: And then it was they're going to
- be available by the end of January. And now we're
- seeing early 2008.
- MR. WUELLNER: Well, until they actually
- start construction, which is subject to a lot of

20	things
21	MR. GEORGE: Yeah.
22	MR. WUELLNER: the time on the contract
23	doesn't start, so it's
24	MR. GEORGE: Well, my concern is that there's
25	office condos out on 312 that have a big sign that

1 says they'll be available in late 2006. I don't 2 know what we need to do, but we've -- we've had a 3 lot of people on the waiting list for a long time, and we need to accelerate, even if it's asking 4 5 somebody from the County for permits or whatever 6 we need, we need to put some pressure on that. MR. WUELLNER: Okay. Terminal project, 7 8 dedication is scheduled for September 22nd at this point. It's a Saturday. 9 Oh. It's changed again. It is now the 29th, 10 it would appear. And Congressman Mica will be 11 able to attend on the 29th, so -- it's a Saturday 12 morning, September 29th. 13 14 MR. GEORGE: I'll be out of town, both of 15 them. 16 MR. WUELLNER: September 29th? 17 CHAIRMAN GREEN: That's the --18 MR. GEORGE: I'll be out of town both of

them, the 22nd and the 29th, but --

20	CHAIRMAN	GREEN:	Not that it	matters	to	us	if

- it's in the morning, but that's the huge
- Florida-Auburn football game. Everyone will be
- over in Gainesville. Not that, you know, it's
- a -- that's a big weekend.
- MR. WUELLNER: Okay.

1	MR. GEORGE: Maybe we can have breakfast that
2	morning before you leave.
3	CHAIRMAN GREEN: I'm not going, but
4	MR. WUELLNER: It is a breakfast
5	dedication
6	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Yeah.
7	MR. WUELLNER: and we'll be out of here.
8	So
9	MR. GEORGE: Well, are you saying it's the
10	29th?
11	CHAIRMAN GREEN: 29th.
12	MR. WUELLNER: 29th, in the morning.
13	MR. GEORGE: Okay.
14	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Early in the morning.
15	MR. WUELLNER: I probably said the 22nd
16	again, but
17	Parking revenue generating equipment will be
18	installed within the next two weeks in the

terminal. So, we'll begin the actual revenue off

20	of parking at that point. It's been on order for
21	some time, but I understand it's due in here next
22	week and will be installed shortly thereafter and
23	begin collecting parking revenues over there.
24	I did provide you with a a printout of the
25	monthly reports we get from from Skybus related

1	to failuring operations here. And you can see for
2	the first 14 days or the 14 days they were
3	in in here in October, you had
4	CHAIRMAN GREEN: October? July?
5	MR. WUELLNER: July. Yeah, get my month. In
6	July, and it was 1308 outbound passengers and 1534
7	inbound passengers. So, you can see it average
8	it's averaging about a hundred a day out and a
9	little more than a hundred inbound daily. And
10	those numbers actually got quite a bit better even
11	moving into August. So, be anxious to see what
12	the end-of-month August numbers are.
13	And we'll we'll continue to provide those
14	to you monthly just as a way of keeping everybody
15	in the loop on what how how well they're
16	doing here. Things look very good there. And
17	we're due to go up there and see them week week
18	after next about how things are and what
19	they're what they're thinking for for

20	service here in St. Augustine moving forward. And
21	we'll get that back to you as soon as we know
22	something definitive.
23	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Do we have any feelings on
24	what that means revenue-wise? Any feel for it
25	yet?

1	MR. WUELLNER: I think their uptake
2	Michael did some quick math on it, but it was
3	it's something in the area of 12- to 1500 gallons
4	daily uplift on it and at 8 cents a gallon, so
5	it's
6	MR. SLINGLUFF: That's about right.
7	MR. WUELLNER: About \$200
8	MR. SLINGLUFF: About \$200 a day.
9	MR. WUELLNER: About \$200 a day minimum
10	uptake on just the fuel flowage side of it. I do
11	not have any definitive numbers yet on
12	concessions. That will be in shortly. We know
13	we're looking about three times the rental car
14	activity that was here prior to them starting.
15	So, you know, I think we're just starting to get a
16	feel for what the numbers are going to look like
17	moving forward with one flight, so Excuse me.
18	Terminal dedication, just mentioned. We've
19	had a number of press releases and and a fair

- amount of assistance from Sacha, whose name just
- jumped out of my head.
- MS. BARRERA: Martin.
- MR. WUELLNER: Martin. Who has been just a
- tremendous help. I believe she has --
- MS. BARRERA: Phenomenal.

MR. WUELLNER: -- a great background in 1 2 marketing, PR, news reporting, all kinds of 3 things. And she's just been volunteering her time and -- and helping out getting press releases and 4 5 helping us put together functions like the 6 dedication. So, she's -- she's been a tremendous 7 asset and she's been a pleasure to work with and 8 very, very upbeat. And most of us struggle to keep up with her, to be honest with you. 9 10 MS. BARRERA: Would you have her stand so the 11 other board members --12 MR. WUELLNER: Is she here? MS. BARRERA: -- who may not recognize her 13 will --14 MR. WUELLNER: Sacha Martin. 15 16 MR. GEORGE: Oh, there she is. 17 MR. WUELLNER: She does a great job for us. 18 MR. GEORGE: Thank you very much.

MR. BURNETT: Ed, while we're on that slide,

- if you're finished --
- 21 MR. WUELLNER: Yeah.
- MR. BURNETT: One thing I wanted to add, just
- so you know, for marketing and public relations,
- we had mentioned before at the last Airport
- 25 Authority meeting the November Chamber mixer.

1	We're working my law firm, working with
2	Michael and the folks at Galaxy to switch the
3	Chamber mixer from the one that was going to occur
4	at my law firm here in town to the terminal
5	building. So, it looks like that's going to
6	happen. We got the green light from the Chamber.
7	So, looks like November, we'll have a Chamber
8	mixer here.
9	MR. GEORGE: Sounds great.
10	MS. BARRERA: That's wonderful.
11	MR. WUELLNER: And finally on the PR, a
12	reminder the MS 150 will be the 29th.
13	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Does that conflict at all?
14	MR. WUELLNER: Well, indirectly. But I think
15	it
16	CHAIRMAN GREEN: But not parking or any
17	problem with
18	MR. WUELLNER: No. They're distinctly
19	different in that respect.

20	CHAIRMAN	GREEN:	Yeah.

- MR. WUELLNER: And nothing new on the leasing
- activity. We do have your -- I think the next
- slide is for -- okay. So, these are where we pick
- 24 up the two -- two additional items.
- 25 Hangars 8, 9, and 10. The company that did

1	the hangar 11 floor, we had them evaluate that
2	floor. They have come back with a couple of
3	methodologies to do that. It's in the area of
4	I believe it was around \$4 a square foot to redo
5	that floor. Essentially, they can they've got
6	some some materials that will clean up the
7	imperfections in the concrete.
8	A part I don't know if all of you know the
9	history of what the problem was out there on 8, 9,
10	and 10, but the original specifications for the
11	hangar did not did not provide for the level of
12	concrete finish that we would normally do inside a
13	corporate hangar.
14	As a result, when the material was applied
15	for the hangar coating of the floor, you've got
16	all of the imperfections of concrete that would be
17	normally okay on the outside but really didn't do
18	well on the inside.
19	And despite the company coming out and

20	recoating it, it it just isn't going to get the
21	level that that we've come to expect from
22	the on those corporate hangars and and is
23	going to be ultimately satisfactory to the tenants
24	there.
25	So, our intent is to try to go out to bid

here very shortly. We now have specifications on 1 how to get the floor to what it needs to be. Go 2 3 out, get some quotes on doing that floor, and go ahead and redo the entire floors on 8, 9, and 10 4 5 and get them to where they should be. 6 They're the highest generating, you know, square -- dollars-per-square-foot hangars we've 7 8 got, and it doesn't make any sense to -- to not do those floors the way that they were all expecting 9 10 it to be done, also. MR. GEORGE: Yeah, I think -- yeah. 11 MR. WUELLNER: It just isn't right. We knew 12 that from the beginning. And there was a lot 13 of --14 MR. GEORGE: So, what time -- so, what time 15 frame are you looking at? 16 17 MR. WUELLNER: It's a very short -- they told us they could -- this particular company we were 18

quoting told us it was approximately a one-week

- 20 project once they start because they would just
- 21 kind of move from unit to unit to unit.
- MR. GEORGE: Okay.
- MR. WUELLNER: But it -- it really could be
- done in as little as I think two weeks to 30 days
- from being able to give somebody a contract on it,

- which it's a -- the value is such that it will
- 2 have to be sealed bids, and as such, it -- you
- 3 know, it takes about 30 days to do it.
- 4 So, probably by this time next month, we --
- 5 we can get to a point where we could award -- you
- 6 know, make a recommendation to y'all to go ahead
- 7 and do the floor. And shortly thereafter, I would
- 8 think within two weeks, we could be on -- they
- 9 could be on work doing it. It's not -- it's not
- 10 complicated. It's just expensive to fix.
- 11 MR. GEORGE: I understand. So, at \$4 a foot,
- we're talking about \$70- -- \$70- to \$80,000.
- 13 MR. WUELLNER: That's correct.
- MR. HOLIDAY: You could tile the place for
- less than that.
- MR. WUELLNER: Well, really, you can't, but
- it's a nice idea.
- MR. GEORGE: I would hope our drawings --
- MR. WUELLNER: And we -- we've had --

- 20 MR. GEORGE: Future ones will specify --
- MR. WUELLNER: Yeah. Yeah, we've -- we've
- taken that remedial action --
- 23 MR. GEORGE: Okay. Fine.
- MR. WUELLNER: -- already.
- MR. GORMAN: That's my question. Who is

1 paying, us? 2 MR. WUELLNER: Yeah. 3 MR. GORMAN: And the discrepancy is --MR. WUELLNER: It was put down in the 4 specifications --5 MR. GORMAN: -- due to an engineering -- lack 6 of an engineering specification, in actuality? 7 8 MR. WUELLNER: Yes. MR. GORMAN: All right. Thank you. 9 MR. WUELLNER: And what was the other? 10 Floor, 8, 9, 10? 11 MR. GEORGE: I just need to know what was 12 Civil Air Patrol and Coast Guard Auxillary, their 13 badges? 14 MR. WUELLNER: I had -- yeah, I had asked --15 had several conversations with members of -- of 16 17 that, and I -- I suggested to them, I said, the problem I've got is within the confines of the 18

existing policy, they are not a tenant on the

20	airport, and as and we attempted to to
21	convince them or talk them into using because
22	they also use that facility, use the Pilots
23	Association membership as as a way of
24	legitimizing the access onto the airport.

Believe me, I have no issues with them having

- 1 access, but the policy didn't allow it. And I had
- 2 asked them to get me a letter some months ago
- 3 to -- to bring forth, get the policy changed to
- 4 where we could -- we could broaden that and allow
- 5 just direct badging of them. And so far, I
- 6 haven't gotten that letter from them.
- 7 I would be perfectly happy to bring it back
- 8 to the Authority, amend the policy, and we can get
- 9 it done. It's -- again, I don't have any issues
- with them being on here. It's just under current
- policy, I don't have any way of giving them
- 12 access --
- 13 MR. GEORGE: Yeah.
- MR. WUELLNER: -- the way it's currently
- written.
- MR. GEORGE: But the policy --
- MR. WUELLNER: Directly, because they're not
- a tenant.
- MR. GEORGE: But the policy could be changed

- because --
- MR. WUELLNER: Absolutely.
- MR. GEORGE: -- we're doing it for SAAPA, and
- 23 SAAPA is responsible --
- MR. WUELLNER: But they're a tenant.
- MR. GEORGE: I realize that.

