MS. GREEN: Yeah, we've got our budget coming up later, so --

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: That's right.
MS. LUDLOW: Yeah.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. So we'll move forward with confirmation.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Now let's go to the agenda
approval. Anybody have a change to the agenda?
(None.)
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: No? Okay. Then the agenda stands approved.

STAFF REPORT
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Staff report.
MR. WUELLNER: Yeah, I just would -- I think I turned that on. I did.

I would just comment that our access road project is coming down to the last few days. It's out for bid. We'll be opening bids on the 22 nd, so I think that's Thursday. So we'll have an idea what the final numbers are for that part.

MS. LUDLOW: And -- and bids on what -- what portion?

MR. WUELLNER: The -- basically the balance of it at this point, the balance of work.

MS. LUDLOW: Okay. Can I ask a question?
MR. WUELLNER: Sure.

MS. LUDLOW: Sorry. Do we have approval from Northrop Grumman for everything?

MR. WUELLNER: We are working through the final pieces of that, but we -- we won't award the piece of contract that goes through their property till that's resolved.

MS. LUDLOW: That -- that's the parking?

MR. WUELLNER: Yes.

MS. LUDLOW: Is that the parking like
perpendicular to U.S. 1 or is it the one back by the terminal?

MR. WUELLNER: It's the one perpendicular to
U.S. 1. It's the one up closest to their building up there.

MS. LUDLOW: At the end.
MR. WUELLNER: Uh-huh.

MS. LUDLOW: So when do you think you'll get that approval?

MR. WUELLNER: It could be still a couple of months, but $I$ don't see this work starting till after the first of the year at this point.

And a new wrench in that little equation is that $I$ haven't seen all the work, but $I$ was informed by Grumman that they got notice from some division of DOD, Department of Defense, about some sort of contaminated potential soil that was a part of their -- it's actually part of their property --

MS. LUDLOW: Oh, God.
MR. WUELLNER: -- but it's adjacent to ours.
So it may or may not have some impact on what goes on when we get to that piece. It's right in the
same area, so...

MS. LUDLOW: So what -- what -- when do you --

MR. WUELLNER: I haven't seen the map yet, so

I can't really talk to it.

MS. LUDLOW: When do you anticipate
completion?

MR. WUELLNER: It's probably looking at May --
MS. LUDLOW: Okay.

MR. WUELLNER: -- April or May by the time
they get started.

MS. LUDLOW: Nothing that --

MR. WUELLNER: And we'll have a small hold, I
would guess --

MS. LUDLOW: Uh-huh.

MR. WUELLNER: -- on the schedule as we get
around TPC.

MS. LUDLOW: Oh. May. Wow. But no traffic
light in the future.

MR. WUELLNER: No, no, no, no.

MS. GREEN: That --

MR. WUELLNER: That's not even in the game right this minute.

MR. MIRGEAUX: Yeah. That'd be a hold.

MS. LUDLOW: I talked to FDOT.

MR. WUELLNER: Yeah.

MS. LUDLOW: And so they say no traffic light is on the horizon for at least five years unless you want to pay for it.

MR. WUELLNER: Correct.
MS. LUDLOW: You know how much that is?
MR. WUELLNER: It's a lot. I've -- I've heard north of a million dollars at this point --

MS. LUDLOW: Oh, is it?
MR. WUELLNER: -- for -- for an intersection.
MS. LUDLOW: Yeah, I -- I didn't ask that, but -- okay. Thank you.

MR. WUELLNER: Yeah, we're hoping to keep it on their dime, not ours.

MS. LUDLOW: Finished next May.
MR. WUELLNER: Uh-huh.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Go ahead.
MR. WUELLNER: That's all I've got.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: That's all?
MR. WUELLNER: Other than you have the operations data. That was a part of your -- if you have questions related to that. But it looks like things are recovering nicely and the numbers are strong and look good so far.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. Any questions on the operations staff report?

MS. GREEN: No.

BUSINESS PARTNER UPDATES
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. Let's go to business partner updates.

I got word that Commissioner Dean is going to be running late, so we'll catch him when he comes in. Vinny Beyers, is he here? MR. BEYERS: No comment. CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: No comment? MR. BEYERS: No comment. CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. Jose Riera. Is Jose here?

MR. RIERA: Right here.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. I have a card for you. Do you want to talk in public comment, also, or just this one?

MR. RIERA: I will talk in public comment.

MR. RIERA: Basically an update on -- on our
thing is we have on October 22 nd the Eagles, Young Eagles flight, and we're trying still to get confirmation from the Authority whether we can use the terminal or whether we can use this area.

Right now we're proceeding as we're doing it from here. We would prefer the terminal because of the logistics of bringing in the people and all that versus this area. But just for your information, October $22 n d$, that's when we are going to do the Young Eagles flight.

We already have a few partners that are going to be providing a static display for airplanes, HondaJets and all that. We're also working with somebody who's going to bring an Army helicopter. And with that, we just need to really have a final confirmation from the Airport Authority that -- if we can use the terminal or if we can use -- or we will probably be using this area if we don't get confirmation from the -- you know, to use the terminal.

MR. WUELLNER: Okay. I think I can update you on that. We spoke with Jerry Melton this morning --

MR. RIERA: Okay.
MR. WUELLNER: -- and it's all worked out,
so...

MR. RIERA: Worked out --

MS. LUDLOW: So where is it going to be?

MR. WUELLNER: It will be here.

MR. RIERA: It will be here?

MR. WUELLNER: Yeah.

MR. RIERA: Okay. So then that settles that portion.

Other than that, don't have any other comments until we discuss in detail the use of the conference room.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. Thank you very much.

Okay. Nate McKendrick, is he here?
MR. McKENDRICK: No comment for me. Sorry I haven't been here for a couple of meetings and $I$ have no knowledge of contaminated soil.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: We really missed you a lot.
MR. WUELLNER: It came from the real estate office.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. Doug Burnett.

MR. BURNETT: Nothing to report this month, sir.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. When Henry Dean comes in we'll ask him if he has anything, all right?

OLD BUSINESS ITEMS
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: All right. Old business, east side terminal access road.

MR. WUELLNER: It's on there for -- at your request, not mine.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay.
MR. WUELLNER: It's a new category as well as that was the item asked to be on.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Do you have anything, Reba? MS. LUDLOW: It -- old business, you have east side terminal, right? So you're going to bring it up?

MR. WUELLNER: I have nothing to bring up under old business. That was kind of a heading you put at us last --

MS. LUDLOW: Well, at that time I thought we were going to get numbers -MR. WUELLNER: Yeah. MS. LUDLOW: -- but then all the numbers are in the budget. So, you know, I wanted a breakdown of the grant amount, how much has been spent, how much was projected. That -- so it doesn't say all that, but it says most of it, so...

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. Any other old business comments?
(None.)

