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1	PROCEEDINGS
2	CHAIRMAN COX: We'll call to order the
3	October 23rd meeting for the St. Johns County
4	Airport Authority. And the first order of
5	business is Pledge of Allegiance, please.
6	(Pledge Of Allegiance.)
7	3 APPROVAL OF MEETING MINUTES
8	CHAIRMAN COX: Thank you. Approval of the
9	minutes. Are there any exceptions or additions to
10	the minutes from last meeting?
11	MS. GREEN: No, sir.
12	MR. BRUNSON: None.
13	CHAIRMAN COX: They'll stand approved, then.
14	4 APPROVAL OF FINANCIAL REPORT
15	CHAIRMAN COX: Financial report. Our
16	secretary/treasurer is not available today, and I
17	think the director is going to make comments in
18	his stead.
19	MR. WUELLNER: Actually, what I was tasked to

20	do is let you know that he had no issues with
21	approving it. And primarily because the audit
22	starts tomorrow and being this is the last
23	financial statement of the calendar year, it's
24	subject to adjustment anyway through the audit
25	period, so

1	CHAIRMAN COX: Okay. So, with that in mind,
2	we will approval the August/September financial
3	reports as as reported by you.
4	5 APPROVAL OF MEETING AGENDA
5	CHAIRMAN COX: Agenda approval. I think
6	the unless there's any additions or changes by
7	anybody
8	MR. BRUNSON: I have I have none, but
9	the this Minimum Commercial Aviation Operating
10	Standards is something that is a little
11	complicated, and I know we've had it on the agenda
12	for a good while, but I'd just like to make a
13	comment that I wish that the whole board was here
14	to really give their thoughts on this. And
15	CHAIRMAN COX: I think Mr. Gorman, as I
16	I'm assuming he's going to be here shortly, so
17	MR. BRUNSON: Oh, okay.
18	CHAIRMAN COX: But Buzz is not available, but
19	I know he's looked those over very carefully too

- 20 So...
- 21 MR. BRUNSON: All right.
- 22 CHAIRMAN COX: And -- and I haven't had
- any -- there's been no comments passed to the
- director concerning that issue, I mean, if Buzz
- had any issues on it.

1	MR. WUELLNER: I have none from board
2	members.
3	CHAIRMAN COX: Okay.
4	MR. WUELLNER: We've worked I believe
5	we've worked through most of the issues with
6	tenants.
7	CHAIRMAN COX: Very good.
8	MR. BRUNSON: That sounds good.
9	CHAIRMAN COX: So, if there's no additions or
10	exceptions to the agenda, that will stand
11	approved.
12	6 CHAIRMAN'S COMMENTS
13	CHAIRMAN COX: Moving into Chairman's
14	comments. Shortly after our last meeting, it was
15	brought to my attention that there was some
16	politicking going on and that one of the
17	candidates for the Airport Authority had been
18	passing around some statements that actually, in
19	my opinion, are are bordering on slanderous and

20	libelous and rife with inaccurate statements and
21	numbers.
22	And I've been approached by numerous people
23	questioning why these were put out to the public
24	in such a negative fashion. And I really can't
25	answer why, but I'd like to answer some of those

1	questions. And if that person would mind taking
2	the floor for a few minutes, I'd like to ask a
3	couple of questions, Mr. Ciriello.
4	Do you want to do you want to stand up and
5	answer some questions to these statements that
6	you've made?
7	MR. HICKOX: Why should he have to?
8	CHAIRMAN COX: He doesn't have to. I just
9	asked him if he wanted to.
10	MR. CIRIELLO: Well, you've caught me off
11	guard, so I don't
12	MR. HICKOX: Well, are you making these
13	statements, Joe? Stand up and answer them.
14	CHAIRMAN COX: You've you've passed out
15	these statements to the public. I don't know why
16	that would catch you off guard. But that's fine.
17	I'll read you some of the statements and
18	respond to those in kind, and I will allow any of
19	the board members, because it attacks every one of

20	the board members on this board.
21	First off, you say that Araquay Park was
22	destroyed by threats of eminent domain to build
23	hangars for special interest groups.
24	There's no special interest groups that the
25	hangars are going to be built for.

1	You say you are opposed to disrupting
2	people's lives, as were we all. You're for
3	letting people keep their homes, as were we all.
4	And you're against careless spending.
5	I'd like to bring up the point to you that
6	you were the one person who insisted on going to
7	Beaver Splat (sic), Pennsylvania in Air at
8	Airport's expense to look at an airport because
9	you didn't think that our director was being paid
10	in a proper fashion or the appropriate fashion, so
11	you were going to make an analogy against or
12	with an airport that you were familiar with in
13	your hometown.
14	In my opinion, that was tremendously careless
15	spending, but we can go on.
16	MR. CIRIELLO: I will answer some of your
17	questions.
18	CHAIRMAN COX: I have the floor, sir. I have
19	the floor, and you said you didn't want to speak.

20	MR. HICKOX: You're attacking him you're
21	attacking him as a private citizen, sir. You've
22	got to give him a chance to respond.
23	CHAIRMAN COX: I will give him a chance to
24	respond, but not while I have the floor.
25	MR. CIRIELLO: Well, I'm just telling you I

1	will respond.
2	CHAIRMAN COX: Mr. Ciriello, that's fine.
3	I'll let you have the floor shortly.
4	MR. HICKOX: You aren't a dictator, John
5	(sic).
6	CHAIRMAN COX: The backbone of the Airport
7	Authority is a 20-year plan and a \$294 million
8	budget. Can you believe this and get off the tax
9	roll in seven years?
10	You insinuate to the public that the \$294
11	million budget, which is a 20-year plan, is our
12	intention to get off the rolls in seven years, and
13	that's not the case at all.
14	You talk about plans for lengthening existing
15	runway 13/31 approximately 800 feet to encourage
16	military contracts for larger aircraft and those
17	huge earth-trembling noisy jets headed right over
18	your front yard.
19	Those huge noisy trembling jets, and I don't

20	know which ones you're talking about, but they are
21	manufactured and employ approximately 2500 people
22	here with the largest manufacturer, the largest
23	employer in the county in this county.
24	Then you talk about the ILS system
25	sacrificing a thousand feet, which that thousand

1	feet of runway has been displaced long before the
2	ILS went in.
3	You talk about people in Ponte Vedra area and
4	then try to advise them that we're building a new
5	runway and I don't know which runway you're
6	talking about for those huge noisy huge
7	noisy jets headed east/west right for your front
8	yard.
9	Ponte Vedra's approximately 18 to 20 miles
10	north of here. The east/west runway wouldn't go
11	over Ponte Vedra to begin with. But I don't know
12	where the new runway that you're talking about
13	came from. Another very inaccurate point that you
14	make here.
15	Then you insinuate that there's no seaplane
16	air traffic, so why build a seaplane ramp. Well,
17	the reason we're building a seaplane ramp is to
18	bring the seaplane air traffic back in.
19	Then in the very last part, though, is the

20	problem is what I have the most problem with,
21	because you insinuate that everybody on the board
22	is either associated with or members of the Pilots
23	Association selfishly involved with the hobby of
24	flying and not the best interests of the taxpayers
25	in mind.

1	And I take that as a tremendous affront to my
2	personal integrity, Joe. And I have some issue
3	with it. And that's the point I have, with you're
4	bordering on slanderous and libelous statements
5	when you go that far.
6	And I want to point this out to you: The
7	only person on this board that's been a hundred
8	percent representational of special interest
9	groups has been you. It's either Araquay Park or
10	Vilano Beach for noise abatement, okay?
11	Everybody else on this board, now why they
12	may have some concerns about special interest
13	groups, has been a hundred percent involved in
14	representing everybody else in this county. And
15	that's the responsibility of the board members on
16	this board, are the other 170,000 citizens in this
17	county, not the 12 or so in Vilano Beach that are
18	having complaints about noise issues here or the
19	homeowners in Araquay Park.

20	Then we move on to your newspaper articles
21	where you quote, in quotes and I'm going to
22	take this at face value, because it's in quotes,
23	that in fact was reported accurately. Joe
24	Ciriello says, "I am the only voice at the Airport
25	Authority that represents the general public,"

1	insinuating that none of the other board members
2	represent the general public.
3	Once again, I take strong issue with that
4	statement, Joe, and I think everybody else on the
5	board does also.
6	Mr. Burnett, you had a comment to make?
7	MR. BURNETT: The only thing that I brought
8	to your attention before the meeting today and
9	brought to Mr. Wuellner's attention and asked
10	Staff about to make sure of, because I was
11	confident I knew the answer, but even though I
12	knew the answer, I still wanted to confirm it and
13	make sure that I was on the right page related to
14	this, was that the St. Johns Sun reported on
15	Friday, October the 20th, 2006, that and this
16	is not attributable to Mr. Ciriello. And and I
17	don't mean to get involved in
18	CHAIRMAN COX: Those issues.
19	MR. BURNETT: those sort of political

20	issues. But what what I do want to comment on
21	is what it reported was that the airport has
22	exercised its powers of eminent domain to take
23	property from citizens and then rent those
24	properties out. And that has not occurred.
25	The St. Johns Sun is is inaccurate in that

regard. And for those of you don't know, the St. 1 2 Johns Sun is a supplement of the Times-Union for 3 residents living in the northwest. So anyways, 4 it's -- it's inaccurate for those --5 CHAIRMAN COX: Well, there were several 6 inaccuracies --MR. BURNETT: -- who may be upset about that 7 article. 8 CHAIRMAN COX: -- in that particular article. 9 MR. BURNETT: Yeah. For those who may be 10 upset about that article, that is actually 11 inaccurate. The airport has not exercised its 12 powers of eminent domain to take property and then 13 rent those properties to folks. 14 As I understand it, the only properties that 15 have been taken are ones which are slated to be --16 17 that either have been demolished or slated to be demolished in connection with the expansion of the 18

airport into Araquay Park.

that.

20	MS. GREEN: Have we asked for a retraction,
21	or are we doing a rebuttal to that to make sure
22	the public knows that we are not taking properties
23	and renting them?
24	MR. BURNETT: You you certainly could do

1	CHAIRMAN COX: Have not as far as I know,
2	we haven't asked for a retraction. Mr. Cooper has
3	called that particular reporter numerous times,
4	with no return calls. So, I don't I don't
5	know.
6	But to move forward, do you have any comments
7	on the issues I was bringing up?
8	MS. GREEN: I do have one comment, coming
9	from the only nonpilot on the board. In my line
10	of business, which is the legal field, I was
11	approached several times from constituents in
12	Ponte Vedra asking about the runway situation,
13	which I kind of said, "I don't know what you're
14	talking about. Being on the board almost six
15	years now, we are not slated to do a runway that
16	has anything to do flying over Ponte Vedra."
17	And I'm trying to calm them down.
18	And also, obviously flying is not my hobby.
19	I wish it was. That would be very nice. It's

20	kind of my volunteer work here.
21	But that article did give great concern to me
22	as a board member trying to answer questions for
23	which, as a board, I didn't know anything about.
24	Because we, as a board, had not discussed any of
25	those things. And it gave grave concern to me.

1	CHAIRMAN COX: Well, the reason we didn't						
2	discuss them, because they're totally inaccurate						
3	and out of context.						
4	MS. GREEN: That's my that was my concern.						
5	And I'm trying to answer our constituents, you						
6	know, our, you know, personnel here in Ponte Vedra						
7	and St. Johns County, their questions, and I						
8	can't.						
9	And they think, well, I don't know what I'm						
10	talking about. I do know. No, we do not have a						
11	runway slated for that. No, we are not taking and						
12	renting property.						
13	So, it was very difficult for me, and I took						
14	great affront to it, trying to re-create and						
15	correct what happened. That's why I was asking if						
16	we, either as a board or the airport, can do some						
17	type of retraction or editorial. I don't know						
18	what we can do, Mr. Burnett, but it's been very						
19	difficult the last two weeks to deal with this.						