- 1 MR. WUELLNER: Yeah.
- 2 MR. GEORGE: But it could be a nontenant
- 3 option.
- 4 MR. WUELLNER: Yes, absolutely. You -- we
- 5 can broaden that.
- 6 MR. GEORGE: If we could get some help from
- 7 the SAAPA members to get the CAP guys to send that
- 8 letter in. You know, sometimes it's difficult to
- 9 write letters.
- MR. WUELLNER: Yeah. We're not trying to
- 11 complicate it. It's just under the current -- I
- didn't have the authority to badge them per se
- directly. We tried to convince them to do it the
- other way. It's -- you know, it just -- I
- understand the issues on there, so...
- MR. GEORGE: Yes. Where you've talked to a
- bunch of people --
- MR. WUELLNER: You're hearing it, too.
- 19 MR. GEORGE: -- all of us get talked to,

- also.
- 21 MR. WUELLNER: I'm sure.
- MR. GEORGE: So, we -- we need to help the
- process along.
- MR. GORMAN: And the -- both the CAP and
- 25 the --

MR. GEORGE: Coast Guard Auxiliary. 1 2 MR. GORMAN: -- Coast Guard Auxiliary, which 3 actually I'm active in, are a public service, and 4 these are all volunteers. And whatever we can do 5 to expedite this, because all these people have tremendous security background checks to even be 6 7 in the services. MR. WUELLNER: I understand. 8 MR. GORMAN: So, yeah. 9 MR. WUELLNER: I really don't have an 10 11 issue --MR. GORMAN: I know you're on the page, Ed. 12 Whatever you do. 13 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Not because you're --14 MR. BRUNSON: Let -- let us know what we need 15 to do. 16 17 MR. WUELLNER: We -- we will have -- assuming I get something from one of those agencies, we'll 18

have something back to you next month, you amend

- the policy and we'll issue badges.
- MR. GEORGE: Are you a member of one of those
- organizations?
- 23 MR. GORMAN: Yes.
- MR. GEORGE: Would you write him a letter and
- e-mail it to him?

- 1 MR. GORMAN: Certainly. Done.
- 2 MR. WUELLNER: I'll do it off an e-mail.
- 3 MR. BRUNSON: And I am, too, and I'll sign it
- 4 with you.
- 5 MR. WUELLNER: Cool.
- 6 MR. GEORGE: You can't talk to him.
- 7 MR. BRUNSON: I can't talk to him. You're
- 8 right.
- 9 MR. GEORGE: Thanks, Ed.
- MR. WUELLNER: He knows that. Did you want
- 11 to do your other agenda item first?
- 12 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Did you want to do the
- plaque thing to recognize prior board members now?
- MR. WUELLNER: That -- that would be a
- 15 regular --
- MR. GEORGE: I can do it at the end. Do you
- 17 want to do it now --
- MR. WUELLNER: That's fine.
- MR. GEORGE: -- or is there -- are there

- 20 public comments in between project updates and
- 21 action items or --
- MR. WUELLNER: I'm finished with the updates,
- 23 so I'd be --
- 24 CHAIRMAN GREEN: That's right.
- MR. WUELLNER: -- moving into action items.

1 So, if you want to --MR. GEORGE: Okay. Basically, I think I went 2 3 over everything I was trying to get when I was moving it to get to the agenda. We do have a 4 5 facility that I think we're all proud of. You know, now with -- with commercial activity coming 6 here, it's just taking us one more step. And I'd 7 8 like to see some recognition for all of the people that have been on the board, you know, since the 9 board was -- since its inception, because every 10 one of those guys have contributed, you know. And 11 a lot of them are still around, hanging around 12 town. And I think, Kelly, through your efforts, 13 14 they were being invited to the, you know, various functions. That's -- that's a great way to get 15 16 them, you know, back involved because they --17 MS. BARRERA: We want to continue that. 18 MR. GEORGE: Yeah. So, I would like to

propose that we give direction to Staff to come up

20	with, you know, a program that could give the
21	recognition, you know, to the board members
22	from since day one.
23	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Put it in the terminal?
24	MR. GEORGE: And put it where they think is
25	best, yeah. But the terminal would be the logical

- 1 place.
- 2 MR. WUELLNER: We could -- hopefully the time
- 3 will allow us to unveil that in -- at that
- 4 September event if you'd like.
- 5 MR. GEORGE: That would be great.
- 6 CHAIRMAN GREEN: That would be great, if you
- 7 could get it. I mean, that's --
- 8 MR. WUELLNER: Because they'd be on the
- 9 invitee list anyway.
- 10 MS. BARRERA: They already are.
- MR. BRUNSON: And the -- and the years
- served?
- MR. WUELLNER: Some of that --
- MR. GEORGE: Whatever the records they have.
- MR. WUELLNER: Yeah.
- MR. GEORGE: Right.
- MR. WUELLNER: Yeah, we don't --
- MR. GEORGE: I make a motion we do that, we
- ask Staff to take a look and do that.

20	MR. BRUNSON: I certainly would second that
21	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Any further discussion?
22	(No further discussion.)
23	CHAIRMAN GREEN: All in favor?
24	MR. BRUNSON: Aye.
25	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Ave

1 MR. GEORGE: Aye. 2 MS. BARRERA: Aye. 3 MR. GORMAN: Aye. CHAIRMAN GREEN: Any opposed? 4 (No opposition.) 5 6 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Passes. 7 MR. GEORGE: Thanks. 8 9.A. - CORPORATE HANGAR SIGNAGE DISCUSSION MR. WUELLNER: First item was the corporate 9 hangar signage at the request of Mr. George. And 10 he asked to have this on here at the last meeting. 11 And it's kind of a --12 13 MR. GEORGE: Yes? MR. WUELLNER: It's an item that's of ongoing 14 discussion with Mr. George and I over the last 15 several years. I don't even want to guess how 16 17 long. But --18 MR. GEORGE: Six.

MR. WUELLNER: The issue, as I understand

25

20	it and unfortunately, I don't have, you know,
21	particularly clean solution.
22	What has gone on is I guess a point of
23	confusion in having meetings with the Authority,
24	addressing of buildings, references to grants, all

kinds of things that frequently -- and even the

1	tenants' names, frequently referring to specific
2	hangars, corporate hangars, in particular, out
3	there. And the wires get crossed when, you know,
4	sometimes we're in Staff referring to it as the
5	FDOT project, being say hangar number 7, and then
6	we just change our mind and start talking about it
7	in terms of the tenants' name and then you
8	know, in hangar number 7's case, you know, we'd be
9	talking about Regency Electric out there or
10	Infinity. And and then the next thing you know
11	we're talking about, what is it, 121 Gun Club Road
12	in in the mix there, too.
13	And we're frequently stepping all over
14	ourselves in describing what the hangars are and
15	then being able to easily reference so that
16	everybody's talking about the exact same building
17	every time we're we're building or every
18	time we're, you know, having discussions here in
19	particular.

20	And and when we you know, it's kind of
21	a fault of when you work with it all day long,
22	they all mean the same thing to you and you don't
23	really even make the distinction. But it would be
24	very easy to see how things get confused when
25	when we just start flitting around with the

1	description.
2	So, we've been asked to kind of bring it to
3	the table today, come up with a uniform method
4	of of describing those hangars for discussions
5	and and and documentation and and the
6	like, and indeed place some sort of sign or
7	something on those particular hangars so that
8	Authority members, members of the public, whomever
9	driving by those facilities can make make the
10	connection as to what building, you know, we've
11	been talking about or what's been referenced
12	perhaps even in a in a newspaper article.
13	Obviously, the most permanent type of
14	discussion would probably be best related to the
15	address, the street addresses. There's a 911
16	address that ends up assigned to each one of
17	those each one of the corporate hangars.
18	It does you know, there is a, you know,
19	normal addressing logic to it relative to evens

20	and odds a	nd, you know,	whatever	whatever	they
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- 21 tell us the -- whatever that is. And that's --
- that's only determined by the County at the 911
- office. Those folks assign an address to the
- 24 property.
- The other method would be to continue along

1	the grant reference, which is typically where we
2	start going hangars 8, 9, 10, or or hangar 11
3	or or the like.
4	The problem with that is, while the first
5	two or three hangars, that worked real well
6	because they were all in the same area and they
7	were largely next to each other and things made
8	perfect sense till we had to move into a new area,
9	we built that one out. And the numbering kept
10	going, but the location was different on the
11	airport. And then, you know, one fit in the
12	middle and it ended up, you know, out of sequence
13	And next thing you know, we've got literally
14	11 or 12 or 13 corporate hangars out there, not
15	all of which even had a grant originally, and
16	they're scattered all over. And I could easily
17	see where that, you know, smattering doesn't
18	really make sense.

The other is we could come up with something,

20	if you want. We could try to come up with
21	something that's more proprietary to the airport
22	that, in effect, renumbers, relabels, re-, you
23	know, maybe develops areas and refer to them as
24	eastside number one or you know, I'm just
25	making this up as we go here. But you could come

- 1 up with some kind of a proprietary labeling system
- 2 that, again, ends up with a sign on each unit.
- But, you know, we try to -- try to create some
- 4 sort of uniform presentation of what the buildings
- 5 are -- are labeled.
- 6 Makes sense in hangar -- T-hangars, but it
- 7 gets -- it gets muddled when you get to
- 8 stand-alones out there.
- 9 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Okay.
- MR. WUELLNER: Go ahead. So, whatever input.
- 11 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Public -- Vic, do you have
- 12 any? You're the only one that gave me a card for
- that. Any comment? Any other public comment?
- MR. COOPER: I'd like to make a comment.
- 15 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Are you public?
- 16 MR. WUELLNER: Hardly.
- 17 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Okay.
- MR. BRUNSON: Going to say, who is this guy?
- MR. COOPER: One of the other issues that we

25

20	had talked about on this is that the fire
21	department has a difficult time identifying where
22	to go on some of these calls.
23	I've worked with the fire department for a
24	number of years now in airfield orientation. And

each time -- every time I have a class with them,

1	this is brought up as an issue that that they
2	would like us to do something different.
3	And so I'd like to see us, when we do this,
4	think about the fire department and ambulance
5	services. It's difficult sometimes to describe to
6	them where to go. And hangar number 7 doesn't
7	mean anything to them. And our addresses assigned
8	to 911 works on some of our hangars but not all of
9	this. For example, all of the hangars down on
10	this side over here, including some that are
11	called corporate hangars, have the same 911
12	address, 270 Estrella Avenue or something like
13	that. And there's, you know, a hundred-plus
14	hangars there.
15	So, we need to think about those things if
16	we're going to come up with a new system. But
17	what we have now, we've outgrown.
18	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Any other board discussion?
19	Jack?