TAXIWAY B CENTER GRANT RATIFICATION

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. Let's look to business item Taxiway B. This is new business. MR. WUELLNER: It's new business. We're asking you to ratify the FAA grant for Taxiway B center section.

This would be -- for geographic reference, this is between $B-2$ and 6-24 out on the airfield. It's 90 percent funded by FAA. The remaining 10 percent is split between the Airport Authority and Florida DOT, making the Authority's share about -- about a hundred thousand dollars total. We are asking that the grant be ratified, and if you will do that first, $I$ guess, and then deal with the contract associated with that. CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. Bring it back to the board for comments, discussion.

MS. GREEN: This is the one that came up last meeting that we had it coming, it was supposed to be on the --

MR. WUELLNER: Yeah, the timing was --

MS. GREEN: -- 12th or something, the timing was off, so this is the same thing.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Good point.

MS. GREEN: All right.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Good point.

MR. WUELLNER: Thank you.

MS. LUDLOW: And you have the res- --
resolution for later?

MR. WUELLNER: It doesn't require -- the FAA
ones don't require resolutions.
MS. LUDLOW: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Public comment?
(None.)
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Seeing none, bring it back to the board. Motion? Robert?

MR. OLSON: Move to accept -- is it accept -move to accept the $F A A$ grant for the project just described for Taxiway B.

MR. WUELLNER: Thank you. Is it all right if

I read the --

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: I was starting to say --

MR. WUELLNER: -- grant number on that --

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: -- if you can read it.

MR. WUELLNER: -- just for reference?
3-12-0073-051-2022. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. Need a second.

MS. GREEN: I'll second.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. We have a second.

Further discussion?
(None.)
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: All in favor?
MS. GREEN: Aye.
MR. MIRGEAUX: Aye.
MS. LUDLOW: Aye.
MR. OLSON: Aye.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Aye. Opposed?
(None.)
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: None. So it passes unanimously.

TAXIWAY B CENTER CONSTRUCTION AWARD
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Second item.
MR. WUELLNER: Okay. Associated with that project, the Airport Authority opened bids on May 12th for this project, and we received four bids from various companies. A low -- or apparent low bidder was Halifax Paving which is at $\$ 1,852,405$.

That also served as a basis for the FAA grant, so that number is a part of the grant number that you just approved. And we're asking that you approve the construction contract with Halifax in the like number of $\$ 1,852,045$ (sic).

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. Let's do that one
first. Bring it back to the board. Any questions or comments?
(None.)
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Public comment?
(None.)

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Seeing none, bring it back.

Do $I$ hear a motion?

MR. MIRGEAUX: Motion to approve.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: No -- motion -- okay. We have a motion. Second? Robert.

MR. OLSON: (Indicates.)

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Do you want to read the
number? Is it a -- is there a number or anything?

MR. WUELLNER: No, there's no contract number.

It's the same -- same FAA reference.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. All in favor?

MS. GREEN: Aye.
MR. MIRGEAUX: Aye.

MS. LUDLOW: Aye.
MR. OLSON: Aye.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Aye. Opposed?
(None.)

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Five to zero approved.
Passero?

MR. WUELLNER: The second part of this is the

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runway -- or the resident project services related
to the project, so the inspection services. And
that would be to Passero Associates at $220,000
even, and that would be their supplemental
agreement 22-98R. And our recommendation would be
approval. And it's also included in the total of
the grant funds.

    board. Comments?

    CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Aye. Opposed?

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CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Zero. Five to zero passes.
STRATEGIC/BUSINESS PLAN SCHEDULE UPDATE

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. Strategic business plan. Okay. Remy, it's up to you I think next. Is that okay, Ed?

MR. WUELLNER: Yeah.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: I didn't know if you wanted to say anything in advance. MR. WUELLNER: Unless Bob has something. MR. OLSON: No, no. MR. LUCETTE: Thank you. Mr. Chair, board members, good afternoon. Thank you for -- for having us again at the board meeting. We -- after the last meeting, we were still working on contractual items. We did officially kick off the strategic business plan about ten days ago. So we came and met with the strategic business planning team which in this case is going to be one board member, Mr. Olson, the airport director, someone else from the Authority, in this case it was Kevin, who joined us as well -MR. WUELLNER: Uh-huh. MR. LUCETTE: -- and the Ricondo team. So we've kicked it off, and one of the first item we wanted to discuss was the schedule. The
project is being scheduled over the course of about nine month, and we want to make sure that we find dates that are going to work for everyone when it comes to workshop with the board.

When we scoped this effort, Mr. Olson was -- I think felt very strongly that we needed to have more interactions with the -- with the board members. So we will have a couple of item -- a couple of things, a couple of types of meetings.

One, there will be briefings at the board meetings. So we will update you on the progress of the study. And then in addition to that, we will have three workshops with the board. And I'm sorry the contrast of the color is a little hard to see, but I'll walk you through the dates.

The first board workshop we would like to have is on October 27th. And I'll ask you if this is a good date. I mean, we're flexible within that week, so October 27th. And it would be a three-hour workshop to talk about -- it's a visioning workshop. We will talk about a mission, finding a mission, a vision, and some values for the airport.

So the first question $I$ have is, would you rather have a -- an afternoon workshop -- an early
evening workshop? I'm not sure what works best for the board. So a 2:00 to 5:00, 3:00 to 6:00, 4:00 to 7:00 p.m. workshop. I wanted to -- to ask you that question so that we can start blocking those times in the calendar.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. Comments from anybody?

MS. LUDLOW: I -- it -- it's a good thing I think to kind of stay in the same rhythm, so if 4:00 in the afternoon's good for you, does it work for you, Justin? We're all kind of in that groove, I think.

MR. LUCETTE: Okay.
MS. LUDLOW: Nighttime would be worse.
MR. LUCETTE: Okay.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Anybody opposed to 4:00 to 7:00?

MS. GREEN: No.
MR. MIRGEAUX: No.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay.
MR. LUCETTE: So what we'll do for those workshops, at least for the first two, is we'll have an external facilitator who will come and help us to -- to generate a discussion around mission, vision, and values for the airport. That will be
the first workshop.
The second workshop will be just before the -the holiday periods in December. The topic of that workshop will be strategic initiatives. So that workshop, we'll do some -- we'll do some discussions around what could be some initiatives, strategic initiatives for the airport.

As of now, we have this scheduled for December $16 t h$ and we'll -- we'll adopt the same -if the date works, we'll adopt -- adopt the same times, the 4:00 to 7:00 p.m. The focus of that workshop will really be to understand among all the different initiatives that could happen at the airport, is there some level of priorities that you could assign to those initiatives.

MS. GREEN: The 16th.
MR. LUCETTE: It's --
MS. GREEN: That's a Friday, correct?
MR. LUCETTE: Yeah, correct.
MS. GREEN: Yeah, that's what I wanted to make sure.

