AIRPORT AUTHORITY REGULAR MEETING - OCTOBER 17, 2005 9 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Bjorn? 1 2 (Not present.) 3 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: He's not here. 4 Mr. Burnett. 5 6.F. - AUTHORITY ATTORNEY MR. BURNETT: I've got a few things that I'll 6

1 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Yeah, he added four more lines, right? 2 MR. COX: Some barbed wire in there. 3 4 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Yeah. What I was attempting to accomplish is the other one showed 5 every month in comparison to the same month the 6 7 previous year, but it didn't let me know a summary of how we were doing year to date. 8 9 And I think that the top line -- if he's not 10 here, I can make it what I want, so the top line 11 is the 150,000 operations, which is what we had put as the addendum to the Master Plan, you know, 12 13 that we might hit that. 14 The line down with the pink squares is what was in the Master Plan, you know, as the 15 prediction, you know, for St. Augustine. So, you 16 17 can see that we are well ahead of the prediction. 18 And the dashed line, 2003, one of the dashed lines, looks like we will have the 2003 and 2004, 19 20 you know, also. So, we're -- we're better than we 21 had forecasted.

GORMAN: Confusion. 14 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: As a matter of fact, I 15 understand the -- Mr. Dixon, the chairman, was 16 taken over my absence, wanted to know who was the 17 chairman, and they had to pull out the minutes out 18 to show that he was elected. And he said, "Well, I wasn't there at that 19 20 meeting." And -- and they had to show him that he was there at that meeting. So, it was a little 21 22 loosey-goosey, but we'll take care of that. 23 MR. COOPER: All right. Project updates. 24 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Before we get into that, is 25 everyone, you know, aware that Mr. Wuellner is not

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1 feeling too well? And so, he's not going to be 2 with us today. And we have his able-bodied 3 assistant that's going to fill in. So, how is he doing, by the way? 4 5 MR. COOPER: Actually, I talked to him this morning. He's feeling fine, but the doctor told 6 7 him not to come back till toward the middle --8 toward the end of this week, and he's obeying doctor's orders for a change. 9 10 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. 11 MR. COOPER: So, he's fine. 12 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: So, he didn't say that the doctor told him not to come back until after the 13 workshop that's coming up. 14 MS. GREEN: I'm sure he took his lessons from 15 you, right? He's obeying the doctor's order? 16 MR. COOPER: Exactly. 17 18 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Exactly, right. Okay. 19 8.- PROJECT UPDATES 20 MR. COOPER: Land acquisition, Araquay Park.

21

Did you have something you wanted to talk about?

- Or, no, it wasn't on land acquisition, or was it?
- MR. BURNETT: Well, partly, I guess when we
- get to that slide later, I'll talk.
- 25 MR. COOPER: Okay.

- 1 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Yeah. This slide just goes
- 2 through I think all of them.
- 3 MR. COOPER: All right. Yeah, I'm sorry.
- 4 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: All right.
- 5 MR. COOPER: Bump through this.
- 6 MR. BURNETT: Okay. The --
- 7 MR. COOPER: All right. The last piece of
- 8 property, we will take possession of that by the
- 9 end of this month, which is a couple of more
- weeks. And there's nothing that's happened that's
- changing that, and so things should move fairly
- rapidly after that.
- We were expecting some delay, based on some
- things we had to do with the county, but Doug has

15 been on top of that. And you wanted to talk about 16 that? MR. BURNETT: Yeah. What's going on is we 17 originally filed a -- and if I could borrow your 18 pointer for just a second, that might help. 19 We filed an application to vacate the plat, 20 21 which y'all are all familiar with the property, but for the public, to vacate the plat of this 22 area east of -- everything east of Casa Cola Way. 23 24 And so -- not only to vacate the lots in the plat, 25 but also to vacate the streets within the plats, AIRPORT AUTHORITY REGULAR MEETING - OCTOBER 17, 2005 15 that this would essentially become one large 1 2 parcel of property with one parcel I.D. number. 3 We've gone through a quick round of Staff 4 comments, mostly related to -- and this was filing 5 an application with the Board of County 6 Commissioners at St. Johns County. In responding

to their comments, they were technical in nature,

8 which we quickly got through. And the plat 9 vacation, the first hearing is scheduled for Thursday, this Thursday, October the 20th, before 10 11 the Planning and Zoning Agency at 1:30. 12 After that hearing, the -- or at that 13 hearing, the Planning and Zoning Agency will get 14 the opportunity to review the application to 15 vacate the plat and recommend approval or denial to the Board of County Commissioners. And it will 16 17 go on to the Board of County Commissioners, 18 presumably in November, potentially in December, 19 but that would only be from a scheduling standpoint for the Board of County Commissioners, 20 21 not from a standpoint of anything that we need to 22 do. Because it's ready to go on to their level. 23 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Are we asking them to 24 vacate Estrella, also? Weren't we going to use 25 that as a public thoroughfare to those hangars?

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1 MR. BURNETT: We're -- we're asking them to 2 vacate essentially everything east of Casa Cola 3 Way. So, the -- the lots and the roadways. So, 4 Indian Bend, Araquay Avenue, and -- and Pine Ridge 5 Road, to the extent they're within this boundary. 6 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: But Estrella --MR. COOPER: They will vacate Estrella, but 7 8 that doesn't preclude us from using it. It will be internal to the airport as -- as other roadways 9 10 inside the airport we use today, such as Hawkeye 11 View Lane and this road out here. 12 And parts of Estrella will be eliminated, anyway, from approximately where the turn is into 13 14 the hangar rows K, L, and M -- or J, K, L, and M. 15 Beyond that, that will -- will go away. So, it's 16 easier just to go ahead and vacate it from like 17 the other ones east of Casa Cola. 18 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: My only concern, and maybe 19 it's not a concern, is that once they vacate it, then it's up to us to maintain it. 20 21 MR. COOPER: That's true. 22 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Which means that we're

- picking up responsibility for maintaining a road
- 24 that is in existence that we want to keep in
- 25 existence.

- MR. COOPER: The -- and also will be internal
 to the fence line of the airport and enables us to
 do some changes, modifications, and also not to
- 4 have to do the same landscaping requirements and
- 5 setbacks, because it's internal to our property.
- 6 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. Yes, sir?
- 7 MR. GORMAN: How -- it would be advantageous
- 8 to be able to properly fence this. Hasn't there
- 9 been an issue with vandalism and --
- MR. COOPER: Yes.
- MR. GORMAN: -- and all manner of things
- going on in that area now?
- 13 MR. COOPER: Right.
- MR. GORMAN: So, as soon as it's fenced as
- airport property, it will be -- that liability

- 16 would be gone? 17 18 19
 - MR. COOPER: Yes. Well --
 - MR. BURNETT: Maybe not gone --
- MS. GREEN: Helped.
- 20 MR. BURNETT: -- but substantially reduced,
- 21 obviously.
- 22 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Does the Master Plan call
- 23 for it to be fenced on both sides all the way down
- 24 to the gate where you go in to K, L, and M?
- 25 MR. COOPER: The -- the Master Plan doesn't

- 1 address that issue, but that's the plan.
- 2 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay.
- 3 MR. COOPER: And the discussions recently was
- 4 whether to put, for example, the maintenance
- 5 facility inside or outside the fence, and -- and
- we're going to put it outside the fence. 6
- 7 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. All right.
- 8 MR. BURNETT: The other -- the other thing

9 that's been going on contemporaneous with this is 10 we filed an application to rezone all of this 11 property. And I guess the first -- the first 12 question that most people would have that are in 13 the know is, why would you rezone property that's already zoned airport development? Because many 14 of these lots in 2004 were administratively 15 16 rezoned to airport development because they were owned by the airport at the time. 17 18 And so, when the county did its administrative rezoning, it -- well, although all 19 of the county's administrative rezoning didn't go 20 21 through, this part did go through. And what we're doing is rezoning the parcels 22 that are RS-3, or mobile home, to airport 23 24 development, which are the properties that are 25 either have been acquired through the eminent

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domain proceedings or -- and I guess a greater

- 2 number of them are the parcels that have been
- acquired by the airport voluntarily over the last
- 4 year, the year and a half.
- 5 And so, now that, through the vacation, we
- 6 will have one giant legal description of one giant
- 7 parcel, the entire parcel is the subject of the --
- 8 of the rezoning application that would be heard
- 9 after the plat vacation, and it would rezone the
- 10 entire parcel to airport development.
- 11 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay.
- MR. BURNETT: So, that's what's going on
- right now.
- 14 MR. COX: Mr. Maguire --
- 15 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Yeah.
- MR. COX: Mr. Maguire is here if you want to
- 17 have him talk.
- 18 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. We'll get him after
- these.
- MR. COX: Okay.
- MR. COOPER: You want to go through these
- before you --

- 23 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Yeah. We'll go -- after we
- 24 get through with the outstanding projects, then
- 25 we'll --

- 1 MR. COOPER: Okay.
- 2 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: -- ask Mr. Maguire.
- 3 MR. COOPER: On the -- the final round of
- 4 bidding for houses to be removed, as I understand,
- 5 we -- we did not receive any bids on this final
- 6 bunch of them.
- 7 Apron design, Andrew, would you like to
- 8 address this issue?
- 9 MR. HOLESKO: The apron -- is that on? Okay.
- The apron design for the south development
- area has two components, what we have identified
- as Bid Schedule A and Bid Schedule B. Bid
- 13 Schedule A involves utility relocation and tree
- removal and tree relocation.
- We had a meeting here in this room last week

to discuss some more professional opinions on 16 17 proposed tree relocation, and we had agreed last 18 week to also seek a third opinion to gain some 19 more specific information on the precare relocation and postcare of the trees that we're 20 looking to relocate. We expect that to happen in 21 22 the next ten days. 23 At that point, Bid Schedule A is going to be 24 on the street. So, it will be on the street in 25 November. That's going to be the first phase.

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1	The second phase, which will be the actual
2	construction of the taxiway and apron, we expect
3	that to be advertised sometime in December or
4	January. We know that Mr. Wuellner has been very
5	actively talking with his FAA contacts, letting
6	them know his very strong desire to receive
7	funding for that project early in 2006. And we're
8	going to have a bid schedule ready to meet the

- 9 construction schedule for the Authority.
- 10 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Yes, sir.
- 11 MR. GORMAN: Is that the latest?
- MR. HOLESKO: That is not the latest.
- MR. GORMAN: That's the -- yeah, okay.
- MR. HOLESKO: That's fine.
- MR. GORMAN: We have a little --
- MR. HOLESKO: Correct.
- MR. GORMAN: -- few itches and --
- MR. HOLESKO: That's right.
- MR. GORMAN: -- some cutouts.
- MR. HOLESKO: That is -- that is not the
- 21 latest layout right there; that's correct.
- There's a few items that have changed versus what
- you see on screen there right now.
- 24 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Would it be too difficult
- 25 for Staff to put together a -- I'm going to call

22

1 it a PERT chart, a chart of schedule of events?