20	MR. GORMAN: I think Mr. Cooper just answered
21	my question. Whatever is the easiest for the
22	emergency services to be able to expedite the
23	delivery of services is the way to go.
24	MR. WUELLNER: We might be able to
25	approach and we haven't done this yet, but

1	maybe we can approach the E-911 office and see if
2	they could assign some additional addresses to
3	especially on the south end. He's absolutely
4	correct; I mean, we have probably three street
5	addresses for the entire block that are assigned
6	for aviation uses, and then it, you know, falls
7	apart rapidly from there once you're in the gate
8	or in the fence. So, they may be able to broaden
9	the street address component going down there and
10	see if, you know, that helps for purposes.
11	Now, that opens, though, let's say we do go
12	with the 911 type approach, but it opens up the,
13	all right, is that do we maintain two separate
14	systems in particular to T-hangars? Because it is
15	a whole lot easier to find you know, most
16	people understand the A, B, C, D, you know,
17	concept that's going on currently.
18	Now that, again, falls apart as we get into
10	the new hangar area down here, because while

25

20	they're logically lettered, they're not as
21	obviously they won't be as obvious in terms of
22	how they're labeled.
23	MR. GORMAN: Certainly there's a difference
24	in activity level in a T-hangar than a corporate

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hangar. A corporate hangar would need EMS access,

1 while a T-hangar is almost one big entity. You know, they're just big storage facilities. 2 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Could their 911 address be 3 4 595 whatever, A through D or -- you're saying the 5 alphabetical thing doesn't work? MR. WUELLNER: We don't need to do it -- like 6 in the case of T-hangars, we don't need to do each 7 8 individual T-hangar unit in a building. But --CHAIRMAN GREEN: That's what I was thinking. 9 MR. WUELLNER: -- you need to do the 10 entire -- right now, we don't even do the -- I say 11 "we." The entire building is not even identified 12 other than our identification of it as hangar 13 row -- or hangar building A or B or whatever it 14 15 is. 16 And that's -- the A, B, C thing, you know, 17 could still exist independently for purposes of directing someone to their hangar unit. 18

I think the real breakdown -- and correct me

20	if I'm wrong, Mr. George, but I think the real
21	breakdown was in following the bouncing ball in
22	the corporate areas, because it it really
23	got you know, we really started hopping around
24	as as as some areas got built out and the
25	labeling did. And then we never really got our

1 arms back around how to label them. So, it --2 we -- you know, we could even just refer to them 3 as tenant. MR. GEORGE: My major issue is with 4 consistency. 5 6 MR. WUELLNER: Uh-huh. MR. GEORGE: If you're an organization, you 7 8 know, and you've got one way of doing it over here and another way of doing it over here and another 9 way of doing it over there, you are perceived as 10 being unorganized. 11 But if you're consistent -- you know, there 12 is a plan. And every airport that I have been 13 on -- and I have not been on them looking for 14 hangar numbers -- but they have buildings that are 15 identified by letters and numbers that mean 16 17 something to them that is an easy identification system and it's consistent. You know, our A, B, 18

C, D did that we have here could be brought into

20	SD for Southern Development A-A, B, C, D.
21	The corporate area could be Corp 1, Corp 2,
22	Co but something that is consistent. You start
23	using the addresses, and I think a lot of people
24	more than just the fire department's going to have
25	problems with them. And if you're going to use

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11

- the addresses, you at least ought to require that 2 the house number or the building number be printed 3 on the road that the fire department comes up to so that they can find it. 4 But I think for consistency sake, we need a 5 plan of identifying them with -- with numbers and 6 letters throughout the whole place. 7 8 CHAIRMAN GREEN: That's what I was saying, that if corporate hangars whatever through 9
- 12 So, both of them are listed with E-911 or 911

whatever are given an address for the E-911, but

the address is 595 U.S. 1-A through F or whatever.

- calls, but we could still have an internal 13
- identification thing here. 14
- MR. GEORGE: Yeah. Well -- yeah. And if you 15
- have something that's A through whatever --16
- 17 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Right.
- 18 MR. GEORGE: -- make that the Corp suffix.
- CHAIRMAN GREEN: Right. 19

20	MR. GEORGE: But I think if we
21	CHAIRMAN GREEN: By department number.
22	MR. GEORGE: If we try to put up on the side
23	of the building, you know, the street address, you
24	know, and some other identification, because
25	there's just going to be so much garbage up there,

1	it's going to be hard to hard to recommend
2	or to see.
3	And I guess when I was in the military,
4	going from base to base to base, it you know,
5	well, where's the sheet metal shop? Well, they're
6	down in D-12. I know where the D row is and I can
7	find it from that, you know?
8	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Should we get direction
9	from or do you want to even talk to them? Have
10	you spoken with the emergency?
11	MR. WUELLNER: No, we haven't with regards to
12	improving the addressing on the south end. The
13	north north end's taken care of, and the east
14	side's taken care of because, all of those are
15	relatively new hangars. They fell into the 911
16	system.
17	MR. GEORGE: I defy you I defy you to find
18	a house number out in front of RingPower's hangar.

All it says is "RingPower" and there's no --

25

20	anything.
21	MR. WUELLNER: I think it's up there. I know
22	the ones on Gun Club are, because that's part of
23	the CO now, is you've got to have the silly
24	numbers hanging up there

MR. GEORGE: Yeah.

MR. WUELLNER: -- to even get your CO. But 1 2 even if it's not --3 MR. GEORGE: Well, the pictures I took, I 4 couldn't find it. 5 MR. WUELLNER: -- it could certainly be put up there. And I'm not suggesting that's the --6 because I think -- you've got the 911 system, and 7 it's not like you can just abandon the 911 8 9 system --CHAIRMAN GREEN: Right. 10 MR. WUELLNER: -- and do what you want. You 11 know, that's got to remain in place no matter 12 13 what. Whether we use it or don't use it is -- is largely a matter of preference. 14 I -- I don't have any problem with -- you 15 16 know, you're right. I mean, a lot of bases, 17 old -- you know, some of the old military drawings we've seen, you know, refer to them as, you know, 18 either with a letter, number, a combination or --19

20	or even a higher level number, you know. And
21	that that works fine. And that's fine. We can
22	renumber those and, you know, make sure everybody
23	gets a sketch of that internally and and
24	MR. GEORGE: And also the 911 people could
25	also have that in their system.

MR. WUELLNER: Because ultimately hangar 11 1 2 doesn't mean a thing once the grant's closed out. 3 It was simply a delineation for purposes of a 4 grant, and it -- it means nothing else after that. 5 MR. GEORGE: Yeah. MR. WUELLNER: We continue to use it, and 6 more often probably refer to it by the tenant's 7 8 name that's in it rather than the -- the hangar 9 number, so... MR. GEORGE: Well, that's the way it was when 10 I started here five years ago. It was, Oh, you 11 know, it's the old Army National Guard hangar. 12 MR. WUELLNER: Right. 13 MR. GEORGE: Well, which one is that? Well, 14 it's the one that they're in now because they 15 moved. They switched with so and so and they've 16 17 moved. MR. WUELLNER: That's exactly what's 18 happened, too. I mean, you know, RingPower's got 19

- 20 two. And, you know --
- 21 MR. GEORGE: Right.
- MS. BARRERA: I have --
- 23 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Go ahead.
- MS. BARRERA: I just want to verify that when
- we talk about this, we're talking about a system.

- But we're not -- when we're looking at this, I'm
- 2 looking at it as a simplistic system and a -- and
- 3 a very economical process. We're -- we're -- when
- 4 we talk about this, is when we're looking at a
- 5 funding standpoint, are we -- how much money are
- 6 we talking about?
- 7 MR. WUELLNER: Probably just --
- 8 MS. BARRERA: Minimum?
- 9 MR. WUELLNER: A few hundred dollars a pop.
- 10 Sign material.
- MR. GEORGE: A few hundred dollars.
- 12 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Signage.
- MS. BARRERA: Okay. Okay. I just want to
- make sure, because something like this can go from
- one thing and can jump up to another.
- MR. WUELLNER: We do it inside.
- MS. BARRERA: And I want to feel comfortable
- with it.
- MR. WUELLNER: We do all that those -- that

- kind of signage in-house.
- 21 MS. BARRERA: In-house. Okay.
- MR. GEORGE: The other signs that are on A,
- B, C, D down there, we're talking about a sign
- something like that on all of the corporate
- hangars.

1 MS. BARRERA: Okay. 2 MR. GEORGE: But you've got to have a scheme. 3 MS. BARRERA: I understand. I just wanted to 4 clarify that and make absolutely sure. CHAIRMAN GREEN: Buzz, do you have a motion 5 6 you want to -- I'm sorry, Randy. MR. BRUNSON: I had -- to me, it's extremely 7 simple. I had a reason to look at every site in 8 our state park today down on Anastasia Island. 9 And I can go to my truck and I can show you a map 10 of the streets and the layouts. And they start 11 with number 1. And if you want to go to 20, you 12 looked at the map and you saw where it is. So, 13 whose -- if we do this thing, just keep it simple. 14 Now, the problem with that, we can have all 15 of this numbering system real good, and then you 16 17 throw in number 22 on us and then that changes the whole thing. But I think --18

MR. GEORGE: Pick up the little 12-inch

- MR. BRUNSON: But -- but I think just a map,
- and start with number 1. And we don't care if
- 23 it's RingPower or if it's your hangar; you've got
- a number and they know where to go to if you have
- a fire.

1	MR. GORMAN: Could we just start with giving
2	the staff direction to ask what the EMS says and
3	then we'll discuss it further after we get the EMS
4	input?
5	MR. GEORGE: Absolutely.
6	MR. BRUNSON: Good idea.
7	MR. GEORGE: I second that motion.
8	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Okay. Mr. Sanchez had a
9	COMMISSIONER SANCHEZ: The only thing I was
10	going to say is it's real simple to create zones.
11	And I spent 14 years on the fire department.
12	Believe you me, there was nothing better than to
13	be able to identify zones like in a condominium.
14	And once you knew the zone, if you get a fire call
15	in, you know that's where you go. So, you're
16	already going to the problem. And the exact
17	location will come to you over the radio while
18	you're on your way there. But you know when you
19	pull in here, you have to go to zone C. And you

25

20	know exactly what it is as to the type of building
21	or what might be in it.
22	So and that's real simple to just create
23	zones, and then numbers follow in that. And no
24	matter who moves where, that building maintains

that number. The place doesn't take it with them.

1	CHAIRMAN GREEN: I think that lends credence
2	to what
3	MR. GEORGE: Good suggestion.
4	CHAIRMAN GREEN: I was espousing and Jack
5	brought up. But let's talk to see what the 911
6	emergency people say first.
7	MR. WUELLNER: They may be able to help us
8	completely.
9	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Yeah. All right. There's
10	any further board discussion?
11	(No further board discussion.)
12	CHAIRMAN GREEN: All in favor of Mr. Gorman's
13	motion?
14	MR. BRUNSON: Aye.
15	MR. GEORGE: Aye.
16	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Aye.
17	MS. BARRERA: Aye.
18	MR. GORMAN: Aye.
10	CHAIRMAN GREEN: All opposed?

20	(No opposition.).	
21	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Okay. So, that's Staff	
22	direction to speak with emergency and see what's	
23	best with them and us.	
24	MR. GEORGE: I will be most happy to make	
25	myself available to commiserate with you, Ed.	