MR. LUCETTE: Again, the -- within the week is absolutely fine. We can move it up or down. So I wanted to ask you to inform us on times and also
dates. We -- we're flexible to move it up or down
by a few days if it helps.
MS. GREEN: I'm more inclined not to put it on
a Friday --
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Yeah.
MS. GREEN: -- just because of work schedules
and what have you, so...
MR. LUCETTE: Is there a Monday, Tuesday,
Wednesday preference earlier in the week?
MS. LUDLOW: Suits me better.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Yeah. Any day other than
Friday.
MR. OLSON: There's a board meeting on the
12 th of --
MS. GREEN: Uh-huh.
MR. OLSON: -- of that week, so Tuesday,
Wednesday, Thursday, what looks best for people?
MR. MIRGEAUX: Uh-huh. 13th through the 15th,
either of -- any of those days.
MS. GREEN: True, yeah.
MR. LUCETTE: Okay.
MR. OLSON: We probably should fix on one now
so everyone can get --
MR. LUCETTE: I'll do --
MR. OLSON: -- it on their calendar.

MR. LUCETTE: I'll do -- I'll do Tuesday
and --

MR. OLSON: Okay. That's Tuesday the 13th. MS. GREEN: So that we have a board meeting Monday and then another strategic on Tuesday. MR. OLSON: Right.

MR. LUCETTE: If that's okay with your schedule.

MS. GREEN: Other board, what do you think? MR. WUELLNER: 13th?

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Yeah.
MS. GREEN: Correct.
MR. OLSON: Okay.
MR. WUELLNER: Are y'all good with that?
MS. GREEN: Okay.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay.
MR. LUCETTE: And then we'll have one last workshop, and this one, the date is a little more tentative as the position of the board might change. That's going to be early 2023.

We would like to have this workshop either late January, early February. For now, we have it on February 1st, but maybe that's something we can validate once -- you know, at the general board meeting once there's -- or before that, once we
have the composition of the board at that time, if that's -- if that's okay. CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. MR. LUCETTE: And then in addition to the board workshops, as I said, we will be coming to the board meetings to give you updates on the progress. And also there -- there might be discussion items, so we'll bring those to you at that time. If we can go to the next slide.

So the way we had -- we have scheduled the different meetings, we want to be here and work with the strategic planning team and the board. We have meetings with the strategic planning team every two month currently scheduled, and then we'll have a meeting with the board every month in one form or another. We'll be meeting with the board either in the form of a workshop or in the form of a board meeting.

Something that we'll do between the first two workshops with the board, we'll have -- we'll have a couple of sessions of stakeholder engagement. So stakeholder engagement is something we want to do to get some input from the different stakeholders at the airport -- tenants, general aviation community -- but also meeting with some of the
local more general economic development community.
The way we schedule those stakeholder meetings, the way we envision those stakeholder meetings, we'll have three meetings with three different groups. The topics will essentially be the same, they'll be very similar in nature, to solicit their input. And we'll have those meetings -- right now we have that scheduled the week of November 7th. That's almost exactly between the first two board workshop. So that we can bring the feedback from the stakeholders to the second board workshop when we start talking about initiatives.

That will be an in-person meeting. I mean, those meetings will be in person, most likely in this room, and we'll be working on scheduling those meetings with the strategic planning team and the airport. Any questions on that?

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Any questions/comments from the board? No?

MS. LUDLOW: Are you going to fill in the dates or --

MR. LUCETTE: Yes. And -- and I'll work with the airport on the previous date when we do have the dates, but it's going to be most likely over
two days that we'll have those three meetings. And as I said, we'll compile the information -- the feedback that we receive, we'll compile that in a way that can be presented to the board members when we come back at the second workshop, in order for you to have that information available to you when we start talking about initiatives. This is really to solicit input from the community at that point. And that will be in addition to the information that we prepare and bring to the board members. As of now, we are targeting the March/April timeline to -- to bring a full draft of the strategic business plan to the board. So with a completion, a final completion in the month of May. So it's approximately nine month.

So, another item that $I$ wanted to bring up today that we discussed with the strategic planning team last time was, you know, what are the goals of the strategic business plan? And I have noted here the goals that we brought to you before.

You know, providing guiding policies to the board and to help work with the airport management staff. Having a single long-term focus for the organization. Those are goals that we've talked

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about before. Ensuring that the airport financial
sustainability is viable long term. And if you go
one more, please.
    The -- the question that I have for the board
is, are there additional goals that you would like
to see within the strategic business plan? We want
this to be a tool that's useful at the end of the
day for you to -- to do your business as a board
and to conduct your mission as a board member.
    What do you think would be most useful for you
if you had the strategic business plan as a tool to
help you make decisions, to help you interact with
the airport staff, to help you discuss problems
internally?
    And I just want to open this to you and
    understand, you know, a little more from your
    perspective what are your expectations. You know,
    what do you need to get in May 2023 for this study
    to be -- to be successful in your eyes?
    CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. That's an overhead
    question for us to think about.
    MR. LUCETTE: You are welcome to think about
    it --
    CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Yeah.
    MR. LUCETTE: -- but I wasn't sure if there
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was already some items that maybe you had in mind. CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Anybody have an immediate idea of what they would like to see? MS. GREEN: I think we need to throw it around. I mean, there's all kinds of different ones out there. So --

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Yeah, I think we have to think on that one.

MS. GREEN: -- just think about it.
MR. LUCETTE: That's absolutely fine.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Two good questions, though. We need to look at --

MR. LUCETTE: And some more questions for us as well.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay.
MR. LUCETTE: But essentially it's really
about helping -- helping frame -- frame some of the board members' policies for the airport and the board members together.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay.
MR. LUCETTE: One item that we're going to be doing before we meet with the stakeholder is we're going to create an online survey.

So what we'd like to do before we meet with the stakeholder groups on the week of November 7th
is start getting a little bit of information regarding their businesses at the airport. What are their needs? What changes are they seeing in their business environment that we should consider in the strategic business plan? That will help us to gain some understanding about the topics that we should bring to the discussion at the working meetings. That survey, we intend on publishing the survey the second week of October, and we're going to leave it online for about two weeks and that should give us enough time to get the results, compile the results, and have that information ready for us to prepare for the stakeholder group meetings.

So, I don't know if there's anything that -any questions you have about how we reach out to the tenants. Again, it's -- we're going to be coordinating with the airport staff to get contact information and to distribute those surveys to all of those stakeholders.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: What qualifies as a stakeholder?

MR. LUCETTE: Anyone who interacts with the airport in some -- some way.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: How about those who don't have any interaction yet but hope to? Are they a stakeholder or not?