- 2 In other words, I hear that we're ready to go out
- 3 to bidding now in November, December, and I was
- 4 always under the impression we were going to be
- 5 moving dirt, you know, in October.
- 6 So, I would like to have something from the
- 7 staff that says, you know, if we go out for bids
- 8 here, then here's when those bids will come back
- 9 in; here's when we will award the contract; here's
- typically when they will start; here's when --
- MR. GORMAN: You mean, get like a Gant
- timeline chart?
- 13 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Yeah, a Gant. Yeah.
- 14 Right.
- MR. GORMAN: That's fine.
- MR. COOPER: Also note this, that you would
- 17 like a timeline.
- 18 MS. GREEN: Uh-huh.
- 19 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: I just want your best
- guess. I just don't want to sit here in -- in
- April and say, well, you know, we've just about
- got the bids done, you know, because -- because
- 23 we're --

- MR. COOPER: Okay.
- 25 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Time's awasting.

- 1 MR. COOPER: Right.
- 2 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. Thanks.
- 3 MR. COOPER: Anything else?
- 4 MR. HOLESKO: No. I'm just assuming that the
- 5 next one is going to be -- your next slide will be
- 6 hangar 8, 9, and 10. I just thought I'd stay
- 7 here.
- 8 MR. COOPER: Just stay here.
- 9 MR. HOLESKO: It's hangar 8, 9, and 10.
- MR. COOPER: Next project, hangar 8, 9, and
- 11 10.
- MR. HOLESKO: Hangar 8, 9, and 10 is
- advertised on the street. Tomorrow morning at 10
- a.m., we're having a prebid meeting right here in
- this room. We've had rather strong demand for
- plans and specifications so far. I think we have

17 approximately nine sets of plans out at this time. 18 Cindy notified me that she received several 19 phone calls today from people that will be coming 20 tomorrow, several of which may even be flying in. 21 So, we'll have somewhere between 10 and a dozen 22 contractors here tomorrow morning to discuss the 23 prebid meeting. And the bids open on hangars 8, 9, and 10 on November 9th. So, it's on the street 24 25 and --AIRPORT AUTHORITY REGULAR MEETING - OCTOBER 17, 2005 24 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: And when will the bids be 1 2 placed with the --3 MR. HOLESKO: We hope to have a 4 recommendation of award for you in November, for

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- 5 your meeting in November. I understand that
- 6 there's was some -- may be some discussion today
- about when your Authority meeting is going to be 7
- at the end of November, early December. But we 8
- 9 should have that ready for your next Authority

10	meeting.
11	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. Good. And
12	construction time line from the time you award the
13	bid is a year?
14	MR. COOPER: No. No, no. It's less than
15	that.
16	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: I don't want to put words
17	in your mouth, but eleven months, ten months?
18	MR. HOLESKO: Six to nine, how about?
19	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Six to nine. Make a note
20	of that. That's good.
21	Anybody got any questions?
22	(No questions.)
23	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. Next?
24	MR. COOPER: Marketing and public relations.
25	A charter is coming in later this month. This

- 1 this came in last year, and it's the Georgia
- 2 Bulldogs flew in here for the -- for the Gator

- Bowl. They'll be coming in here shortly before
- 4 the end of the month, and so we'll have that same
- 5 process that we did. And hopefully, we can get a
- 6 little bit more public relations this year than we
- 7 did last year.
- 8 Of course, you also heard the air show is
- 9 still ongoing for next May. I guess the public
- relations on that should start probably after the
- first of the year. Generally, that gets real
- heavy in March when we start talking about air
- shows and advertising that.
- 14 LPA, are you -- you're developing -- or is
- 15 Phil developing that insert for the paper on the
- Master Plan?
- 17 MR. GOODE: Yes.
- MR. COOPER: All right. When that's being
- developed, that's going to be an insert which will
- 20 go into The St. Augustine Record, which is -- will
- give a nice synopsis of the Master Plan, the
- history, how we got there, and what we're looking
- at in the future. And it's -- it'll -- it'll

- 24 going in all of the papers.
- 25 That should happen as soon as we get the

- 1 finalized version of that and -- and you accept
- 2 the Master Plan. So, hopefully here in the next
- 3 couple of months, we'll be able to do that.
- 4 Certainly before the end of the year.
- 5 MS. GREEN: I have a question.
- 6 MR. COOPER: Yes.
- 7 MS. GREEN: When you said "all of the
- 8 papers," are we going to hit north county, too,
- 9 the Ponte Vedra Recorder and --
- MR. COOPER: At this point in time, the only
- discussions I've heard was for The St. Augustine
- Record. But I'll talk to Ed about maybe extending
- that.
- MS. GREEN: Yeah. I'd really like to get --
- because we get a lot of questions from north
- 16 county, and a lot of our corporate people come up

- that way. With the PGA, I think it would behooveus to get it in the Recorder and The Leader.
- 19 There's two papers up there that have a pretty
- 20 good circulation.
- 21 MR. COOPER: Right. Right.
- 22 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: We had talked to
- 23 Mr. Wuellner about, you know, once we have
- 24 approved the Master Plan, to take select groups
- 25 that might be more interested than -- than not and

- 1 have kind of an open house meeting down here, you
- 2 know, like all of the tenants on the -- on the
- 3 property and, you know, economic development and
- 4 some of the other ones we can actually lay out
- 5 what's been approved and where we're headed, so
- 6 that would fall in line with doing something up
- 7 there, too.
- 8 MR. COOPER: I have no new leases to bring to
- 9 you. We had hoped to be able to bring something

10 on the restaurant, but that's going to slide one 11 more meeting. CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Go ahead, Jack. Didn't you 12 13 have a question? MR. GORMAN: Considering the need and 14 15 considering the acute need, I've got to ask -- not 16 to be snide -- what's the holdup? Is there -- is 17 there a way to get someone in there in the next month or so, or do you think there's a problem, or 18 19 a conceivable problem, or will there be a holdup? 20 MR. COOPER: No. I -- I -- did we have 21 something on the agenda here for -- to discuss that? 22 MR. BURNETT: Yeah. The lease amendment? 23 24 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Yeah, there is a 25 restaurant/catering facility update --

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- 1 MR. COOPER: Yeah, okay.
- 2 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: -- as an action item.

3 There is an item there on --4 MR. GORMAN: Then --5 MR. COOPER: Okay. Yeah, we'll -- yeah, we will discuss it. 6 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. 7 MR. COOPER: But it's -- it is moving. 8 MR. GORMAN: Okay. 9 10 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. MR. COOPER: On the Airport Master Plan, the 11 12 final document has been transmitted to FAA and 13 FDOT. There were comments back from the FAA which was addressed by LPA. We haven't gotten the 14 15 final-final back from the FAA on that, but I don't 16 anticipate any problem there. 17 Once we get that back, it will come to you 18 for approval, and then Ed will prepare an agenda 19 item with the Board of County Commissioners to 20 make a presentation to the Board of County 21 Commissioners on the -- on the Master Plan. And then we'll transmit copies of the Master 22 23 Plan to various agencies, library, different departments in the county, the city, places where 24

copies of that will go.

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1	That's, again, just waiting on the final
2	document to come back so it can come to you.
3	Hopefully that will be at the next meeting
4	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay.
5	MR. COOPER: November meeting. At the
6	last board meeting, it had been suggested that we

17	MR. COOPER: I believe you have a copy of the

- appeal provision. The issue was that there was --
- let me see. There was -- there was no room in the
- agenda item for appeals.
- 21 MR. BURNETT: Yeah. There was -- if I could
- jump in and talk a little bit about it --
- 23 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay.
- MR. BURNETT: -- because I drafted quite a
- bit of the lease policy manual.

- 1 One of the things that had come up -- and --
- and I think that Mr. Gorman's initial request
- 3 related to going back to the -- the security and
- 4 access issue of if the executive director
- 5 determined -- made a determination related to
- 6 access on the airport, was there -- was there a
- 7 mechanism for folks to bring that to the
- 8 Authority.
- 9 And I guess this is carried over to the lease
- documents, and whether or not a tenant, if there's

11	some procedure in place for a tenant to say, "Hey,
12	I'd like to bring this issue up to the Airport
13	Authority."
14	And there was nothing in writing I guess
15	underlying. There's always the issue of folks can
16	come to the airport and speak during public
17	comment and bring something to your attention.
18	But, essentially, what was what your staff
19	did was take the policy that was initially drafted
20	from the security gate access standpoint and
21	revised it to fit the lease policy procedure
22	manual.
23	And your lease policy has several
24	administrative requirements. And what Staff did
25	was look at those administrative requirements as
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1 far as how the staff goes about drafting a new

2 lease and determining rates to recommend and those

3 sorts of things and set -- and -- and put it in

- 4 that section that would be a new section, 8.12, as
- 5 you see on the Appeal of Administrative Decisions
- 6 section. That would fit actually in the lease
- 7 policy manual, and then spell out for folks how
- 8 they would go about appealing a decision the
- 9 executive director made related to the lease.
- 10 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay.
- MR. BURNETT: That's --
- 12 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: And so, the policy says
- what?
- 14 MR. BURNETT: Okay.
- 15 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: I don't want you to read
- 16 it.
- MR. BURNETT: No, no, no. Sure. Essentially
- what happens is within -- within 30 days of the
- 19 executive director making a decision, a person
- 20 could file a written statement requesting to

25 meeting of what the issue was, how the person felt

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1	they had been adversely affected, and what their
2	argument was as to why the executive director's
3	decision should be overruled.
4	Essentially, that would then be set for a
5	hearing, you know, put on as an agenda item. And
6	the question would be for the for whether or
7	not the Authority was going to hear it at all,
8	would be for the Authority members it would be
9	on the agenda. The Authority members could look
10	at it. If there was an affirmative vote to hear
11	the appeal, it would then give the tenant the
12	opportunity to speak and stand up and say, Look, I
13	want to appeal the issue, and here's what my issue
14	is.
15	And if there wasn't an affirmative vote of
16	the Authority, the appeal would not even be heard.
17	And the Authority, by exercising that action,

18 would be affirming essentially the executive 19 director's decision. 20 MR. GORMAN: So, in other words, you would through very -- through a very quick perusal of an 21 appeal, the Authority members can decide whether 22 it has merit and either decide to hear it or 23 24 decide to --25 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: To not hear it, right. But 15 that's the -- you know, the ending step. 16 MR. GORMAN: Bob, I might say one comment, 17 just because I want to argue, is that Mr. Wuellner 18 as the director doesn't oppose it. SK has requested -- SK Logistics, that has hangars on the north end of the field, 17 18 has requested that he put his own jet fuel farm 19 in. 20 He has, over a period of months, met with 21 Mr. Wuellner off and on on this issue, and they 22 have come to an agreement. And the operation of 23 that facility required an amendment to his lease. You have a copy of that in your package. 24

The amendment of the lease addresses

1	additional insurance requirements that are
2	extensive, additional environmental considerations
3	above what his lease addressed, and lays out what
4	the fuel flowage fee would be and the annual
5	increases of the fuel flowage fee.
6	MR. BURNETT: A couple
7	MR. COOPER: Yeah. The staff's
8	recommendation is you discuss this and then move
9	forward to either approve this, authorize
10	Mr. Wuellner to sign this amendment to his
11	lease
12	MR. BURNETT: And if I could jump in and add
13	a couple of things. The this lease amendment
14	is very similar in format and I guess in content
15	to the FBO lease which you recently approved for
16	Mr. Slingluff's company, Aero Sport, other than
17	being tailored for SK Logistics.
18	And the one big point that's in this lease
19	amendment is that it is limiting the fuel jet

- fuel sales -- first of all, it's limiting the fuel
- just to jet fuel. But beyond that, it's limiting
- it just to refuel aircraft that are owned and
- controlled major by -- with a majority of interest
- owned or controlled by SK Logistics. It's not for
- other aircrafts. It's for SK's own aircrafts.