20	CHAIRMAN COX: Right. Mr. Brunson?
21	MR. BRUNSON: Very briefly. Only comment I
22	have, Mr. Cox, I feel exactly like you do.
23	However, having said that, I think as a private
24	citizen, Mr. Ciriello has the the right to give
25	his personal opinion on anything he wishes to

1	discuss and let the voters and the public decide
2	whether it's inaccurate or not.
3	I, too, take offense, but what I've tried to
4	do is talk to Joe and say, you know, I am a member
5	of the Pilots Association, but I think my voting
6	record will prove that I don't represent the
7	Pilots Association a hundred percent.
8	On the radio talk shows, when people call in,
9	and Mr. Ciriello's been on there a couple of
10	times, people will say things, and they will
11	support him or not support him. And to tell you
12	the truth, what I do when somebody makes a comment
13	like, "Mr. Ciriello is the only one on the board
14	that has common sense," then I take it upon myself
15	to call that person and request a meeting with
16	them to show them my voting record and show them
17	my background. And hopefully they'll see that I
18	have common sense.
19	But I'd rather not get involved with politics

20	here and do anything formally to because
21	everybody has their rights to
22	CHAIRMAN COX: I don't disagree with you.
23	You have the right to speak your mind and and
24	give your own opinion, but when you when you

obviously give out opinions that are tremendously

1	skewed with inaccuracies and, you know
2	MS. GREEN: That's my concern, because we are
3	here, and Mr. Gorman's not here, but he's been a
4	big forerunner in marketing and getting the
5	airport out there so that people can see what we
6	are doing. And then this happens, and it's not
7	the board speaking; it's politics, which you're
8	right, should be out there. It's not here.
9	We, as a board, need to stand together and
10	say, no, we as a board say this. Politicians can
11	do something else.
12	But my concern was, I'm answering questions
13	as a board member for some agenda we did not put
14	out there
15	CHAIRMAN COX: Right.
16	MS. GREEN: and that's difficult.
17	MR. BRUNSON: We we need to respond in the
18	paper, and if nothing else, letters to the editor.
19	They they might get published and they might

20	not.
21	CHAIRMAN COX: True. Let me allow
22	Mr. Ciriello to take the floor and respond.
23	MR. CIRIELLO: Well, Mr. Cox, you'll have to
24	help me here, because of all the things you went

through, what was the first statement you made?

1	Of course, it'd just be my opinion against
2	your opinion. I don't think there's any hard
3	proof here that can be made is this thing on
4	one way or another, but
5	MR. WUELLNER: It is.
6	MR. BRUNSON: It is on.
7	MR. CIRIELLO: what was the first state
8	statement you were objecting to?
9	CHAIRMAN COX: Well, I don't know what you
10	call hard proof. This is your mission statement
11	out of a deal you were talking about.
12	MR. CIRIELLO: Still, what was your first
13	comment?
14	CHAIRMAN COX: How you represented all the
15	people and taxpayers and not just the special
16	interest groups.
17	MR. CIRIELLO: I thought you had a couple of
18	points before that. But, okay. Here's here's
19	my line of thinking when I made that statement,

20	okay?	If I a	at my	speeches,	if I'm	not	if
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- 21 I'm remembering correctly, I alluded to the fact
- that the first year on the board with you guys,
- was your first year was my third, that that's the
- year that a \$17 million record budget was passed.
- And at my recollection, I tried to get you to take

out \$7 million of that budget that I thought was 1 2 (sic) necessary. And I also wanted to go with a rollback rate on ad valorem taxes, which you guys 3 decided to keep the same. 4 So, when I say, "I represent all of the 5 citizens of St. Johns County and not just special 6 interest," I'm thinking of all the citizens of St. 7 8 Johns County is paying taxes, and if you guys were interested in all of the citizens, plus, you are 9 10 the ones that are going around telling everybody -- not just you guys, the one -- people 11 way before you, 20 years ago. They're always 12 saying when it comes time to get elected, "We're 13 going to get off the tax rolls." And it never 14 happens. 15 So, if you're interested in supporting all 16 17 the people of St. Johns County and you're speaking for all of them, why then would you not lower that 18 budget and go with the ad valorem rate, because 19

20	all that money was benefiting the airport? It
21	wasn't benefiting everybody else.
22	Oh, you'll say, "Oh, sure, it brings in
23	employment" and everything else, but I don't go
24	with that.

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But that was my -- anyhow, that was my line

1	of thinking when I said that, that I represent
2	everybody because not just the special
3	interest, okay?
4	Now there was a couple of other points you
5	brought out. Well, I know the one about the trip
6	to Beaver County. You like to make slight of the
7	name of the place because
8	CHAIRMAN COX: I couldn't remember what the
9	name of it was.
10	MR. CIRIELLO: Beaver County Airport.
11	CHAIRMAN COX: All right.
12	MR. CIRIELLO: I've said many a times as a
13	board member and before a board member, speaking
14	at the mic, comparing Beaver County with this
15	airport. Beaver County makes money in the black
16	every year, and and there's no burden to the
17	taxpayers. So, I wanted to go up there, and I
18	wanted Ed to go along, but he couldn't go, to see
19	how the airport was run, not have any effect on

20	his management. It had nothing to do with how
21	much he was making.
22	Now, I think you might have got that the
23	statement from one of the guys that was with me,
24	but I happened to ask the lady that was running
25	the airport, that had the same job he has, how

much money she was making at the time. 1 And I think she said \$47,000. 2 3 I asked her if she had a college education. She said, no, high school. She told me her name. 4 And then I remembered how she got the job. She 5 was a secretary beforehand, and then the county 6 who runs the airport appointed her to be the 7 8 executive director. But she does the same thing that Ed does. 9 10 Of course, the airport's physically not as big as this one, but it's just as busy. Had a 11 control tower way before you people even thought 12 of having one. And she gets paid \$47,000 for 13 doing basically the same job as Ed, and maybe 14 she -- I will say she's probably not as smart as 15 he is, because he's educated in this area. 16 But that was the reason for going up there, 17 18 just to see how they are, how come they're in the black, why we can't be, why they're not on the tax 19

20	rolls and we are. It had nothing to do with
21	trying to compare Ed's job or his duties or how he
22	does it with anybody else.
23	CHAIRMAN COX: All right.

MR. CIRIELLO: Now, there was a couple of

other comments you made earlier before that, that

I don't quite remember what they were, but when 1 2 you said them, I had something in mind. 3 CHAIRMAN COX: The gist -- the gist of the 4 issue is, Joe -- yes, sir. 5 MR. BURNETT: Mr. Chair, I just want to make 6 one comment. And again, I want to repeat before I say this, I'm not trying to get in the middle 7 8 of --9 CHAIRMAN COX: Politics. MR. BURNETT: -- politics. It's not my 10 position. I'm here as an attorney for the board 11 and the Airport Authority. 12 I just want to make sure that Mr. Ciriello 13 knows that although the Chair is asking him 14 questions, Mr. Ciriello -- and I'm not here to 15 16 advise you and be your attorney. But I just want to at least make the statement that you're not 17

required to answer anything. It's up to you

whether you respond or -- or answer questions or

18

- 20 make statements or the like.
- As far as from a legal standpoint, you're --
- you're making public comments to the extent you
- want to or don't want to.
- MR. CIRIELLO: I understand that.
- MR. BURNETT: Okay.

1	CHAIRMAN COX: Joe, I don't want you to I
2	don't want you to have to stand here and and
3	issue these bullet points, but you've passed this
4	out
5	MR. CIRIELLO: Oh, I've just answered the
6	questions that you brought out.
7	CHAIRMAN COX: Okay. And that's
8	MR. CIRIELLO: You mentioned Beaver County
9	You've mentioned
10	CHAIRMAN COX: All right.
11	MR. CIRIELLO: that I said I'm the only
12	one
13	CHAIRMAN COX: I understand that.
14	MR. CIRIELLO: You also mentioned at the end
15	of your speech now, at the beginning, you had a
16	couple of points, but when I say something
17	about the private St. Augustine Pilots
18	Association. Now, you can't tell me that four
19	it's not the four, because Mr. Brunson wasn't here

20	then. But when I was on the board, there was
21	three members of your club on the board
22	CHAIRMAN COX: What club are you talking
23	about?
24	MR. CIRIELLO: The private pilots club. You
25	belong to it. Jack belongs to it and George

belongs to it. 1 CHAIRMAN COX: We belong to it by de facto 2 3 because they automatically include all board 4 members in the club. 5 MR. CIRIELLO: Well, I know that. CHAIRMAN COX: Okay. But anyway, let's --6 let's move forward. All -- the gist of the 7 8 problem I'm getting at is, you have, with this paper, impugned the integrity of everybody on this 9 10 board by -- by saying that we don't have the best interest of taxpayers in mind. That's BS. 11 MR. CIRIELLO: That's the thing I draw from 12 the way you guys act. 13 CHAIRMAN COX: All right. Well, that's your 14 opinion, but I think personally you owe an apology 15 to everybody on the board. 16 17 MR. CIRIELLO: Well, how you about 18 apologizing to me with that personal attack? You

never liked me from day one, and I've never said

20	anything bad about you. I think you're
21	CHAIRMAN COX: Which personal attack are you
22	talking about?
23	MR. CIRIELLO: Oh, hell, you tried to get me
24	censored one time.
25	CHAIRMAN COX: That's right. You were

- 1 speaking out of turn.
- 2 MR. CIRIELLO: No, I wasn't. I wrote a
- 3 letter to the editor --
- 4 CHAIRMAN COX: All right. I'm not going to
- 5 debate it with you, Joe. Do you have any other
- 6 comments on this?
- 7 MR. CIRIELLO: Well, I can't remember the
- 8 first couple of things you said --
- 9 CHAIRMAN COX: Okay.
- MR. CIRIELLO: -- and you won't tell me,
- 11 so...
- 12 CHAIRMAN COX: Please take your seat.
- MR. HICKOX: May I make one comment?
- 14 CHAIRMAN COX: Yes, sir.
- MR. HICKOX: As you know, I report -- I'm
- Wayne Hickox, 881 Queen Road. I think this is
- 17 probably going into the record.
- I've worked with all of you, and I've -- and
- 19 I will not deny the fact that I'm the

secretary/treasurer of Joe's campaign. He's been
a personal friend to me and I support him. Do I
agree with everything? You know I don't.
We've had debates over the executive
director's pay before the board, and I have made
suggestions to you here. But you have never heard

1	in any one of my stories I heard you mention
2	the media. You have never heard me take a stance,
3	whether it's something he supports or something
4	that Kelly supports, or for that matter, one of
5	you.
6	There are members of the media out there that
7	will take a piece of material and make a scandal
8	out of it.
9	CHAIRMAN COX: Yeah.
10	MR. HICKOX: I think it's unfortunate that
11	you've been forced to have to bring this up in
12	front of the meeting. I don't apologize for Joe.
13	I support some of what he believes, much of what
14	he believes, but not necessarily as to how you
15	guys have conducted your jobs. I just want that
16	understood.
17	CHAIRMAN COX: Yes, sir. Thank you. And the
18	media that I was alluding to was not you by any

means, so...