MR. LUCETTE: As of -- as of now, we were going to use the airport list for the information. If you have any specific tenants or a stakeholder that you would like us to survey --

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: I don't --

MR. LUCETTE: -- we can add them to the list.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: -- but I know downtown
there are several business owners that over the last couple of years have been thinking about buying an airplane or whatever, just haven't gotten around to it yet. So $I$ was wondering would they be a stakeholder or --

MR. LUCETTE: As of now, we -- we weren't going to include them but -- because we're going to leverage the list of the common place that exists at the airport. But again, it's an online survey, so if somebody has feedback that they would like to provide, it's easy for us to add them to the list.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay.
MS. GREEN: I'm sure they could respond and say not a current tenant or not whatever, but have an interest.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Yeah. I just hate to see

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    people turned away --
    MS. GREEN: Right.
    CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: -- because they don't have
an airplane yet.
    MR. LUCETTE: As long as we know who they are
and we can reach out to them, I think that's
something we could do.
    CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. All right.
    MR. MIRGEAUX: Can we just broadcast it and
    just open it up to the public, just the
    St. Johns County residents?
    MR. LUCETTE: We can. It's -- we'll need to
know --
    MR. MIRGEAUX: And then like a question early
in the survey, just be like, you know, identify
which stakeholder group you are and just you can,
you know, general public can be one of the groups.
    MS. GREEN: Right. What your concern is. If
it's for a hangar or if it's for commercial or if
    it's for a restaurant or whatever it is.
    MR. MIRGEAUX: Exactly.
    CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Yeah. Recognizing the
    airport's here for the entire county --
    MR. MIRGEAUX: Right.
    CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: -- okay? So the entire
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county needs to be given the opportunity, if they have an interest, to voice their opinion.

MR. LUCETTE: I think we can -- we can absolutely include something like that.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay.

MR. LUCETTE: We are -- so, as part of the different stakeholder groups, we're going to be including the general aviation community at large here at the airport, the aeronautical businesses that are at the airport, and also a lot of external organizations that are in the community such as the Chamber of Commerce, some economic development groups. So we will get some of that external feedback. But again, I think if we -- we wanted to open it to the community at large, we could as well.

MS. GREEN: We have some industrial people, too, that are interested. CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Industrial people. MR. LUCETTE: Yeah. MS. GREEN: Correct. MR. OLSON: And the hotel owners -MS. GREEN: Correct. Right. MR. OLSON: -- that stage conferences and seminars.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Yeah. Okay. MR. OLSON: College.

MS. GREEN: Anything like that.
MR. LUCETTE: Good feedback.
And so, that -- as I said, that survey will go out most likely the second week of October. So we'll report on that next time, next time we probably have the workshop.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. Comments from anyone?
(None.)
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Is that it?
MR. LUCETTE: I've got one little more.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Good.
MR. LUCETTE: So, the next -- the next item is the benchmarking. This is something that, again, while going through the scoping, we were told that there really was a desire to understand how some other airports may approach some of their problems.

So we are -- we have -- we are starting to
look for tentative airports that would fit the description of airports we would like to benchmark. We are going to be reporting to the strategic planning team a list of airports, probably a dozen airports, that fit the criteria that we would like
to survey. And then we'll engage with a subset of those airports.

We'll probably select three airports to reach out to and schedule a call with them most likely to discuss very specific items about their business that would be relevant for -- for the Authority. And then in case some of those airports are not able to respond, we'll also have a few backup airports.

So that's a list of airports that will be running through the strategic planning team. And I'll talk with you, Ed, and Mr. Olson, if you want to circulate those names through the board members first to get approval, that's also something we could do. But that's -- that's an effort that's about to start now. We're looking for airports right now that we could benchmark. Next slide.

So that -- that's about it for the presentation today. As I said, we just kicked it off. We're coordinating some data collection efforts. We do want to schedule those stakeholder meetings as soon as possible so that we can -- we can lock people's calendars.

So that's why I had those questions for you today on the schedule. We'll probably go ahead and
put in the calendar the first and the second workshop with the board as well as start blocking out times for the stakeholder group meetings the week of November 7th.

The online survey, we started to work on this as being prepared as a -- as a Word document initially and then that will be transferred into an online survey tool. And lastly, the benchmark, as I mentioned, is ongoing.

With that, any -- any questions or comments? CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Questions from the board? (None.)

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Thank you, very much. MR. LUCETTE: Thank you. CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. I have a comment I want to talk about the workshop. And y'all can add or just...

I've been in numerous workshops for 40 years, and I was four years with the county, and I've been on both sides of the workshop. I've been the person out in the audience just listening to the people up here talk and I'm itching to say something, and I've been on the table doing a workshop on the other side of the table. The purpose of the workshop, and this is

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something y'all have to -- we all have to come to agreement on, the purpose of the workshop is for us to talk. It's not for them to say, wait a minute, I object to what Robert's saying. It's up to us, okay?
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So my -- my -- my experience shows that workshops that are limited to us work far better, we get more done. Workshops that allow comments from outside detract from the objective and it limits the amount of work to be done because it takes time. And if someone out here hears something they don't like, they can make notes and bring it up at the next meeting so it's not lost forever.

But we have to think of how we want to conduct the workshop, so -- and I won't bring it up right now, but later we will. When's the first -- do we have one more meeting before the next work -MR. WUELLNER: You do.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Think about how we want to do that. Just us and staff or outside interjection, okay? That's it for me, okay? Administrative policy. Ed?

ADMINISTRATIVE POLICY - MEETING ROOM USE

MR. WUELLNER: Yeah. At -- at your request
and based on some -- some comments we have received to date, we were looking to take a look at the administrative -- it's actually a section of the administrative policy of the airport at it relates to the meeting room use, which is the room you're in.

When the policy was originally drafted in 2009, there were basically three spaces that could be -- could be utilized. The board made a decision at some point to lease the -- what was Meeting Room A, which is the room next to us, to Passero. That sits under a lease now and is unavailable for public use as such.

This is Meeting Room B. There was a meeting room downstairs when the building was first built. Since that time, it's been incorporated into the downstair tenant's leasehold, including all the -the little offices that were down there. So that space is also gone for purposes of continual rental or access.

That leaves you just this room. This room is about 35 x 46 in size, has some eventual fire code limits that of course are ascribed by a county when the building's built. We constructed a policy that we thought at the time kind of dealt with most
contingencies.
As we got into of course the realm of COVID in the last couple of years, some of the dynamics of how we would make that available and the like dramatically changed because of the cost structure primarily of getting -- keeping -- getting and keeping this room in a condition that would be usable and limiting the -- of course the long-term liability of the airport as it related to the COVID impact.

We are really at a point now that the meeting room can be back in service for the most part. But there are some very real costs that came out of that kind of reared their head during the COVID impacts in terms of how much it really costs to clean and get this room set up and torn down and do all of those things.

When we look back at our usage over the years, by far, the amount of use that's going on is -- is very heavily shaded toward governmental when it's not an Airport Authority use.