- 1 That's the -- that's what they need the facility
- 2 for.
- 3 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: What impact does this have
- 4 on our lease agreement that we have with Aero
- 5 Sport now for fuel, for servicing the base?
- 6 MR. COOPER: The -- the impact would be that
- 7 the fuel flowage fee from fuel that SK would have
- 8 been buying from Aero Sport, instead of those
- 9 sales going to Aero Sport, they won't. But the
- fuel flowage would be the same. So, the economic
- impact theoretically should not change.
- MS. GREEN: To the airport.

13 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Well, the economic impact 14 to us --15 MR. COOPER: Right. 16 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: -- won't change. What 17 about the -- what about the economic impact to Aero Sport? Do we have anything in the lease 18 19 with -- that -- with Aero Sport that basically 20 says we give them any exclusivity to pumping fuel? 21 MR. COOPER: No. We -- no, we do not. There 22 is -- in fact, we're prohibited by FAA regulations from giving exclusive rights for that. 23 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. 24 25 MR. COOPER: Unless we maintain them AIRPORT AUTHORITY REGULAR MEETING - OCTOBER 17, 2005 43 1 ourselves. 2 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. Do you want public comment before yours? But -- okay. Go ahead. 3 MR. GORMAN: I just wanted -- this does not 4

allow them to compete with the FBO for, again,

6 fuel sales outside their own usage. 7 MR. COOPER: No. 8 MR. BURNETT: That's correct. 9 MR. COOPER: It does not allow that. 10 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Yeah. 11 MR. COOPER: It does not allow them to in any 12 way give that fuel to anybody else other than 13 their own aircraft. 14 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. Any public comment? Mr. Slingluff? 15 16 MR. SLINGLUFF: We have worked with SK over the years. Their volume is sufficient that we've 17 actually gone to Phillips Petroleum and put them 18 on essentially an airline program. So, 19 20 economically, the impact to Aero Sport is nil. 21 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Is nil? 22 MR. SLINGLUFF: Nil. 23 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay.

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MR. SLINGLUFF: So, we -- we have -- and I

really want everyone to understand that, because

1	my next statement will rankle you.
2	I'm opposed to this type of fuel farm and the
3	way the airport is handling it with a lease
4	amendment, given the fact that we have just
5	approved a Master Plan that that takes into
6	consideration a a fair amount of expansion, a
7	lot of public money being spent, and the
8	attraction of what will be needed, a second F
9	FBO.
10	You're you're basically diluting the
11	the pie here. And, you know, we had we had
12	really hoped that the airport would be able to
13	maintain its current structure until the new
14	facilities were built. We would be able to
15	attract a large another large FBO, and the
16	marketplace would be very healthy.
17	It's it's our feeling that, one, the
18	the installation of the hundred low-lead
19	self-serve system has prevented other FBOs from

No 15 16 expense to us. 17 MR. GORMAN: No expense. 18 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: No expense to the taxpayer. 19 MR. GORMAN: No -- no lease expense, no site 20 preparation, no --CHAIRMAN GEORGE: What's the length of this? 21 22 MR. GORMAN: -- environmental? 23 MR. BURNETT: The -- this -- this fuel farm 24 amendment would have a term that is the same. It specifically says in it that its term will be the 25

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- 1 same as the underlying lease.
- 2 The underlying lease was entered into in
- April of 2004 for a period of 20 years. There's 3
- 4 no option to renew, but it is a 20-year lease.
- CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. 5

6 MR. COOPER: And this would be for the 7 balance of that 20 years. CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Are there any provisions in 8 the lease that says in the event that SK Logistics 9 doesn't live up to their part of the lease, that 10 we can cancel it? 11 I just don't want to get in a situation five 12 years from now where we find that SK is, you know, 13 at midnight, you know, selling fuel to one of 14 15 their buddies or something like that. 16 Is there a part of the lease, if they violate any of those provisions, that we can call the 17 lease? 18 19 MR. BURNETT: It -- it does go back to the 20 general default provisions of the -- of the main 21 lease and -- and those would apply. And what 22 happens then is you have a 30-day notice --23 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: To cure. 24 MR. BURNETT: -- to cure. And then they have

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to fix it within those 30 days.

CHAIRMAN GEORGE: And if they don't? 1 MR. BURNETT: And if they don't, then the --2 the lease would be -- they would be in default of 3 the lease and be subject to termination. And in 4 fact, under the "Remedy" section, it says, 5 6 "terminate tenant's right to possession of the prim -- of the property." 7 8 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. So this -- all 9 right. And at 20 years, this -- when this lease is over, that fuel farm, you know, reverts to our 10 ownership; is that correct? 11 12 MR. BURNETT: That is correct. 13 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. 14 MR. GORMAN: Is there any -- anyone from S&K (sic) here to --15 16 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Is anybody here from S&K --17 or SK Logistics? MR. BRUNSON: That's my question now. 18 19 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Yes, sir. 20 MR. BRUNSON: I don't know who can answer

- 21 this question, but are we setting a precedent by
- allowing this to happen, and it would continue to
- happen with other people?
- We can't -- we can't deny it; anybody can
- 25 fuel their own airplanes. But we can not approve

- 1 a lease and -- but have -- have we studied the
- 2 environmental impact of this?
- 3 MR. COOPER: Yes. We've spent a lot of time
- 4 on that. And in this amendment, we have tried to
- 5 cover every contingency that we could think of.
- 6 And we've also required, unlike other leases, that
- 7 all of those contingencies be insured against.
- 8 MS. GREEN: Uh-huh.
- 9 MR. COOPER: The -- if you look on the third
- page of the lease amendment, you'll find eight
- separate requirements for insurances that all of
- them relate to environmental issues. And they're
- all separate coverages.

- 14 MR. GORMAN: Then --15 MR. BRUNSON: Would this -- would this -- if 16 we approve this amendment to the lease, would this 17 alter our Master Plan to where we'd have to revise 18 our Master Plan because of this fuel farm? MR. COOPER: No. I -- I don't see it -- do 19 20 you? 21 MR. GOODE: No. 22 MR. COOPER: I know of no reason that that 23 would --CHAIRMAN GEORGE: I think Mr. Slingluff's 24
- point was that in the Master Plan, you called for 25

- 1 a second FBO.
- 2 MR. BRUNSON: Yeah, this is going to --
- 3 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: This could stall it off,
- you know? 4
- MR. GORMAN: Mr. Brunson brings -- I'm sorry. 5
- 6 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Go ahead.

- 7 MR. GORMAN: Mr. Brunson brings up a point.
- 8 If then again we do this, in other words, then
- 9 does each and every entity on the field -- then
- will they be allowed to petition the board for
- their own fuel farm? I mean, that's his question.
- MR. BRUNSON: Setting precedent.
- MR. GORMAN: Yeah, that's his question, that
- it sets the precedent, and we wonder, is this a
- good precedent to set? I mean, do we need to
- discuss this further or table it for later or --
- to discuss that or what?
- 18 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Let's listen to Mr. Cox.
- MR. COX: Two -- two separate questions,
- Bryan. Under -- I would assume that we've done
- 21 diligent -- you know, looked at -- for instance,
- number 8, "Extended umbrella pollution spill and
- cleaning." Is -- is -- just out of curiosity,
- because I don't know, is \$50 million going to be
- enough to take care of a major spill? EPA-wise.

1 I mean, I'm curious, because I -- I don't 2 want it coming back to the airport, well, it's 3 actually going to be \$120 million because the tank 4 ruptured or, you know, whatever it is. I'm -- I'm curious. I just want to know. 5 6 Secondly, I would like to see -- and then you 7 can save that for future because we can discuss 8 it. I'd like to see us possibly just table this 9 and get some more information and background, and I'd like to have SK come tell us why they think 10 this is a good idea, also. 11 MS. GREEN: Yeah, I was concerned, because I 12 don't know with all of our insurance that we're 13 paying, which is out the wazoo, whether it does or 14 does not impact. I mean, as landlords, you can 15 always pass off as much as you can to the tenant, 16 but the landlord still has to be responsible --17 18 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Yeah. MS. GREEN: -- for something. And if we have 19

another fuel farm that's on our property, I'm a

- 21 little concerned that we've just upped that
- hundred-and-some-odd thousand we're paying for
- 23 insurance.
- MR. GORMAN: Exactly, because it's
- 25 petrochemical, too.

- 1 MS. GREEN: Yeah.
- 2 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Is there anything in the
- 3 lease that says this is the insurance we want you
- 4 to acquire, and if it requires additional funds,
- 5 then it's your responsibility, not ours?
- 6 MR. BURNETT: The lease has provisions in
- 7 here related to what amount of insurance is
- 8 required. And it's generally a million dollars
- 9 per incident for all of these categories listed on
- 10 page 3.
- The other thing that it has is it does have
- an indemnification provision related to any
- liability that would go beyond the -- the

14 insurance policy. SK Logistics would -- would have to indemnify the airport. 15 16 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: If they're still in 17 existence, they would have to --MR. BURNETT: And -- and that is true. And I 18 guess if you're asking about the -- the bigger --19 I guess the longer range view or the bigger 20 picture, you've got issues to weigh related to, at 21 the end of this lease period, although it doesn't 22 23 have an option to renew, it says that SK Logistics 24 could ask to -- to renew it. Essentially, that's 25 an agreement to agree and it's not enforceable.