- MR. HICKOX: I just want it understood, I
- 21 have never used --
- 22 CHAIRMAN COX: I know that.
- MR. HICKOX: -- my comments on the air --
- 24 CHAIRMAN COX: Thank you.
- MR. HICKOX: And you can --

CHAIRMAN COX: Thank you, Mr. Hickox. 1 2 MR. BRUNSON: I agree. 3 CHAIRMAN COX: Well --4 MR. BURNETT: Mr. Chairman? CHAIRMAN COX: -- moving forward, then, let's 5 go to -- yes, sir. 6 MR. BURNETT: Mr. Chair, if I might. Let's 7 at least offer if anybody else has public comments 8 since we've gone beyond just the initial speaker. 9 CHAIRMAN COX: Very good point. Any other 10 public -- Mr. Martinelli? 11 MR. MARTINELLI: Victor Martinelli, Ponte 12 13 Vedra Beach. When it comes time for elections and candidates are out there, they're tripping the 14 light fantastic. Sometimes I think they're eating 15 the wrong mushrooms. 16 17 But in any event, this appears to be a new low. And I would implore everyone -- Joe, I've 18

known you for a long time, and you don't really

20	need to hit below the belt to get elected. And
21	and I really think that when you're impugning
22	and and in my opinion you are, that's my
23	opinion, your statements do impugn the integrity
24	of this board and when you do that, I think you
25	really buy a lot of trouble. So, that's point

1	number one.
2	Point number two, I would suggest that and
3	I'd be happy to do it. I'll write an editorial to
4	the Ponte Vedra Recorder, and I'll get all the
5	facts about the so-called runway that's going to
6	fly airplanes into our backyards and so on.
7	I do have some following in Ponte Vedra. A
8	lot of people know me. And so maybe it will carry
9	some weight, and it won't be coming from the
10	board. So, I'd be willing to do that.
11	CHAIRMAN COX: Thank you very much, sir. Any
12	other comments?
13	MR. SESONA: Al Sesona, 394 North Boulevard.
14	I've only been attending Airport Authority
15	meetings the last couple of years or so, and I've
16	heard statements often repeated. Some, I took a
17	hundred percent. Some, I didn't.
18	I know Joe. I've gone back and researched
19	Airport Authority minutes for pretty close to ten

20	years. In my observations, in the minutes of the
21	Airport Authority meetings, as they reflect to
22	Joe, he was more or less one of the very, very few
23	people, more often than not, that held feet to the
24	fire on this board and across and the executive
25	director, which I thought was pretty admirable,

1	considering what was going on at the time and now.
2	Personally, I've heard you, Mr. Chairman,
3	pontificate about how wonderful the Airport
4	Authority is, but as a private citizen and as a
5	business person, I have a lot to object to about
6	how you run the board and how do you run the
7	business of the board. I believe that this
8	airport could function very well as is just under
9	the direction of the fixed base operator.
10	And the airport really doesn't need the
11	Airport Authority. It could do very well without
12	it. It's a going business. And and and
13	this Airport Authority and all that it does is
14	is really an empty shoe, in my opinion. And I
15	think I'm entitled to that. The airport more or
16	less is made up of Northrop Grumman, it's made up
17	of the fixed base operator, and it's made up of an
18	awful lot of tenants that pay rent.
19	The business of the airport is business, not

20	flying, not me, not you, not anybody, but how much
21	money in and how much money out. And y'all don't
22	have a good record of that. You've been
23	subsidized from day one. And if it wasn't for the
24	largesses from the Florida Department of
25	Transportation, from the Department of

- 1 Transportation and the FAA, you couldn't exist.
- 2 Thank you.
- 3 CHAIRMAN COX: Mr. RauHofer.
- 4 MR. RAUHOFER: Warren RauHofer, Ponte Vedra
- 5 Beach. I disagree with you wholeheartedly. And I
- 6 just want to bring up the fact that none of these
- 7 people are paid. You know, yeah, just a little
- 8 mistake you made. I'm sure you're aware of that.
- 9 The other thing that I really get is when I
- went to Joe's web site, and I saw this club that
- we have at the -- at the field called the
- private -- the rich private pilots club, well, the
- only one I know is St. Augustine Airport Pilots
- 14 Association. And those are the folks who
- volunteer to do a lot of the grunt work when we
- have things like Super Bowl come along. They
- 17 volunteer to run the COA air -- air show, which
- everybody in the county enjoyed, and we pumped
- 19 \$40,000 into the COA. They -- they were the arms

20	and legs of that air show.	
21	And we do a lot of other things here at the	
22	airport. And I'm not rich and I don't own an	
23	airplane, and most of the people in that club	
24	don't own an airplane, including you, Joe.	
25	And your pictures are on the same page on	

that directory as Mr. Cox. So, you're in the 1 2 same -- you're in the same club that we are. Are you rich? No. Probably not. Not any richer than 3 any one of us. 4 I think it's -- I think when people say that, 5 all they're doing is looking for votes. That's 6 all they're doing. The agenda is looking for 7 8 votes. And I agree with the individual that said, 9 hey -- Mr. Martinelli said we've come to an all 10 11 time low, if that's what you have to do to get votes, is -- is to -- is to shade the truth. 12 I mean, a runway that's going to disturb 13 Ponte Vedra is ridiculous. And I've spent all my 14 life, 35 years, with American Airlines, 31 years 15 with -- with flying in the Navy Reserve, and I 16 17 want to tell you something; I -- I don't see any

runway that's ever going to be a problem up there.

You just -- what you put it in there for is

18

20	to get votes. That that's my opinion. And I
21	believe, with Mr. Cox and the other board members,
22	you owe not only them an apology, but you owe the
23	club an apology, you owe a lot of people that are
24	just citizens of this community apology. Thank
25	you.

I	CHAIRMAN COX: Thank you, sir. Sir?
2	MR. THOMPSON: I'm Mike Thompson. I live at
3	895 Roberts Road.
4	I've heard some things here this afternoon
5	that kind of defy belief. I think one thing that
6	has gotten lost in some of this, and maybe all of
7	this, is that this airport is a huge benefit to
8	the entire county. And anybody that doesn't think
9	so needs to sit out here, go to the restaurant,
10	have a glass of tea, and watch those business jets
11	coming in.
12	Every one of those jets is here for a
13	business reason. I know that some of y'all want
14	to sit around and say, hey, just came down to play
15	golf. No, they don't play golf, just like they're
16	dressed, when they get off those jets. They're
17	here for two hours, three hours, four hours, maybe
18	overnight, spending some money outside the fence,
19	working on business deals that benefit who? The

20	county.
21	This airport is one of the most critical
22	resources St. Johns County has at its borders.
23	And anything that occurs that damages this airport
24	or its image is a terrible thing for all of us.
25	I'm not too sure what I just heard

1	Mr. Ciriello say, but when he was talking about
2	employment in the airport, he he didn't believe
3	that or he doesn't want to get into it, but
4	anybody that's ever gotten caught in a traffic jam
5	when Grumman lets out over on the east side of the
6	field knows that there's a whole bunch of
7	people and I got to tell you, I don't think
8	they're doing volunteer work over there. I
9	believe every one of those people is getting paid,
10	and in turn, they're contributing to the tax base.
11	I just heard that it's the largest employer
12	in the county. I don't know whether I believe
13	that or not. I believe it's the largest private
14	employer, but you've got to go some to beat the
15	government in this county in terms of number of
16	people, between the government and the school
17	system and all that. But I believe it's the
18	largest employer that contributes taxes.
19	And that's something that we have to keep in

- 20 mind. This is a valuable resource, and doing
- anything to damage the credibility of this airport
- or the people that run it is, in my opinion, a bad
- thing. Thank you very much.
- 24 CHAIRMAN COX: Thank you, sir.
- 25 Move on into regular reports.

1	7.A COUNTY COMMISSIONER
2	CHAIRMAN COX: Mr. Bryant is not available
3	this evening. Mr. Slingluff?
4	7.B GALAXY AVIATION
5	MR. SLINGLUFF: Nothing to report.
6	MR. RODERICK: Coward.
7	7.C GRUMMAN ST. AUGUSTINE
8	CHAIRMAN COX: Mr. Nehring?
9	MR. NEHRING: Nothing to report.
10	7.D S.A.P.A.
11	CHAIRMAN COX: Mr. Roderick?
12	MR. RODERICK: I feel like an infantryman
13	walking into
14	CHAIRMAN COX: Don't you bale out on me.
15	There's a mine field there.
16	MR. RODERICK: On the bright side, we were
17	approached to help design and look look ahead
18	to an airport community service building. This
19	will be a facility that supports high school

20	people, and we have a new aviation program, Civil
21	Air Patrol, Coast Guard auxiliary air program
22	that's growing at a very good rate. But it's
23	something to give back to the community.
24	And we have volunteered Warren RauHofer, like
25	we do for lots of things, to actively participate

1	for the St. Augustine Airport Pilots Association.
2	We have a new slate of officers, and we're
3	moving forward with what I might call established
4	adult leadership. We have two women to lead us
5	for the first time. Millie, vice-president. And
6	Reba, we have volunteered you to be president.
7	So, we're striking off in a new direction.
8	I will be replaced by Michael Thompson
9	starting next meeting. Thank you very much for
10	your indulgence.
11	CHAIRMAN COX: Thank you, sir.
12	7.E F.A.C.T.
13	CHAIRMAN COX: Mr. Ottesen? Is he not here?
14	(Not present.)
15	7.F AIRPORT ATTORNEY
16	CHAIRMAN COX: Okay. Mr. Burnett?
17	MR. BURNETT: Nothing to report.
18	7.G ATCT
19	CHAIRMAN COX: Mr. Knight? Did you have to

20	think about it, Dave?
21	MR. BRUNSON: He kind of crawled up to the
22	mic.
23	MR. WUELLNER: Can you bring a mic to me?
24	MR. KNIGHT: Good evening, everybody. Our
25	traffic count is just slightly below in September

1	in terms of the 2008 forecast. But other than
2	that, I think due to the economies of fuel, et
3	cetera, that the yellow and blue lines that you
4	see up there is previous years when the pilots
5	could afford the fuel a little bit easier.
6	Right now, we're running a little bit less,
7	in fact, close to our 2004 correction, 2003
8	numbers. Overall, we'll probably hit between 120-
9	and 125,000 operations for the year. Any
10	questions?
11	(No questions.)
12	CHAIRMAN COX: Thank you very much. Finished
13	up reports. We'll go into member committee
14	reports. And a couple of our members are not
15	here. But the MPO, please.
16	8.A MPO
17	MR. BRUNSON: MPO. We had an unbelievable
18	event at the Hyatt Regency in Jacksonville,
19	talking about global trade and transportation.

20	This was an all-day event that Congressman Mica
21	was a keynote speaker. And there were so many
22	good informative presentations. Frankly, you just
23	had to be there to to enjoy it.
24	One of the two of the things that stood
25	out in my mind were the things that had gone on at

JAXPORT. It's just a -- St. Johns County should 1 2 really benefit from the whole scope of JAXPORT. 3 And also, one of the people that just gave an 4 unbelievable presentation on what's going on at Navy Jax, Commander Chip Goodson (sic), and so 5 that was a great thing. 6 And I'll mention that Navy Jax, as most of 7 8 you know, is having their air show the 27th, 28th, and 29th. And I hate to admit to you guys, but by 9 representing the Airport Authority on the MPO, I 10 get to go to the commander's booth --11 CHAIRMAN COX: Good for you. 12 13 MR. BRUNSON: -- and watch the air show. So, 14 thank you very much. MR. HICKOX: Part of the perks. 15 CHAIRMAN COX: That's right. Well, you put 16 17 in a lot of time, you know, volunteer time, so, yeah, you deserve it. 18

8.B. & C. - EDC & INTERGOVERNMENTAL

- 20 CHAIRMAN COX: EDC and Intergovernmental
- 21 is --
- MR. WUELLNER: EDC did not meet this month.
- 23 CHAIRMAN COX: Okay.
- MR. WUELLNER: They won't meet till November.
- 25 And the -- I'm sorry. Not EDC. Intergovernmental

1 did not meet. 2 MR. BRUNSON: EDC had, as usual, a monthly 3 breakfast. And help me with his name, the 4 terrorism ---5 MR. BURNETT: Glenn Hastings. MR. BRUNSON: Glenn Hasty (sic) gave a 6 PowerPoint presentation and mentioned the study 7 8 that the EDC has done and the Chamber with this -with this land, and gave us some good figures on 9 how many rooms we have here and how many 10 restaurants we have and how many people have come 11 into this airport and some very positive things 12 about the airport and terrorism and what this 13 does. So, that was an excellent meeting we had 14 with EDC. 15 16 CHAIRMAN COX: Great. Project updates, 17 please. 18 MS. GREEN: Mr. Chairman, we have one more --

we have one more --

- 20 CHAIRMAN COX: I'm sorry.
- 21 MS. GREEN: -- committee report, kind of.
- 22 CHAIRMAN COX: Oh, yeah?
- MS. GREEN: Since we now have the
- St. Augustine -- the school that's --
- 25 CHAIRMAN COX: Oh, the -- the St. Johns

County Aerospace Academy. 1 8.D. - ST. JOHNS COUNTY AEROSPACE ACADEMY 2 3 MS. GREEN: Yes, sir. I'd like to add that, if we can, to our reports --4 CHAIRMAN COX: Sure. 5 6 MS. GREEN: -- since we have board members --CHAIRMAN COX: Very good idea. 7 8 MS. GREEN: -- that are actively involved in advising that. And I know you were there and 9 Mr. Wuellner was there. And as an advisory 10 committee, I think we made some good strides 11 towards St. Augustine. 12 Actually, we even got some calls from Nease 13 students that wanted to come down and just 14 participate in the aeronautical part of it. But 15 the way it's set up right now, no, they cannot. 16 17 They have to be a full-time student at St. Augustine High to participate in this. 18

And from what we learned at that meeting,

20	they are overwhelmed.
21	CHAIRMAN COX: Yeah.
22	MS. GREEN: They have more than they can
23	handle with students that are interested in the
24	aeronautical industry. And I actually, on a quick
25	note, went up to Auburn this weekend and had I

1	went for a run, and I had a Nease shirt on, and
2	F-16s flew over during the game, and someone said,
3	"You go to that school that's next to the school
4	that has that aeronautical school, right?"
5	And I'm looking at them going, "How did you
6	know that?" Word's getting out. It's out there.
7	CHAIRMAN COX: That's cool.
8	MS. GREEN: So, this is a big thing for
9	St. Augustine and the school, so
10	CHAIRMAN COX: The airport's going to take an
11	active, very active role in the aerospace academy.
12	It's going to be a very very positive thing for
13	the county, it really will.
14	MS. GREEN: Our next meeting's the first.
15	CHAIRMAN COX: All right. Very good. And
16	that's a good point. Can we just add that in on
17	the committee reports?
18	MR. WUELLNER: Yeah, I actually touch it

under public relations --

- MS. GREEN: I'm sorry. Okay.
- MR. WUELLNER: -- but we can add an item, if
- you want --
- 23 CHAIRMAN COX: Okay.
- MR. WUELLNER: -- for future.
- 25 CHAIRMAN COX: That's cool. Project updates?