So we have a lot of little uses such as CDDs, homeowner associations, entities that aren't really governmental but are kind of community oriented such as the Civic Round Table. The Coast Guard

Auxiliary has been a consistent user of this building for -- whether it was the whole building or this -- by that, I mean floor, not building. The School District historically has used this significantly over the years for everything from group meetings and teacher orientations to one time they had an event called the Academy Awards, which is sort of their way of recognizing the business partners associated with all of the academic academies at all of the high schools across the county. They held that here one time.

We do occasionally get private sector uses, things like showers and weddings, graduations, retirements, even celebrations of life from time to time. Those kind of events. And we've even had a couple of attorneys approach us and use the space for seminars and symposiums and little gatherings like that. Those would typically be considered private sector uses or private uses of the -- of the facility.

The policy envisioned all of those different kinds of uses. The original board action on the policy kind of took rental off the table for governmental uses.

And there is some difficulty, while that's a
great deal of the use, even moving toward collecting or charging for that space, the economies or the vehicles available to collect from those governmental or quasi-governmental agencies makes it unlikely that we would be -- they would be rented, that the space would be rented and used, just because it's difficult for other units of government to pay for space, notwithstanding. We also made it available at no cost, as you recall, to kind of nonprofit kind of uses. Of significance were aviation uses. I think there are some groups that aren't really well defined by either category because the original public use or nonprofit kind of use was geared toward aviation as the original policy was written, but when you look at the preponderance of uses, they're really not aviation not-for-profit kind of uses that got the most use, it's nonaviation not-for-profits; i.e., the Civic Association -- or the Civic Round Table. I'm sorry, I keep calling it the Civic Association. Even Coast Guard Auxiliary, while it may or may not be considered governmental at the end of the day. We put up a couple of items, $I$ don't know if you've got another slide of it, but items that we felt within the policy that need a -- need a
look-over quick within -- and today's -- you know, I'm not sure we get to a final policy today unless you want to provide all that input today.

The idea was to give you an idea of what we think are perhaps deficiencies or things you want to talk about related to this policy and give us some feedback and we can draft, if you will, or redraft or edit the existing policy and get it to where everybody's happy and maybe adopt it in early October, if you want -- want those kind of wholesale changes in there.

I don't know what's going on with our air -through the air video today. It's just acting up like crazy. But issues including the cost structure, the real cost of using things.

Equipment use, the equipment in this building, just to add a little point to it, a great deal of our equipment is end of life. I mean, it's at 10 or more years old. And much of it's been used and well used, and most -- most of it's not supporting today's technology, especially video and things like that that are being used in meetings.

The -- how we allow or disallow food and beverage to include alcoholic beverages in certain cases and the insurance that's currently in our

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policy that's required for those events. The fee
structure for use of the facility, the setup and
teardown, cleanup, those kind of things. The
equipment use at this point, we do have little
charges for certain equipment. But as I said, some
of that's at end of life and will need to be
replaced. You may want to look at maybe not
providing that equipment as a -- as a real use.
    Last is scheduling and the priorities
associated with who gets what when. That was
established in the policy, but it seems like
there's some -- perhaps some interest in looking at
those priorities and maybe reestablishing or giving
us some additional direction in that.
    So we see those as the primary items that you
may want to look at. You may not want to change
any of them. You may want to change just a few.
It's up to you. That's what this is about.
    MR. OLSON: Okay. Well, I had a question.
Pre COVID --
    MR. WUELLNER: Uh-huh.
    MR. OLSON: -- was there a -- did you have a
lot of situations where you had to -- people were
trying to -- there was enough demand that you were
needing to do a lot of work managing how you fit
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entities into the use of the building or not?
MR. WUELLNER: Well, I think one of the things that get underestimated is the amount of time that it really requires if we do the setup of the building.

Every group has a different idea of what they need or want, whether it's, you know, tables around, something like this or theater-type seating or stuff with -- for training, the setup's going to be different and all requires significant staff time to tear down --

MR. OLSON: Yeah.
MR. WUELLNER: -- not only the previous use but re-set up.

Then lastly, of course is the -- you know, getting the technology to function with -- it requires almost somebody here when they -- the group initially shows up to make sure that if they're using our technology, we can be making it to work.

Then there's the difference between cleaning and sanitizing, which is kind of where the expense and the time --

MR. OLSON: Yeah.
MR. WUELLNER: -- related comes in.

MR. OLSON: Well, I guess $I$ was interested in knowing whether it was a big administrative load to actually -- I know you had some entities that had a regular pattern. The Civic Round Table had a regular slot --

MR. WUELLNER: Uh-huh.
MR. OLSON: -- that they used. And this
Authority has regular slots of meeting time. But did you get a lot of calls where you had to say, this is not available at that time, but we have that day available, those kind of things?

MR. WUELLNER: I don't think we had a ton of conflicts, to be honest with you.

MR. OLSON: But it was all handled through telephone probably --

MR. WUELLNER: Yeah.
MR. OLSON: -- into Cindy a lot.
MR. WUELLNER: Telephone and e-mail.
MR. OLSON: And this building, is it -- is it closed and locked after business hours so there has to be a special -- if there's anything in the evening or that goes past the time the building's locked up and secured, that that would require additional --

MR. WUELLNER: It doesn't require additional
staff because the type of campus-wide security
system we employ, we can literally program doors --

MR. OLSON: Okay. Okay.
MR. WUELLNER: -- to open and close for periods of time.

MR. OLSON: Okay.
MR. WUELLNER: So that's relatively simple to set up in advance.

MR. OLSON: And I guess my last question. Did you have a priority of use before? Because that seems like something that probably should be considered, is what's the top priority?

I would -- you know, I would just throw out the meeting needs of -- I mean, we just scheduled some board workshops, and we have regular -- you know, versus events that took could just simply ideally probably be held in a hotel. We don't want to compete with the hotel meeting market, $I$ don't think.

MS. GREEN: Weddings and --
MR. OLSON: Yeah.
MR. WUELLNER: No. And maybe a little -- yes, we do have an order of priority and that's established in the policy and it's -- right now it's this. The official airport business, which
includes all types of Authority meetings and staff uses is number one priority. So it would preempt any other scheduling or any other meeting desires.

Then we've historically prioritized next outside governmental uses. They tend to be the least flexible and have the fewest options available to them. That includes local, state, and federal agencies that may request a use.

Third would be aviation groups, and these are non -- not-for-profit organizations, whose primary purpose is related to aviation.

And then the last would of course be private meetings, groups, even extended at this point to private businesses on the airport who wish to lease this particular space. And that was a -- so they would be in theory the lowest priority.