MR. WUELLNER: Thank you. I look forward to 1 2 actual progress this time, right? 9. B - STAFF POSITION REQUEST 3 4 MR. WUELLNER: Next item was another item requested by Mr. George, and it had to do with 5 Staff assistance or Staff position request. 6 And --7 MR. GEORGE: Good way of putting it. While I 8 was in the hospital, I had plenty of time to 9 think, and that's the reason I came up with all of 10 11 these harebrain ideas. CHAIRMAN GREEN: We have to keep you well. 12 MR. GEORGE: That's right. Yeah. 13 14 MR. WUELLNER: Amen. 15 MR. BRUNSON: I didn't, and I was in the hospital. 16 17 MR. WUELLNER: You had better drugs. 18 MR. BRUNSON: Yeah.

MR. GEORGE: In February of 2007, we approved

20	scheme number 2 for the T-hangars to be 11, 3,000
21	square foot hangars and 42 T-hangars with an
22	estimated revenue of \$349,000. That's \$30,000 a
23	month.
24	Right now, that project has slipped from the
25	end of the year completion to the end of January

completion and now to 2008 completion. 1 2 I think that alone has done two things. It's demonstrated what we're asking our present staff 3 to do, the amount of time that they're having to 4 5 spend on the projects that we dream up for them, plus the projects that are already on the books. 6 The Skybus project really drained us of -- of 7 8 some resources. And I'm thinking that another staff position as an assistant -- if he could get 9 our hangars done 60 days earlier, there's \$60,000 10 of revenue coming in that we wouldn't be getting. 11 We all have done -- or seen the airport 12 expand and expand and expand, and I think that we 13 owe a lot of that to Mr. Ed Wuellner. I usually 14 go to the conferences with him to go around behind 15 him and pick up his resumé when he drops them off, 16 17 if he does drop them off. But I think at some point down the road, there's going to be other 18 people that are going to recognize his talents, 19

20	and that probably will coincide with his last
21	child graduating from school here. Just thought
22	I'd throw that in.
23	But we have his contract coming up again, and
24	we need to start giving him some help and also
25	training someone so that in the event that

1	somebody does come in and steal him and we can't,
2	you know, convince him otherwise, that we have
3	somebody here that can keep the ball rolling.
4	So, that's why I'm recommending a to add
5	to the budget before we present it, you know,
6	another position as an assistant to the executive
7	director for construction projects and and the
8	like.
9	CHAIRMAN GREEN: I don't have any public
10	discussion cards. Board discussion?
11	MR. GORMAN: Specific to construction? In
12	other words, someone that is astute to
13	engineering, drafting, and development?
14	MR. GEORGE: Well, I think they have to
15	they have to ultimately be oriented toward the,
16	you know, entire airport the way Bryan and Ed are.
17	But that could be a training.
18	You know, I think that initially we get the
19	position paid for by the work and the benefit that

20	they can do in the construction arena, but the job
21	description has got to be of such a broad spectrum
22	that the education is there to get that person
23	educated in all aspects, you know, of the airport.
24	MR. GORMAN: Do you think that level of
25	staffing would be conversant with other levels of

1	staffing with other airports of this size? That's
2	my only last last last question.
3	MR. GEORGE: I I do not know what other
4	airports have. I just saw \$60,000 being lost in
5	early 2008. If you turn now to July, that's a lot
6	more than \$60,000 that we're losing in revenue
7	coming in. And it could impact our financial
8	plans.
9	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Kelly?
10	MS. BARRERA: My question would be have we
11	lost the \$60,000 because of lack of planning from
12	a staff standpoint?
13	MR. GEORGE: We originally were going to open
14	bids in June, and the bids were opened in July,
15	even though all the bids I think were in in June.
16	And that's not any outside forces telling us that
17	you can't open these for another three weeks. I
18	think we had too many other things on our plate,

you know --

20	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Skybus.
21	MR. GEORGE: was the reason they couldn't
22	get opened. Well, if you don't open the bids for
23	three weeks, the contracts don't get assigned for
24	three weeks. That's three weeks lost right there

25 And all I'm saying is somebody to stay on top of

1	it.
2	We don't need another fiasco like we did with
3	the terminal five, six years ago. But someone
4	that they can spend more time, you know, working
5	with those, and maybe pick up some of the
6	assignments that we're presently contracting out
7	to the, you know, designers and stuff like that.
8	I just think that he can pay he or she could
9	pay for themselves, you know, very easily.
10	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Any other board discussion?
11	Buzz, are you looking for an action I mean,
12	it's on the action items.
13	MR. GEORGE: Well, we have the budget coming
14	up, and if we're going to do it, it needs to be an
15	item in the budget.
16	CHAIRMAN GREEN: I'd like to see something,
17	and maybe from Staff and from you, if you have an
18	idea, as to maybe a job description so we know
19	what kind of monetary salary we're looking at.

20	Obviously, if you want someone with
21	engineering or whatever and FAA grant, DOT grant
22	background, that would be one thing versus someone
23	that's more new and wants to train. I would like
24	to see a job description so we can equate that
25	with the budget and what we would

MR. GEORGE: Well, I don't think we're going 1 2 to have time to do a -- that depth of analysis 3 before the budget gets around for its approval. 4 CHAIRMAN GREEN: I think we could do it 5 cursorily, though. I mean, if you're saying someone's got an engineer, we could probably 6 look --7 8 MR. GEORGE: I'm not so sure we shouldn't do it with promoting from within. 9 10 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Yeah. MR. WUELLNER: You might be looking at just, 11 at this point, a placeholder kind of item in the 12 budget. 13 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Right. 14 MR. WUELLNER: It's not, you know, to where 15 16 it allows you --17 MR. GEORGE: Yeah. 18 MR. WUELLNER: -- to finish the -- the preparation for it. 19

- 20 CHAIRMAN GREEN: No, I just wanted to --
- MR. GEORGE: I'll be glad to work on that --
- 22 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Yeah.
- MR. GEORGE: -- for the budget. First budget
- presentation is what?
- MR. WUELLNER: Coming up.

1 MR. GEORGE: It's coming up. 2 MR. WUELLNER: 19th. 3 MR. BRUNSON: Madam Chairman? 4 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Yes. 5 MR. BRUNSON: I'd like to reserve my comments until I could talk to our director and get some 6 insight to his thoughts on it and -- because I 7 8 have some thoughts on it, too. 9 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Well, that's what I meant. MR. GEORGE: Why can't he share his thoughts 10 with us in the open? 11 12 MR. BRUNSON: Well, I want one on one. 13 MR. GEORGE: Okay. CHAIRMAN GREEN: That's what I meant; I'd 14 like a little feedback from what is needed, what 15 16 the parameters are in there. What's our 17 placeholder? Are we talking about a part-time,

three day a week? Are we talking full time,

salary, benefits, whatever? That's fine.

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20	MR. GEORGE: Okay.
21	CHAIRMAN GREEN: I just would like to know
22	where we are budgetwise.
23	MS. BARRERA: And do we have enough work that
24	would keep somebody like that busy? Because when
25	you have somebody like that, their you have to

1 pay them to do what their specialty is or else 2 you're wasting everybody's money. That would be my question. 3 MR. GEORGE: Yeah. Well, Ed, what do you 4 5 think about having another position on your staff? 6 MR. WUELLNER: I'm not opposed. I'm not sure I'm a hundred percent behind the focus of that 7 position yet. 8 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Right. That's my question. 9 MR. GEORGE: Okay. 10 MR. WUELLNER: But that's something to be, I 11 think, talked about. And the -- the secondary 12 reason is that, you know, as you've added airline 13 service and you -- you -- you begin to need an 14 operational focus and -- and somebody that's on 15 16 top of that, because there's simply too many 17 requirements in that arena that -- that have to be 18 maintained all the time. And -- and it's not an

area you can just decide you're not interested in

20	and don't want to do anymore in terms of managing
21	that part of it.
22	So, it may very well be that that that is
23	an area to bolster and and thereby freeing up
24	other Staff time to do the other to do what
25	you're talking about. So

1 MR. GEORGE: Yeah. 2 MR. WUELLNER: -- anyway, I think it just 3 needs to be developed and mature the idea a little 4 bit. 5 MR. GEORGE: I'll try to put some bullets together as part of the scope of work before the 6 September the 10th meeting. 7 8 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Jack? MR. GORMAN: Just one thing a little bit out 9 of the box. You've heard of these virtual offices 10 and things like that. For instance, one of my 11 observations has been like when Ms. Hollingsworth 12 answers the phone constantly. You know, she's a 13 good administrator. You just sub out some of this 14 phone answering service so that she doesn't have 15 16 to still answer the phone and can be an 17 administrator rather than just a phone -- you know, phone answering, without adding -- continue, 18 you know, adding a staff member completely. It's 19

- 20 kind of an as-needed thing. Just --
- 21 MR. GEORGE: Yeah.
- MR. GORMAN: -- thinking along those terms.
- 23 Maybe for just engineering.
- MR. GEORGE: I don't know. Let me put
- 25 together what I think the scope of work is. I

1	just seems to me that I saw the strain on the
2	organization for what Skybus put on us, and I saw
3	the resulting lost revenue because of contract
4	slippages and everything. If we don't have the
5	manpower to do it, we can solve that. So
6	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Any further discussion?
7	MR. BRUNSON: I have none.
8	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Okay. We can sit down
9	and individually, if you want to talk to Ed, or
10	you'll give us or we'll give Ed our input, if
11	we want, and he can give us ours.
12	MR. GEORGE: I will try to get the bullets
13	out that so Cindy or Ed can distribute them
14	easily, that you'll have them before the September
15	the 10th meeting so you can think about it.
16	MR. BURNETT: I will make one comment, if I
17	can, or really two. If you go back four or five
18	years ago Ed is currently running leaner than
19	he has in the past for his office

20	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Yeah, Christine.
21	MR. BURNETT: Yeah, because there was that
22	secretary/receptionist-type role. And the other
23	thing is it's difficult and we come up with
24	this every time we look at the executive
25	director's compensation, to look around and find

1	other airports as to where they run at, but that
2	may be something to look at, as well, as to how
3	many staff folks they have.
4	CHAIRMAN GREEN: I think
5	MR. BURNETT: But again, it's another
6	difficult one again because
7	MR. GEORGE: It is.
8	MR. BURNETT: the airport's so unique
9	and and with commercial service here.
10	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Well, when Jack I
11	remember long ago, we we have those numbers.
12	We did comparisons. We looked at employees
13	airport to airport. So, we have that data.
14	MR. GORMAN: We've got lots of numbers. We
15	never came to any conclusion.
16	CHAIRMAN GREEN: No.
17	MR. GORMAN: But we did get lots of numbers.
18	CHAIRMAN GREEN: But it's easier to look at

maybe look at flight ops and -- or construction or

20	whatever and number of employees than it is wha
21	we were trying to do, which was budget and all of
22	that. But that information is here.
23	MR. GEORGE: Speaking of looking at other
24	airports, Mr. Wuellner's contract is coming up,
25	and it kind of ties along with the budget year

1	that's going in. And for the last five years,
2	I've kind of taken the lead in getting in with
3	other airports in the area, you know, executive
4	salary reviews and stuff like that.
5	And I would like for somebody else to take
6	that this time so and feed all of the
7	information and the contacts we've had from
8	before. But I think that there's somebody other
9	than me that needs to get up to spec on what a
10	position like his in an airport like we're running
11	here and plan on running, you know, what it needs.
12	Madam Chairman.
13	CHAIRMAN GREEN: I was just going to ask,
14	Jack, since you were
15	MR. BRUNSON: Noted.
16	CHAIRMAN GREEN: You've done a lot of the
17	comparisons with the airports before. Do you have
18	time to do that or

MR. GORMAN: I'll take a cursory look at it.