1	9 PROJECT UPDATES
2	MR. WUELLNER: Yes, sir. I've got several
3	ongoing projects to bring you up to speed on.
4	They include the south hangar excuse me, south
5	area development, apron development project;
6	T-hangar development; hangars 8, 9, and 10;
7	seaplane ramp project; marketing and public
8	relations; and airport leasing activities.
9	First is Taxiway Foxtrot and the associated
10	apron, and I'm proud to announce we're actually
11	under construction now. They are turning
12	turning dirt back there. And a quick drive
13	through that construction site and you'll get a
14	feel for the magnitude of that project real quick.
15	It's I understand that you can actually kind of
16	visualize now what the size of the apron is and
17	locations of of taxiways now that they're
18	starting to begin their efforts on the subbase
19	preparation for that construction.

20	So, things look good down there. And we're
21	glad. Looks like completion of April 2007,
22	thereabouts. It was a six-month duration project
23	We officially got underway earlier this month
24	or actually last Wednesday, I believe it was. So,
25	a few short months, we'll be able to occupy that

1	and and be be on our way with some of these
2	hangar projects and and other revenue-producing
3	projects.
4	Speaking of hangar projects, T-hangar project
5	to to be developed in that area right now, the
6	engineering is continuing and is ongoing.
7	Expected to be bidding this project and getting us
8	some solid numbers on construction costs toward
9	the end of this calendar year. So, that's going
10	to come up pretty quick here.
11	We'll be also meeting with the County shortly
12	to go through the DRC process for the the
13	buildings as as required. And hopefully a few
14	months after that, we'll be in construction with
15	some buildings. So, I'm optimistic that first
16	quarter next year, we should be at a point where
17	permits are in place and and maybe we're
18	actually starting to build back there, so
19	Next project I've got for you is hangars 8,

20	9, and 10. 8, 9, and 10, as you recall, are on
21	the eastside corporate area. This is the last
22	facility being built in that in that area due
23	to land constraints. That is under construction.
24	I can report that the heavy steel portion of
25	those buildings is virtually complete at this

1	point. And they will begin, I would expect in the
2	next day or so at the most, to begin skinning the
3	exterior of the building and placing insulation
4	and beginning to bring that structure under roof.
5	So, it's progressing nicely and
6	CHAIRMAN COX: Projected completion?
7	MR. WUELLNER: I believe we're still looking
8	at I think they have till the end of February
9	to finish the building. But I would not be
10	surprised to see that accelerate a little bit.
11	CHAIRMAN COX: Okay.
12	MR. WUELLNER: But a lot of a lot of
13	factors between here and there.
14	Seaplane ramp, we we promised a rebid of
15	that. It actually shows up as an agenda item a
16	little bit further back. But you may recall that
17	we rebid that after reviewing the scope of work in
18	the proposed contract and and felt that it
19	still was way out of proportion to the work being

25

20	done. And I think you'll see that we that
21	turned out pretty well in terms of dollars to
22	dollars related to that element of the project.
23	So, that's still on track. Must be completed
24	by the end of March of this year at the latest.

We're told that it's about a 30-day construction

1	effort once they re in there.
2	We have submitted applications to FDEP to
3	to actually place the dock in in state waters,
4	which is required anywhere. So, once those are in
5	place, the construction can begin, assuming you
6	approve the contract later on.
7	Marketing and public relations. Point out
8	St. Johns County Aerospace Academy, as you already
9	pointed out, that several Airport Authority
10	members are on that, as well as myself and Michael
11	Slingluff with the with Galaxy. And we
12	continue to, again, get more and more interest on
13	the airport community in participating in that and
14	making that a strong player in in St. Johns
15	County education. Everybody seems to be genuinely
16	excited about about that program. So, it's
17	good news.
18	The other thing I did want to point out that
19	the University of Georgia charter is once again

- scheduled to be in here later this week in support
- of the Florida-Georgia game, so we -- we've been
- handling that charter for the last couple of
- years. And again, they'll be in later this week.
- 24 CHAIRMAN COX: What kind of airplane is that?
- MR. WUELLNER: That's a Boeing 737-800.

1	CHAIRMAN COX: BBJ or
2	MR. WUELLNER: No, it's a
3	CHAIRMAN COX: Just a regular
4	MR. WUELLNER: It's actually Delta Airlines.
5	CHAIRMAN COX: Oh, okay. All right.
6	MR. WUELLNER: It's a regular passenger
7	passenger aircraft.
8	And what else have we got? Nothing to report
9	on leasing activities.
10	I did just I took the item off the
11	reports, but I did want to let you know that we
12	made some contact with the County about walking
13	through the process, getting the Master Plan
14	document incorporated into the Comprehensive Plan
15	revisions coming up. Not this current cycle
16	they're in, but it will likely be the next one.
17	So, we'll walk through that process with them.
18	And and they'll have to adopt a new Airport
19	Overlay District boundary as a part of that, the

20	Land Development Regulations to the	Comp Plan.
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- 21 CHAIRMAN COX: The new overlay.
- MR. WUELLNER: Well, the way the -- the
- Comprehensive Plan for the County is written, the
- 24 Airport Master Plan, to -- to a great extent,
- 25 governs the borders of what the Airport Overlay

1 District should be. 2 CHAIRMAN COX: Okay. 3 MR. WUELLNER: And the County --4 CHAIRMAN COX: Yeah. 5 MR. WUELLNER: -- effectively adjusts the Comprehensive Plan to agree with the Master Plan. 6 But that requires their action. It's not an 7 Authority action. 8 So, that process takes a little time to go 9 through. And the County's limited to the number 10 of times they can amend their Comprehensive Plan 11 in any calendar year. And we'll have to hit the 12 next cycle. And it will be a part of many other 13 things that get adjusted in the Comp Plan in the 14 next iteration. 15 CHAIRMAN COX: Okay. Want to move into 16 17 action items? 10.A. - MINIMUM COMMERCIAL AVIATION OPERATING STANDARDS

MR. WUELLNER: Okay. First item I have for

25

20	you today is the Minimum Commercial Aviation
21	Operations Policy, which also is synonomous with
22	the Minimum Commercial Aviation Operating
23	Standards document that was provided in your
24	agenda package.

As I mentioned at the last Authority meeting,

1	when we withdrew it as an action item, that many
2	of our many of our tenants had concerns about
3	requirements that were in there or just genuinely
4	had not had some time to spend with the document.
5	We hosted a couple of meetings with those
6	tenants and went over those issues, made some
7	revisions to our proposed documents to provide a
8	little more, not so much flexibility, but a little
9	more understanding of what a clarification
10	CHAIRMAN COX: Clarification.
11	MR. WUELLNER: for lack of better terms,
12	within the document as to what our intents were.
13	And one of the areas that got a significant amount
14	of tension was the area of independent operators.
15	And the concept of independent operators is
16	while not new on airports, is one that heretofore
17	the Airport Authority's Minimum Operating
18	Standards did not address directly.
19	And in an in an attempt to get that

20	properly regulated and properly considered by the
21	Airport Authority, we created a section that
22	basically allows someone to create an operating
23	arrangement through an operating written
24	operating agreement with the Authority for
25	business actions that would be accommodated or

1	accomplished on the airport. Provides for a
2	written agreement, payment of some fee to be
3	determined later and we'll deal with the fee side
4	at a future meeting, but allows those operators to
5	become, quote, unquote, legitimized on the
6	airport. Allows us to be aware of their presence.
7	Allows a regulatory element to that.
8	The requirement for insurance and things of
9	that nature begin to come into play as a way of
10	protecting the public and the flying public at
11	large from unscrupulous business practices, should
12	they end up inside the fence at times.
13	It is not an attempt and we tried to
14	clarify this at at Pilot's Association meeting
15	had concerns over the policy in general. But it
16	is a policy that strictly and entirely deals with
17	commercial aviation activities.
18	It is not aimed toward an individual who is
19	trying to work on his own aircraft or or along

20	those lines. It's strictly designed to cover
21	people who are intent on using airport public
22	property to develop revenue, to to go into
23	business. And it allows, again, some standards to
24	be applied to those situations.
25	Otherwise, probably the biggest changes from

1	the previously adopted one, which predate
2	frankly predates all of us goes back to 1995
3	is a relaxing of some of the square footage
4	requirements under some of these individual
5	business classifications.
6	Many of these requirements had space
7	requirements in excess of 8- to 10,000 square foot
8	in order to establish a business. And in some
9	cases, that's a significant burden on a on a
10	small business.
11	For the most part throughout this, and the
12	FBO would be an exception, but most single-focused
13	businesses business opportunities on the
14	airport would now require a minimum threshold
15	entry value of about 3,000 square foot.
16	So, that also plays very well into some of
17	the future hangar developments that we have, as
18	well as some of the existing hangar developments
19	we have, such as hangar rows H and hangar row I

20	and some of these five smaller corporate size, for
21	lack of better terms, that we were working into
22	the the south hangar development area. Those
23	are right at about 3,000 square foot.
24	So, it would allow those to be meet the
25	satisfactory minimum requirements of a building

size for somebody wanting to be in business. So, 1 in -- in effect, it enhances the opportunities for 2 3 commercial businesses on the airport within facilities owned by the airport. 4 So, I -- we -- I think I can somewhat speak 5 for the tenants, although I think a few of them 6 are here and, you know, maybe -- maybe have 7 8 comments to issue on their own. But I think we came to a pretty good consensus document in what 9 we were trying to accomplish, and that is bring 10 that up to -- up to, you know, current thinking 11 12 and create a document that allows some flexibility. 13 Another -- I need to -- one more point within 14 these. Something that your old policy did not do 15 16 was facilitate any method of appeal or a creation 17 of a variance to these requirements. And we -we've gone to great lengths to create a vehicle, 18 19 for lack of better terms, that -- that lets

20	somebody who needs to stray from the standards
21	applied here to make an appeal, for lack of better
22	terms, back to the Authority and and get those
23	considered for some sort of tweaking or adjustment
24	if it were deemed appropriate by the board.
25	So, it it does open the door to be a lot

more flexible, but an informed flexibility of the 1 2 board versus just simply saying, no, you can't do 3 it. We -- we've found over the years, a lot of 4 5 business opportunities tend to go away when it's -- when you can't find a way to accomplish 6 something that's unique or -- or something that 7 8 just doesn't fit the standard mold. So, with that, assuming you've had a chance 9 to look them over and -- and get somewhat 10 11 comfortable with them, we would recommend adoption. I don't know. Again, you may have some 12 public comments that we've tried to circulate that 13 14 will especially affect the parties. CHAIRMAN COX: I want to just give -- offer 15 16 my own comments. I'm very impressed with the 17 document. I think it's -- and I actually sat in on one of the meetings with the tenants that -- in 18 19 some of the -- where the concerns were, you know,

20	dealt with.
21	I think Ed and the staff have done a really
22	good job in redoing the policy and making it much
23	more, I guess finite, if you will, in in
24	actually expanding the opportunity for small
25	businesses to work within the parameters of the

- 1 airport's policies.
- 2 Any comments from the board, please?
- 3 MR. BRUNSON: Just a question just to
- 4 clarify. The -- the bigger tenants here, like the
- 5 flight school and the FBO and -- let's see here.
- 6 What was my comment? FBO. Now -- so the FBO --
- 7 MR. WUELLNER: Uh-huh.
- 8 MR. BRUNSON: You're saying that a FBO needs
- 9 10,000 square feet.
- 10 MR. WUELLNER: Uh-huh.
- MR. BRUNSON: And 80,000 square feet of ramp.
- MR. WUELLNER: Uh-huh.
- MR. BRUNSON: If a new -- does Galaxy meet
- this requirement now?
- MR. WUELLNER: Yes.
- 16 MR. BRUNSON: Okay.
- 17 MR. WUELLNER: By far.
- MR. BRUNSON: By far. And do we have space
- available that we -- for an FBO that could utilize

20	this square footage and
21	MR. WUELLNER: Are if you're asking me do
22	we have existing facility
23	MR. BRUNSON: No, not existing facility, but
24	we do we have room
25	MR. WUELLNER: For another one?