But frankly we have so few contact -- excuse me, conflicts, that it's really not -- not an often situation --

MR. OLSON: Okay.
MR. WUELLNER: -- where one conflicts with
four or --
MR. OLSON: Okay.
MR. WUELLNER: And you did make provisions --
you I mean the board -- when it was originally
written that if we do have a conflict, in other words, the Authority decided they needed a meeting on the October 10th, we'll just throw one out, at 4:00 and somebody has it leased, that person will be contacted and the space made available to the Airport Authority and they'll have to find some other place. MR. OLSON: Okay. Thank you. MR. WUELLNER: Uh-huh. CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. Other comments? MS. LUDLOW: Yes. CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Go ahead. MS. LUDLOW: So the board talks and then public comment and then back to the board? CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Uh-huh. MS. LUDLOW: Okay. Thank you. Ed, what year was this built? MR. WUELLNER: 200- -- I believe it opened in 2009 .

MS. LUDLOW: Okay. 2009. And so how many
people pay rent in here? MR. WUELLNER: Pay rent in here currently? I think there are two tenants. MS. LUDLOW: But other than Passero and Florida Flyers.

MR. WUELLNER: In terms of being a tenant, that would be it. MS. LUDLOW: That's all. MR. WUELLNER: Yeah. MS. LUDLOW: That's all the money we get, is from Passero and -MR. WUELLNER: Correct. MS. LUDLOW: Do they pay their own electric bills and things like that or does that come out of ours?

MR. WUELLNER: I think it's included in the rent because of the way they were originally metered. Plus, there's been changes over the years, Ms. Reba, over how -- what space is leased by each tenant. Especially on the first floor. So if we'd had multiple tenants, it wouldn't have worked out very easily. But it's prorated back to them.

MS. LUDLOW: Okay. Okay. Well, it is my suggestion that we probably table this till next meeting because $I$ would like to bring all of the correspondence and approval that we did to -- in '09 for why we asked for this building.

MR. WUELLNER: Okay.

MS. LUDLOW: I was here. We asked for this
building for a community building. You're already getting rent and you're eating it up more and more.

I think it should be used for airport people and I think it should be used for nonprofits. I think it should be used for community affairs. We about Boy Scouts? Are we going to charge those people $\$ 75$, you know?

I mean, you know, I think that if they're going to have food, that we can charge a cleanup fee. But you're defeating the whole purpose of the building. You're taking it away from what it was meant for.

MR. WUELLNER: I think you're going to find the minutes don't reflect that as the overall purpose, but it certainly was included in the uses.

MS. LUDLOW: Well, $I$ can tell you $\$ 75$ is prohib- -- I've called every one of these people. It's prohibitive. The Coast Guard said it would probably take months before they could get anything approved. Civic Round Table said they don't have any money.

MR. WUELLNER: I don't -- I don't think anybody's proposing to charge any money at this point.

MS. LUDLOW: Excuse me?

MR. WUELLNER: I think the only people that are paying currently are the private users at the bottom.

MS. LUDLOW: Is -- you have a use fee?
MR. WUELLNER: I'm just saying it may need to be addressed. That's why it's up for you guys to talk about. It is not currently being assessed, except for private users.

MS. GREEN: It's an item to discuss --
MR. WUELLNER: We don't charge --
MS. GREEN: -- and which category for
discussing it.
MR. WUELLNER: -- governmental entities currently. We don't charge -- as an example, when SAAPA used to use this on a -- for meetings, they weren't assessed a surcharge for this.

MS. LUDLOW: I know, and I don't think they should be.

MR. WUELLNER: Right. Agreed.
MS. LUDLOW: Uh-huh.
MR. WUELLNER: But that's a policy decision.
MS. LUDLOW: I think, you know, they should pay a cleanup fee if they do have food. But we're supposed to be a community airport and -- and you've taken the whole building away from us if you
don't at least let us use this room for community affairs. That's only right. That's why we built it.

MR. WUELLNER: Well, that's -- that's a policy decision. So --

MS. LUDLOW: I have it.
MR. WUELLNER: -- it currently is -- currently that is how it's being used.

MS. LUDLOW: I was here when we did it, so...
MS. GREEN: But I think Mr. Wuellner said
that's currently how it is being used.
MR. WUELLNER: That's currently how we are using it.

The only -- only previous time that it was not generally open to anybody to come in freely was really during the, call it the highlights of the pandemic.

MS. LUDLOW: Okay. But --
MR. WUELLNER: We would entertain those requests all day long for everything else.

MS. LUDLOW: I understand from these -- some of these people that it is almost impossible to get this room. It is -- it is referred to as your own private domain and that's it. And it is -- I mean, even a year ago, a year and a half ago, somebody
told me that they tried to get this room and it just was like pulling teeth.

MR. WUELLNER: Well, a year and a half ago, we were under the --

MS. LUDLOW: Don't -- I mean, not counting COVID.

MR. WUELLNER: Okay.

MS. LUDLOW: And besides that, COVID's been gone for how long, a year?

MR. WUELLNER: But the expectation of -- the level of cleaning following public events is significant.

MS. LUDLOW: Okay. But that's -- the COVID threat has been gone for a long time, so --

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. We're getting away from --

MR. WUELLNER: I don't know. I've got staff that still have COVID, so -CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Let's get back on topic -MR. WUELLNER: -- I don't think that's factual.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: -- okay? So, in this particular case, you have your opinions, and I agree we all need to bring this back next meeting and talk about it.

MR. WUELLNER: Do you -- I guess I'm asking, do you -- are there items you really either want to change or want to continue to talk about or whatever, do you want us to attempt to draft something in terms of changes, leave it alone and let you kind of take the next step at your next meeting and provide those specific sections -CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: I'd like to know the real costs you have up here. If somebody uses it three hours, what's the real cost to the airport --

MR. WUELLNER: Okay.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: -- okay? And it is -- is it our job to subsidize anybody? Because, you know, you have to look at the amortization of the building, the cost of the electricity. And it may only come out to \$10 an hour. But is it our responsibility to subsidize this building for anybody that wants to use it? MS. LUDLOW: You might be wanting to use it in your next appointment. CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: They may. They may. But you don't play the politics. This is a business, okay?

> MS. LUDLOW: We -- we didn't have time to
adjust to this.

MR. WUELLNER: Sure.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. So if you have comments, send them in right now -- not now. When you leave here, send them in to Ed that you would like to see the following changes. But it sounds like we're doing pretty well what we're supposed to be doing already. Is that correct?

MR. WUELLNER: Yeah, we're resuming kind of normal operation. Now if there's other changes you want to make in the policy, obviously we'll do whatever you guys direct us to do.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: And we'll go back to something we talked about before. We're not talking about the past; we're talking about the future. So don't come in here and start saying, John Doe said this, Reba, because that's the past.

MS. LUDLOW: No, I'll prove it.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: We're going forward, okay?
MS. LUDLOW: No. You have to build on trust.
This was --

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: The past --

MS. LUDLOW: -- built on trust.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay.
MS. LUDLOW: Don't reprimand me.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Any other
questions/comments? issue?

MR. WUELLNER: That's all the action items I have.