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- 1 But the -- the thought process is I guess 2 that SK Logistics, at the end of 20 years, still 3 be in business, still be doing well, and -- and 4 want to renew the lease. It may be continually 5 their fuel farm that -- that they have
- responsibility for. 6

7 The other side of that, though, is if business goes bad, you could be winding up taking 8 9 back over the property and have a fuel farm. And I guess if you take that out times ten for ten 10 11 different tenants in the future who wanted their own fuel farm, you could have an airport dotted 12 13 with fuel farms. And that's --14 MR. GORMAN: That's my point. MR. BURNETT: That's a decision for y'all to 15 16 make. MR. BRUNSON: You know, there might be a good 17 18 reason that our excellent tenant, SK Logistics, wants to do this. I'd like to hear why they want 19 20 to do this. Because it sounds like they've got an 21 excellent deal on their fuel. So, I'd like to 22 know more about this. And there must -- there's 23 got to be a good business reason they're doing 24 this. But I --

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CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Nickel to a dime, it's to

save money, but you want to hear it from them, you 1 2 know? 3 MR. BRUNSON: Yeah. 4 MR. COX: Can you reach out to Hope and have 5 somebody present us at the next meeting with some information on why they would -- you know, give us 6 7 some background on it and -- and convince us why it's a good idea. 8 9 MR. COOPER: Well, I -- I have -- we've had the conversation with SK Logistics about why they 10 11 would want to do this. MR. COX: Right. 12 13 MR. COOPER: But the first time they 14 approached us was more than a year ago, or 15 probably two years ago. And to them, if they can 16 save a penny or a fraction of a penny on a gallon 17 of gas, it -- he feels that's a fairly large 18 impact on his bottom line and his cost. He's in an extremely competitive business, 19 20 and his main cost is fuel. And so, to him, that's

an important thing.

22	Because of of what Aero Sport did quite a
23	while back in getting him on that special program
24	with Phillips, the in the plane program, he put
25	off this for quite a while, because that brought
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1	his fuel costs down far below what people here
2	were paying, or anyone else on this field was
3	paying for fuel. But his business has continued
4	to increase.
5	The number of jet aircraft that he's
6	operating has continued to increase, and they're
7	anticipating that to continue, more aircraft. And
8	they're down now to where he really believes that
9	fractions of a penny on a gallon of fuel is a big
10	impact on his bottom line, which is why he wants
11	to do this.
12	And it it doesn't have anything to do with
13	the cost of fuel here on this airport. It's the
14	cost that he's paying. And if he can do save a

15 half a penny on a gallon of gas, that's a lot of 16 money to him. 17 MS. GREEN: I still would like to know what 18 impact it has to us, the airport, 20 years down 19 the road if we're stuck with a fuel farm and what 20 impact it's going to have on our current insurance 21 rate, if any. 22 MR. COOPER: I -- I think that we can find 23 out -- my gut feeling is insurance-wise, it's --24 it's not going to increase. It may even decrease 25 some of our fuel costs, because we --AIRPORT AUTHORITY REGULAR MEETING - OCTOBER 17, 2005 55

1 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Well, we need to ask our 2 agent that so we can get, you know, some specific 3 answers, that that's what's going to happen to us. 4 I also would like to know who's -- who is 5 responsible for establishing the level of these insurance. Was that someone that's knowledgeable 6

about fuel farms that we're putting in? Was it a

- 8 recommendation taken by the company that we bought
- 9 the farm from?
- MS. GREEN: I think Mr. Burnett said it was
- standard in the industry for the eight
- compartments, the eight delineated items.
- 13 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Yeah, I think it's standard
- that there is a policy, but who set the \$50
- million as opposed to \$75?
- MS. GREEN: No, I meant the million per
- incident, the --
- MR. COOPER: It's my understanding --
- 19 Mr. Slingluff, is this not the same insurance
- 20 requirements we placed with you?
- 21 MR. SLINGLUFF: Yes, it is. The --
- MR. COOPER: Okay. That's where that came
- 23 from.
- MR. SLINGLUFF: Usually, we -- we've stayed
- with major oil companies because they do give you

1 the supplemental \$50 million liability --2 pollution liability insurance. Plus, you know, 3 they're -- they're all top Fortune 50 companies, 4 so they're not going away if you do have a spill. And, I mean, the environmental side of this 5 is -- is another big concern. I can tell you a 6 lot of stories of companies who have put their own 7 8 fuel systems in. In fact, we can use Home Depot as an example. They put their own fuel system in, 9 10 ran it for 18 months, and now they're -- they have out for bid, somebody to come in and operate their 11 12 fuel system for them because the costs are 13 prohibitive, insurance and -- and certification requirements. 14 One of the pitfalls of having various fueling 15 16 facilities all over the airport is you're going to have spot market fuel in here. And that fuel will 17 18 come without pollution liability insurance, which 19 is something --20 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Say that again. You're going to have what? 21

- MR. SLINGLUFF: That fuel will be brought in,
- and it will not carry any supplemental pollution
- 24 liability insurance with it, which I think is --
- is something you all need to consider.

- 1 MR. GORMAN: In other words, you're saying
- 2 that an off -- an off provider that is not a major
- 3 oil company can put spot market fuel in, and that
- 4 fuel --
- 5 MR. SLINGLUFF: They've sold it to you, they
- 6 provide no additional liability insurance.
- 7 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Did we consider that and
- 8 put any language in there that says he has to, you
- 9 know, from an insurance standpoint, you know, use
- a major supplier that does provide supplemental
- insurance to buyers?
- MR. COOPER: Well --
- 13 MR. BURNETT: That -- that type of
- provision's not in here. I guess the -- the flip

I mean, 16 other than regulating his flowage and getting receipts for where -- when his fleet -- fuel's 17 being delivered. We're regulating the flowages 18 being paid on -- on what his flowage is. But 19 that's -- that's an issue we simply didn't 20 21 consider, that's true. 22 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. MR. COX: I suggest we table --23 24 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: I think what we want to do 25 is we want to give Staff the -- the job of -- of
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1 presenting to us again and answering some of these 2 questions, you know, more explicitly. What does 3 our insurance agent say is going to happen to our insurance? Okay? 4 5 What's the impact of 20 years from now of --

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of us having a facility that we're going to wind

up eating? What's the possibility of having a

8 negative impact, as Mr. Slingluff said, of having 9 fuel? And at the same time, what's the possibility of having a positive impact of being 10 11 able to attract somebody that is at SK's level, 12 because we do allow them to have their own fuel here? 13 And from SK's standpoint, I think the board 14 15 wanted to hear them -- have them at this meeting 16 so that we can ask them some questions. 17 MR. GORMAN: Plus, one more, we don't --18 this -- doesn't this board need to consider the 19 fact whether we are setting a precedence so that 20 each and every entity that is doing business on 21 the field will then clamor for their own fuel farm? 22 23 MR. COX: Absolutely.

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MR. GORMAN: Yeah. In other words, that's my

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25

point. Exactly.

1 MR. COX: We just talked about putting 8, 9, 2 and 10 up. You know, whoever moves in there, or 3 whatever we do, if they come in with 15 Lear jets and decide they want to put theirs in, too, and so 4 we -- you know, we end up with like 20 fuel --5 6 MR. COOPER: We can establish the 7 requirements that -- that you can place on them to 8 do that, but you can't tell them you can't do it. 9 I mean, you can add to -- to these requirements 10 that -- that we put in this --11 MR. COX: Right. 12 MR. COOPER: -- when we develop this 13 amendment. You can increase that. 14 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Well, we can also decide 15 that it is to our advantage to have someone that's 16 going to pump that much fuel here, and then any 17 other situation will have to be taken on a 18 case-by-case basis. 19 So, if you get somebody in with one airplane that wants to put his fuel farm, he doesn't meet 20 21 the volume, you know, that we were anticipating, 22 to go for the risk that we were going to be

- taking, you know, insurance-wise.
- MR. COOPER: I don't know if that can be --
- volume can be one of your considerations. But

- 1 environmental requirements, space requirements,
- 2 safety requirements, those are things that you can
- dictate. But I -- I don't know that you can
- 4 require a minimum volume. We --
- 5 MR. BRUNSON: We don't --
- 6 MR. COOPER: -- will have research that.
- 7 but...
- 8 MR. BRUNSON: We don't know enough. I -- I
- 9 don't know the financial stability of
- 10 SK Logistics. We don't know the long-range
- liability that we have. And that's what we can
- regulate, is our long-range liability.
- 13 And -- and this amended lease would have to
- pretty well follow these other people that want to
- do the same thing, and we need to make it real

16 restrictive. But I -- but I sure would like to 17 hear from SK Logistics and -- and know more about 18 this before I vote on it today. 19 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. Do you need to add 20 anything to what I put out that we wanted Staff to 21 do? Because they need explicit instructions. 22 MR. BRUNSON: The only thing I said is I 23 don't know the -- you know, we need to look at the 24 long-range liability and their financial strength. 25 If Home Depot had a problem, then --AIRPORT AUTHORITY REGULAR MEETING - OCTOBER 17, 2005 61 1 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: I don't know why their 2 financial strength has anything to do with it.

MR. BRUNSON: Well, being able to sustain

10	MS. GREEN: I'm more concerned about like you
11	have homeowners and covenants and restrictions,
12	are we opening up Pandora's box? So, what can we
13	put in restrictive-wise so that we're not saying
14	every tenant now can have their own fuel farm; and
15	two, insurance-wise, what's it going to cost or
16	what do we have to change our insurance by to
17	cover something like this? Because we could end
18	up with this fuel farm in 20 years.
19	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Right.
20	MS. GREEN: I mean, those are my two main
21	concerns, cost of the airport insurance-wise,
22	liability-wise, and are we opening up the door?
23	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: But also, 20 years, whoever
24	the board is at that time, they can elect to have
25	it hauled off and thrown in the dump because we

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1 didn't pay for anything for it.

- 2 MS. GREEN: True. Well, we still have to
- 3 remove it, though.
- 4 MR. BRUNSON: How much does that cost?
- 5 MR. COX: More to the point -- I mean, it
- 6 could go away in 5 years, not 20.
- 7 MS. GREEN: Right.
- 8 MR. COX: You know, we still -- we'd end up
- 9 with a fuel farm.
- 10 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. It seems to be the
- consensus that we need to ask Staff to go back and
- do some -- you know, some other discussions. And

- MR. COOPER: Next item was the airport budget
- comparative analysis. At the last meeting --
- well, it had been discussed previous meeting and

- then at the last meeting, you were asked to make
- recommendations on what airports you would like to
- see this compared to.

- 1 Mr. Gorman turned in a listing of five
- 2 airports. I think you were also asked to list who
- 3 you would like to see on the committee to review
- 4 that -- do that comparative analysis.
- 5 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: I went back and reread the
- 6 agenda on page 92, I think it is. There are three
- 7 specific things.
- 8 MR. COOPER: All right.
- 9 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: The board members were
- supposed to get with you to let you know what
- airports they thought were comparable, and then
- the airport staff was going to consolidate that
- and add something to it if you -- if you thought
- there was somebody else that was more comparable.
- We also would establish who we thought from

16 the public should be included in our workshop. MR. GORMAN: Right. 17 18 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: And then we would decide -or back to the first time, we'd decide if any of 19 the board members wanted to specifically take an 20 airport to do investigation before the board 21 22 meeting so they'd be more knowledgeable of what 23 their -- how they run their airport, that we would do that. And I assume, and we'll discuss it now, 24 25 that -- that the airport would reimburse them AIRPORT AUTHORITY REGULAR MEETING - OCTOBER 17, 2005 64 travel expenses to go there if they had to, you 1 2 know, to do that. 3 And the third item was we would establish a date for our workshop. 4 5 MR. COOPER: That's fine. Mr. Gorman has 6 provided a list of five airports for comparison. 7 And I don't think there's been any others that I'm 8 aware of.