MR. BRUNSON: -- to allow another FBO to --1 2 MR. WUELLNER: Yes. 3 MR. BRUNSON: -- meet this requirement? MR. WUELLNER: Yes. Your south development 4 5 has an area reserved. MR. BRUNSON: Okay. And then on the flight 6 school, same question. 7 8 MR. WUELLNER: Yes. The -- the airport -the context of the Airport Master Plan would allow 9 every business that's listed in the Minimum 10 Operating Standards to be accommodated on the 11 airport. 12 MR. BRUNSON: So, the flight school now has 13 4,000 square feet. 14 MR. WUELLNER: They have leased -- they have 15 16 leased that amount of property, yes. 17 MR. BRUNSON: Okay. And so they -- they would qualify under this. And under our Master 18

Plan, we're -- we're saying that another flight

- school could have that space available.
- MR. WUELLNER: Yes. The -- the space could
- be made available to them.
- MR. BRUNSON: Right.
- MR. WUELLNER: We do not existing --
- MR. BRUNSON: Right.

1 MR. WUELLNER: -- have that space. But, yes, 2 they could be accommodated. 3 MR. BRUNSON: Okay. That was the only questions I had of -- on this. 4 CHAIRMAN COX: Ms. Green? 5 6 MS. GREEN: Other than I -- I read through 7 the independent contractor's part of it, which was my main concern, and I think that that's been 8 addressed by Staff --9 CHAIRMAN COX: Yeah, absolutely. 10 MS. GREEN: -- tremendously. I was fortunate 11 to be in a meeting with -- with Ed and one 12 13 individual who was interested in that. It was nice to hear his comments. And I hope that we've 14 15 accommodated our desires, as well as those 16 independent contractors that want to come onto. 17 CHAIRMAN COX: I think it addressed them rather well. 18

MS. GREEN: Yes.

20	CHAIRMAN COX: Ed's done a pretty good job.
21	The staff's done a really good job of backing that
22	up.
23	I'll open this up to public comment. I see
24	we've got at least one. Mr. Martinelli, comment
25	on the

1	MR. MARTINELLI: Yeah. Going back, and
2	quoting history sometimes is a drag, but I want to
3	just quote some history here, because for many
4	years, the standards that were applied were very
5	discriminatory and they were very restrictive.
6	And there were many, many good business
7	opportunities that were missed over the years.
8	It's been a crusade for a long, long time to
9	get a nondiscriminatory objective set of standards
10	that really satisfy the objectives of the airport
11	and of the people who inhabit the airport.
12	And I think that what you have here in this
13	document is a real milestone toward that end. I
14	think you've done an excellent job. And and I
15	just want to commend everyone.
16	CHAIRMAN COX: Thank you very much, sir
17	Appreciate it. Mr. Jones?
18	MR. JONES: Joe Jones, St. Augustine. Yeah,
19	I was hoping that, with the last homes that hadn't

20	been rezoned yet, that still are up to the PZA,
21	that I was going to try to somehow or another
22	convince them or something, at least part of the
23	area further south would be new development.
24	You know you know where he's talking about
25	doing now a commercial, you know, and you have the

I	businesses are under something like that? Put
2	some kind of time frame on any kind of business
3	like that so that it just ain't open 24 hours a
4	day or something like that, where some because
5	you're going to be right next to an existing
6	neighborhood. I mean, you're talking about being,
7	you know, friendly with the neighborhood and stuff
8	like that.
9	And, you know, the way I don't know. I
10	haven't read that yet. But if it's you know,
11	if you're talking about making 3,000 square foot
12	hangars for commercial, you know, business and
13	stuff like that, it's possible that there's some
14	kind of time frame
15	CHAIRMAN COX: I see what your point is. And
16	I that's well taken point. And I don't think
17	there's any standard in there saying
18	MR. JONES: Well, because, see, nothing's
19	really been rezoned back there yet.

- 20 CHAIRMAN COX: Right.
- MR. JONES: -- even on the houses. And it's
- still got to go to the PZA.
- MR. WUELLNER: It's been rezoned. It's been
- 24 rezoned for --
- MR. JONES: I talked to them again --

MR. WUELLNER: -- six or eight months. 1 2 MR. JONES: I talked to them again this 3 morning. They said none of them houses, because you did an eminent domain, has been rezoned. They 4 5 don't even know how you're doing any construction 6 back there. MR. BURNETT: Well, part of -- part of the --7 there's -- there's several issues that you're 8 raising, Mr. Jones. But part of -- and for 9 this -- what this is worth -- and I invite you to 10 go ask County Staff. Part of the property is 11 actually zoned commercial that was taken. When 12 you get into the McElroy properties -- is it --13 McElroys were the ones on the marsh front. 14 MR. WUELLNER: Right. 15 16 MR. BURNETT: Those properties were actually 17 commercial to begin with.

MR. JONES: Right. Well, that was further

down. That's back over there -- that's back

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- 20 closer to the airport. It's -- the ones that are
- even further I guess would be almost coming west.
- You know where that big Spanish-style house was,
- the big white Spanish-style house that was right
- there on the corner and stuff like that?
- MR. WUELLNER: I'm not sure --

1 MR. JONES: Well, I'm just --MR. WUELLNER: -- what your source of 2 3 information is, but all -- all Airport Authority 4 owned property --5 MR. JONES: Well, I went to a meeting here at the airport for another administrative rezoning 6 7 for the rest of the airport property. 8 MR. WUELLNER: Right. MR. JONES: And they listed every one of your 9 properties. I went and talked to them this 10 morning. It still hasn't been rezoned to this 11 day. It doesn't go back -- it doesn't even go to 12 the PZA until November the 15th. Then after they 13 decide if it's rezoned or not, it goes to the 14 commission. 15 16 MR. WUELLNER: No, the County Commission approved it in 2005, March of 2005. It was 17 instantly rezoned to airport. 18

MR. JONES: I wonder why they had it on the

19

- 20 meeting. And they've got it on all your -- I'm
- telling you, it's in the meeting. You haven't
- been to the -- it hasn't been to the P -- it
- hasn't been in front of the PZA yet or anything.
- And they were wondering how you could do any
- construction back there.

1 MR. BURNETT: Yeah. And Mr. Jones, perhaps 2 we can meet and talk about that after the meeting. 3 You are correct as to some of the parcels are not zoned airport district currently --4 MR. JONES: Right. I'm just --5 MR. BURNETT: -- if that -- if that's your 6 point. 7 MR. JONES: Well, no. My point was I know 8 you're fixing to pass this right here with 9 10 commercial, you know, hangars and tenants and everything. And I was just wanting to know if 11 there's any possible way that if you want to talk 12 about being good neighbors and stuff, you know, to 13 14 look at putting stuff back there as hangars as -for storage hangars, like your other T-hangars 15 type stuff where people park them, and they don't 16 17 go back to them. But, you know, not ones that's 18 going to be a business or a jet sitting out there running or working on it or something like that. 19

20	CHAIRMAN COX:	So we don't have G-5s pulling

- in at 3 o'clock in the morning.
- MR. JONES: Right. Just so -- because, you
- know, like setting up for that section.
- 24 CHAIRMAN COX: I understand. Very good
- point. If you've got the time, why don't you

1	speak with Mr. Burnett about the other zoning
2	issue that you raised after, you know, the
3	meeting? That would be great.
4	Is there any other comment, public comment on
5	this particular agenda item?
6	(No further public comment.)
7	CHAIRMAN COX: Seeing no further public
8	comment, I will entertain a motion concerning
9	the Staff's looking for direction from us.
10	MS. GREEN: I make a motion we recommend the
11	aviation operating minimum commercial standards
12	recommended by Staff.
13	CHAIRMAN COX: I'll second. We have
14	MS. GREEN: I think we've discussed it. I
15	thank Mr
16	CHAIRMAN COX: I don't think there's any
17	further discussion, but that that
18	MS. GREEN: Comments are very well taken.
19	CHAIRMAN COX: You know, we can amend any of

- that language at any time, so...
- MS. GREEN: Yeah.
- MR. WUELLNER: Yeah. I would also -- it's --
- what may be less about the standards in the
- individual lease agreements that are developed,
- 25 this sets the minimum.

1	CHAIRMAN COX: Right. Understand.
2	MS. GREEN: We can be more restrictive.
3	MR. WUELLNER: What you're talking about,
4	each of those leases still would be subject
5	MR. JONES: I think it would be nice if, you
6	know, you tried to put your storage stuff back
7	over there and stuff that's actually going to be
8	worked on, where things are going to be worked on,
9	where you've already got the noise going and
10	everything, to make these making another
11	problem.
12	MS. GREEN: I think that's right. And we
13	can we have to leave Staff up to doing the
14	specifics on the leases. We try and stay out of
15	micromanaging, but that's a good point, that we
16	can direct Staff or take your recommendation that
17	when you get to those hangars, you take that into
18	consideration.
19	MR. JONES: What type of hangar that you

20	build there, you know, how much
21	CHAIRMAN COX: All right. We have motion on
22	the table. It's been seconded.
23	MR. BRUNSON: May I make a comment on
24	CHAIRMAN COX: Further discussion?
25	MR. BRUNSON: I I agree with you,

Mr. Jones. And I think basically what you're 1 2 saying is try to keep the -- or has SJ (sic) 3 bought this -- Logistics, who have to blast off at 3:00 in the morning to do their kidney transplant 4 things, but if we could get them to stay away from 5 there, that would be where they are now. So, I 6 7 have no other discussion. 8 CHAIRMAN COX: Okay. We have a motion on the table and a second. All in favor, say aye. 9 MR. BRUNSON: Aye. 10 CHAIRMAN COX: Aye. 11 MS. GREEN: Aye. 12 CHAIRMAN COX: All opposed? 13 14 (No opposition.) CHAIRMAN COX: The ayes have it, and the 15 motion is passed. 16 17 10.B. - SEAPLANE BID AWARD CHAIRMAN COX: Next agenda item is the --18

MR. WUELLNER: Seaplane bid award. And refer

19

20	to your agenda packet. But low low bidder
21	let me find it here real quick.
22	The project was rebid, and Yelton
23	Construction Company here in St. Augustine was the
24	low bidder at \$158,500. And that includes the
25	dock and lift for the seaplane. It's essentially

1	the same scope of work that was before us the last
2	time at for \$305,000.
3	Engineers and Staff went back to the drawing
4	board on materials and and exactly how it was
5	specified, and we came up with some revised
6	specifications that suit the need, but allow us to
7	reduce the cost.
8	And it would be our recommendation that you
9	award Yelton Construction in the amount of
10	\$158 \$158,500, and that, again, this is a
11	50/50 project with Florida DOT.
12	CHAIRMAN COX: All right. Any discussion on
13	the seaplane ramp from the board?
14	MR. BRUNSON: The two comments. Even
15	though I voted against this at \$350,000, it's been
16	approved. And and I haven't talked to Chip
17	Yelton, but he certainly has a good reputation,
18	and I'm sure he'll do a good job. And I make a
19	motion that we approve

20	CHAIRMAN COX: Well, we're going to get to
21	MR. BRUNSON: Get public comment?
22	CHAIRMAN COX: We've got to get public
23	comment first and any Ms. Green, any comments?
24	MS. GREEN: No, I I voted for it. I think
25	it's going to bring tourism in, and we need it.