MS. GREEN: Mr. Dean's here.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay.
MS. GREEN: Bruce, did you see Mr. Dean was here?

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: I'm sorry.
MR. MIRGEAUX: Mr. Dean.
MS. GREEN: Mr. Dean snuck in.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Oh, Commissioner Dean walked in.

MS. LUDLOW: We almost missed you.
COMMISSIONER DEAN: Well, let me -- can I
speak for a moment?
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Please do.

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call World Golf Village where it's Mur- -- whether it's MuraBella or other communities around that area that -- you know, what would those now current residents like to see if the Hall of Fame -- not if, but when it leaves. And I -- I'm totally open. I look at it like a blank screen, not a screen with letters and numbers.

So I'm pretty excited about the opportunity, I think, to really revitalize what has been called World Golf Village. But $I$ think we would like to come up with something that everyone would buy into and support. So we have time to work on that, but I would like to start the process after the first of the year, probably.

So, I want to give you, excuse me, a heads-up on another thing I'm going to mention tomorrow at the commission meeting. For those who follow local news, county news, $I$ think all of you are very much aware that there is on the ballot November 8th a referendum asking the voters whether or not they would approve or not a one cent sales tax increase going from $61 / 2$ to 7 1/2.

We'll just see how that plays out. It's either going to pass or fail. If it does pass, I'm going to go ahead and start the process suggesting

& \text { our backlog of infrastructure and a list of capital } \\

& \text { items. But I really want to hear from the public } \\
& \text { if this passes. I want -- I want community input } \\

& \text { applications to serve on a citizens advisory } \\
& \text { committee that would sort of scrub our staff work } \\
& \text { and hear from what that particular community, } \\
& \text { for that. So anyone here that might be interested, } \\
& \text { whether it's Ponte Vedra or Fruit cove or Hastings } \\
& \text { or downtown St. Augustine, what do you think, what } \\
& \text { are you hearing from your residents, your local } \\
& \text { neighbors, of what the most pressing need is? } \\
& \text { create that and -- and that type of advisory } \\
& \text { fore might be interested. } \\
& \text { fore got }
\end{aligned}
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Because if we wait several months and wait until after the referendum is voted on, and assuming it does pass, I don't want to wait that long. I want to go ahead and be ready to hear from the citizens because our backlog is so great and the needs are so great.

If you drive almost anywhere now in the county, particularly on 210 or -- well, just pick a road, 16, we -- we need to act sooner rather than later. So $I$ want to just touch on that, and then I'll be happy to answer any questions you may have this afternoon, Bruce.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. The -- it is now four minutes till 5:00. At 5:01, we're having our budget hearing. So we're going to take -- if you can hold off and not leave, we're going to take a five-minute break and come back at 5:00 plus 30 seconds so we can open up at 5:01, okay?

COMMISSIONER DEAN: All right.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: So take a five-minute potty break.
(Recess had.)
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: All right. Now we're going on to public comment. We have two. Jose.

PUBLIC COMMENT - GENERAL

MS. GREEN: Mr. Dean, were you --
MS. LUDLOW: He left.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Oh, Mr. Dean --
MS. GREEN: Oh, he did. I just wanted to make
sure.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: He left, didn't he?
MS. LUDLOW: He left.
MS. GREEN: Okay.
MS. LUDLOW: He couldn't stay.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Jose?
MR. RIERA: Mr. Chairman.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Make sure you talk loud
enough into the mic so she can hear you.
MR. BURNETT: And -- one -- one moment.
MR. RIERA: Three comments.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Hold on.
MR. BURNETT: Just for clarification on the record, we closed the millage --

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: I'm sorry, you're right.
MR. BURNETT: -- and budget meeting and we're
reopening --
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: You're right.
MR. BURNETT: -- back up the regular meeting.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: We have closed the 5:01
meeting and now we're back to the normal meeting.

Thank you, sir.
MR. RIERA: Okay.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: That wouldn't in my notes, by the way.

MR. RIERA: Three comments.
The first comment $I$ have is, Mr. Chairman, I think I agree with you that the workshop should not be open to the public. It should be for you-all for you to really do the work that needs to be done. Number one.

Number two, as far as the stakeholders survey, I believe that should not be open to the public. It should be to the stakeholders, businesses, and all that that can benefit at the airport, but not the general public. You're going to open a can of worms if you open that particular one to the general public. My suggestion.

And the last comment $I$ have, it has to do with this particular usage of the room. I am the flotilla vice commander for the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary, the flotilla in St. Augustine. We are a fellow entity under Title 14 of the CFR.

So for that, we would fall under the Category $B$ under the order of priority you are using. We have not been charged in the past. If
they want to charge us, that's going to take a long time for us to get an approval, so we'll like to see this, the usage of this room continuously on a no charge basis. We have our own equipment that we can bring in. So the audiovisual that you guys have may not necessarily fit ours, but we bring our own. And as far as the cleaning, we don't serve food, and so we will keep it clean as much as we can. And we would like to see the usage of this room again if at all possible is in the interest of the public safety on behalf of the Coast Guard. Those are my comments. CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. Thank you. Thank you, very much, sir. Okay. Next is Bill Hay. MR. HAY: Thank you. Most of mine were addressed during our intermission, which was great, so I'll take those off the list. The airport director has answered most of my questions. One I'd like to say that came up at the SAAPA meeting is that we need to make sure that the common everyday person who doesn't deal with boards and things of that nature understand the difference between CPI and CIP. Because CIP is used in Jacksonville quite a bit, and everybody wanted a list of where are the capital improvement projects
and we know it was Consumer Product Index, but not everyone does. And so that would be something that would be addressed in the future.

And someone who's not here tonight is certainly going to want, if you have a workshop in the shade, that you at least announce that and possibly do the microphones or whatever or stream it for those people if you're going to have it nonpublic. And I think that's a great idea, also, because it is a distraction, even people chuckling from the office or (indicating) doing this all the time, it's just not worth it.

And then another question that came up at SAAPA, and I don't know why they bring it to me and not to you, but where's the fire truck? Why is it off property? And what's the status on when it will be returned? Because no one knew that it was gone until someone saw it being towed out on a wrecker. So that's it.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay.
MR. WUELLNER: Yeah.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Going to the -- the workshop, thank you for your -- both of your comments on the workshop.

It will be advertised. It has to be by law.

We encourage in the audience to be here and listen, but they may not be able to talk. It depends on what the board decides, all right? Any other public comment that's not mentioned?
(None.)
MEMBER COMMENTS AND REPORTS
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: All right. Bring it back to the board. Let's first of all go to Ms. Reba Ludlow. Three issues: Aerospace, TPO, and safety review.

MS. LUDLOW: We had a wonderful Aerospace Academy meeting finally. And of course, I mean, because I did Zoom but that was because of my foot. I was going to have to park in the parking lot, then walk all the way into the building and I thought I don't think so.