- 20 And let's -- let's -- let me volunteer to take a
- cursory look at it and then I'll holler if I need
- some more help --
- 23 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Okay. All right.
- MR. GORMAN: -- because it's -- it's
- involved.

1	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Sure.
2	MR. GORMAN: What we did decide the last time
3	we looked is it was more involved than we
4	decided than we thought.
5	MR. GEORGE: Yeah.
6	MR. GORMAN: It's really true. Let me
7	volunteer for a cursory look and then we'll
8	discuss it.
9	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Doug?
10	MR. GEORGE: Cindy has the old files with the
11	old name and addresses. Let's don't lose them.
12	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Doug, we can't I mean, it
13	Jack needs help, we can't do it together?
14	MR. BURNETT: No.
15	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Yeah.
16	MR. BURNETT: No. The thing I was leaning
17	over to Ed to to ask was, I mean, it may be the
18	kind of thing that you could task one of your
19	continuing consultants to actually to at least

20	do the fact-finding to get some of the information
21	together for you. And then from there, you, as
22	the board members you know, they could
23	circulate that out.
24	But take Passero, for example, they could at
25	least do the fact-finding gathering, and circulate

- 1 that information out on a spreadsheet to you guys
- 2 so you'd all have the basic information, which
- 3 would eliminate some of that burden.
- 4 MR. GEORGE: Yeah.
- 5 MR. BURNETT: Because it's a task to try and
- 6 contact the folks, get the information --
- 7 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Yeah.
- 8 MR. BURNETT: -- and put it together.
- 9 MS. BARRERA: My question would be, does AAAE
- or any like the Florida Airports Council, do any
- of them provide that type of support service?
- MR. GEORGE: Three-year-old data.
- MR. WUELLNER: Yeah, it's probably --
- MR. GEORGE: When I looked to them, it was
- three-year-old data.
- MR. WUELLNER: And the state doesn't do one.
- 17 FAC does.
- MR. GORMAN: There's also a reluctance for
- that -- for them to actually publish those and --

20	and try to do those comparative, you know,
21	situations, because they really don't want any
22	internal strife. In other words, they don't
23	really I've talked to several of them at the
24	one of the last conference I went to and I
25	kind of like Doug's idea of just saying, this

1	airport, this much; this airport, this much. Just
2	raw data, give it to us that way. And then
3	including me. And then, then we can try to figure
4	out the job descriptions from there.
5	AAAE was I asked several people, and I
6	didn't get the answers that I thought were going
7	to accomplish what we needed. Unfortunately,
8	you'd think they would, but it didn't work.
9	MR. GEORGE: Yeah.
10	CHAIRMAN GREEN: What kind of cost do you
11	think we're looking at if we have them pull the
12	data? Because you said it's time consuming.
13	MR. BURNETT: Yeah. I guess it's a question
14	for
15	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Passero?
16	MR. BURNETT: If you whoever can take it
17	upon themselves to ask Passero as a continuing
18	consultant to see if they can give us a ballpark,

you know.

- 20 CHAIRMAN GREEN: I -- I'll do that.
- 21 MR. GORMAN: Something simple.
- 22 CHAIRMAN GREEN: I'll talk to LPA and Passero
- and see what --
- MR. BURNETT: Yeah.
- MR. GORMAN: Yeah, something simple.

1	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Yean. Right. 111 do that.
2	I will talk to
3	MR. BURNETT: I mean, I know we've got hourly
4	rates. You know, and usually they'll give us a
5	cost not to exceed. But they also work by the
6	hour, so
7	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Or we could say give us what
8	you can and give it so we'll afford five hours of
9	work or whatever, ten, or whatever it is. We can
10	set the limits on that, just like we do other
11	consultants.
12	All right. I'll I'll volunteer to do
13	that. I'll talk to Ed, I'll talk to you or
14	Cindy about everybody, Passero or LPA. David's
15	number is I know. Okay. I will do that.
16	9.C SECOND FBO DISCUSSION
17	MR. WUELLNER: Okay. Last item of the day
18	that I have is a return trip based on last month's
19	discussion on second FBO. And I was asked to

25

FBO activities that that we would expect to an FBO would be involved in ordinarily. At I provided that. It's in the PowerPoint. I this	hat
, and the second	
22 I provided that It's in the DowerDoint I this	nd I
I provided that. It's in the PowerPoint. I this	nk
24 I yeah. It's the PowerPoint, next slide. I'll	1

get to it in just a second.

1	My suggestion in in developing this is
2	and I'm not trying to represent this is absolutely
3	inclusive of everything, so if you have some other
4	things that you would consider typical FBO
5	functions that aren't loosely already covered, you
6	know, we can certainly add them. It's not not
7	designed to there's certainly nothing
8	proprietary in the list.
9	My suggestion was that, you know, the the
10	ongoing assertion from from the folks I talked
11	to and certainly the the background chatter,
12	the light noise, so to speak, from the airport is
13	that there are, you know, things that aren't
14	either provided on the airport or, you know,
15	aren't provided well or whatever.
16	And one of the things I thought you might
17	want to do is take that activity list or an
18	improved version thereof and develop a survey in
19	one of two formats: one, you know, asking for

20	what you know, how they feel about those
21	services on the airport and how they're offered
22	and those kind of things; or, the other approach
23	would be relative to, are those services
24	adequately represented on the airport? You
25	could you could take it from either direction

1	and get, I think, the same kinds of conclusions.
2	And then use that data to kind of refine exactly
3	what an RFP might look like. You know, what is it
4	you're trying to ask this second FBO to be?
5	And and at that point, I think it's
6	appropriate after the RFP's development, to then
7	kind of shake the bush and see who's who's
8	really interested where you know, we're
9	we're interested now.
10	The second component of that that effort
11	in developing the RFP is that that discussion
12	on funding. And to be honest, we haven't we
13	haven't gotten into that in any great detail.
14	I can tell you that, you know, in in a
15	broad picture, the type of project that would
16	likely come out of the an FBO or second FBO
17	would be eligible for FDOT participation.
18	We do have some projects starting out, you
19	know, about three years and beyond that are

20	somewhat placeholder in nature, wherein you could
21	adjust the the project descriptions before the
22	grants are written and and get that to be more
23	FBO related, if you want to do that.
24	To get new projects into the work program is,
25	while we can add them all the time, there's a

1	finite or a very fixed amount of money that gets
2	divided up among the airports. And once it's
3	divided, which is, you know, basically they add a
4	new year each year, and it's at year 5, year 6.
5	And to get new projects in that scheme is, you
6	know, is easy, but if you're willing to wait five
7	years for it.
8	Otherwise, it requires you to somewhat
9	finesse what you have programmed, the dollars you
10	do have identified, and and prioritize them to
11	whatever you'd like. And it doesn't have to be an
12	FBO. But that's kind of what we do every day.
13	You know, when you sometimes think we pull a
14	miracle, well, it's a project that's out there
15	that's not likely to get done in the way it's
16	described, so we'll reclassify the money a little
17	bit into into something that's more important,
18	or at least is important at that time.
19	So, we can get it in there, but you're

20	looking at something that's out maybe beyond where
21	you want to be in terms of time. We can make some
22	adjustments in the work program on a shorter time
23	line. May or may not provide all of the match
24	you're looking for, depending on the value of the
25	project. There's always the alternative, you

1	know, funding, you know, everything from from
2	borrowing to just committing, you know, collected
3	ad valorem. Yeah, you've got all of those
4	those tools in the in the box, so to speak.
5	So, I think until we have an idea and firmed
6	up exactly what this FBO's going to be and what
7	the square footage requirements might need to be
8	to do that, you know, it's really hard to get
9	dollars into the equation. A lot of the
10	infrastructure's in place. So, it you know,
11	it's you know, it's really hard.
12	I mean, I can tell you that in just doing
13	something as reasonably simple as as what we
14	did out there at hangar 11 is, you know, is very
15	expensive per square foot. I mean, and and
16	it's not much too that. But that's what things
17	are running these days. Everything's gone through
18	the roof in terms of construction dollars.
19	So, you're getting a lot less for what you

25

20	were in terms of square footage. Fortunately,
21	your rates have been able to keep up with the
22	other end of it. So
23	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Okay. Well, I'm going to
24	open up to public because we have a lot of public

discussion. Mr. Martinelli?

1	MR. MARTINELLI: Really, two two issues.					
2	One issue has to do with services that might be					
3	lacking on the airport. And as an airport tenant,					
4	as a pilot with an airport here, and using the					
5	services on the airport, there are two major ones					
6	that affect us. One is fuel and the other is					
7	maintenance.					
8	And at the present time, with the Airport					
9	Authority's self-fuel and and Galaxy's fuel					
10	service, I believe that most of us are well					
11	satisfied with that service.					
12	As far as maintenance is concerned, since					
13	Wind Dancer has now been on the field and and					
14	from what I gather, from the users of that					
15	service, it's very adequate. I think that was a					
16	blank spot for quite a while until Wind Dancer					
17	came on the field here. But now I believe that's					
18	taken care of.					
19	So. I don't believe that there's urgency to					

- 21 have a flight school. And Bjorn has -- has and is
- doing an excellent job there. There's charter
- service, and that's available.
- And so I think that since this is a very,
- very important decision that you folks will make

1	because it's going to affect what's on this field
2	for the next 30 or 40 years, that it be done
3	methodically and properly, considering all the
4	alternatives.
5	I think that the idea that Ed came up with of
6	taking a survey is more input into that, and I
7	think that's the way to go.
8	So again, I don't think there's any urgency.
9	I think it should be done and done methodically
10	and done properly. And when an RFP is finally
11	crafted and it goes out, it will be one that
12	everyone can respond to and with with no
13	questions. Thank you.
14	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Thanks. Ms. Sutherland?
15	MS. SUTHERLAND: Alise Sutherland, and I just
16	wanted to speak in support of the second FBO.
17	I I sort of think there is an urgency.
18	I think the direction of aviation, especially
19	business aviation, and now you've opened up the

20	floodgates with Skybus, I think that putting all
21	these things on one FBO, with the future growth
22	that's going to come about with these things, is
23	just almost an impossibility. And I think that a
24	second FBO on the field is absolutely urgent. So
25	thank you.