1	CHAIRMAN COX: All right. And Mr. Sesona had
2	a comment on the seaplane ramp.
3	MR. SESONA: Al Sesona, 394 North Boulevard.
4	I really don't see a need for a seaplane dock
5	here. I you know, I've lived by the airport
6	now since 1974. I don't believe in that period of
7	time, which is how many years? That's quite a
8	number of years. I don't believe I've seen 50
9	seaplanes come and go.
10	Now, I'd like to see a separate study done,
11	maybe a three-year study done on seaplane traffic
12	and have it identified with time periods so that
13	at the end of three periods, we could look back
14	and say, well, you know, this was a good move or
15	it wasn't a good move. And I think I find that
16	very important to know. Thank you.
17	CHAIRMAN COX: Thank you. Any other comments
18	on seaplane ramp?
19	(No further comments.)

- 20 CHAIRMAN COX: Seeing no comments, I will
 21 entertain a motion to -22 MR. BRUNSON: Make a motion we approve
 23 construction of the seaplane ramp to Chip Yelton
 24 Construction, \$158,000.
 25 MS. GREEN: I second.
 - AIRPORT AUTHORITY REGULAR MEETING OCTOBER 23, 2006

1	CHAIRMAN COX: Okay. We've got a motion on
2	the table and a second. Any further discussion?
3	(No further discussion.)
4	CHAIRMAN COX: All in favor, say aye.
5	MS. GREEN: Aye.
6	CHAIRMAN COX: Aye.
7	MR. BRUNSON: Aye.
8	CHAIRMAN COX: All opposed?
9	(No opposition.)
10	CHAIRMAN COX: There is no opposed, so the
11	motion passes. Next agenda item?
12	10.C JPA RESOLUTION 2006-08
13	MR. WUELLNER: Next item I have is Resolution
14	2006-08, which is a supplemental JPA resolution
15	for Taxiway Foxtrot and the apron. This provides
16	for the FDOT share of of not to exceed
17	\$125,000, which equates to the approximate 2 1/2
18	percent share of the Taxiway F and apron project
19	that FAA is funding.

20	So, this brings total grant project or
21	total grants to bear percentage of 97 1/2
22	percentage of state and federal money for this
23	job, and the Airport Authority's share at 2 1/2
24	percent. You're, in effect, paying 2 1/2 cents
25	per dollar for the development of Taxiway F and

1	apron.
2	CHAIRMAN COX: Just to educate those who are
3	not familiar with Taxiway F, would you mind just
4	delineating for us or can you do that real
5	quick or not?
6	MR. WUELLNER: Yeah. It will just take me a
7	second. There you go.
8	That is this project (displaying). It's the
9	entirety of this bluish area and the green area
10	(indicating). That's the entire project.
11	CHAIRMAN COX: All right. It'll allow
12	everybody to understand the scope of the project
13	we're talking about.
14	MR. WUELLNER: I'll try to catch back up with
15	it here.
16	CHAIRMAN COX: Did you have some further
17	information?
18	MR. WUELLNER: No.
19	CHAIRMAN COX: Okay. Any discussion from the

20	board, please?
21	MS. GREEN: No.
22	MR. BRUNSON: No.
23	CHAIRMAN COX: No discussion? Any public
24	comment on this agenda item, Taxiway F
25	construction?

1	(No public comment.)
2	CHAIRMAN COX: Seeing no queries from the
3	public side of the house, then we will I'll
4	entertain a motion for acceptance of this
5	resolution.
6	MS. GREEN: Make a motion we accept the
7	Resolution 2006-08 as recommended by Staff.
8	MR. BRUNSON: Second.
9	CHAIRMAN COX: We have a motion and a second.
10	Any further discussion?
11	(No further discussion.)
12	CHAIRMAN COX: All in favor, say aye.
13	MS. GREEN: Aye.
14	CHAIRMAN COX: Aye.
15	MR. BRUNSON: Aye.
16	CHAIRMAN COX: All opposed?
17	(No opposition.)
18	CHAIRMAN COX: There will be no opposed. The
19	ayes have it. Resolution 08 passed. Next agenda

20	item, please?
21	10.D FUTURE FBO - DISCUSSION
22	MR. WUELLNER: Okay. Next action item I have
23	for you, which is really more a discussion, we
24	continue to have strong interest in development of
25	second FBO facilities here at the airport. We

1	have a number of parties on a waiting list, or a
2	list of interest, for lack of better terms, in
3	developing a second FBO.
4	With the development of Taxiway Foxtrot and
5	the apron project down there, the area immediately
6	adjacent to the air traffic control tower and
7	immediately east of our maintenance facility, so
8	in the interior portion of the air of that
9	development is an area that's been reserved, at
10	least from a planning standpoint, to accommodate a
11	second FBO.
12	What I'd like to know is if, because we are
13	now on a again, on an actual construction time
14	line, if the Authority is interested at this point
15	in moving through that process to be open
16	dialogues with prospective second FBO operators
17	and and get those kinds of things out on the
18	table and and hopefully to some kind of a
19	project in the future.

20	It's I'll be honest with you, it's not
21	a you know, a two-month effort. It will
22	probably take several months to go through a
23	process of identifying eventually a preferred FBO
24	operator or or developer for this. And then
25	you'll have lease negotiations, and then

1	ultimately at some point, discussions on who's
2	capitalizing what portions of that project. And
3	that may very well be a part of the selection
4	criteria.
5	Eventually, I would think it would result in
6	some sort of an FBO project being developed and
7	moved forward over the next year or more and
8	result in an FBO location. When you factor
9	construction and things of that nature, it could
10	be, you know, one to two years or more till
11	something's actually in place.
12	We've had discussions individually over
13	over the years, actually, as to whether that
14	second FBO would be something that the Airport
15	Authority wanted to do or something that was, you
16	know, best left in the private sector. So,
17	perhaps the first question is, one, do you want to
18	move that kind of an effort forward?
19	Second question would be, if the interest is

20	there to move it forward, is that something best
21	left in the private sector, or is that something
22	the Airport Authority had a genuine interest in
23	moving forward as a as an Airport Authority
24	operation, keeping in mind there'll be you
25	know, there are absolutely some some positives

1	and negatives to both decisions.
2	CHAIRMAN COX: Right.
3	MR. WUELLNER: And then if a decision is to
4	go private sector, which I'm not presupposing, but
5	in the event it is, perhaps some direction to
6	Staff to begin developing a a criteria to
7	solicit letters of interest or statements of
8	qualifications or something else, some sort of
9	document along that line, moving forward, if it's
10	indeed going to be a private sector effort. So
11	CHAIRMAN COX: The
12	MR. WUELLNER: And and what speed
13	you're you know, what what pace the whole
14	thing might go on. It could go as as quickly
15	as maybe a three- or four-month effort to
16	ultimately identify somebody or as slowly as, we
17	don't want to deal with it now; we'll deal with it
18	next year, or another year for that matter.
19	CHAIRMAN COX: You you brought up two yer

20	good points. And I think one one point is,
21	which will lead us into the next one, is whether
22	or not the Airport Authority wants to become
23	involved in being an FBO.
24	And this is my personal opinion, but I've got
25	some issues with government competing with private

1	sector. And because there's such a tremendous
2	vantage on the advantage on the government
3	side, that it would be I mean, in my opinion, I
4	just I'm not willing to go there with the
5	airport being its own FBO, as opposed to
6	soliciting private soliciting or answering to
7	letters of interest for other private enterprises
8	coming into the airport. Your comments?
9	MS. GREEN: I coming from the nonpilot
10	standpoint here, I kind of agree with you that
11	the disadvantages or the unfairness going on, but
12	I also don't want to put any more tax dollars into
13	anything with us. I would like to see some
14	outside, private
15	CHAIRMAN COX: And I think that's part of
16	what
17	MS. GREEN: Yeah.
18	CHAIRMAN COX: And what the parameters that
19	Ed's looking for in letters of interest, if you

- will, is, hi, we're X, Y, Z corporation, here's --
- we've got financial backing up the, you know,
- ying-yang, and we'll -- we'll do our own thing or
- 23 we accept 50 percent of a grant from so and so,
- you know, whatever. But I think that's going to
- be part of the vetting process, if you will.

1	MR. WUELLNER: Yes.
2	CHAIRMAN COX: If the Airport Authority
3	reaches out to entities that might be interested
4	to send us a letter of interest and say, here's
5	what we'd like to do, or our thoughts on the
6	issue, you know. Mr. Brunson?
7	MR. BRUNSON: Second FBO. I talked to the
8	present FBO many months ago with discussion on
9	this and was very surprised at the answers I
10	received from them and how much they supported a
11	second FBO.
12	I agree with Susan (sic), that I think maybe
13	the investment is something that even though I
14	think there's some excellent points with the
15	Authority doing certain things, and they need to
16	be weighed, but just on the surface, I would
17	wish we would look into private investments to the
18	second FBO initially.
19	MR. WUELLNER: Okay.

20	CHAIRMAN COX: So and this we just need
21	to get this clear for the director is, I think the
22	direction, then, that the board members are
23	looking toward to go is private enterprise as
24	opposed to government enterprise; is that correct?
25	MS. GREEN: Well, go out there, cast your

nets, and find out. But I think you want -- do 1 2 you want a direction for a three-month or a 3 one-year? You're looking for a time frame. MR. WUELLNER: Yeah. I think initially, I 4 5 don't know that you have to decide absolutely --6 CHAIRMAN COX: True. MR. WUELLNER: -- today which way it goes. 7 CHAIRMAN COX: True. 8 9 MR. WUELLNER: But if the -- if the interest is definitely not absolute that it's the Authority 10 doing it --11 CHAIRMAN COX: Very good point. Right. 12 MR. WUELLNER: -- then we can begin a process 13 over the next several months to -- first effort 14 would be we'd internally try to create some 15 16 criteria that we could bring back to you folks 17 and -- and further, you know, refine into something that would be meaningful and represents 18

what your vision is of a second FBO in going out

19

- and soliciting interest.
- 21 Then that would come back and -- and be
- evaluated by, I would suspect Staff and the
- 23 Authority --
- 24 CHAIRMAN COX: Right.
- MR. WUELLNER: -- and some -- some criteria

- 1 matched and -- and eventually at least a short
- 2 list kind of a mentality established.
- 3 CHAIRMAN COX: In your best guess, if we cast
- 4 the net, so to speak, are we looking at -- let's
- 5 say if we -- blue sky effort, we solicit letters
- of interest and it's presented in maybe let's say,
- 7 okay, 30 days, 60 days, whatever, are we looking
- 8 at 10 letters, 20 letters, 5 letters? What --
- 9 what are your -- what's your best guess?
- 10 MR. WUELLNER: To -- to be fair, if -- if you
- don't spend the front-end effort in developing
- what you want out of the second FBO --
- 13 CHAIRMAN COX: Good point.
- MR. WUELLNER: -- that you're going to end up
- with a very --
- 16 CHAIRMAN COX: A hundred letters.
- MR. WUELLNER: Hundreds.
- 18 CHAIRMAN COX: Yeah, okay.
- MR. WUELLNER: Potentially that.

20	CHAIRMAN COX: All right.
21	MR. WUELLNER: If if you refine that
22	and and openly discuss in your solicitation the
23	level of investment, your expectations for for
24	what they do on this field, you will refine that
25	dramatically down to those who fit that fit

1 that criteria. The "one size fits all" approach to this 2 3 is -- is probably the least productive, and you're going to find yourself mismatched with -- with 4 firms with the financial capability but not the --5 CHAIRMAN COX: I mean, I --6 7 MR. WUELLNER: -- don't match. CHAIRMAN COX: Once again, personal opinion, 8 but having flown into lots of different places, 9 I -- I don't think that we're looking for the type 10 of an FBO that services the same FBOs that you 11 might find in -- in category 10 cities and 12 category 10 -- I'll -- I'll change that phrase --13 very, very, very large cities, you know, I mean 14 with hundreds of jets a day coming in. So --15 16 MR. WUELLNER: We have different needs. I 17 mean --CHAIRMAN COX: Right. 18

MR. WUELLNER: -- that -- that's a part of

19

20	what you're going to have to wrestle with in
21	developing the criteria.
22	CHAIRMAN COX: Good point. So, any ideas?
23	MR. WUELLNER: We don't mind and from a
24	Staff perspective, we certainly don't mind putting
25	some of that down and and then bring that back.

