| 10 | district grant that we just finished the first |
| 11 | phase of dredging on. |

| 13 | identifies an additional 210,000 of FIND dollars |
| 1 4 | that can be matched assuming we are awarded the |
| 15 | grant, which we would not know until September or |
| 16 | October. It's a definitely a fall kind of time |
| 17 | line, so it's a next-year's budget related item. |
| 18 | But there should be \$210,000 available to match for |
| 19 | additional pledging activity in the seaplane basin |
| 20 | area. It would be our our recommendation that |
| 21 | you adopt Resolution 2012-01 and facilitate that. |
| 22 | CHAIRMAN YOUMAN: Is this for continuing the |
| 23 | improvements for the tug boats and barges |
| 2 4 | MR. WUELLNER: Yes. |

of a pumping activity to remove the sand bar at the 11

12 throat to the seaplane basin.

> Then about halfway in on the throat was another buildup area. They have cleared I believe it's to about five or six feet nominal depth in the channel at this point. There are still additional areas as well as the permit conditions have us going down to a nine-foot depth throughout that channel. So this -- the second phase would go a long way toward getting that accomplished.

This was more -- this isn't -- 210,000 isn't -- well, would be \$420,000 total project. May or may not accomplish that. Once -- once they get into it, we'll know more as we get close. It may require an additional year after that. So we

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can continue to approach FIND district on an annual

          basis for dredge, dredge maintenance, additional
 3
          facilities that might be needed to support it.
 4
               This -- this kind of project is very much
 5
          aligned with the purpose of the FIND district
 6
          grants. They're not -- their main purpose is not
          recreational kinds of grants that a lot of the
 7

          money goes to. But it's -- their primary purposes
 9
          are toward enhancing commercial use of the
10
          Intracoastal Waterway, commercial sea use. And the
11
          type of activity we're proposing fits very high.

               Last year, our project was ranked I believe

I -- I -- so I wanted some kind of language in there that other than what's written about usage of the meeting rooms, that if there's anybody that approaches the director or the Authority for wanting to use the room and wants it for free, that it should be given, the problem to the board to let the board say yes or no.

I mean, I thought -- you know, I just think that the board's not involved enough in making some monetary decisions at the airport. And I'm not blaming the director. I'm not trying to throw nails at him or anything like that. It's just that I think the board passes off a lot of its responsibility on to the director and I just think that the board should be involved when they say who can and who can't use this facility for free. And I -- I was talking to Ed about that. I didn't know he was going to bring that up. He thought he was just going to bring this other thing up. But that's my thoughts about this meeting room thing.

CHAIRMAN YOUMAN: Board discussion? Mr -MR. COX: Yeah, I would take an exactly the
opposite opinion of that. That's why we have the

We're not talking hundreds of thousands of dollars. It's not an issue that -- and all of the groups are civic function groups. It's not like we've got groups in here that he's making a choice to give for free and we're giving away some kind of, you know, dollar amount that's affecting the airport in a negative manner. So that's my position on it.

CHAIRMAN YOUMAN: Thank you. Mr. Werter?

MR. WERTER: Yeah. I think I'm somewhere in the middle ground of that, but I'm sure the executive director can disseminate between a nonprofit charitable type or a community-minded organization versus a profit organization which should be renting the room. But, you know, like Mr. Cox, to get into the day-to-day's on it would be micromanagement and I don't think that's exactly our role.

CHAIRMAN YOUMAN: Ms. Barrera?

MS. BARRERA: I think when we're looking at the meeting room use, we also need to look at how

other entities, both government and nongovernment,

charge and facilitate their policies.

If you look at that, the -- the library has a policy that if it's open to anybody, because the library was built with taxpayer dollars, it's available for use free of charge. However, if they are exclusionary in who they will allow to attend, then the library does not allow them to use their meeting facility or they will also -- they'll -- they'll charge, one of the two.

And I think that that is the direction that we gave Ed initially with the meeting room policy, is something along those lines. And when you're looking at something like the Civic Round Table, that is open to anybody to attend and I see it as a good use of our taxpayer dollars.

CHAIRMAN YOUMAN: Mr. Ciriello?

MR. CIRIELLO: Yeah. I -- I specifically brought up the round table. Now, the round table charges all these different organizations. Like I live in the St. Augustine South. We have a St. Augustine South Improvement Association.

And according to our membership list, we have around 5,000 people living in the south, but only about less than 200 actually pay dues to the

information. I want to know more what's going on.

I think the board has more authority in running this airport than it gives itself credit for, and I seem to be the only one like that. And then whenever discussions come about, it seems like I'm made to look like a -- I don't know, I'm not going to say, but like I'm wrong because I want to know so much or because I want the board to take more responsibility in doing their job, that they're saying it's micromanaging. It's not.