1	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Thanks. Dan?
2	MR. HOLIDAY: Good afternoon.
3	MR. GEORGE: Dan Holiday.
4	MR. HOLIDAY: Sometimes you can't see the
5	tree for the woods, you're so close to it. But
6	it's so glaringly obvious. Mike here has got his
7	hands full with the jets, right? You're not
8	you're not focussing on light general aviation.
9	Just in the very short time that Gene's been
10	working over in his new facility, he's slammed.
11	He's growing out of it. Am I not right?
12	MR. POWERS: Yes, sir.
13	MR. HOLIDAY: And in business, you find a
14	need and fill it. Well, the need's here. We
15	don't need to duplicate what we've already got,
16	but we do need to grow in the area of light
17	general aviation, internal combustion engines.
18	A lot of us are kind of hanging on by our
19	by our toenails as far as, you know, the fuel

20	prices and everything else.
21	I was very relieved when Gene took over. I
22	no longer have to take my plane to Bartow to get
23	it annualed. But there's there is everyone
24	sitting at this table here that's a pilot
25	recognizes Randy Brunson's a pilot. Buzz is a

pilot. Captain Jack's a pilot. You're a pilot. 1 Kelly's a pilot. And you're all -- you're not 2 flying jets; you're flying single-engine aircraft, 3 twin-engine aircraft. And I know, myself, after 4 being out here for almost 40 years, that there is 5 a tremendous vacuum. Am I not correct in saying 6 this? A tremendous vacuum. And that's when you 7 8 define an FBO. Immediately you want to talk about jet fuel. 9 10 We're talking about an FBO for small general aviation. And if there's enough of us, just 11 signing up the people that are waiting on the list 12 for hangars, most of those aircraft are sitting in 13 Craig and Herlong and Palatka and you name it, 14 waiting for hangars here. Am I not correct in 15 saying that, Randy? You know this yourself. 16 17 There's even planes sitting over in Hastings

International that would be here if they had a

hangar. So, that's what we need.

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20	And when you start getting these people here,
21	the additional new hangars going out and clearing
22	that area with I call it shanty town, the
23	little T's are in rough shape start building
24	some new hangars in shanty town, where shanty town
25	is, you're going to end up with probably another

hundred small general aviation pilots, which is --1 they're from St. Johns County. These people are 2 not from the moon. You look at that list and look 3 at their addresses. They're in St. Johns County, 4 5 and that's what we're here to do is serve St. Johns County. 6 7 It makes the hair stand on my arms to see a 8 U.S. Congressman stand there and talk about building a place over in the zuzu grass and the 9 giggly weeds. 10 This is our -- this is our -- this is our 11 airport. And it's a general aviation airport. 12 And, you know, welcome, Skybus. I mean, this guy 13 here, I know they -- they really strained 14 themselves tremendously putting that Skybus thing 15 together. And I can understand why things have 16

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been put on a back burner.

But that's up and running now, and I guess

it's going to be a success, and I'm very happy

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18

- about it. A little skeptical, but a little -- but
- 21 I'm happy. But we need it. Find a need and fill
- it. And we need leadership in this Airport
- Authority. And we need to take this and do it.
- Don't put it off.
- I mean, to spend an hour here talking about

- 1 addresses in this airport is ridiculous. Think
- 2 about that. Zone A, 1, 2 3, 4, 5. Zone B, 1, 2,
- 3 3, 4, 5. Simple. Everybody else does it. Thank
- 4 you very much.
- 5 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Dan, question? What do you
- 6 think about the survey issue, you know?
- 7 MR. HOLIDAY: Who are you going to survey?
- 8 CHAIRMAN GREEN: SAAPA tenants. You know,
- 9 people --
- MR. HOLIDAY: I'll tell you right now that --
- that you're going to have a huge amount of SAAPA
- is for it, 100 percent.
- 13 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Well, that would just lend
- credence when we start discussing --
- MR. MARTINELLI: What do they want? Not just
- 16 for it, but what, specifically?
- MR. HOLIDAY: What does SAAPA want?
- MR. MARTINELLI: Specifically with an FBO.
- 19 CHAIRMAN GREEN: With a second FBO.

- MR. HOLIDAY: In an FBO.
- MR. MARTINELLI: That's right. That's --
- that's the question.
- MR. HOLIDAY: Do we want -- do we want a
- duplication of Galaxy?
- MR. MARTINELLI: Obviously not.

1 MR. HOLIDAY: Okay. Right, Mike? 2 MR. SLINGLUFF: Right. MR. HOLIDAY: Okay. Do we -- do we want to 3 have an Embry-Riddle here? Okay. 4 5 MR. MARTINELLI: I don't want to get into a debate between you and me, Dan. 6 7 MR. HOLIDAY: Because I'll win. 8 CHAIRMAN GREEN: What we're talking about is what Ed presented here. These are different 9 10 areas. MR. HOLIDAY: That -- that basically is great 11 and wonderful, but that's -- it's so obvious, 12 isn't it? Or am I just sitting here with my head 13 in the clouds like most pilots? It's -- it's just 14 that simple. It's that simple. 15 16 Yeah, you can go out and ask questions, but 17 find a need and fill it. 18 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Thanks.

MR. HOLIDAY: Bjorn, don't you agree?

- MR. OTTESEN: Yeah, sure.
- 21 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Mike?
- MR. MICKEL: Let me know if I get too loud.
- 23 Sometimes I get a little passionate about this
- business, so I've had this microphone which I
- probably don't need.

- MR. BURNETT: If you would, and so we get 1 2 back on track for the rest of the meeting, if 3 folks would, when they come up to speak, give your 4 name and address. 5 MR. MICKEL: Okay. I'm going to read a little bit today. It's very brief, so bear with 6 me. I just have some points I'd like to make sure 7 8 I make. MR. BURNETT: And, sir, we're trying to get a 9 record, so I've got to interrupt you again. If 10
- 12 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Mike Mickel.

you would, please.

- MR. BURNETT: Give your name and address.
- MR. MICKEL: I'm going to do that.
- 15 MR. BURNETT: All right, sir.
- MR. MICKEL: Madam Chairman, members of the
- 17 Authority, Mr. Wuellner, my name is Mike Mickel,
- and as many of you know, I operate -- own and
- operate an aviation business in Richmond,

20	Virginia. And I also maintain a second residence
21	here locally at 201 South Ocean Grande Drive in
22	Ponte Vedra Beach.
23	For the many years I've been part of this
24	community, I have watched it successfully grow and
25	flourish, and I am sincerely optimistic about the

1	future. I've observed this airport grow from when
2	it primarily emphasized smaller sport and general
3	aviation aircraft to today with its increasing
4	corporate jet and airline service.
5	As a businessman, I have to take the
6	responsibility to make long-range business
7	decisions based on present-day facts and
8	opportunities.
9	Based on my years of experience and my market
10	research, and as contained in my May 2nd proposal
11	which I thought was a response to an RFP, I am
12	confident in the long-term growth and economic
13	potential not only here at this airport but in
14	St. Augustine and St. Johns County.
15	The decision to add a second fixed-base
16	operator is not about whether you have one
17	operator, two operators, or three. It's not
18	whether the existing operator is doing a good job
19	or a bad job. And quite candidly, I think Galaxy

20 is	doing	a good job.	That is not	the	main	issue.
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- 21 And I do not believe that should be the basis of
- your decision in addressing the long-term economic
- potential of the region, this region and the
- 24 airport.
- 25 What I do believe should be the primary focus

1	to help attract activity in your area, whether it
2	be business, tourism, is to give choices.
3	Consumers, just as you, demand options that
4	favor communities that embrace a competitive
5	environment. The communities that are winning
6	today are the ones that create competitive markets
7	that attract long-term capital investments.
8	Successful communities do not subscribe to
9	the fixed pie model. They embrace and endorse a
10	growing pie. And ladies and gentlemen, the pie
11	can get very big.
12	Your vision can make way for tremendous
13	increase in economic diversity and prosperity. I
14	see a future of multiple FBOs, multiple airlines,
15	and employment growth that subscribes to these
16	services. It will be driven by the market and it
17	will be driven by demand.
18	You will have made it possible. You will be
10	right in the middle of the growth and progress of

20	this area. If you diversify your aviation-based
21	business and your transportation links to the
22	outside world, these capabilities and choices
23	demonstrate that you're a growing community with a
24	vision for the future, a future that includes not
25	just expanding aviation services, but businesses

1	in general.
2	You're in a unique position to make some
3	really long-range decisions that will play a vital
4	roll in the future of this airport. Additionally,
5	I believe my concept for an FBO will be
6	complementary to what is already provided, yet
7	provide an array of additional services.
8	I hope you'll decide to move this second FBO
9	project on as soon as possible. There is a much
10	bigger decision on the table. How you choose to
11	lead and grow this airport and this region in the
12	future is your decision and your choice. Thank
13	you for your time.
14	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Thanks, Mr. Mickel. I have
15	no other public discussion.
16	Board discussion?
17	I like the survey idea. I'd like to make it
18	short and concise and say return it within a
10	period of time. But I would like to know what the

20	tenants since I'm not a pilot and I'm not on
21	the airport every day what they feel they need.
22	I know maintenance was a huge issue that we
23	talked about before. But I would like to hear
24	that, because we have discussed at this board,
25	well, we don't want to give parameters to a second

FBO; yes, we do want to give parameters. So, I --1 2 I really like Ed's idea of that. I'd like to not 3 only -- maybe a hybrid of what you were saying. This is what we have; how do you feel these 4 5 services are? Are there others that we need? I mean, what are you looking for? 6 I don't disagree with our public comment. 7 8 There's a need. I mean, we are growing, there's no question. But at what capacity and in what 9 10 areas that we want to focus? Jack? 11 MR. GORMAN: As elected officials, we're supposed to represent the public. And the idea 12 of -- of a survey certainly then gives credence to 13 that, that you're actually trying to represent the 14 public by trying to actually act on what they feel 15 16 is their needs. 17 I also agree with Mr. Martinelli, although 18 once we get those needs, I don't see a tremendous

urgency here. I see some -- an urgency to -- I

19

25

20	mean, we need to continue to move forward. But an
21	urgency to make a decision and put an FBO on
22	the you know, on the plans and and right
23	away, I don't see that. I can see a survey being
24	necessary, and I agree with you.

CHAIRMAN GREEN: The only urgency I see is

1	what Ed is saying, that down the road, if we're
2	looking for matching funds, funding, we need to
3	decide now
4	MR. GORMAN: He needs to put place markers in
5	for funding, yes. That's true.
6	MS. BARRERA: I agree.
7	MR. GEORGE: Maybe I'm missing the part of
8	the survey. But if the main people that you're
9	going to survey are the people that are the
10	tenants on this field, I think that Mr. Martinelli
11	put it well. He said the two issues are fuel and
12	maintenance.
13	Fuel, we've got it covered with the
14	self-service. We are the lowest of anybody in
15	Florida, and people come down and stop for fuel
16	and keep right on going. And it's over there by
17	the hangars. I don't think we have a problem with
18	that.

CHAIRMAN GREEN: It's lowest price or lowest

19

20	consumption?
21	MR. GEORGE: I'm sorry?
22	CHAIRMAN GREEN: It's price he's talking
23	about, not consumption, right?
24	MR. GEORGE: Yes, price. I'm sorry. But the
25	second thing that they're going to say they want

1	is maintenance. What kind of airplanes do they
2	have? Do they have jets? Do they have
3	turboprops? 99.9 percent of them have internal
4	combustion engines. So, that's the kind of
5	maintenance that they're going to want.
6	So, I think the survey is fairly clear as the
7	nose on the end of our the end of our nose on
8	our face. I don't see any sense in doing it. But
9	if you want to do it just to stall, that's not a
10	bad idea.
11	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Well, I mean, I understand.
12	I'm not stalling. I'm looking you're telling
13	me, because you're a pilot and you see it all the
14	time, fuel and maintenance. And I know that from
15	working with this with the board.
16	But now we're looking at it's more of a light
17	general aviation focus and not to duplicate what
18	Galaxy that's what I wanted to hear from what,
19	you know, our tenants may have and our pilots and

- 20 SAAPA and whatever, just a couple of ideas of what
- is our big, big need. What do you wait for?
- MR. GEORGE: Yeah.
- MR. GORMAN: Well, agreeing in principle with
- Mr. George, because that's pretty obvious that,
- you know, that so far that's the discussion. But

- 1 then I -- you'll have to ask our director why he
- wants it. Because I do trust that he's trying to
- do things, you know, step by steps to put all of
- 4 the boxes stacked in order.
- 5 MR. GEORGE: Yeah.
- 6 MR. GORMAN: If he wants one, then I would
- 7 say, well, go with his expertise and let's do
- 8 this. I mean, although in principle, I agree with
- 9 you. I mean, you know, I don't think it's a
- stall. I think it's a matter of almost a
- documentation.
- 12 CHAIRMAN GREEN: I think the survey's so
- simple, you get it and return it in ten days. And
- if you don't turn it back in, okay.
- MR. WUELLNER: We ought to try and do it
- online so it's just a matter of logging on --
- 17 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Yeah.
- MR. WUELLNER: -- and entering your
- information and moving on.