1	And then, of course, you know, you go with it
2	where you want.
3	But let me just get the get the some
4	some thought provokers, if nothing else, on the
5	table in those ideas. And you may not want to
6	ascribe criteria to all the things that we might
7	even suggest. And at the same point, you may have
8	ideas that we haven't come up with and and need
9	to be addressed in the solicitation.
10	MS. GREEN: And I know Mr. Brunson's one
11	step at least one step ahead of me. But I'd
12	like to speak to our current FBO, too, just to see
13	their insight, and I have not done that. My
14	fault. But I'd like to do that.
15	MR. WUELLNER: I don't think there's anything
16	to be gained by being exclusionary in in how
17	you go about developing what's what's in the
18	interest of the overall airport community.
19	It's a it's a very important decision and

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20	it's a very important revenue production project
21	for the airport over time. So, it it bears
22	paying attention to and being
23	MS. GREEN: We want to we want to
24	complement. That's the whole point. We want to

make this as efficient as possible and complement.

1 So, I think we need to work together. CHAIRMAN COX: Well, and -- and one of the 2 3 bullets points here is fundamental direction to Staff. So, they're looking for some direction 4 from us at this point to say, okay -- well, I 5 mean, do you want just some basic parameters on --6 7 that we'd like to --8 MR. WUELLNER: I mean, I think what I've heard, and you can confirm this or, you know, 9 modify it as you -- as you see fit here, but --10 but the general leaning is toward private sector. 11 The -- the pace, you know, is probably less 12 important than getting it right. However, moving 13 it forward is not a bad idea. And that you 14 probably would look to us to -- to start the 15 16 discussion for it. If that's what I think I 17 heard. It may have been what I said instead of what you heard. That may have been where I heard 18 19 it.

- 20 CHAIRMAN COX: I'm not sure I heard -- I'm
 21 not sure I heard what you heard what you said.
 22 MS. GREEN: I think we are looking toward the
 23 private enterprise -24 CHAIRMAN COX: Yes.
 25 MS. GREEN: And -- and to look at that, I
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think we're trying to complement what we have, so 1 obviously we're not going to the category 10 --2 3 CHAIRMAN COX: Right. MS. GREEN: -- airports. And I was going to 4 5 ask Mr. Slingluff -- and I'll talk to you afterwards, but -- maybe Wednesday afternoon, just 6 for my edification, that I would like to see what 7 8 your thoughts are or Galaxy's thoughts are so we can complement what we're looking at. But that 9 doesn't have to weigh on what you're doing. 10 CHAIRMAN COX: I -- I know that a year ago or 11 a year and a half ago, I mean, I know there was 12 some interest expressed by some FBOs. Do we 13 currently have a list of letters? 14 MR. WUELLNER: We -- we maintain a list right 15 16 now. The level --17 CHAIRMAN COX: Yeah, I understand. MR. WUELLNER: -- of those would be people we 18

directly provide -- it's more like a bidder's list

19

20	in that we we have basic information from them.
21	and we'll certainly provide them with a direct
22	mailing information, but you would also solicit
23	publicly those those things and anybody else
24	that was there. So, it's not meant to be
25	inclusionary (sic) or exclusionary in terms

1 CHAIRMAN COX: So saying -- I don't know. 2 MR. WUELLNER: We probably --3 CHAIRMAN COX: What kind of a time frame 4 would we be --5 MR. WUELLNER: Five -- four or five, maybe or 6 so on the -- our waiting list. CHAIRMAN COX: So, within -- within the time 7 parameters of the next meeting, would we be able 8 to be presented with a list of possible or --9 10 MR. WUELLNER: I'm not sure that would --11 CHAIRMAN COX: Letters? MR. WUELLNER: Frankly, I don't see that 12 being productive. What I -- what I think you --13 MS. GREEN: A couple of months? 14 MR. WUELLNER: -- need to do is -- is develop 15 16 what you want out of it and then go out and ask. 17 MR. BRUNSON: We need a vision. MR. WUELLNER: I think you're going the wrong 18 direction if you don't. 19

- MS. GREEN: Yeah.
- MR. WUELLNER: Or you're going to have a task
- that's -- it's -- you're going to be in that
- apples and oranges, basically fruit salad, trying
- to pick out the grapes.
- 25 CHAIRMAN COX: Right on. But we don't -- we

1 don't need any motion on this because --2 MR. WUELLNER: No. 3 CHAIRMAN COX: -- I mean, because you've 4 accepted. But I need to open up to public comment 5 because it's an agenda item. Any -- any public 6 comment on this particular agenda item? 7 Mr. RauHofer? 8 MR. RAUHOFER: I've seen -- oh, yeah. 9 MR. BRUNSON: Mr. Auctioneer. MR. RAUHOFER: Warren RauHofer, Ponte Vedra. 10 I've seen -- I've spent my whole life in aviation, 11 12 and I've seen some terrific FBOs move on with 13 another FBO on -- on the same station. They seem to get along, because one FBO will be after a 14 group of people in the market that the other FBO's 15 16 not interested in or not -- not interested, not 17 want to -- not -- not that interested in. Another thing is, on a positive side, we --18 you should remember that the way you structure 19

20	your your offer to to come aboard as the
21	second FBO will indicate how much positive things
22	you can get from it.
23	Number one, dedication of the building that
24	they're going to build. Normally an FBO will come
25	in and build its own building to suit itself and

its needs, and then they'll turn around and 1 2 they'll dedicate it back to the -- to the airport, 3 which -- which is huge for the airport because in case they leave, you -- you -- you have the 4 building. 5 The other things, of course, are -- are 6 collateral issues like maintenance. You know, if 7 8 the guy's got a -- the FBO has a fuel contractor that he comes in and he can -- he -- he develops a 9 situation with the fuel. There's all kinds of 10 real positive things that can go on by having a 11 12 second FBO. The -- the charge that you guys have is -- is 13 making sure that you frame your criteria in such a 14 way that you'll -- you'll attract serious people 15 16 and people that can -- that can give you what you 17 want. Thank you. CHAIRMAN COX: Thank you very much, sir. 18

19

Let's start on this side and -- yes, sir.

20	MR. THOMPSON: I know you almost said "the
21	short one over there," but John's one of the few
22	people that can make me feel short.
23	CHAIRMAN COX: Well, I I started to say
24	"the good-looking one," but I didn't want to hurt
25	his feelings.

1	MR. THOMPSON: Well, then there would have
2	been a rush and I would have been the only guy
3	left sitting. Mike Thompson, 895 Roberts Road.
4	I want to say by way of opening this
5	conversation that one of the bad dreams that I
6	have, one of the fears that I have when I wake up
7	in the morning is I'm going to come down here one
8	day and find out that some high-powered airport
9	has come in and hired away Ed and the entire staff
10	for, you know, much more money. Whatever the
11	reason would be, I would be absolutely
12	heartbroken. We are blessed at this airport.
13	Having said that, I would like for this board
14	to direct him on two things in the criteria. One
15	is that nothing happens to our great self-service
16	fuel prices.
17	CHAIRMAN COX: From here on out, right?
18	MR. THOMPSON: No, no. Got to go down from
10	here on out

- 20 CHAIRMAN COX: Oh, okay.
- MR. THOMPSON: But he's done great with that.
- 22 And it's --
- 23 CHAIRMAN COX: He has done.
- MR. THOMPSON: And if you check airnav.com
- and -- and those web sites dedicated to it, we get

1	a lot of positive comment, both with the fuel
2	prices and the facilities.
3	CHAIRMAN COX: Yeah.
4	MR. THOMPSON: The the restrooms get very
5	positive comment. And that may not be something
6	you think about if you don't fly, but going to a
7	nice bathroom when you're getting out of that
8	airplane after three hours is that's a
9	wonderful thing.
10	The other thing is we've got to make sure
11	that this operator keeps a couple of old beater
12	cars that run around for the guy that come in and
13	buy 25 gallons of fuel so they can go get some
14	seafood while they're here.
15	Thank you very much.
16	CHAIRMAN COX: Yes, sir. Thank you very
17	much. Mr. Roderick?
18	MR. RODERICK: I definitely support the
19	private sector. I having many years of

20	government work and having gone through
21	recontracting services that the government
22	previously did to the private sector, it's
23	unbelievable the savings and the quality that
24	improves. And and I don't that's not to say
25	that we don't have great public servants, but

1 it's -- I've seen that trend. 2 The second thing is, this can be done in a 3 complimentary fashion. We -- not only does he fuel jets, but I'm in the Coast Guard Auxiliary. 4 5 We walk in there and use the conference room. 6 It's very convenient for the county of this size. Those people are wonderful. They give us coffee. 7 8 He handles a great niche on this side of the highway. 9 10 And Mr. Jones, his concern for noise, smaller planes, little piston airplanes, things like that 11 would be better served on this side for the 12 community and for them. So, those kind of things 13 14 can be worked out very well. CHAIRMAN COX: Thank you. Mr. Martinelli? 15 16 MR. MARTINELLI: The approach that you all 17 discussed, I think, is a good approach. I would 18 suggest also that in scoping or specifying what

you want the second FBO to be and to do, don't

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20	overlook the needs of the little private pilot
21	here with an airplane that can't get service and
22	has to go to other airports to get maintenance
23	service on his airplane.
24	So, hopefully that's a niche that can be
25	filled by the second FBO. And I would suggest

1	that maybe you consult the pilots and make sure
2	that they have representation in those respects,
3	as well.
4	CHAIRMAN COX: Well, part of those concerns
5	is answered in the Minimum Commercial Operating
6	Standards, anyway, so and that will be
7	that's a good point, though. Thanks for your
8	comments. Any other comments on the agenda item?
9	(No further comments.)
10	CHAIRMAN COX: Well, I think you have some
11	direction, Ed. Is that what you're looking for?
12	MR. WUELLNER: Yes, sir. Thank you.
13	CHAIRMAN COX: And we're just moving on to
14	housekeeping items then.
15	11 HOUSEKEEPING ITEMS
16	MR. WUELLNER: There's a couple of things to
17	point out. That public wireless access on airport
18	property is is finally available. So, tenants
19	who have wireless capable computers can now access

20	the internet on on the property.
21	Also, the industrial park study that the
22	Airport Authority's participating in needs a
23	would like to have, anyway, a board member
24	participate in that short-list committee. They
25	have solicited consultants to conduct that study,

1	and they are trying to whittle that down to a
2	couple of companies to
3	CHAIRMAN COX: How many months do you foresee
4	that being?
5	MR. WUELLNER: Actually, they've already got
6	the the responses in hand, and they're just
7	there's probably a week's worth of effort, if
8	that.
9	CHAIRMAN COX: I'll volunteer to do that.
10	MR. WUELLNER: Just over the course of a
11	week.
12	CHAIRMAN COX: I'll do that.
13	MR. WUELLNER: Okay. We'll we'll let them
14	know. Because I think we could probably have you
15	the solicitation results in the next day or so.
16	CHAIRMAN COX: Okay.
17	MR. WUELLNER: And that's really all I had
18	for housekeeping.
19	12 PUBLIC COMMENT

20	CHAIRMAN COX: Open the floor up to general
21	public comments. Mr. Hickox.
22	MR. HICKOX: Wayne Hickox, 881 Queen Road
23	again.
24	I would like to urge the chairman and the
25	rest of the board to please do start a practice of

1	reporting regularly on your activities. We've
2	tried to do some of that. But one of the things
3	that was discussed earlier, of course, was a
4	problem. And I think it would serve the board's
5	interest well. I hope you do respond to this. I
6	think you should. And so forth. But I think the
7	public would have an awful lot of the questions
8	answered if we knew on a regular basis what you
9	were doing.
10	I know what you're doing, and wherever
11	possible, without without having my own show at
12	the present time, I get these things out. But I'm
13	only one person.
14	All of this other media that you were talking
15	about, the regular general circulation newspaper,
16	the peripheral suburban papers, if you can get
17	some kind of release in the wake of your meeting
18	of those things that you are working on, why you
19	think they're important, but make very good

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20	articles and very good reading. Because one of
21	the things I have heard about the meetings is it's
22	amazing how many new people don't even know you've
23	got an airport here. They haven't been on U.S. 1,
24	and they don't see it.