- 19 MR. COOPER: Peter O. Knight, Tampa.
- MR. GORMAN: Tampa.
- 21 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay.
- MR. GORMAN: And again, can I make a comment?
- We -- we don't need to really reinvent the wheel
- here. Just get these -- get these -- copies of
- 25 this -- of these budgets and throw them on the

- 1 table and start to go -- just discuss them openly.
- 2 MR. COX: Assuming the airports will give you
- 3 the copies of the budget.
- 4 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: It's open to the public.
- 5 Yeah, I would think so.
- 6 Okay. The three that I added was Fort Myers.
- 7 MR. COOPER: Okay.
- 8 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Naples.
- 9 MR. COOPER: That was Page Field at Fort

- 10 Myers.
- 11 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Yes, Page.
- MR. COOPER: We had that conversation.

- added Naples. Not Southwest Regional, now, but

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1 that's doing work for Orlando Exec. And there is 2 considerable amount of that, but we can pull that 3 out. 4 Same problem with Craig. Craig is a local 5 airport. Very similar. It's smaller than us. 6 Probably same number, maybe slightly fewer 7 operations. However, it's part of the 8 Jacksonville system that manages four airports. 9 And so, some of the administrative costs in that 10 is divided amongst four airports. Tamiami, I 11 think, is probably --12 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Dade County? 13 MR. COOPER: -- a very good comparison for 14 us. Tamiami, however, is part of a multiple 15 airport system, but again, we've got that for all

of them.

 - MR. COOPER: Page Field, probably the closest
 - to physical size of our airport, but Page Field
 - is -- again, is part of a multiple airport

- 1 that's -- Southwest Regional manages Page, also.
- 2 So, some of those costs are going to be a little

3 difficult. We're going to have to do some estimating there. 4 5 Naples is a city-run airport, owned by the city, and that's their only airport. And that's 6 fairly close to us. However, the difference there 7 is -- and this would have to be pulled out also --8 is the airport itself is the FBO. They sell the 9 10 fuel and operate the FBO there. Valdosta and Gwinnett County, I've flown in 11 12 there quite a few times. I'm not sure about 13 administration on that. MR. BRUNSON: The problem with Valdosta is 14 that you do have scheduled flights out of there, 15 16 which would have to be pulled out. MR. COOPER: Right. And I'm not sure about 17 18 the ownership, whether that's an independent 19 authority operating that or it's city or county. 20 I don't know. 21 MR. BRUNSON: Gwinnett does have --MR. COOPER: And, now, Gwinnett County is the 22 23 county-run airport there.

MR. BRUNSON: Yeah. Gwinnett has an

authority.

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1	MR. COOPER: Uh-huh. So, these are
2	comparisons. It's going to be difficult. I mean,
3	it's not going to be an exact comparison to this.
4	We're going to have to add and subtract some
5	of these costs, because they're divided amongst
6	where where here, you have well, some of
7	these airports, for example, where we spend a lot
8	of time preparing what it takes for the taxing
9	authority here, some of these airports don't have
10	that at all, because it's done by somebody else in
11	the county, and the cost isn't transferred to the
12	airport.
13	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Yeah. And some of the
14	accounting is done by the city or the county over
15	the payroll and
16	MR. COOPER: That's right.
17	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: and all that sort of

- stuff.
- 19 MR. COOPER: Right. But --
- 20 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Bryan, does -- does every
- 21 airport have to submit their budgets to the same
- categories and same chart of accounts that -- that
- 23 we have to?
- MR. COOPER: For the most part, yes.
- 25 However, if you take a county airport, some of the

- 1 items that -- that we have to submit are submitted
- 2 already in other parts of the county government,
- and so, the county takes care of that. But the
- 4 public -- the requirements for public accounting
- 5 is the same for all of them.
- 6 So -- so, yes, we have to submit the same
- 7 things. It's just the ones that are run by the
- 8 city have a few line items that aren't there, and
- 9 the ones run by counties have a few line items
- that aren't there.

11 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Yeah. Okay. Any public 12 comment on airports? I'm sure that 13 Mr. Martinelli's got some. And the subject is 14 that we're trying to come up with comparable 15 airports so that we can compare our budget and 16 actual operations to get a good feeling. 17 MR. MARTINELLI: Okay. Is this on? 18 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Yes. 19 MR. MARTINELLI: I think you just said the 20 final word there, "to have a good feeling." 21 Now, if that's your objective, is to have a 22 good feeling about where you are, then I question 23 whether or not all of this effort you're putting into it is worth it. 24 25 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. That's all right. AIRPORT AUTHORITY REGULAR MEETING - OCTOBER 17, 2005 74 Okay. That's --1

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because when you're all finished with this, and

MR. MARTINELLI: The reason I say that is

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4 because of some of the points that Bryan has 5 brought up, and others which will come up that you 6 haven't seen so far, you're going to still be at 7 odds. You're going to be wondering whether or not 8 you've made the proper comparison. Some of you 9 folks are going to feel you have and some are 10 going to feel you haven't. 11 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. Those -- those are 12 good comments, but this board has already decided 13 we are going to do this. MR. MARTINELLI: Okay. 14 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: So, if you can give us your 15 suggestions on which airports to go after, I would 16 appreciate it. 17 18 MR. MARTINELLI: I can't give you suggestions 19 on airports. 20 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. Anybody else? 21 MR. MARTINELLI: But I can give you some 22 thoughts, if you will allow me. Because I think 23 that there's another way to tackle the problem.

And I think you ultimately will all be much better

off and much better satisfied.

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1	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Go ahead, if you can do i
2	in a couple of minutes.
3	MR. MARTINELLI: Yeah. It's called
4	zero-based budgeting. Okay? You take every line
5	item you have. You don't go by precedent. You
6	do don't go by history and say, Well, last year
7	we spent X dollars, so this year, we need need
8	to bump it up for inflation or whatever. You
9	simply say, "Do we need it? And how badly do we
10	need it?"
11	And that's basically zero-based budgeting.
12	And I think if you all put your heads together in
13	a workshop, go over every line item that you have,
14	and make that determination to the point where
15	you're all satisfied, or the majority of you are
16	satisfied, then I think you will accomplish your
17	objective of feeling good about what you have as a

18 budget. And that's my suggestion. 19 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: I appreciate those comments. That might be the way we actually, you 20 21 know, come about, because I think that -- my 22 personal feeling is that as we get into it, we're going to find so many differences, that it's just 23 24 going to lead us into a zero-based budget, you 25 know. 11	MR. SLINGLUFF: I I was just going to
12	comment that going going out of state, you're
13	going to run into some issues with the fund
14	funding levels, cofunding levels from state and
15	federal, and also the tax bases.
16	I think you've got a monumental task ahead of
17	you. And and taking some of what what
18	Mr. Martinelli said, I think if you want if you
19	narrowed the scope by pulling out line items that
20	you're worried about and then do a line-by-line
21	analysis with the eight airports, I think you
22	could come up with a pretty fair assessment of
23	whether or not we're doing things on track,
24	developing a beta.
25	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. It was my

- 1 assumption -- maybe I need the board's agreement
- 2 on this now -- that -- that we were going into the
- 3 operating budget, you know, of the airport to do a

- 4 comparison. The actual capital expenditures and
- 5 getting federal funds were based on our Master
- 6 Plan and what we think our requirements are here.
- 7 So, I was under the impression -- and correct
- 8 me, board members, if I'm wrong -- that this
- 9 workshop was going to be going into the
- operational aspects of running the airport.
- 11 MR. COX: Question.
- 12 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Yes, sir.
- MR. COX: This is an agenda item that we're
- 14 going to vote on; is that correct?
- 15 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Yeah.
- MR. COX: Because you made a statement to
- 17 Mr. Martinelli that this board is going forward
- with this. And I don't remember ever voting on
- the fact that we were in fact going forward with

- 21 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: I think it's page 92.
- MR. COX: Did we vote on it? I thought

1	of it was, because we had already moved forward
2	with it.
3	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Well, I was under the
4	impression that we had approved that this is the
5	way we were going to go through it, and I stand
6	corrected. I do not see anything in page 102
7	we just went right from this where I presented
8	what the three action items were going to be and
9	we take it up at the next meeting. We did not
10	make a vote on it.
11	MR. COX: This agenda item that we're
12	that's under discussion on the table right now is
13	whether or not we move forward with a comparative
14	analysis. That's that's what we're discussing
15	right now
16	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay.
17	MR. COX: whether we move forward and even
18	have a comparative analysis. That's what's under

19 discussion, because we didn't vote on this the 20 last --21 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: It fairly clearly states --22 and people let me go on, whether I should have or 23 not. COX: It's like let's bring it to the 9 table, discuss the --10

CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Are -- are other board

12 members also under agreement that we have not 13 decided that that's what we want to do? 14 MR. GORMAN: If -- if Mr. Cox has a 15 contention with whether or not we're going to do 16 it, we can vote to see whether we're going to do 17 it. I may make a statement, though. Can I make a 18 statement? 19 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Yes. 20 MR. GORMAN: I think that to be responsible 21 to the taxpayers, we need to look at other airports to see what they spend, in very simple 22 23 terms. And a workshop will do that fine. And so 24 I ---MS. GREEN: But I have a concern, who's going 25

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- 1 to do the analysis, then? Are we paying
- 2 somebody --
- 3 MR. GORMAN: It's a broad-based analysis.
- 4 You're going to do it by --

5 MS. GREEN: I know you're saying broad-based, 6 and then we start getting more detail, well, this 7 has to be pulled out and this has to pulled out, 8 and we need this and that. 9 What is it going to cost us to do -- are we 10 going to sit down and look at it, or are we going 11 to hire someone to sit down and pull out 12 comparative line items to see where we are? That 13 was -- that was my concern. I'm -- I'm kind of in line with Mr. Cox. I 14 don't remember voting on this is what we're going 15 to do, because I was concerned. We had talked 16 17 about budget \$3,000 versus \$20,000 to do this analysis. 18 MR. COX: There you go. Exactly. 19 20 MR. GORMAN: During a workshop, we can decide 21 that, whether or not we need outside help and of 22 what of type and --23 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: I thought that was item 2 on the agenda, to come up with the people that we 24 25 wanted to include in it, in this -- in this

1	roundtable.
2	MR. COX: Here's the issue I have with it,
3	and it was something that I went through last
4	meeting, is it's extremely difficult, as
5	Mr. Slingluff has pointed out, as Mr. Martinelli
6	pointed out, for us and I pointed it out last
7	month, for us to find any airports that are going
8	to be that are parallel to this airport enough
9	to say, okay, we can compare this and this and
10	this, and as as the director has pointed out,
11	also.
12	Now we're adding going to have to add
13	stuff here, we're going to have to take away. By
14	the time we get it's just going to be so the
15	process is going to be so diluted, there's not
16	going to be a comparison. And just I I have a
17	problem with because all of us are on board
18	with trying to save money for the taxpayers, but

- we're spending a bunch of money to try to get an
- analysis to find out whether we're on target.
- 21 MR. GORMAN: Mr. Cox, if you're in business,
- don't you look at what you spend and what your
- competitors spend to produce the same product?
- MR. COX: Competitors compete directly with
- 25 the same focused --

- 1 MR. GORMAN: So, we don't have to
- 2 microanalyze how -- how similar we are. We just
- 3 have to take a look at -- at what one airport
- 4 spends for maintenance and what -- what we spend
- 5 for maintenance, what an airport spends --
- 6 MR. COX: I think --
- 7 MR. GORMAN: Simple as that.
- 8 MR. COX: -- Ms. Green brought up a good --
- 9 who is going to make the analysis? I don't -- I'm
- not qualified to, and I don't think --
- MR. GORMAN: I have a -- I have a suggestion

- for a man that has been making those analysis his
 whole life.