20	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Randy?
21	MR. BRUNSON: I'm extremely optimistic about
22	the need for a second FBO. Having said that, I
23	think the loyal pilots that have been here year
24	after year and have supported this
25	facility in meetings and buying fuel, they should

1	be in my opinion, should be number one in our
2	thoughts to provide piston mechanics and keep the
3	fuel costs down.
4	And I had this on my comments for closing,
5	but number 5 was the loyalty of the pilots, but
6	and then number two is the second FBO. I think we
7	have a need, but we need to be methodic and make
8	sure we do the right thing for the second FBO and
9	do it slow, but in a in the right way. That's
10	my comment.
11	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Kelly?
12	MS. BARRERA: My my suggestion would be is
13	if we do send out or if we do have an online
14	survey, this was something that we had talked
15	about before as a part of a larger picture as far
16	as the PR, is also find out what what people
17	like about this airport, to add that onto the
18	survey. Because if we did do a quick turnaround,
19	those type of things, what needs are being met,

20	what what things that the airport can tout in
21	the community that is currently being accomplished

- here. I would like to see that as a part of that
- survey.
- 24 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Like rental cars. May not
- be all pilots that rent cars or passengers. May

1 be other public people that do. MS. BARRERA: And fire services. And my 2 3 second thing on that is I know that I was given the opportunity to tour Dominion Aviation when I 4 5 was up in the vicinity of Richmond. And I would like to have the opportunity to do that with other 6 facilities. 7 8 I've been to the Sky Harbor facility many times. But when we get down to -- to selecting an 9 10 FBO, and even in the process, I think that it would be beneficial for all the board members to 11 have that opportunity so that we can have a true 12 picture of what we're looking at from a business 13 standpoint of people who are interested, and also 14 with the services that they're looking at 15 16 providing. 17 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Board discussion? Jack? 18 MR. GORMAN: I agree with Kelly. If you're going to see what a particular entity, as a 19

21

20	business entity has created before, then you can

know, intend, you know, what they're going to do.

one on one, you know, see what they really, you

- MR. GEORGE: You need to expand this survey
- to the tenants --
- MS. BARRERA: Agreed.

1 MR. GEORGE: -- the corporate guys. 2 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Absolutely. 3 MR. GORMAN: Yeah. That's another point. MR. GEORGE: And maybe even have it as 4 something for transients coming in, as anything 5 that they see that they would like to have. 6 I'd like to remind everybody of the last 7 8 meeting. The last meeting, the concern was that where the money is in an FBO is pumping jet fuel 9 10 and services to them. And we were concerned that we're losing the -- the objective of what we, the 11 tenants, of this airport right now need. 12 And I have a question to Mr. Burnett. Can we 13 put together an FBO contract that says you can't 14 ship -- you can't --15 16 CHAIRMAN GREEN: You only do light --17 MR. GEORGE: -- fuel jet A? That you can't do this and you can't do this? 18

MR. WUELLNER: Sure.

19

20	MR. GEORGE: Because we were all concerned
21	that, you know, all of these companies Mike
22	and are going to tell you what you want to
23	hear. And if you want to hear, well, I'm going to
24	take care of the piston guy, I'm going to take
25	care of the piston guy, you know, in two weeks,

1	I'm going to be pumping jet A somehow or another,
2	and the and the emphasis of what we are saying
3	we want is going to be drawn away from it. So,
4	can we put together an FBO that says this is the
5	type of facilities that we need, and therefore,
6	this is what you're limited to?
7	MR. BURNETT: One of my notes, going away
8	from this, which was a follow-up to another note
9	that I had had before, which I had actually done
10	some research on, but I need to research that just
11	a little bit more to give you the detail as to how
12	restrictive we can be. I want to be able to give
13	you the parameters as to how restrictive you can
14	be.
15	You can clearly identify what's important to
16	you and target an FBO that's proposing to give you
17	those things and and favor that one over others
18	because these are the factors that are important
10	to you the airport. How how restrictive you

- 20 can be in the actual contract, I need to be able
- 21 to -- I need to do a little more work on --
- MR. GEORGE: Yeah.
- MR. BURNETT: -- before I can give you that
- answer.
- 25 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Even if it's said you can't

1	do this, of the majority of percentage of your
2	profits
3	MR. GEORGE: Okay. Of your revenue
4	CHAIRMAN GREEN: have to be for
5	MR. GEORGE: has to come from this area,
6	right?
7	MR. BURNETT: Yeah.
8	MR. GEORGE: You know, another way of doing
9	it, if we don't want to just open the box and say,
10	okay, here's the shopping list and we're looking
11	for somebody that will do 90 percent of these with
12	the priorities, if we're going to start building
13	facilities ourselves, which is the best revenue
14	that comes in to us, maybe we pick what we want to
15	have done first and we start building those
16	facilities with the reservation of land next to it
17	that could be expanded as our airport grows to get
18	into some of these other things.
19	But that way, you would be having a second

20	FBO, and your facilities would restrict them to
21	what they're doing, which should coincide with
22	what you want.
23	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Meaning building something
24	that would allow them to pump jet A fuel or
25	MR. GEORGE: Building building a second

1	FBO that has a very large maintenance shack on it.
2	MR. BURNETT: Yeah. And and you going
3	one step further in that, I doubt you're going to
4	find this, but maybe I don't know the market that
5	well, but maybe someone's going to propose that
6	they would actually build something.
7	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Oh, they have. I mean,
8	that that's
9	MR. GEORGE: Oh, yeah, that's that's an
10	option. Right. Yeah.
11	MR. BURNETT: One other thing, and and for
12	what this is worth, and Ed's got these on file,
13	but the existing FBO lease has quite a laundry
14	list in it for services, if anybody's looking to
15	see what what the potential services are. It's
16	pretty interesting. Some of them
17	MR. GEORGE: What the potential of services
18	are.
19	MR. BURNETT: Some of them, I hadn't thought

- of, to be honest with you.
- 21 MR. GEORGE: Yeah.
- MR. BURNETT: The services that -- and uses
- and -- and those kinds of things under the
- existing FBO, it's -- it's a laundry list, like
- you said earlier.

1	MR. GEORGE: Yeah.
2	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Right. But we're looking
3	at, okay, that's fine, but what do we need
4	MR. BURNETT: Yeah.
5	CHAIRMAN GREEN: of those services? What
6	are the focus?
7	MR. GEORGE: Yeah. If if my hourly rate I
8	get for a jet engine mechanic is 250 bucks an
9	hour, and my hourly rate that I get for a piston,
10	you know, is \$75 an hour, which one do you think
11	I'm going to push for?
12	MR. BURNETT: Sure.
13	MR. BRUNSON: I just want to comment that in
14	my opinion, we need to keep this a level playing
15	field. Put in what we request people to do and
16	the percentages and these kind of things. But
17	it's got to be a level playing field or we're
18	going to ask for trouble.
19	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Well, that's where we were a

20	month ago. We had talked about that the
21	competition still has to stay there. Well, that's
22	for discussion. Is there a motion with regards?
23	I don't know if we need one.
24	I I would like to see a very short, get it
25	to the public type of survey. Just tell me what

1	you believe our needs are, here's some ideas, and
2	market. And add other.
3	MS. BARRERA: And I'd like for it to it to
4	also have a spot on there about what what is
5	good about St. Augustine Airport.
6	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Uh-huh.
7	MR. GEORGE: Yeah. And maybe from that, we
8	could wind up putting together an RFP that defines
9	percentages that coincides with what this field
10	wants, but still leaves the open for them to get
11	into those other areas, but with us having a
12	strict control over where that revenue is coming
13	from.
14	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Anybody want to make a
15	motion? Or, Ed, do you need anything further than
16	that from us?
17	MR. BRUNSON: I don't think we need a motion.
18	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Okay.
19	MR. WUELLNER: I'm fine.

- 20 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Okay.
- MR. BURNETT: And -- and I will do the
- research to come back and give you an opinion
- related to how restrictive. I want to give you
- the parameters.
- 25 MR. GEORGE: Okay. Thank you.

1	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Okay.
2	MR. WUELLNER: We skipped there's the
3	list. We didn't even get past it. But I'll have
4	some copies available.
5	COMMISSIONER SANCHEZ: Chair, I have another
6	commitment. I'm going to slip out. I appreciate
7	the opportunity to be here.
8	CHAIRMAN GREEN: I'll see you.
9	MR. WUELLNER: Okay. You're at general
10	public comments.
11	CHAIRMAN GREEN: The housekeeping took care
12	of itself.
13	MR. WUELLNER: Yeah. I really incorporated
14	it in the update earlier.
15	10 PUBLIC COMMENT - GENERAL
16	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Mr. Tucker? Len? You had
17	public comment, sir?
18	MR. TUCKER: Yeah, Len Tucker, 223 South
19	Matanzas Boulevard.

20	I had two basic comments, one on behalf of
21	the Pilots Association, I forwarded a letter to Ed
22	today requesting that the board consider adding
23	some sort of a permanent use public facility
24	either in the hangar area that's being built or in
25	some other area that might be designated a

1	facility that could be used by groups like the
2	Civil Air Patrol, the EAA chapter, the Pilots
3	Association, and any other group. And, of course,
4	the Pilots Association also would be willing to
5	coordinate housekeeping at that and, you know,
6	whatever else might need to be done to kind of use
7	that facility. But I think it would be good PR if
8	we had this.
9	I mean, even the Aerospace Academy might be
10	able to come in and have meetings there. It's a
11	great venue for that sort of thing, keeps the
12	aviation interest up, and at the same time,
13	extends the PR value from the airport to those
14	groups to keep it going. So, I did have that
15	formal request that I sent in to him.
16	And then in also in a related matter,
17	where I understand we needed a formal request from
18	the Civil Air Patrol, being a member of the Civil
19	Air Patrol, I have now created a written letter,

- 20 which --
- 21 MR. WUELLNER: Thank you, sir.
- MR. TUCKER: -- I will give you,
- 23 requesting --
- MR. GEORGE: Is it signed?
- MR. TUCKER: -- that they have gate access

1	onto the facility, which again, this is an issue
2	that I I tell you, these guys that come out
3	here and do training all on their own spare time,
4	and they're paying their own dues out here and
5	everything else. And to try to create some
6	hurdles for them getting out here to do their job
7	I think just is something we have to address,
8	because it's a great organization, and certainly
9	we can't you never want to turn away a
10	volunteer and say, you know, don't come out here
11	and try to search for somebody
12	MR. GEORGE: Right.
13	MR. TUCKER: and help us out. Thank you.
14	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Thank you. I have no other
15	public comment. Okay. Joe?
16	MR. JONES: It didn't say public comment on
17	the card.
18	CHAIRMAN GREEN: I don't have yours.
19	MR. JONES: It didn't say public comment. It

20	said	only	the	action	items.

