I am pleased to report that over the holidays and meeting the requirements of our grant with Florida DOT we were able to complete the land transaction with Flagler Development. So both pieces of that have now been completed.

So you now are the proud owner of approximately 417 acres just west of U.S. 1 that is -- is congruent with property we already own. So we now have approximately 11- to 1200 acres of total available property west of U.S. 1. I am pleased to report that we were able to accomplish that by dividing that into two transactions. We were able to do that without the need to borrow any of the letter of credit that was authorized.

We did complete a \$2 million letter of credit as you recall toward the end of last year as a back-stop. At this point we have not had to dig into that. We expect to be fully reimbursed back from DOT share by about the third week of this month, I would think. That's all been submitted, we're just waiting on that to show up.

We did a pavement remarking over a good portion of the airport, and I am pleased to report that we passed with no discrepancies our FAA inspection earlier in December.

Hurricane Matthew of course saw fit to make -make a close encounter to our community. We have a
few items where we had some superficial mostly
cosmetic kind of damages including some trees down
and some I would call hangar rash kinds of damage

Primary damage that we had included the seaplane dockage. We are working with FEMA for some reimbursement on -- on some of those costs and working to reformulate that project. Probably the two biggest items affected by that included your glideslope antenna. So, since the hurricane the glideslope has been down.

The replacement antenna and its components arrived today. The crew will be out tomorrow to do that installation. We are still on the calendar with FAA to have it reflight-checked. It requires as though you were building a brand new glideslope, it requires that level of flight check when replacing an antenna. That will -- I believe is on the calendar for the end of next week, if all goes well. We don't expect any issues there, so I expect to have that back in service.

And this was also a year where we were required by Part 139 to conduct our triennial emergency exercise or full scale drill on the airport. That involved nearly a dozen agencies in -- participating in that drill. That was -- that went off obviously and we were grateful to all of those folks who got out here and participated, everyone from volunteers who served refreshments as we went along to make sure that everyone was hydrated because we do this in June, to those who acted as injured passengers and the like. The hurricane also saw us hosting more than 2000 truck operations in support of Florida Power & Light in restoring power to our community. Kind of an awesome event.

So we closed the year I believe strong. The metrics are good. And I'm -- I believe that you're going to be very pleased in March when they finally get the -- the audit completed and can present that to you. We're shooting for the -- your March meeting at this point.

The State of Florida has indicated that the -the actuarial results for the Florida Retirement

anticipate the flight check of the MALSR. I'm a little sketchy as to when we will be able to do that. There are still some components that need some -- some work on it, one damaged as a part of the hurricane.

The lead time on that particular component looks to be about six weeks out. That puts it beyond the timeline we were hoping to be able to combine that with the glideslope recertification and get the FAA flight check.

It requires an FAA flight check to be able to be used. So right now I don't have a firm date for flight check for that. But we'll get it -- we'll get it in the queue as soon as the parts show up to get that finished and we're happy with the installation.

We will begin in earnest, starting really right about now, the master plan project now that we have entered a -- the new year. We will get very involved with that.

I think at some point, probably the March meeting if not before -- I didn't have a chance to talk to you before, but I think we need to -- we've reserved a spot on the citizens advisory committee for a board member to be there to hear firsthand