It's worth more than that. We all know how

1 important it is, and I think it would help the 2 present case. 3 CHAIRMAN COX: Good point. Thank you, sir. Any other general public comments? Yes, ma'am. 4 5 Ms. Barrera. MS. BARRERA: Kelly Barrera, Ponte Vedra. I 6 would just add on to what Wayne had to say, 7 8 because when I've been out in the public, a lot of people do not realize what a valuable resource 9 10 this airport is or how much it impacts, the economic impact of the airport to the community. 11 And so, I think Wayne is exactly right. 12 Any -- any PR that we could do to get that 13 information out -- they don't realize how they 14 personally benefit from the airport. They don't 15 understand that the emergency services that are 16 17 based here. They don't understand the job 18 creation, the tax base, and the -- the extended

economic impact by people who do come in, who do

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- stay overnight, who do eat dinner.
- 21 And so anything like that, that -- that
- you're able to do, or in the future is able to do,
- I would wholly support. And I agree with
- Mr. Hickox on that.
- 25 CHAIRMAN COX: Thank you.

- 1 MR. HICKOX: By the way as a volunteer,
- 2 anybody that needs help with contacts -- Ed
- 3 already knows this -- I'll be happy to help you at
- 4 any time. That's always been true.
- 5 CHAIRMAN COX: Thank you, sir. Mr. Jones.
- 6 MR. JONES: Joe Jones. I just had a
- 7 question. You know, at one time you talked about
- 8 putting a park out towards -- to the south so you
- 9 could look at -- is that still in your plans?
- 10 CHAIRMAN COX: Yes.
- 11 MS. GREEN: Oh, yeah.
- MR. JONES: That's going in the south
- development plans?
- 14 CHAIRMAN COX: That's one of our primary
- issues right now.
- 16 MR. JONES: Okay.
- 17 CHAIRMAN COX: And it's a really nice little
- 18 area, so...
- MR. JONES: Okay. Well, I was just -- you

- know, I seen how you got the taxiway there.
- 21 CHAIRMAN COX: Right.
- MR. JONES: Are you crossing the taxiway,
- 23 then, or is it going to come in from the other --
- I'm just -- because people ask me. I don't like
- 25 to tell -- say things I don't know.

1	MR. WUELLNER: While it's not designed, it's
2	designed to complement the marshfront portion
3	that that separates the the two
4	neighborhoods there.
5	CHAIRMAN COX: Uh-huh.
6	MR. JONES: That's why I was just curious
7	there.
8	MR. WUELLNER: That that's the general
9	area of where that's supposed to go.
10	MR. JONES: I didn't know.
11	MR. WUELLNER: It's not designed or anything
12	yet. It's just kind of conceptually laid out.
13	MR. JONES: At one time, we you know, we
14	talked about you were going to do that buffer
15	averaging and stuff like that
16	MR. WUELLNER: Yeah.
17	MR. JONES: and things like that and how
18	that was going to affect the park area, but that
19	fell inside your buffer that you couldn't use it

- for a park anymore. That's why I was curious --
- MR. WUELLNER: Right.
- MR. JONES: -- how that affected, you know,
- what you have going.
- MR. WUELLNER: Well, and again, it's not laid
- out, but the -- the concept is to take the buffer

1	as it ends up approved and use the waikway, for
2	lack of better terms, to delineate that usable
3	wetland area.
4	MR. JONES: Okay.
5	MR. WUELLNER: Because we have issues
6	MR. JONES: You still have a park going in
7	there. Because I knew what
8	MR. WUELLNER: That's the intent.
9	MR. JONES: you can't use that as a park
10	either, so
11	MR. WUELLNER: That's the intent. It is the
12	intent, and it would be outside the buffer, yeah.
13	CHAIRMAN COX: Any other public comment?
14	(No further public comment.)
15	CHAIRMAN COX: We'll move to comments from
16	board members. Mr. Brunson, please?
17	13.A MR. RANDY BRUNSON
18	MR. BRUNSON: The only a couple of little
19	things. Wayne, I agree with you a hundred

20 perce	nt. And before	e you leave	tonight, I'd	l like
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- 21 to chat with you just a moment, if you may.
- MR. HICKOX: Sure.
- MR. BRUNSON: And -- but I will say that in
- all my meetings I go to, one very recently one was
- 25 the St. Johns Vision. And at the EDCs and the

1	Intergovernmental and the the MPO First Coast
2	and the Chamber of Commerce, I venture to say that
3	this airport comes up, especially about the
4	industrial park study. And that was brought up at
5	the Vision. And so I think we do need to expand a
6	little bit on what we're doing and and
7	everything.
8	The only and this is a real little thing
9	I'd like to say. Next we'll be voting in
10	November. So, good luck to all of the candidates
11	that are running for the Airport Authority. I
12	hope the county will make good decisions.
13	And having said that, we all have to make a
14	living. And from time to time, some people have
15	to miss meetings. And we understand that. But
16	the people that are on the board that are able to,
17	when it becomes time for budgeting and passing
18	about the rollback rate, and some of these hard
19	decisions that we have to make, if we could

20	schedule to attend every meeting, especially at
21	that time, I would appreciate it, instead of three
22	people sitting here making the decisions.
23	And I think the airport is doing a great job,
24	and and I hope we continue on the way we're
25	going.

1	CHAIRMAN COX: Thank you, sir. Ms. Green
2	13.B MS. SUZANNE GREEN
3	MS. GREEN: I just want to bring up what I
4	had mentioned briefly earlier that you're going to
5	add to the committee reports. I'm very excited
6	about the St. Johns County Aerospace. I'm going
7	to be pretty active in that just because I'm the
8	one with younger children on this board. And I
9	think that's great for our future marketing and
10	for the kids out there.
11	We're not talking kids. We're speaking about
12	kids that are 14, 15. They're voting in a couple
13	of years, and we're trying to indoctrinate them
14	into, one, a career, and two, into aerospace and
15	aviation. And the market's out there. I mean,
16	they want it.
17	So, I'm going to try and do as much as I can
18	to get them into seminars and internships that
19	we're trying to do for them. We're working with

20	UNF and other Grumman's been wonderful helping
21	out with that. So, I'm looking forward to that
22	quite a bit. And I think this airport
23	Mr. Wuellner was there and Mr. Cox was there
24	but we're going to do everything we can. We're
25	trying to make everything available for them. I

- think they have what, 50? What? 1 2 MR. WUELLNER: Eighty-seven students. 3 CHAIRMAN COX: Right. MS. GREEN: Eighty-seven? I mean, it's huge. 4 5 I mean, it's -- it's really great. They're overflowing. So, I'm looking forward to working 6 with that. 7 8 CHAIRMAN COX: I think there was a number thrown out, it was 130-something volunteers -- I 9 mean, volunteered for the program. And, you know, 10 they have to schedule -- so there's -- you know, 11
- have to be a volunteer in this program. They
 don't assign this class. So, these -- these kids
 are very, very -- very up on the issues. And

we've got a bunch of really brilliant -- and you

- they -- as Ed mentioned before, he went into one
- of the classes, and these guys were talking rocket
- science --

12

19 MR. WUELLNER: Literally.

- 20 CHAIRMAN COX: All kind of analysis. And
- 21 they had to launch a rocket ship into space and
- with a payload and like, yeah.
- MS. GREEN: It's not just a couple of
- classes, either.
- 25 CHAIRMAN COX: Right. Yeah.

MS. GREEN: We're -- we're speaking a 1 2 four-year curriculum that they have to follow. 3 CHAIRMAN COX: It's an academy. That's exactly -- that's the way they're running it. 4 So -- and it's a good academy. It's for any --5 any school student in St. Johns County can go to 6 7 that. 8 MS. GREEN: Actually, you can come from out of county if you want. 9 CHAIRMAN COX: That's a good point. 10 11 MS. GREEN: I asked that. CHAIRMAN COX: Right. 12 13 MS. GREEN: It's because we had a number of kids. But you have to attend St. Augustine High 14 full time. And you can get the deferral, but you 15 16 have to be a student. 17 MR. WUELLNER: And the other point -- it probably wasn't brought up by anybody today, is 18

that the relevance of what they're teaching them

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20	actually satisfies first-year aerospace
21	engineering requirements
22	CHAIRMAN COX: At a college level.
23	MR. WUELLNER: at an accredited college
24	MS. GREEN: And they also spoke that it would
25	save in costs?

1	MR. WUELLNER: Upwards of \$70,000 in some
2	cases.
3	CHAIRMAN COX: And and just to add on to
4	what you're talking about, the Aerospace Academy,
5	some of the supporters of that academy are
6	Embry-Riddle, FCCJ, Northrop Grumman
7	MS. GREEN: UNF.
8	CHAIRMAN COX: UNF. I mean, we've got
9	MR. WUELLNER: JU.
10	MS. GREEN: JU.
11	CHAIRMAN COX: the Airport Authority, and
12	they've got and they've got a really huge depth
13	in quality of people helping and participating in
14	that as the advisory committee.
15	Mr. Gorman's not here. Mr. George is not
16	here.
17	13.E CHAIRMAN BOB COX
18	CHAIRMAN COX: Just one comment from me.
19	We've had and for most of the people that

20	are in the room here are very, you know, intensely
21	interested in what happens around the airport,
22	whether it's a negative or positive sense, but I
23	don't think anybody would disagree that every one
24	of us in this room wants to watch out for the
25	security of the airport, regardless of what our

1	political concerns are outside of that.
2	We've had several issues in the last several
3	months where we've had I won't call it security
4	breaches, but we've had some questionable
5	incidents around the perimeter of the field.
6	So, I would like everybody, if you wouldn't
7	mind, spread it around to the to S.A.P.A., the
8	pilots and public citizens, if you see anything
9	suspicious going on around the perimeter of this
10	airport, please call either the airport you
11	know, the director's office or the police or
12	whatever it is, because we've had some interesting
13	incidents.
14	I mean, anything suspicious, people getting
15	out with telescopes, taking pictures, you know,
16	people trying to sneak in over the fence.
17	Whatever it is, just just be a good citizen
18	about it and try to protect our community. And
19	that's all I have.

20	14 NEXT MEETING DATE
21	CHAIRMAN COX: We need to set a next meeting
22	date. November 20th is I'm not going to be in
23	town. I was wondering if the 13th will work out
24	for y'all.
25	MR. WUELLNER: Three days before

- 1 Thanksgiving, the 20th? So, the week before is
- 2 probably better in terms of attendance.
- 3 CHAIRMAN COX: I'm sorry?
- 4 MR. WUELLNER: The 13th's probably --
- 5 CHAIRMAN COX: 13th?
- 6 MR. WUELLNER: Probably is a better date.
- 7 The only -- the only thing is it's only a couple
- 8 of weeks away, really.
- 9 CHAIRMAN COX: Right.
- MR. WUELLNER: So, it's really up to you.
- 11 You know, last -- I don't know if it was last
- year, but in previous years, we considered
- combining it, taking it after Thanksgiving, and
- then not having a later December meeting, but
- that's -- you know, think about it.
- 16 CHAIRMAN COX: The -- yeah, the issues are,
- is we're -- we're approaching an election time
- frame and we've got a lot of stuff coming up in
- 19 the next -- I don't know. My personal preference

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20	would be not to combine the two meetings, but if
21	everybody wants to move in that direction, that's
22	fine. And
23	MR. WUELLNER: We can be ready with an agenda

25 CHAIRMAN COX: Well, you know, we've got --

on the 13th, so...

- 1 two of the members are missing. It may be -- it
- 2 may be a better idea to solicit dates by e-mail
- 3 or -- instead of deciding this evening.
- 4 MR. WUELLNER: You want to tentatively put it
- 5 on the 13th?
- 6 CHAIRMAN COX: Let's tentatively do that.
- 7 And then --
- 8 MS. GREEN: For whatever it's worth, I'm in
- 9 trial that day, so that means I could be here or
- 10 could not be here, depending on Judge Alexander.
- 11 CHAIRMAN COX: Just do a really good job.
- Take this with you.
- MR. BRUNSON: I'll go with you and help you.
- 14 MS. GREEN: Thank you.
- 15 CHAIRMAN COX: We wouldn't see her the next
- 16 month, then.
- 17 MS. GREEN: Post my bail for me.
- 18 CHAIRMAN COX: Okay. Well, let's just
- tentatively put it as the 13th, and then we can