- 21 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Yeah, this is what we do.
- I'll write your name down.
- MR. JONES: Thank you. Joe Jones, 4672 North
- Boulevard. I was just curious about your south
- development. You know, as far as the clearing and

1	the infrastructure and everything, you know, you
2	said you did request the pricing from your
3	contractor you have now.
4	I don't know if y'all are settled on him or
5	not. And just, you know, what was what'd the
6	bid come in at?
7	MR. WUELLNER: We're still evaluating that.
8	In fact, we're trying to make sure that that
9	remains within the scope of the budget for the
10	site development. You're referring to the site
11	development component.
12	MR. JONES: The site development, right. I
13	mean, do you have like a ballpark?
14	MR. WUELLNER: Actually, I think he's got an
15	initial blush of about \$2 million, which exceeds
16	the budget currently, but it it involves a
17	larger scope than is necessary to do the hangars,
18	so
19	MR. JONES: Right. That's taxiways and

- 20 everything else here --
- MR. WUELLNER: Yeah. The T-hangar access.
- MR. JONES: -- the hangars and everything
- else here?
- MR. WUELLNER: Yeah. Exactly. Water.
- Sewer. All of that stormwater and all of those

1	things. Yeah. And including pavement.
2	MR. JONES: All right. So, you might be
3	still a couple of months off even doing anything.
4	MR. WUELLNER: No, it won't take long to
5	value engineer yeah, they'll value engineer
6	that down very quickly, because it it includes
7	the complete development back there in terms of
8	scope. And that's obviously going to exceed the
9	budget we have for it.
10	MR. JONES: Do you have a certain map that
11	you can give as a change order since you already
12	have I mean, I know there's like you can't
13	exceed so much of percent of, you know, your
14	your original contract was \$4 1/2 million for the
15	people? So, you have to stay within a certain
16	percentage of that?
17	MR. WUELLNER: Actually, no, we don't have
18	to. You could change order any quantity you
19	wanted back into the job.

20	MR. JONES: I thought you like when you do
21	a contract, I thought, like with government, like
22	if the government's giving you money or state
23	money or county money I know like county jobs
24	and stuff like that, you ain't supposed to exceed
25	like 10 percent or something?

1	MR. WUELLNER: Yean, you've got you've got
2	two different you're confusing two different
3	things. One may be a condition of a grant that's
4	involved.
5	In this case, the original grant that we are
6	talking about change ordering is is an FAA
7	grant, a federal grant, and we're we're adding
8	work that's not federal in scope. So, it's coming
9	from a different funding source. It would be
10	coming from Florida DOT as a match to the Airport
11	Authority's.
12	And since FDOT has some money in the FAA job,
13	we've already run it by them in concept, and they
14	don't have any problem at all adding it as change
15	order. Again, we don't know what the exact
16	value
17	MR. JONES: Right. That's why I was curious.
18	And if because if you get state money, and it's
19	such a small number of that \$4 1/2 million

- 20 what, it was 2 1/2 percent of the 4 -- 4 1/2?
- MR. WUELLNER: Right.
- MR. JONES: I mean, so you'd be, what,
- 23 quadrupling the original contract.
- 24 MR. WUELLNER: Well --
- MR. JONES: Seems like it'd just have to go

1	back out to bid.
2	MR. WUELLNER: No. It even at \$2 million
3	it would be, you know, roughly 35 percent of the
4	original contract value. You remember the
5	original contract value was \$4 1/2 million.
6	MR. JONES: Right. Well, that's I mean,
7	you were saying you have the state part of the
8	original and then now you've got the state part of
9	the T-hangars.
10	MR. WUELLNER: Oh, you're referring to the
11	state. Okay.
12	MR. JONES: You go back with the state, not
13	with the federal.
14	MR. WUELLNER: I understand. You're
15	comparing the state shares.
16	MR. JONES: Okay. Okay. I was just curious
17	where we were at, you know, what you're
18	MR. WUELLNER: It is it's not from a

DOT standpoint, it is not a change order. From

19

- 20 DOT standpoint, it's a separate stand-alone grant.
- So, all you're doing is using the change order to
- make -- to be able to use the grant that's in
- place. So, it's -- you're confusing two
- 24 different --
- MR. JONES: Okay. They don't make you put it

1	back out to bid. That's all I was curious about.
2	MR. WUELLNER: They won't make it, but the
3	market may force it there if we can't get numbers
4	that work.
5	MR. JONES: Okay. Thank you.
6	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Mr. Martinelli?
7	MR. MARTINELLI: I'd like to go back to an
8	earlier comment that was made by Mrs. Barrera.
9	Visiting sites and doing due diligence before
10	making decisions is always good.
11	I think in the public arena, as it stands
12	today, that when this is done, if it's done at
13	personal expense, if it's done at Airport
14	Authority expense, or if it's being offered by a
15	contestant for a position on the airport, I think
16	that should all be brought before the public just
17	to clarify it and make sure that everything is
18	is agreed to ahead of time. Because I know that
19	down the road, that can come back and haunt you.

20	So, I would like to suggest to you folks that
21	you set a policy that either these visits will be
22	made at your individual expense or at Airport
23	Authority expense, or if it's offered by a
24	prospective FBO or contestant for a position on
25	the airport, that it be clarified and approved by

1	the board ahead of time. I think that would be in
2	good order.
3	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Okay. No further public
4	comment? Authority members. Closing. Kelly?
5	11.A MS. KELLY BARRERA
6	MS. BARRERA: I just wanted to reiterate
7	again how much we appreciate Sacha Martin's help
8	as far as all the PR consulting that she's been
9	doing and helping out with the terminal
10	dedication, the Skybus dedication, the press
11	releases that she's helped us put together.
12	And when we talked about recognizing the
13	previous board members and maybe as an idea
14	going forward to send those, if we can collect
15	their e-mail addresses and send those out to them
16	so that they know when we know that this press
17	release is coming out. That's something to go
18	forward with.
19	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Thanks, Randy?

20	11.B MR. RANDY BRUNSON
21	MR. BRUNSON: Okay. I also, Kelly, if
22	nobody's looked at this North Shore News, and the
23	pictures that Sacha and I again just appreciate
24	that. And Len Tucker also, very involved in the
25	First Flight. But that one little picture there

1	of that young man sitting up in the cockpit does a
2	thousand words. This whole North Shore is full of
3	great pictures for good PR for the airport. So,
4	Sacha, thank you again, my good friend.
5	And again, I'll probably say it again, I
6	can't say enough for Ed and Staff on putting this
7	terminal together so so fast and making the
8	deadline. It was just unbelievable.
9	And this is great news about the percentages
10	on the Skybus. The only thing negative I can say
11	about today is I was disappointed to hear about
12	the the \$70- to \$80,000 we're going to have to
13	spend on the concrete.
14	I'm in the construction business and
15	sometimes these things happen. But if any way we
16	can hedge that and I think we we don't need
17	to be taught as much as we need to be reminded.
18	And so that's just a reminder to do that. But
19	good meeting, and that's all I have.

20	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Thanks. Jack?
21	11.C MR. JACK GORMAN
22	MR. GORMAN: I thought it was a good meeting.
23	We're getting things done. I really like Mr. Len
24	Tucker's idea for a public use building, and I
25	really would like to continue to put in front of

1	this board the idea of of setting aside some
2	area that's right on the water for an
3	observational park for the public. And we can tie
4	that into this this public use building. And
5	I'd like to add that to an agenda item and for
6	maybe the next meeting or whenever Ed thinks it's
7	a good idea to continue to put it in front of the
8	board, this park. And it'll be giving the public
9	something out of this airport that they can
10	actually get to, the nonpilots if they need to. I
11	would think that would be a good idea. But let
12	kids watch airplanes take off. Park and building.
13	MR. BRUNSON: Amen.
14	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Buzz?
15	11.D MR. WAYNE GEORGE
16	MR. GEORGE: I thought also it was a good
17	meeting. Jack and I agreed on two things. That's
18	a first.
19	MR. GORMAN: That's a record.

- MR. GEORGE: As far as the park goes, Ed,
- is -- is that included in the budget for next
- year?
- MR. WUELLNER: You have --
- MR. GEORGE: Work on the park?
- MR. WUELLNER: My recollection is you have

1	some preliminary money in there to do engineering,
2	site development, those it's the preliminary
3	work that needs to go into to locating it,
4	scoping what it is and and doing those things.
5	There's some money that's currently placed in the
6	budget. And, you know, it's subject to your
7	ratification in there in the budget process, but
8	there is some some funds set aside for that in
9	the budget.
10	MR. GEORGE: Well, I'd like to echo Jack's
11	anticipation of the benefit that we would get. We
12	have been talking to the public and and all of
13	the news for three years that we're going to have
14	a park, you know. And I'm getting questions,
15	"When? When is it going to happen?"
16	So, I would like to see it accelerated into
17	the schedule to get that road infrastructure in
18	back there and present to SAAPA the the
19	possibility of a building on that particular site.

20	you know, maybe a second-story observation deck.
21	Other than that, that's all I have.
22	11.E CHAIRMAN GREEN
23	CHAIRMAN GREEN: Just on a point with that,
24	it reminded me when I was in Orlando at FAC, I
25	was the old golf pro shop is now a restaurant,

1	and you can either sit outside or sit by the
2	windows or whatever. And there were a number of
3	kids there that were either consultants or
4	whatever, their kids there for the conference, and
5	one of the pilots was explaining what a string of
6	pearls was, because they were sitting there just
7	watching all of the flights landing. And these
8	kids were mesmerized just to sit there and watch.
9	So, that's really a good idea for the public with
10	that.
11	Sacha, thank you for your help. I'm reading
12	your e-mails. I copied three copies today and
13	gave it to my clients, because I'm reading it and
14	I'm going, "My goodness, this is so much
15	information."
16	So, I gave it to clients. And we're trying
17	to get word out, even your information about the
18	dedication, everything. That's wonderful.
10	MS MARTIN: We still have a lot of work

- ahead of us in a short period of time, putting
- just little invitation lists together.
- 22 CHAIRMAN GREEN: I know September 29th is
- coming quickly. Your date is coming quickly.
- MS. MARTIN: Yes. Exactly.
- 25 CHAIRMAN GREEN: Yes.

1	12 NEXT MEETING DATES
2	CHAIRMAN GREEN: All right. Just remind, we
3	have our first public budget meeting September
4	10th at 5:01. That will be published, but just to
5	remind everybody here.
6	Our regular meeting will be the 19th at 4:00.
7	Then our last budget, our second and final one,
8	will be the 19th at 5:00. So, we'll have our
9	regular meeting, we'll interrupt it with the
10	budget, and then if we need to go back to finish
11	our regular meeting, we will.
12	To remind the board members, we have a shade

15	MR. WUELLNER: If you bring it.
16	CHAIRMAN GREEN: I may need to. All right.