 MR. COX: On what?
 - MR. GORMAN: On -- with both municipal and
 - 16 federal governments. And --
 - MR. COX: What would he charge us?
 - MR. GORMAN: I'm going to suggest his name
 - 19 now.
- MR. COX: What would he charge us? That's
- 21 it.
- MR. GORMAN: Well, right now, he's going to
- charge us nothing. Just an opinion.
- MS. GREEN: Well, this --
- 25 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: How do you feel,

- 1 Mr. Brunson?
- 2 MR. BRUNSON: You know, I'm listening,
- 3 because this -- when you did -- in the real estate
- 4 business, when we do appraisals, you have to do

5	pluses and minuses. And I I thought that this
6	would be something that we could do.
7	But it seems like the problem is that we
8	can't find any airports that are even close to
9	what we have here. And I tried to think about
10	that. So, doing a cost analysis is going to be so
11	difficult that it I don't think we'll ever come
12	to a conclusion.
13	Having said that, I do think we need to
14	continue with the workshop amongst the board
15	members to look at each line item and and
16	but this thing of going to different airports and
17	getting their budgets and analyzing, and I
18	think is a task that we just cannot do.
19	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay.
20	MR. GORMAN: We can't do it
21	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: My comments
22	MR. GORMAN: in detail
23	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: My comments on the whole
24	thing is, for for two years, I thought it was a
25	neglect of our normal duty of coming out

1	individually and sitting down with the staff, who
2	is more than willing to take you through every
3	budget item, every check that is written. They
4	have been willing to do that for two years we've
5	talked about this.
6	Two years ago, we even put \$20,000 in the
7	budget to do an analysis, and we fell on our face
8	even coming up with a scope of the analysis. It
9	wound up being somewhere between \$20- and \$150- to
10	\$200,000.
11	This past iteration of the budget, we have
12	been requested, sit down and go over it and
13	understand it, and I don't think we did. I don't
14	think we actually did our homework. And so now
15	we're coming up with another one of let's let
16	somebody else do our work for us.
17	I really think that the board members that
18	are concerned about us not being efficient, they
10	need to spend some time out here and get a warm

20 and comfortable feeling.

21 I was hoping that this direction that we were

22 taking would do nothing but show exactly what is

23 showing at this meeting, that it's going to be so

24 many differences here and there and that the

25 differences that you find out from an operational

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1 status are not going to make a drop in the bucket. 2 You know, if \$900,000 is what we spent operationally last year, and we're able to save 3 4 8 percent or 10 percent, that's \$90,000. And 5 while I'd like to save the \$90,000, I just don't 6 think it's a big -- you know, that big of a drop in the bucket. 7 8 But if the board members want to go through a 9 workshop, you know, and either bring up the airports or don't bring up the airports but go 10 11 through it and have a better understanding of the

budget, I think we'd be well spent with the time

13 so that we can do it down the road. 14 MR. BRUNSON: I agree with you. 15 MR. COX: Agree. MS. GREEN: Either that, or I would have no 16 17 problem if -- if Jack has this qualified friend of his to sit down and say, all right, we've got 18 19 these eight airports we've talked about; how many 20 do you need for comps, getting back to the real 21 estate issue? How much would it cost us? And 22 come back to us and say, all right, we need four comps, whatever it is; it's going to cost you X 23 amount, because he knows you have to pull such and 24 25 such out; and here it is. - 1 And then we can say, no, we're not going to
- 2 do it; it's too costly; or yeah, or we'll just do
- it at a -- at a workshop. 3
- CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Well, why not make it a 4
- workshop where we actually go through the 5

- 6 operational budget, and if anybody wants to see 7 what other airports, they can feel free to bring 8 it up, but --9 MR. BRUNSON: You can bring the comparisons 10 with you. CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Yeah, but let's don't come 11 12 up with another action item after the workshop. 13 MR. BRUNSON: But if Henry would be willing 14 to do that then --MR. GORMAN: You had a suggestion. And I 15 think there's other people that would volunteer. 16 I think you had a good suggestion. I don't 17 18 know --MR. BRUNSON: Finance person, yeah. 19 20 MR. GORMAN: Right. - MS. GREEN: What time do you want this

- 17 Is it better off for you to do it at 4:00?
- 18 MS. GREEN: It's not at all.
- 19 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay.
- MS. GREEN: Neither one's good. I'm in a
- four-hour contempt hearing at 3:15.
- 22 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. Sounds good. All
- right. Next item.
- MR. COOPER: Tuesday, November the 8th.
- 25 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Moving right along.

9.D. - RESTAURANT/CATERING FACILITY UPDATE

- 2 MR. COOPER: Next agenda item is discussion
- on the restaurant. It's basically an update. At
- 4 the last meeting, you had given us direction. We
- 5 had been moving that direction. However, we
- 6 started out with four potential operators that --
- 7 that were interested. Of that, we only got a
- 8 response from one.
- 9 Since then, we've had a few more that have
- 10 expressed interest. And of those, we today got
- another response. We have two now. And we have
- an appointment in the morning to show the
- restaurant to another operator.
- One of -- one of the potential operators came
- back and said that they were no longer interested,
- and two did not respond at all. So, after
- tomorrow, we may have three, which means we can
- bring that to your next meeting. And that's going
- 19 to move back a start date, unless you want to
- authorize Mr. Wuellner to choose one of those on
- some guidelines.

- 22 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Yeah, I think that --
- 23 didn't we authorize him at the last board meeting
- 24 to make that decision?
- MR. COOPER: You did? All right. Fine.

- 1 MR. GORMAN: Yes. That's fine.
- 2 MR. BRUNSON: The sooner, the better.
- 3 MR. COOPER: Okay.
- 4 MR. GORMAN: Thank you.
- 5 MR. COOPER: Then we'll shoot for hopefully a
- 6 December 1 opening or earlier.
- 7 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Earlier, if possible, yes.
- 8 MR. GORMAN: I mean, I understand that the
- 9 tower gets calls to find out if the restaurant's
- open. That's really the truth.
- MR. COOPER: That's -- I hear that quite
- 12 frequently.
- 13 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Next?
- 14 9.E. MPO DISCUSSION

15 MR. COOPER: Next item is discussion of your 16 membership in the MPO. 17 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. Would you like to 18 tell us what this is all about? 19 MR. COOPER: Well, there was -- there was a 20 budget item for the membership fee of the MPO, and there was some discussion in previous meetings 21 22 whether or not you wanted to spend that money. And you had asked, I think Mr. Wuellner, to do a 23 24 little research, make a recommendation. And there's his recommendation right there 25 AIRPORT AUTHORITY REGULAR MEETING - OCTOBER 17, 2005 98 1 (indicating). 2 The point is, some of these things that are 3 coming up are going to affect this airport and 4 affect the area. And if you decide you do not want to continue your membership, you won't have a 5 voice in that. 6

They will have a significant impact on

8 directing state funds for some of these 9 transportation projects, not as much for airport 10 projects, but definitely for road projects, 11 particularly the 312 extension and things like 12 that; the 210 realignment, those types of 13 projects. Without the membership, you have no 14 voice in that at all. 15 I don't remember the exact amount. Do you remember the exact amount of the membership that 16 17 was --18 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Six thousand? 19 MR. COOPER: It was discussed down. I think 20 it was brought down considerably. 21 MR. GORMAN: Six- was half --MR. BRUNSON: Bruce, do you think they're 22 23 going to continue to give us the same rate as they

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COMMISSIONER MAGUIRE: (Nods head.)

did initially?

24

1	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Little background on this
2	particular line item: When I first started going
3	to the MPO, I challenged it also because the
4	tab tab was \$12,000 a year. And we have
5	representation in St. Johns County of four
6	organizations, I think it is, but some of these
7	three? That would be St. Augustine City of
8	St. Augustine, the Airport Authority, and the
9	County. I don't know why I thought that the beach
10	had represent but anyway, three. That's
11	immaterial.
12	But having a voice in it, we have some of the
13	members from Jacksonville that have two votes to
14	our one vote. So, out of all of the voting pool
15	that we have, our voice is not that significant.
16	And I challenge whether we should be spending that
17	kind of money, when really what we were after was
18	the results of what they're going to do to be kept
19	abreast of it.
20	In subsequent months, Mr. Gorman has gone and
21	has indicated some why don't you tell them what

- your concern is?
- MR. GORMAN: It's similar. But the
- problem -- we may be a little bit different in --
- in opinion. I think some of the issues are not

- directly relevant to the airport. But there's
- 2 enough issues that are directly relevant to the
- airport that we need to be kept abreast of them.
- 4 And if a small amount of -- of input into
- 5 some of those issues, and at least our knowledge
- 6 that those issues are going to be -- come up and
- 7 voted on, the MPO is essential.
- 8 It's funny, it isn't that relevant to the
- 9 airport, all of the issues, but I think it's very
- relevant that St. Johns County have a seat. So,
- 11 for the -- the larger scope of things, for the
- greater good of the public, we need the seat. We
- need to keep the seat.
- 14 If we can get Mr. Maguire to pay for it so