That charter deliberately states that we run this airport and everybody else is employees. And I don't know how many times I've said that. And -- and board members -- I'm the only one that seems to say that. Everybody else seems to say, "No, no, no, Joe. You're wrong. We don't do that. All we do is just sit here and rubber stamp everything."

| 1 | And I'll till the day I die, I'll still say that |

| 3 | been on seems to pass the buck sometimes on their |
| 4 | responsibility onto the director. And and I |
| 5 | have no qualms about the director's job or what he |

It's just that I'm disappointed in the board, is what I -- and every -- I don't -- people are allowed to have their opinion and that's fine with me. But when I -- they use that one word "micromanage" to me that's a swearing word because we're not micromanaging anything. We're doing our job or we're supposed to.

CHAIRMAN YOUMAN: Mr. Ciriello, I agree with you. You are doing your job and you're doing it well. You're bringing -- you're bringing the points up to the board's attention, and you have a different viewpoint than some of us and that's -- that's good, because if you weren't here, we may miss some things. And you're doing a heck of a job with it and I appreciate it very much. Mr. Cox?

MR. COX: Yeah. If we're going to go ahead and micromanage the airport, I'd like to put an agenda item on the -- for the next meeting for a pay increase, would you please? Can we stick that

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in there? Because if we're going to micromanage
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- and do Ed's job, then I'm not going to volunteer
- 3 for this anymore.
- We set policy. We don't run the airport.
- 5 That's what we hire the executive director for.
- And if we start to reach down into his job, then we
- 7 are in fact micromanaging, period.
- MR. WERTER: I just have one change to that.
- 9 Since we don't get paid, it would be the creation
- of a paid -- of a wage scale.

- Now, if there's a problem with, let's take the
- 25 admin -- let's take the conference room, renting

| 1 | out the conference room. If it's being willy-nilly |

So, you know, there is something called micromanagement that goes on or can go on if we allow it, all right? So it's finding that -- that fine line between what we call proper participation in the management of this airport versus micromanagement.

If we get into the everyday business like don't issue that check, issue that check, you know, then there's a problem. My job as treasurer is to

| 3 | overall. If I see a problem there, I bring it up. |

Do we rent it out to everybody or do we cut some people like charitable organizations like Civil Air Patrol whatever carte blanche?

Along those lines, sticking with the conference room, the public library is kind of a different entity than us. I've used free rooms there. They don't charge. But that's a different service than us. We're a self-supportive running organization, a business. So, you know, as -- as a

Following that was a section on the budgetary impacts. For instance, if it was a capital project or something to that effect or really any project, anything, we would evaluate it for how it fit within the budget. Was it included in the budget? Is it something that's got grants associated with it? Whatever obligations might be associated budget-wise.

The next section dealt with the legal implications. Were there any kinds of policy issues in -- in play here? Was there something that was of questionable or dubious legal strategy in something you're being asked to do?

And then lastly came a recommendation section wherein largely we would -- we would sort of craft the beginnings or details of what we were recommending from a staff perspective for consideration by the board. And usually it had something to do with, as an example, staff recommends approval of contract for dredging to X, Y, Z company in the amount of X dollars. And if there were conditions or issues that needed to be a part of that motion, we would -- we would put them

And that approach generally allowed the board to very quickly evaluate the agenda item and also to craft a motion during a meeting. They could simply refer to "As per staff," something to that effect.

We got away from that as we bolstered and improved the use of PowerPoint in the meetings.

And I think, if I'm -- if I'm understanding, you'd like to see us return to that or something similar to that that would help provide additional details related to meetings. I have assured him personally that whatever he needs by way of background, that we will -- we will provide him.

The language that's in your policy currently, while not I will call mandatory language, it's permissive language that would say that if, you know, more detail is required, we will certainly generate the additional details as necessary.

We considered it for this meeting, meaning preparing the items. We felt really that, for instance, the FIND grant resolution was pretty self-explanatory relative to what you were being asked to approve. This one was probably more complicated than I would even attempt in a memo

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just based on what we were going to discuss today.
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2 So, I -- I would certainly agree if that's the 3 desire of the board to go back to those staff memos 4 in support. We'll happily do that. If you find 5 value in them, if they help you digest the material 6 we're asking you to do ahead of meetings, then 7 there's value in it and we'll absolutely go back to 8 that approach. Even if it's just on an 9 item-by-item basis, you know, where it does make

sense to provide more detail.

- But -- and also you're as follows welcome to come see me, pick up the phone, whatever you -- whatever need in terms of detail. That's really our job. We're -- we're here to help you understand the issues ahead of having to vote on them.
 - We don't want you surprised. We don't want you hearing about it the first time at this meeting and having to make decisions. So whatever we can do, you have my personal assurance we'll make sure it happens for you.

| 14 | frames, I need to ask a question. How soon can it |
| 15 | be brought the board bring this to the for a |
| 16 | discussion on contracts? |
| 17 | Like I have two checkmarks here and the one is |
| 18 | for third from the bottom, the contract is up in |
| 19 | October of '13. So if I asked to put that on the |
| 20 | agenda to discuss that, is it too early? Is what |
| 21 | I'm asking. Or should I wait if I'm still alive |
| 22 | then a couple of months before it's due? Or how |
| 23 | soon should we bring any of this up? |
| 24 | CHAIRMAN YOUMAN: I'll defer to Mr. Wuellner, |
| 25 | but I my personal opinion as chairman at this |