So I brought up the unanswered question of the donated airplane, and so that's been tabled for a while. They're just getting back on track now and they're trying to set up committees to do strategic planning for themselves. So they're just something to be proud of, really proud. TP- -- let me see. I didn't go to the SMART meeting. Did $I$ go to the TPO? I don't think I went. They don't have them every month -- every
month. What's the other one?
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Safety committee. MS. LUDLOW: Oh, okay. I am working diligently on the safety committee. I have a posse. Now that we know we can get the room, I will be calling.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay.
MS. LUDLOW: We weren't sure, so we wanted
tenants and principals --
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Yes.

MS. LUDLOW: -- to be here.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay.
MS. LUDLOW: Thank you.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Robert Olson, sir.
MR. OLSON: Nothing other than $I$ just want to restate what our Chair just stated, to make sure everyone understands that the board workshops will be public meetings. They'll be publicly announced. The public can attend. They're workshops. There's no action taken. No formal action taken. And as was suggested $I$ think very well is that we will -it will be just any -- any public comments about the workshop can happen at a following regular meeting.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. All right.

Ms. Green?
MS. GREEN: EDC did not have a meeting until
this Friday, which they will be coming up, the breakfast meeting this Friday at World Golf Village. Still called that, right? It's an economist about labor that we're -- with the growth that we're having in our county right now. His name is Ron Hetrick. He's a senior laborer economist at Lightcast. So he will be speaking about the influx of the people here and labor demands or wants that will be going on. Starts at 8:00 basically on -- at the World Golf Village. CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. MR. MIRGEAUX: Can you send me that? MS. GREEN: Yeah, sure. CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: If anybody wants to go, pass it on, okay? Justin? MR. MIRGEAUX: None. CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: All right. I have two things. Do we have a VCB member here?

MR. WUELLNER: Yeah.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Okay. We have a VCB member here, so pass the word to the VCB about the workshops, okay? Did you want to say anything on behalf of the VCB?

MS. PHILLIPS: I can tell you guys a couple of things.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Make sure you talk into the mic and give your name.

MS. PHILLIPS: I will. Hi, everyone. I'm Susan Phillips. Can you hear me? I'm with the Visitors \& Convention Bureau. And I've got to tell you I was listening very carefully to Commissioner Dean. I love listening to all of his updates. We are still seeing strong tourism growth here in the county.

Despite what was happening is people are coming and staying. They're just not spending as much money on some of the ancillary activities. So you're seeing that some of the attractions and all are certainly off a little bit. But still, we're back to 2019 numbers and making those.

So we keep telling our hoteliers, you know, this growth, you know, at some point you can't keep having double-digit growth, but we're still seeing it in the bed tax collections. So we're keeping a cautious eye out, but the economy here from a tourism perspective in St. Johns County is doing very very well.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Thank you.

All right. The only other comment I have is I want to give you some real quick thoughts on my thoughts on old business and new business because it came up last meeting. And this is purely me from the way $I$ was brought up in the business world.

If Ed brings an issue up and let's say it's a grant for X amount of dollars to do paving outside, okay? That's say new business. If we approve the grant, that disappears but the paving remains. So the grant is no longer old business, but the paving situation may continue to be an old business issue if there are problems associated or continuances. So when an issue comes up, it's not the entire issue. Pick out what the old business really pertains to so we don't get sidetracked in the things that have already disappeared and resolved. That's -- that's the biggest issue. Now, do you disagree with that?

MR. WUELLNER: No, I'm just trying to -- is there a difference, then, between the executive director's report on those, in your example, where I'm reporting on the capital projects --

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Well, it's just like the old business today, okay?


MR. MIRGEAUX: Give them a day or three days heads-up --

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Yeah.
MR. MIRGEAUX: -- and then they'll be prepared.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: And the only reason $I$ want to bring this up, we need to discuss old business, but we don't need to confuse it with things that are already done and over with.

MR. MIRGEAUX: Right.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: That's the key, okay? That's all I have.

MR. WUELLNER: I have one comment.
I just wanted to make you aware of that next -- next Tuesday evening, $V C B$ is doing their annual meeting out at the car museum. So it's south of town there.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Oh.
MR. WUELLNER: 5:30 to 7:30. They'll do a short like 10 -minute business meeting at the front end of that and then it's a -- kind of a free event, and the board members are certainly invited to attend that. Now that we're an ex officio entity on that board --

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: And that's next --

MR. WUELLNER: -- you're certainly welcome to come out there.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: -- next Monday?
MR. WUELLNER: It's next Tuesday the 27th. MS. GREEN: 27th.

MR. WUELLNER: It's 5:30 to 7:30 at the -- I think it's called the St. Augustine Car Museum, which is south on U.S. 1 --

MS. LUDLOW: I was going to say isn't that --
MR. WUELLNER: -- about where Wildwood --
MS. LUDLOW: -- way down there?
MR. WUELLNER: It's a little south of where Wildwood connects.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: If you haven't been there, it's a nice --

MR. WUELLNER: It's really a nice place. Some really need stuff in there.

MR. BURNETT: There's -- there's some interesting history in there including, for example, the NASA astronaut Corvettes. And the government told them they weren't allowed -Chevrolet could not give them the Corvette. They had to buy it for a dollar. So back in the day --

MS. LUDLOW: I'll be darned.
MR. BURNETT: -- Chevrolet gave astronauts a

Corvette for a dollar and there's one of them there. So there's some cool stuff at the museum.

MR. OLSON: Were those the Mercuries -- the Mercury astronauts?

MR. WUELLNER: If you think you want to go -the last piece of that. If you think you want to go, would you please let me know or let VCB know directly? It's your call. It is an RSVP kind of event.

CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: She's right over there. Tell her if you're going to go, okay? That's one less thing you have to worry about.

MR. WUELLNER: Fine with me.
MS. GREEN: 5:30 or 5:00?
MR. WUELLNER: 5:30 to 7:30.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: I will probably be there.
All right. The last thing is regular
meeting -- I remembered it this time, thank you. Regular meeting is October 10th. That was a change. It was going to be the 17th. It now October 10th, okay, which is probably one of the most important dates in history.

MR. MIRGEAUX: Is that your birthday?
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: It's my birthday.
MR. WUELLNER: That was my dad's birthday.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Was it really?
MR. WUELLNER: Yeah.
MS. LUDLOW: Mine's the 14th.
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: How did you know that,
Justin?
MR. WUELLNER: That's yours, too?
MR. MIRGEAUX: I know you, Bruce. That's why.
MS. GREEN: So it's changed from the 19th?
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: It changed from the 17 th to
the 10th, okay? Then it's November 14th, okay?
December 12th, okay? And I can tell you that
November 14 th will be my last meeting, okay? So,
enjoy October 10th. Any other comments?
(None.)
CHAIRMAN MAGUIRE: Thank you, very much.