15 the airport doesn't have to pay for it, then that 16 would be perfect. CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Well, he happens to be 17 here. So, with that as a background on it, let me 18 19 ask for public comment on it, and I'm sure that Mr. Maguire will have a comment. 20 21 COMMISSIONER MAGUIRE: Good -- good idea. The reason you thought four is because the City of 22 St. Augustine Beach flips and rotates its 23 24 membership with St. Augustine. 25 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Oh, okay. AIRPORT AUTHORITY REGULAR MEETING - OCTOBER 17, 2005 101 1 COMMISSIONER MAGUIRE: And so, the mayor, 2 one -- one or two years, then the St. Augustine 3 Beach mayor. And it's designed to flip like the 4 three beaches up in Jacksonville. 5 The real benefit of continued membership is

because you all hit the nail on the head; there's

not a whole lot that the MP does for this

6

8	particular airport. You're not a SIS; you're not
9	an emerging SIS, so you're not going to get those
10	funds. Every now and then, something will come
11	up, though, that we do need a support on.
12	Specifically addressing the comment about
13	membership up there having two votes, that was
14	designed to our benefit, not to our negative.
15	What they originally wanted was, in the MPO
16	status, state statute, you're limited to 19
17	members board members on an MPO. And they're
18	trying to change that because some of the MPOs
19	down south have as many as 35 different cities
20	within the county. So, they're trying to come up
21	with with ideas.
22	This was promulgated primarily because they
23	wanted to give the the membership is based on
24	population, but we wanted we felt like we
25	worked better with smaller numbers, so we wanted

1	to keep the membership down around 12 or 13.
2	And to do that, is you took the City Council
3	members of Jacksonville and gave them two votes.
4	The reason that helps us is if one member is
5	absent, that's two votes gone. And so, if our guy
6	is there and he's gone, instead of being one for
7	one, we're now up one position on a vote.
8	I think you found out that that not all of
9	the City Council members are there all the time.
10	So, we do have a little bit more leverage in the
11	voting.
12	But the biggest issue with with membership
13	on the MPO is I hope you found that because of
14	the, I'll say the agrarious (sic) nature that
15	we've approached the MPO, Clay County, St. Johns,
16	and Nassau County collectively have been pushing
17	Duval County to make an attitude change in the way
18	they do things. And that's a significant issue,
19	that they now respect the three counties in a way
20	that they've never respected them before.
21	In the last meeting that I attended I
22	missed the last one we were talking about how

- do we spend this extra \$32 million that the State
- budgeted that we had, and it was a City Council
- 25 member out of Jacksonville who proposed that we

- split it so each county get a proportionate share.
- 2 So, they didn't go in and say, "Give it all to
- 3 us."
- 4 And -- and that's the real strength of -- of
- 5 your position, is you continue to give us
- 6 credibility at the bargaining table. And my
- 7 concern is if you step aside, what you're really
- 8 telling the MPO, especially the Jacksonville
- 9 members, is that it is not important to be there,
- and our bargaining power is reduced down.
- Having said that, and going back to the --
- the idea of having us pick up your tab, that's not
- farfetched. By no means will I say that I
- encourage it at this point. But if you're having
- problems coming up with the money, then -- then it

- 16 might be a good idea to make a resolution and go 17 forward to the county and ask them to pick up the 18 tab. 19 But the critical issue is, as far as -- my 20 belief, having been there for two -- two and a 21 half years now, you are critical. Your vote is 22 critical. And I'll say this, too: The mayor of 23 St. Augustine has decided he doesn't want to go to 24 the meetings anymore. And that hurts. And it 25 hurts real bad when we're sitting there trying to AIRPORT AUTHORITY REGULAR MEETING - OCTOBER 17, 2005 104 1 say we want to put greater emphasis in different
 - areas, and we don't have the vote that our county
 is authorized to go up there. Yes.
 MR. GORMAN: Can I ask, if he doesn't, if
 there isn't some mechanism where -- that we could
 replace him?
 COMMISSIONER MAGUIRE: We're working that

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issue. Yes. Yes.

9	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. Any other public
10	comment?
11	(No further public comment.)
12	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Anything else to add?
13	COMMISSIONER MAGUIRE: No, sir.
14	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. Then we're going
15	to you had a comment.
16	MR. COX: I'm in full support of continuing
17	the membership. I just think for the money we're
18	paying, the the ability to have a voice at this
19	level is almost beyond, you know, price it's
20	priceless.
21	MR. GORMAN: It
22	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Mr. Brunson?
23	MR. BRUNSON: Bruce touched on I'm hearing
24	more and more about how much we're getting
25	getting done in the counties, the regional concept
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of things that are going forward. And having 1

2 attended these meetings, we have definitely had 3 the voice of what goes on. And I would support us 4 continuing and even being stronger. 5 I would hope that -- that the -- George 6 Gardner would send another city councilman in his 7 place if he can't go, because that -- that's bad that he -- the city is paying that money and not 8 attending. 9 10 COMMISSIONER MAGUIRE: Yes. 11 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Ms. Green? MS. GREEN: Yeah, I mean, I agree. I think 12 for right now, we've budgeted around \$6-, as I 13 recall? 14 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Donna's going to get that 15 16 number now. MS. GREEN: Yeah. - 9 somebody from Green Cove? Because that's where
- the -- most of the transportation stuff is.
- 11 MR. BURNETT: Maybe -- maybe I'm missing
- something.
- MR. BRUNSON: I don't understand that.
- MS. GREEN: A staff member?
- MR. COX: I don't, either.

CHAIRMAN GEORGE: How much is the number? 16 She'll find it in just a second. 17 18 For the Airport Authority to have a 19 representative on the board, does that mean it has 20 to be a Airport Authority member? 21 MR. BURNETT: I'm not sure that you couldn't 22 delegate that to a staff person. 23 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. What about to a not staff person? 24 25 MS. GREEN: He's going further than that. AIRPORT AUTHORITY REGULAR MEETING - OCTOBER 17, 2005 107 1 MR. BURNETT: Yeah. I'm not sure I need --CHAIRMAN GEORGE: If George Gardner finds 2 3 someone that is sympathetic in the -- you know, to 4 the City of St. Augustine, and the council agrees 5 to add Judy Smith to go and sit in and take their 6 position... 7 MR. BRUNSON: I don't think so. MS. GREEN: Volunteer delegate for the --8

9 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Right. 10 MS. GREEN: -- city. 11 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Mr. Maguire, no? 12 COMMISSIONER MAGUIRE: If I could. The 13 county-elected officials have to be on there. But on boards like this, if you look at JTA, JEA, 14 15 they're all represented, and JIA are all 16 represented, but they have no elected officials. CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. So, you're saying 17 18 that the MPO has to be elected officials. 19 COMMISSIONER MAGUIRE: No, no. The County 20 has to be elected officials. The -- the county in which it's held -- we have to have a county 21 22 commissioner by state law on the -- on the MPO. 23 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. 24 COMMISSIONER MAGUIRE: Outside of that, it 25 just says that you have to be represented. You

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1 have to have a seat on the table.

2 What I'm saying is that -- that Jacksonville 3 airport doesn't have an elected official on the board, on the MPO. They have the executive 4 5 director. CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. More than one? 6 Don't they --7 COMMISSIONER MAGUIRE: They have one. JTA 8 9 has one. JIA, JTA, JPA each have one. And in 10 each case, it's either the executive director or 11 the chairman of their board. 12 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. Fine. All right. 13 MR. BURNETT: And I apologize for not being able to answer the question. I typically have 14 15 almost all of the files with me that I need. And 16 this is one I don't have. 17 I don't have the MPO file with me to be able 18 to tell you, for example, what's in your contract 19 related to who has to be there, because 20 contractually, there could be something in there 21 as well, I guess. 22 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. I -- it was just a 23 thought that -- you know, that there are other

- organizations or other entities within the county
- 25 that are more directly impacted by decisions made

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on the MPO than this real estate that we're having 1 here. And for us to keep it and have that 2 representative go there for us and come back and 3 give us the briefings and everything that we need 4 would have also satisfied the problem. 5 6 I am definitely against the county paying our way, because I don't want to get any kind of 7 8 obligation back and forth to the county. COMMISSIONER MAGUIRE: Thank you. And if I 9 10 might, Mr. Chairman, the --11 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: We're thinking about taking 12 the county over as opposed to --13 MS. GREEN: We still want that health 14 insurance. 15 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: But we want the health

17 COMMISSIONER MAGUIRE: Is this a hostile 18 merger or... The Nassau Port Authority, 19 Fernandina Beach, their executive director is on 20 the board. Okay. - 24 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: With the happenings of this
- past week, I imagine each one of you board members

1	have had comments from the public, you know, as I
2	have had comments about "I can't believe that an
3	airplane could be stolen," you know, and this,
4	that, and the other.
5	I have been assured by Mr. Cooper that we
6	are, you know, in compliance with all of our
7	security requirements of the Homeland Security.
8	But would you like to make a general comment on
9	MR. COOPER: Well, all of the requirements
10	that Florida Department of Transportation puts
11	out, we're in compliance with. The
12	recommendations of the task force that various
13	groups had met with, in which TSA came up with
14	general aviation security requirements, or
15	recommendations, we meet or exceed all of those.
16	In addition, about a year and a half ago to

17 two years ago, Staff started discussing what enhancements we could do beyond that. That was 18 19 the time frame when those recommendations were being formulated by the TSA or Homeland Security. 20 And we, through the budgeting process, have been 21 22 implementing a number of those improvements. 23 We've got more that are underway now. I 24 don't want to go into the details of them, but there's a significant amount of improvements to 25

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security at this airport, none of which would have 1 2 prevented this airplane from being stolen the way 3 it was. And I don't know that we could do anything to have prevented that, nothing. 4 5 But we are in compliance, we exceed 6 recommendations, and we're doing more beyond that. 7 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. I -- in checking with Mr. Burnett this week, there is a provision, 8 9 you know, within the statutes that we can have a

10	closed-door meeting on this
11	MR. COX: True.
12	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: for the purpose of
13	discussing security plans and where how far
14	this board board wants them to go.
15	And I I guess the logic there is, you
16	know, if you have discussions of that sort of
17	stuff and just, you know, in the public, then
18	then the people that do want to come in just know
19	where the holes are, if there are any holes that
20	are there.
21	So, I would like to suggest that we have one
22	of those meetings, maybe, you know, for an hour in
23	front, you know, of the workshop, you know, but a
24	closed-door session so that the board members can
25	get a more detailed presentation, you know, on
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- security and security possibilities that our staff 1
- 2 has considered that we might want to look forward

3	to down the road so that we're all in in
4	concert with that.
5	MR. GORMAN: More so than the actual security
6	threat is, in my own way of thinking, is the
7	knee-jerk reaction that is possible by the federal
8	and state government, as far as their knee-jerk
9	reaction requiring some compliance from general
10	aviation airports that may not be so so
11	practical, like the ADIZ around Washington DC,
12	which is highly debated, you know.
13	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Well, I'm hoping that
14	Staff, you know, they're privy to all of these
15	discussion points and all of these conferences.
16	Maybe they can tell us what they're thinking.
17	MR. GORMAN: Exactly. That's fine.
18	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: So, is anybody in objection
19	to maybe starting an hour earlier on whatever date
20	we pick? Tuesday, December the 8th, I think it
21	was? Unless we have a closed-door session on
22	security?
23	MS. GREEN: It's November 8th for the
24	November 8th is for the budget, and the 5th is

your regular meeting.