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time is we can put it on the agenda at any time you
desire.
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- 3 MR. WUELLNER: I -- if -- I might be able to
- 4 answer that if I know what you're trying -- what
- 5 you're trying to bring up.
- 6 MR. CIRIELLO: Well, you and I had a
- discussion about consultants.
- 8 MR. WUELLNER: Uh-huh.
- 9 MR. CIRIELLO: And you know what my thoughts
- on that, that I'm not real happy with the work
- 11 that's been done here by some of the consultants
- 12 over the years. There's been shoddy work. There's
- been contract language has been misinterpreted and
- work not done right and everything. And I
- 15 mentioned this one group and you told me that a
- particular person that we -- or group had fired
- somebody.
- MR. WUELLNER: Uh-huh.
- MR. CIRIELLO: Because I -- I wanted -- so in
- 20 other words, what I'm looking at is this third one
- from the bottom, the LPA Group, Passero, and
- 22 Prosser Hallock, when the time comes, rather than
- just rubber stamp and extend their contract for
- another time period, I'd like to see it go out for
- resume or bid or something to see if there's

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1 something better out there.
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- MR. WUELLNER: Okay. In -- understanding a

 little bit better, we would -- we are obligated

 under Florida Statutes to go out and do a

 full-blown consultant reselect on or about October

 of 2013. You have existing contracts right now

 that extend to that date, to 10/13, to October '13.
- About six months in advance to that, anyway,
 in order to comply with Florida Statutes, we will
 be bringing that topic up. We would -- with your
 direction, we'll begin the process of selecting
 consultants to take effect October of 2013.
- 13 MR. CIRIELLO: In other words, October 20th on
 14 '13 is the last day their contract is in effect.
- MR. WUELLNER: That's correct.
- MR. CIRIELLO: All right. The last one down
 here, which involves Doug, you have no timetable on
 there at all.
- MR. WUELLNER: Correct.
- 20 MR. CIRIELLO: What kind of a contract's he got?
- MR. WUELLNER: Well, a couple of things.
- 23 Statutory exemption for legal services. It doesn't
- fall under CC -- what's called Competitive
- 25 Consultants Negotiation Act under Florida Statutes.

| 1 | We can simply select professional services such as |
|----|---|
| 2 | legal services, accounting services, audit |
| 3 | services. I believe there's even an exception for |
| 4 | advertising services. You can just select. |
| 5 | Doug is on a month-to-month contract |
| 6 | arrangement with us, which allows this board to any |
| 7 | time it wishes notify Doug that 30 days later his |
| 8 | contract is terminated. So you may bring it up and |
| 9 | pending a favorable vote, you can terminate Doug |
| 10 | any time you wish of his services. Keep in mind we |
| 11 | would then have to bring reselect someone or |
| 12 | bring someone in to fulfill that ob you know, |
| 13 | the legal services obligation in the future. |
| 14 | MR. CIRIELLO: You mentioned the statute that |
| 15 | it doesn't go out for bid. When did that come in? |
| 16 | Because I can recall |
| 17 | MR. WUELLNER: It's been now, from a |
| 18 | process now I'm talking about the statutory |
| 19 | requirement to go through a process. And that's in |
| 20 | place for our engineering consultants as an |
| 21 | example. We have to do certain things under |
| 22 | statute to stay in compliance. |
| 23 | Our policy mirrors the Florida Statute |
| 24 | requirements. So our policy looks very similar to |
| 25 | exactly what is required from the state to stay |

- 1 compliant and legal.
- We have in the past when we selected legal
- 3 services, whenever they wished to do that, and
- 4 we've had a couple of opportunities in the last 15
- 5 years where we've done this, you can mirror that
- 6 process. That's your decision.
- 7 You can go out and say, look, we would like to
- 8 select new legal counsel or new audit services or
- 9 whatever the process and say, hey, we're going to
- go out and see who's interested in providing those
- 11 services, select -- have them submit
- 12 qualifications, go through a process where they
- come in and talk to you as a -- as a board, and you
- 14 ultimately select a new firm to do that work.
- 15 You -- you have that right to do that. But it's
- not a statutory requirement.
- 17 So the -- where I'm going is, the arrangement
- 18 we have with Doug, the arrangement we have with our
- auditors, our accountants, you can terminate
- whenever you wish. If you are unhappy with Doug's

| 14 | of the areas of some sort and form subsidize the |
| 15 | operations of commuter service. |

And a draft of the unified planning program was presented and will be voted on to the next meeting.

One other item I'd like to ask to bring up, future meeting frequency and schedule. The items have been reduced -- the important items have been reduced somewhat where I asked Ed what he thought about looking at during the summer not having a couple of meetings.