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MR. COX: Right. 1 2 MR. BRUNSON: For the workshop --3 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: I'm sorry, it was November 8th. 4 5 MS. GREEN: November 8th --MR. Generally, 9 10 people have made -- and in fact, in this morning's 11 paper, someone sent a note -- sent a letter to the 12 editor that they're surprised or that it's easier to steal an airplane at the St. Augustine Airport 13 than it is to steal a candy bar at Wal-Mart. 14 And I would just like to point out a couple 15 of things. One is that the person that took that 16 airplane had legal access to the airport. There 17 18 was nothing a security system or a guard or 19 anything else would have changed that. The person 20 came on the airport legally. And that would not 21 have changed. 22 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: How --

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the system, and if you look at the TSA's

MR. COOPER: The thing that did not work in

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25 recommendations, there's recommendations for the

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1	airport to do, the Airport Authority to do, FBOs
2	to do, people that work on the airports to do, and
3	then owners and pilots of airplanes. There's

6	those recommendations was the airplane wasn't
7	locked. That's a recommendation to the pilot or

13	would have been possible to do, as people steal
14	unlocked cars all the all the time and locked
15	cars.
16	But that's the only thing that wasn't done;
17	therefore, the person that wanted to take that

A policeman, it's very easy for a policeman to steal 22 a police car. A cab driver can steal a taxicab. 23 24 A bus driver can steal a bus. A truck driver can steal a truck. Pilots can steal 1 2 airplanes. 3 But if everybody follows, there will be less of that. But we were in compliance, and it was 4 5 not a break-in to this airport. It was not a

lapse in any security at this airport that caused

- 5 either as a PDF or a Word document. And it would
- 6 allow -- a couple of things would happen.
- 7 If you got it that way, you would get it at
- 8 least a week sooner. That would give you more
- 9 time to review it. And it would reduce Staff
- time, which is considerable to produce this, and
- the cost, this paper cost, considerably, save you
- money and save you time.
- 13 And he would like your concurrence in
- allowing you to receive your minutes via e-mail.
- 15 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: If you'd like to put that
- as an agenda item on the next as a way he does
- 17 it --
- MR. COOPER: It's housekeeping. It's on --
- on your agenda.
- 20 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Housekeeping is not part of
- 21 our --
- MR. GORMAN: He could just as easily burn a
- 59 cent CD and hand it to us.
- MR. COOPER: That's an option, also.

1	MR. GORMAN: That's fine, because e-mail is

3	MR. COOPER: And if you have no objections,

7	objection, but I'm not sure I'm ready to voice
8	that objection. So, put it down as an agenda item

11	MR. COOPER: Okay. You just had to have

13	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Yeah. Okay. Let's open it
14	up to public comment. Any general comments or
15	anything? Yes, sir. Mr. Slingluff.
16	11 PUBLIC COMMENT
17	MR. SLINGLUFF: Going back to the security
18	issue, I just want to say that that Bryan's

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19 absolutely right; this -- this instance, there's 20 nothing we could have done to prevent it. It was an inside job. The fellow had knowledge of even 21 22 the procedures around that jet, such as leaving 23 the doors unlocked. But, looking at the benefits here, you know, 24

security is like safety; awareness is 80 percent

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1	of the issue. And so, I do applaud y'all having a
2	meeting and finding out about the proposed changes
3	and new technology that we're implementing at the
4	airport. But we've had meetings with our tenants,
5	and just to get the awareness out out there and
6	get the attitude changed.
7	On on another subject, last last month,
8	we talked about the Hurricane Katrina and the
9	problems with the Red Cross and said we were
10	collecting 10 cents a gallon on our on our fuel
11	and donating it to the Red Cross. So, the

12 airport, I'm happy to announce, we have collected 13 \$7,500 for September. 14 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Great. 15 MR. SLINGLUFF: Looks like October will be 16 even more than that. So, you know, that -- that 17 comes from the whole airport. So, that's really 18 good. And that's all going to the Red Cross. 19 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: That's great. Any other public comments? Ms. Willis? 20 21 MS. WILLIS: Mary Willis, Araquay Park. First of all, I wanted to ask earlier, but 22 23 kind of missed the public comment section there. 24 What percentage of your budget do you spend on salaries? 25

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- 1 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: It's in the budget. We'll
 2 be glad to give you a copy of the budget.
 3 MS. WILLIS: I have a copy of your budget in
- 4 my file.

5 MR. BRUNSON: How much do we spend? 6 MS. WILLIS: I said what percentage. 7 MR. BRUNSON: If you've got the budget, you should know what that is. 8 9 MS. WILLIS: Probably -- it differs with you 10 all than many other organizations where the majority of your budget is spent on salaries. 11 12 It's certainly the biggest, more than 50 percent of our budget with fringe benefits at Mosquito 13 14 Control, and it's a great deal more than 50 percent, I believe, of the School Board. 15 And that was something I was interested in, 16 which of course, it's very difficult to compare 17 apples and oranges when you're looking at other 18 districts. But we do that all the time. In fact, 19 20 I do it at no cost to my district. We get budgets 21 from other comparable agencies at Mosquito 22 Control. 23 My second question is, I posed a problem last meeting as to the mineral rights on the parkways, 24 25 and I'd like to know if Mr. Burnett has checked

1	that and what the answer is.
2	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: I don't remember it,
3	either, Mr. Burnett, but you are on the spot.
4	MR. BURNETT: Mineral rights? I I'm not
5	sure that I was tasked to look up the issue of
6	mineral rights.
7	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: I think it was evidently
8	it was a question Ms. Willis
9	MR. BURNETT: I'll be happy to talk to
10	Ms. Willis about it after the meeting if
11	typically in a plat vacation, if you have property
12	owners
13	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. That's a good idea,
14	that you talk to her after the meeting.
15	MR. BURNETT: Yeah, because I can I can
16	tell you the answer; it's just going to take a
17	little bit of time.
18	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay.

- MR. BURNETT: Essentially when it's -- the
- 20 plat's vacated, the airport will own the property.
- 21 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Mineral rights, too.
- MR. BURNETT: Yes.
- 23 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: If you wouldn't mind
- 24 getting with Ms. Willis and make sure she gets the
- answers. And if she doesn't like them, I'm sure

- she will let us know if she doesn't like those
- 2 answers.
- 3 MS. WILLIS: Mr. Burnett, it's coming up
- 4 before the Planning and Zoning this week to vacate
- 5 the entire plat.
- 6 MR. BURNETT: Not -- not the entire plat.
- 7 MS. WILLIS: The entire plat east of Casa
- 8 Cola.
- 9 MR. BURNETT: Yes, ma'am.
- MS. WILLIS: We're very specific now, so I
- shall be specific and tell you that my brother, a

12 geologist with the U.S.G.S. said that he filed for the mineral rights for all of the parkways in 13 Araquay Park. He is now deceased, but I would 14 15 like an answer on that, please. Thank you. CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Thank you, ma'am. Any 16 other public comments? 17 (No further public comment.) 18 19 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. Board final 20 comments. Mr. Brunson? 21 12.A. - MR. RANDY BRUNSON 22 MR. BRUNSON: Let's see here if I had any 23 thoughts. - 1 and what the future plans were and was very
- 2 impressive. And even -- even with the pilots,
- 3 there was some dissension of -- of why we should

5 Monday, we got this surprise. 6 But -- but Bryan is exactly right; if people 7 will remember that here several years ago, some guy stole a tank and went down the boulevard 8 9 knocking cars off, and -- so, my airplane before last, my Chevrolet key fit the magneto switch, 10 11 just like my airplane did. So, there's -- the -- anybody could have done 12 that, that had the knowledge. And this young 13 14 man's father flew a Westwing, and he's got so much 15 jet time, and it's just -- but that's my comments 16 on that. I look forward to the workshops and hope that 17 18 we can do line items and get some comparisons. That's all I have. 19 20 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Ms. Green? 21 12.B. - MS. SUZANNE GREEN 22 MS. GREEN: The only thing I want to get back 23 with David, the insert we're going to do with the 24 MPO -- I mean, with the Master Plan, I have been 25 approached by some people in Ponte Vedra, because

1	obviously I reside up in that area and that's such
2	a fast growing area and we are the
3	St. Augustine-St. Johns County Airport.
4	I really think we're lacking so much in that
5	area as far as information. I tried to get the
6	St. Augustine Record delivered to my office. They
7	won't do it. They won't deliver. I'm five feet
8	into Duval County, and they refuse.
9	So, getting information to us that are right
10	on the county line, St. Johns County-Duval, which
11	is a lot of Marsh Landing, Sawgrass, all of that
12	area, if I can do anything to help, I will call
13	the Ponte Vedra papers to see if there's a cost to
14	put anything in or whatever, let them know that
15	St. Augustine Record's going to do it anyway.
16	So, if you want, I'll do whatever you need
17	when you guys decide what you're going to put in
18	as the excerpt. Just call me and let me know.
19	MR. GOODE: Thank you.

20 MS. GREEN: Okay. 21 12.C. - MR. JOHN GORMAN 22 MR. GORMAN: In line with that, that's a 23 great project. - 15 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Establish the base line.
- MR. COX: No, I think it's a good idea that
- you have about getting all of that info, the
- same -- the same type of foldout put into the
- 19 Ponte Vedra papers.
- MS. GREEN: I mean, I see this article -- and
- I don't want to take your time right here. We
- didn't have anything.
- MR. COX: I know.
- MS. GREEN: Well, maybe two lines
- 25 (indicating).

- 1 MR. COX: About how you could steal a candy
- 2 bar from Wal-Mart.
- 3 On -- on this issue of security -- and I
- 4 reached out to Mr. Roderick and asked Ed also to
- 5 reach out to Len Tucker, both of S.A.P.A., the

6 Pilots Association, to -- to task -- I'd like us 7 to task the pilots specifically to be much more 8 aware of what's going on on the field. We just 9 can't have people walking on and off the field. 10 And I think Mr. Slingluff would agree with that, 11 also. We need to watch out for ourselves to start 12 with. And that's the first level, right there. 13 Beyond that, I think -- and I -- I totally 14 agree with Bryan -- that this airport meets or 15 exceeds -- or exceeds in most cases -- the -- the level of security that we're required to do. We 16 just can't go out -- I mean, we could have laser 17 18 beams and televisions and all kinds of stuff. We could do that. But it would be, you know, so 19 tedious at that point, that it would -- just 20 21 wouldn't be able to do anything. But that's it. 22 12.E. - MR. WAYNE GEORGE 23 CHAIRMAN GEORGE: Okay. Mr. Slingluff, the idea of how much funds have been collected, you 24

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know, that would be an ideal press release to get

1	it you know, just to you know?
2	MR. SLINGLUFF: Yes. I'll get together with
3	Bryan on that. We'll put that together.
4	CHAIRMAN GEORGE: There you go. That's good.
5	MR. COX: And include that in our foldout?
